NO CONSISTENT CARTER POLICY, DOLE SAYS

Tarpon Springs, Fla. -- Sen. Bob Dole (R-Kan.) said today the only consistent thread running through the Carter Administration thus far has been the President's desire "to appear to the American people to be unconventional".

Dole told the annual meeting of the Consumer Credit Insurance Association the it was "natural for a new leader to want to put his best foot forward, to want to impress the American people with the full range of his earnest attentions."

"But we have been traited to a public relations blitz that is unprecedented in the history of the Presidency," declared the Republican Party's 1975 Vice-Presidential nominee. "It is customary for such concentrated doses of symbolism to come after and not before you have something to brag about."

The Kansas Senator said he hoped responsible Democrats in Congress were "able to persuade the President to put aside his posturing and his play-actine and work together with the Senate and House to fashion workable solutions to difficult problems."

CONGRESS JUST ANOTH PROBLEM

President Carter's attitude has "alternated wildly between thoughtful consultation with Congress and the dictatorial dismissal of the legislative branch as just another bothersome problem to be dealt with," Dole asserted.

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Republicans can serve their country and their own interests best, the Senator declared, if they support Mr. Carter when he is right and offer constructive alternative when he is wrong,
