OSBORNE, KANS., MAY 29 -- U. S. Senator Bob Dole (R-Kans.) in a commencement address this evening to Osborne High School graduates said, "The keepers of our educational institutions should not resort to repression, but rather, their objective should be to promote a more rational, meaningful dialogue between the generations."

Dole said, "Members of the intellectual community must assume a greater share of the responsibility for establishing the context of lawful dissent."

The Senator continued, "More effective than withdrawing federal assistance from offenders would be expulsion from the academic community." He said, "For those who violate the law, we must insist that the police, and the college administrators deal with them as they would any other law breaker."

Dole concluded, "I do not advocate direct government intervention as a real or effective solution to this problem, but if the college administrators do not retain control of the schools, there will be intervention by the state legislatures or the Congress."
