WASHINGTON, D.C. Nov. 18---"It appears that former Vice President Hubert Humphrey has a short memory," U.S. Senator Bob Dole (R-Kans.) commented on the Senate floor today.

Dole inserted into the Congressional Record editorials from the June 28, 1968 issues of the Birmingham News and the New York Times.

"The former Vice President apparently forgets his own remarks concerning the news media, when he criticizes Vice President Spiro Agnew's remarks.

"Humphrey has accused the Nixon Administration of mounting a calculated attack on the right of dissent and on the news media.

"Just to keep the record straight," he said, "in June, 1968, Mr. Humphrey charged that television in particular had been used to spread the message of rioting and looting. In one instance, Humphrey was quoted as saying, 'If the media are going to broadcast the emotional appeals of the Stokely Carmichaels and the other agitators, it is like throwing gasoline on the flames.'

"Humphrey's remarks concerning the news media, and particularly network television, make Vice President Agnew's statements mild in comparison."

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
