Actually, it was a continuing lawyer-client relationship as Dole had been the oil field trucking firm's company attorney beginning when he completed law school, and after becoming the country at and, after becoming the county attorney, continued for an additional eight years, combining his duties in both responsibilities.

When Williams became mayor in 1963, Dole had left Russell for Washington, D. C., as a congressman elected in 1960.

Williams continued as mayor of Russell until his retirement in 1985. The mutual respect between the two men was personified when Dole came to Russell to attend Williams' farewell reception in May of that year.

"As mayor, I would have to go to Washington from time to time on city business. Bob always was helpful in my getting to see the proper people. He assisted in any way he could," Williams said.

At that time R. C. Williams, Inc. was the largest oil field trucking firm in Kansas. It employed about 100 in four locations, Russell, Liberal, Oberlin and Pratt.
