NO CONSISTENT CARTER POLICY, DOLE SAYS

Tarpon Springs, Fla. -- Sen. Bob Dole (R-Kan.) said today the only consistent thread running through the Carter Administration thus far has been the President's desire "to appear to the American people to be unconventional".

Dole told the annual meeting of the Consumer Credit Insurance Association that it was "natural for a new leader to want to put his best foot forward, to want to impress the American people with the full range of his earnest attentions."

DOSES OF SYMBOLISM

"But we have been treated to a public relations blitz that is unprecedented in the history of the Presidency," declared the Republican Party's 1975 Vice-Presidential nominee. "It is customary for such concentrated doses of symbolism to come after and not before you have something to brag about."

The Kansas Senator said he hoped responsible Democrats in Congress were "able to persuade the President to put aside his posturing and his play-acting and work together with the Senate and House to fashion workable solutions to difficult problems."

CONGRESS JUST ANOTHER PROBLEM

President Carter's attitude has "alternated wildly between thoughtful consultation with Congress and the dictatorial dismissal of the legislative branch as just another bothersome problem to be dealt with," Dole asserted.

Dole said the President's positions have "veered sharply" from extreme caution to off-the-cuff pronouncements before his advisers have completed their studies of a complicated problem.

Republicans can serve their country and their own interests best, the Senator declared, if they support Mr. Carter when he is right and offer constructive alternatives when he is wrong.

He cited the House defeat of the common site picketing bill as an example of the influence the minority can bring to bear on public policy by translating issues into terms that ordinary people understand.
