# 33/ WASHINGTON, D.C., January 21 -- The first step to establish the first international animal quarantine in the U.S. was taken today when a bill cosponsored by U.S. Senator Bob Dole (R-Kans.) was reported out of the Senate Agriculture Committee.

Dole, a member of the committee, said "If passed, the bill will permit better detection and control of animal diseases." Currently, he noted, animals imported into the U.S. go through health inspection in an international quarantine station in Canada.

"This bill," Dole said, "will enable American livestock breeders to take advantage of the breeding advances in other countries while maintaining the same strict safequards against disease."

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
