Gave Both Yes and No Votes Equal Deliberation.**

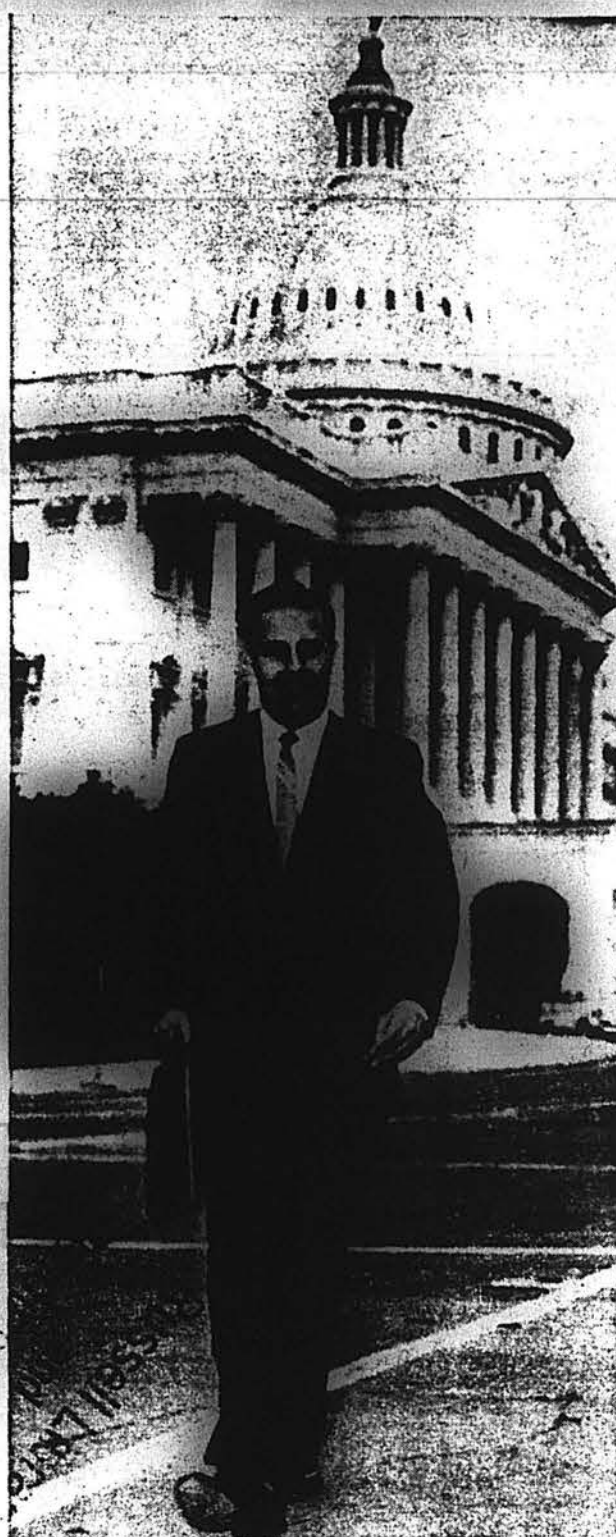
SOME NO VOTES

1. On numerous measures to increase the national debt limit to \$324 billion) which has placed larger mortgages on us, and future generations.
2. "Red tape" controls over American farmers and the Freeman mandatory supply-management farm control program. (Senator Carlson and all Kansas congressmen voted against the mandatory program.
3. Congressional salary increases.
4. Authority to extend credit to Communist countries.
5. On increasing authority of Area Redevelopment Administration, a vote-catching "pork barrel" measure that would have cost \$455,500,000—just to start the program.
6. On \$2 billion in new appropriations for foreign aid.
7. On so-called "anti-poverty" bill, appropriating nearly \$1 billion to start a new massive Federal welfare program.
8. On a bill to enact an international Coffee agreement which effected higher coffee prices for American consumers.
9. On authorization of nearly \$12 billion for urban renewal programs.

DOLE SPEAKS AGAINST OIL IMPORT PROGRAM

HILL CITY — Congressman Bob Dole in a speech given here Friday said:

- Today, the domestic petroleum industry in general and the Kansas independent oil and gas producing industry in particular, are in serious trouble. Economic deterioration in our domestic oil industry, reflected in declines in drilling, exploration, reserves, employment, and crude oil prices, is now in its eighth year.

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A number of factors have contributed to this instability—but the primary and overriding one is the brutal competition of more than 2,000,000 foreign dollars of low-cost foreign oil having a transportation, economic and strategic advantage over the domestic oil industry. If we can't have a realistic Administration solution, then we must and will fight for a legislative solution. Many members of the Congress from our oil-producing states, including myself, are ready to join

1. Introduced legislation to increase sugar beet acreage in Western Kansas. This crop is in short supply at home and the American farmer—not the foreign farmer—should be given preference.

- 2.** Dole introduced legislation, voted for, and fought for a limit on the import of beef from abroad. The market value of cattle sold by Kansas farmers in 1963 declined \$150,000,000 while imports of beef from abroad increased sharply.

If the Dole Bills had become law, farm income would be higher than it is today for all Kansas farmers.
