Lights flashed and music blared as they waved to the almost 10,000 spectators gathered inside the Hilton Coliseum in Ames, Iowa. The prize this cool night in corn country would be first place in the Iowa Straw Poll, billed as the "first major event of the 1996 Republican presidential campaign."

Earlier, the notes of "Come Home Bill Bailey" mixed with the chants of hundreds of supporters shouting "We want Dole. We want Dole."

In response, a backer of business executive Morry Taylor, a longshot candidate, flapped a sign and yelled, "Elect

Taylor." Suddenly, a white Frisbee emblazoned with the name of Indiana Sen. Richard Lugar sailed into an area occupied by supporters of Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas. A young boy picked up the Frisbee and ran back to his seat.

Each candidate had a tent. The more popular - Dole, Gramm and commentator Pat Buchanan - had bigger tents and more of them. Gramm also had actor Charlton Heston, who helped dish up pork and beans. And Morry Taylor, in an attempt to attract attention, arrived in a caravan of motor homes and Harley-

Davidson motorcycles. At one point, an airplane trailing a sign, "Go with a winner - vote Dole," flew over the grounds.

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
