TUCSON, Ariz., Nov. 22 -- U.S. Senator Bob Dole (R-Kans.) tonights said he is certain President Nixon "will insist" on the appointment of another "strict constructionist" to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Speaking here at the Tucson Trunk and Tusk Club, Dole said, 'While liberals may have succeeded in crushing the Haynsworth nomination, those of us who believe the Supreme Court should interpret the Constitution and not be a super-legislative body, will continue to support Nixon's efforts to appoint a conservative strict constructionist."

The Kansas Senator, who supported the Haynsworth nomination, said he sent a telegram to the Judge late Friday expressing "continued support and confidence" in the Chief Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit.

"The Senate action rejecting Judge Haynsworth may well have destroyed his future," Dole said. "This is particularly regrettable because nearly every opponent of the Haynsworth nomination prefaced his remarks by saying he is a man of honesty and integrity."

"Judge Haynsworth was the target of organized labor--with a few exceptions," Dole said. 'No special interest group -- labor, agriculture, small business or whatever should be vested with that much power and influence."

"In reality, neither Judge Haynsworth's record nor his attitude are anti-labor or anti-civil rights. He was rejected because of the efforts of organized labor and because of his conservative philosophy."
