Bob Dole, Sixth District Republican Congressman, told a gathering of collegiate and senior Republicans in Hays, Kansas last night that the greatest political crisis is that faced by the Kennedy administration in finding new leadership in the increasingly conservative House of Representatives. Dole, speaking to Republicans on the campus of Fort Hays Kansas State College stated, "The depth of the problem can be measured by the battering administered President Kennedy's legislative program during the last few weeks of the current session."

Dole stated, "With the respected Sam Rayburn absent, the Democratic liberals, moderates, and conservatives are in a three way struggle for power, and despite the outcome, the Kennedy program will have rough sledding in the House in 1962. The Administration's program has not aroused any great enthusiasm around the country, and late session failures after early session successes, has stiffened opposition to Administration bills, and strengthened conservative opposition, in both parties."

Congressman Dole also stated, "Friendship for Mr. Rayburn was the vital factor in early session successes of the Administration, which included enlarging the Rules Committee, extending unemployment benefits, raising the minimum wage, and passage of the Omnibus Housing Bill, but as Mr. Rayburn's illness developed, the Administration's troubles increased, as evidenced by defeat of the Administration's school aid bill, job retraining, postal increases, and foreign aid financing proposals.

"Members of both parties have different philosophies, though many of the Democrat liberals are mere "rubber stamps" who are irked by the growth of conservative strength in the House. From a political standpoint, the conservative hand will be strengthened by Democrats squabbling, which could restore reason and stability in the second session of the 87th Congress.

"The Liberals who are now busily engaged in defending their voting record to their constituents could easily learn, if they would only listen, that there is little, if any, popular demand for 'New Frontierism'."

Dole concluded by telling the Collegiate Republicans present that the Republican party was the only political vehicle available to young people with initiative and a willingness to work for success, and every time the Administration proposes another "we'll take care of you" plan, it is another step down the road to Socialism, and a blow to Americans, young and old, who value individual freedom.

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
