BOYD LAUDS DOLE RECORD

Anyone who says that Bob Dole isn't working for the farmer should read the record.

1. Bob Dole co-sponsored and introduced a farm bill which would have provided a voluntary wheat and feed grain program to permit farmers to combine their base acreage and plant the crop of their choice. If the bill had passed, farm income today would be higher than it is now.

2. The Dole bill would have prevented the Secretary of Agriculture from "loading" the market with CCC wheat until prices reached at least 115 per cent of support price plus transportation. About 90,000,000 bushels of government-owned wheat have been "dumped" on the market at a lesser figure since the first of July, 1964, creating heavy pressure on wheat prices at a time when large stocks are still owned by farmers.

3. Bob Dole introduced a bill to increase sugar beet acreage for western Kansas farmers. We are still importing great quantities of sugar from abroad, and at the same time, limiting production on American farms.

NONE of these Dole proposals

were allowed to pass by this present administration.

4. Bob Dole introduced a bill to limit the imports of beef from abroad - imports that were crippling the cattle industry, and making it more difficult for farmers at home.

5. Bob Dole voted for appropriation for REA, soil conservation, watershed and irrigation projects, the school lunch program, the "food for peace" plan (Public Law 480) to help dispose of surplus agricultural products - all of which are beneficial to farmers.

6. Bob Dole supported increased appropriations for farm extension research, and appeared before a Congressional hearing in support of a grain research center.
