U.S. Senator Bob Dole (R-Kans.), speaking to members of The Associated Milk Producers in Wichita Friday evening, urged support of President Nixon's plan "To Win the Peace" in S.E Asia.

Dole said that a committee advertising a plan called "The Amendment to End the War" was "unwise, inappropriate and impractical." He termed the plan, more correctly, "The Amendment to Lose the Peace" and termed ... members of the committee-"neo-isolationists."

The Kansas Senator also asked for continued support for the President's proposal for the continued development of the Safeguard Anti-Ballistic Missile Syst (ABM).

Dole said, "Perhaps the greatest importance of the ABM is not how many Russian warheads it can destroy or how many American missiles it can protect. Its' greatest value may lie in what it can be traded for at the Strategic Arms Limitations Talks, the so-called Salt Talks."

"This is a crucial period for America's future in the Senate. Defeat of ABM Limitations and "The Lose the Peace Amendment" are important to strengthening President Nixon's efforts to win the peace in Southeast Asia and throughout the world.

"I believe the American people support President Nixon and reject these isolationist and defeatist schemes which have sprung up in the Senate.

"The President needs all of our support and backing. I will give him mine and hope you will join those of us in the Senate who want a safe and proud America in a peaceful and secure world."

In regard to the Farm Bill passed last week by The House of Representatives, Dole informed the audience that Senator Allen Ellender, Chairman of the Agriculture and Forestry Committee, has called a meeting for next Tuesday to consider the bill.

Dole, explained, "The Bill contains an extension of the present Class 1 base plan. It also extends the authority to donate dairy products to Armed Services and Veterans Hospitals and renews the pesticide indemnity for dairy herds. The present bill suspends the mandatory butterfat price support program for farm separated cream and permits the secretary to lower support prices on butter.
