The non-partisan event will be in the Russell Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 6240 Hall and the nearby Memorial Park from 8 a.m. until 11 a.m. The public is invited to attend.

The recognition and reception will provide Kansans an opportunity to renew friendships with Senator and Mrs. Dole and will give the Doles an opportunity to meet and greet their many Kansas friends. A free pancake breakfast will be provided, with serving con-

The homecoming will mark the climax of a busy week of Dole's campaign as he seeks the Republican nomination for president. Senator Dole. It was 50 years ago, April 14, 1945, when Lt. Dole received near-fatal wounds while engaged in an assault on a hill in the Italian Alps where he was serving with the United States Army's 10th Mountain Division. In the long years of recuperation and rehabil-itation, the former athlete, who wanted to become a doctor, found he could continue to serve his people and country in law and public

Senator Dole and Elizabeth will attend the informal breakfast as their time permits, and plan to meet with constituents and supporters during the morning's activities. The breakfast homocoming reception will be open to all, regardless of political affiliations. The Doles are looking forward to seeing their many friends.
