Sen. Dole Introduced Health Insurance Bill conditions. This employerfinanced catastrophic health insurance coverage would be provided through existing private insurance carriers and employees could be required to pay no more than 25 percent of the premium cost. Tax relief would be provided to employers who incur significant increases in payroll costs as a result of providing catastrophic coverage. (3) For the unemployed and others not covered by parts I and II of the plan, private catastrophic health insurance coverage would be provided to those with lower incomes to assist them in purchasing a policy. In addition, state Medicaid programs would be required to provide catastrophic coverage for their low income beneficiaries.

Sen. Bob Dole believes that comprehensive government-financed health care insurance, which would cost American taxpayers tens of billions of dollars each year, is neither desirable, nor fiscally responsible. But, we can and should do something to insure that serious or catastrophic illness does not result in financial ruin for striken families. No American family should be forced to endure financial bankruptcy because of unexpectbankruptcy because of unexpect-ed catastrophic medical expen-

To address this issue, Sen. Dole has introduced the Catas-Dole has introduced the Catastrophic Health Insurance and Medicare Improvements Act of 1979 (S. 748). When fully implemented, Sen. Dole's Catastrophic Health Insurance Program would cost about \$3 billion, compared to an estimated \$10 to \$20 billion for the other (Long), major catastrophic catastrophic catastrophic program with the other (Long), major catastrophic catastrophic catastrophic programs and catastrophic cat the other (Long) major catastrophic health insurance bill and more than \$100 billion for Sen. Kennedy's cradle-to-grave com-prehensive health proposal.

(1) Senior citizens who are presently eligible for Medicare will be protected against the cost of prolonged, catastrophic illness by expansion of their present benefits. Despite present Medicare and Medicaid coverage, the cut of process for medical care and Medicaid coverage, the out-of-pocket costs for medical care by the elderly have been estimated to be as much as \$600 per person per year. Such large expenditures pose severe burdens to elderly citizens, since many are forced to live on fixed budgets with little extra for emergency purposes. Sen. Dole's bill would expand Medicare coverage for catastrophic illness.

(2) All employers would be required to offer their employees group health insurance with minimal catastrophic benefits. Employees would be free to choose whether to participate or not, and plans could not exclude benefits for pre-existing medical




