Washington, D.C., July 10, 1972 -- Grants ranging from \$200 to \$1,000 to college students meeting specified requirements through the Educational Opportunity Grant Program were announced today by Kansas Senators Bob Dole and James B. Pearson.

To be eligible for the grant, a student must come from a family with an annual income of nine thousand dollars or less with a parental contribution of \$625 or less, be an undergraduate or full-time student and a United States citizen or permanent resident. In addition, each grant requires provision of an equal amount of financial assistance from one or more of the following sources: institutional, state or privately financed grant aid; compensation from employment provided by the institution including employment under the Federal College Work Study Program; or institutionally provided loans, including the National Defense Student Loan Program.

The latest grant of \$44 million brings the total U.S. government Educational Opportunity Grant allocation to \$208 million for fiscal 1973 (July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973). It is estimated that these funds provided through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare will benefit 317,000 students in more than two thousand institutions across the nation.

The list of the 51 Kansas institutions participating in the program, the amount they will receive and the estimated number of students the grants will benefit follows.
