Harold Purdy of Deerfield, Kansas, and Harry L. Lightcap of Hugoton, Kansas, appeared before the full committee of the House Committee on Agriculture to testify in behalf of long-range sugar legislation on which two days of hearings are scheduled, May 15 and 16.

They told the committee farmers of western Kansas have the resources and capacity to triple sugar beet production in western Kansas.

Purdy said Kansas farmers who have irrigation facilities want to expand their production but cannot do so without the proper outlet for their beets.

Purdy and Lightcap, representing the Southwest Kansas Sugar Beet Council, explained their testimony was primarily in the interests of new grower legislation but also pointed out the necessity for a long-range program for new and old growers alike.

"We think more of our domestic sugar requirements should be taken care of by our own domestic growers. American farmers have not been given an opportunity to participate in supplying quotas taken from Communist Cuba," Purdy said.
