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WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 18 --- Wichita's economic development problems associated with cutbacks in aerospace employment will be the subject of a hearing in Wichita, Feb. 26, U.S. Sen. Bob Dole (R-Kans.) said today.

Dole, a member of the Economic Development Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Public Works, will chair the hearing.

"The Subcommittee," Dole explained, "is studying both short and long-term solutions to under-employment and unemployment problems in preparation for drafting legislation for a national economic development program." "Field hearings are being conducted throughout the country," Dole said, "but we are particularly interested in the Wichita experience." "It will provide us with an opportunity to examine the proper Federal response to situations where plant closings, loss of vital natural resources, or elimination of government facilities created economic distress," the Kansas Senator explained.

"Leaders in the Wichita area," Dole continued, "are making strides in overcoming many of the problems. They are, however, facing many of the same problems in the application of Federal programs that are being encountered in other areas of the country."

Dole said:

The Subcommittee is looking at new ways to promote economic development. It is concerned with such questions as what constitutes proper development, how to determine the development goals and objectives of state and local governments, and how the federal government could be structured to better assist state and local governments in meeting these responsibilities.

There are indications, Dole said, that economic development programs need thorough re-evaluation, and possibly re-structuring. Although the Subcommittee's study is still in very early states, it seems possible that more emphasis on state programs could be part of its recommendations, Dole said.
