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INTERSTATE TRASH DUMPING

WASHINGTON -- SENATE REPUBLICAN LEADER BOB DOLE (R-KANSAS) TODAY SUBMITTED TESTIMONY TO THE SENATE SUBCOMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ON A DOLE-BACKED BILL TO HELP STATES SUCH AS KANSAS REGULATE OR BAN THE DUMPING OF OUT-OF-STATE WASTE WITHIN THEIR BORDERS.

TO STATE THE OBVIOUS, INTERSTATE DUMPING OF TRASH IS AN ENORMOUS PROBLEM. AFTER A COUPLE OF ATTEMPTS WHICH I STRONGLY SUPPORTED LAST YEAR TO DEAL WITH THIS ISSUE IN THE SENATE, I AM HEARTENED BY THE FACT THAT MANY MORE MEMBERS OF CONGRESS ARE BEGINNING TO PAY ATTENTION TO THIS IMPORTANT MATTER. THE LONGER WE AVOID DEALING WITH THIS ISSUE, THE GREATER THE HARDSHIP FOR MANY OF OUR STATES, THEIR COMMUNITIES, AND THEIR CITIZENS.

ON A NATIONAL LEVEL, THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY ESTIMATES THAT AMERICANS GENERATE ABOUT 4 POUNDS OF TRASH PER PERSON DAILY -- OR ABOUT 180 MILLION TONS OF TRASH A YEAR. SUCH AMOUNTS ARE PROJECTED TO MOVE IN ONLY ONE DIRECTION -- UP -- REACHING AS MUCH AS 216 MILLION TONS

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PER YEAR BY THE YEAR 2000.

WITH 80 PERCENT OF SUCH WASTE BEING DISPOSED OF IN PRIVATE AND
PUBLIC LANDFILLS, IT IS NO WONDER THAT LANDFILLS ARE BEING FILLED UP AT
AN ALARMING RATE. INDEED, IN 1960, THERE WERE ROUGHLY 30,000 LANDFILLS
IN THE U.S.; BY 1986, THIS NUMBER HAD FALLEN TO JUST 6,000 LANDFILLS.
THESE STATISTICS BECOME EVEN MORE STARTLING WHEN CONSIDERED IN THE
CONTEXT OF A RECENT REPORT BY THE U.S. OFFICE OF TECHNOLOGY ASSESSMENT IN
WHICH IT WAS ESTIMATED THAT 80 PERCENT OF CURRENT LANDFILLS WILL REACH CAPACITY AND CLOSE WITHIN THE NEXT 20 YEARS.

THE INESCAPABLE RESULT OF THIS SITUATION IS THAT SOME STATES ARE

BECOMING DUMPING GROUNDS FOR OTHER STATES THAT HAVE NOT ADEQUATELY
ASSUMED RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THEIR OWN GARBAGE.

EAST COAST TRASH EXPORTS TO KANSAS

KANSAS IS ONE OF A NUMBER OF MIDWESTERN STATES THAT IS BEGINNING TO
FIND OUT-OF-STATE TRASH ON ITS DOORSTEP.

INDEED, I WAS TOLD JUST YESTERDAY BY THE KANSAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT (KDHE) THAT THE LAST FEW WEEKS HAVE WITNESSED AN INCREASE IN SHIPMENTS -- WHICH ONLY RECENTLY STARTED -- OF TRASH ORIGINATING FROM NEW YORK AND NEW JERSEY.

LAST WEEK, KDHE ISSUED AN ORDER TO STOP THE DUMPING OF TRASH IN THE MCPHERSON CITY LANDFILL UNTIL ITS OWNER STARTS COMPLYING WITH THE DUMPING LAWS. I MIGHT ADD THAT THE OWNER OF THE LANDFILL IS A NEW JERSEY COMPANY AND THAT AT LEAST SOME OF THE TRASH BEING DUMPED IS FROM OUT-OF-STATE.

I KNOW THAT AT LEAST TWO OTHER COMMUNITIES IN KANSAS HAVE OR ARE FACING SIMILAR DECISIONS INVOLVING THE IMPORTATION OF TRASH FROM OTHER

STATES.

THE SOLUTION TO THIS EXTREMELY CRITICAL PROBLEM LIES IN LEGISLATION TARGETED AT BOTH THE STATE AND NATIONAL LEVELS. IN THIS CONNECTION, I AM PROUD TO HAVE BEEN AN ORIGINAL COSPONSOR OF S. 153, WHICH WAS INTRODUCED BY THE DISTINGUISHED SENATOR FROM INDIANA, SENATOR COATS, AT THE

BEGINNING OF THE 102ND CONGRESS. THIS BILL PROVIDES IMMEDIATE RELIEF TO THE STATES BY GIVING THEM REGULATORY AUTHORITY TO IMPOSE DISPOSAL FEES ON OUT-OF-STATE TRASH, INCLUDING FEES WHICH DIFFERENTIATE BETWEEN TRASH ORIGINATING FROM DIFFERENT STATES.

GIVE STATES FREEDOM TO MANAGE, BAN, OUT-OF-STATE GARBAGE OND, THIS BILL PROMOTES A LONG-RANGE SOLUTION TO THIS PROBLEM BY SECOND, THIS BILL PROMOTES A LONG-RANGE SOLUTION TO THIS PROMOTES AND IMPLEMENT 20 YEAR SOLID WASTE ENCOURAGING STATES TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT 20 YEAR SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLANS. IN CONNECTION WITH THE ADOPTION OF SUCH PLANS, WOULD BE AUTHORIZED TO BAN THE DUMPING OF OUT-OF-STATE TRASH WITHIN THEIR BORDERS.

IN MY OPINION, THIS BILL IS PRO-STATE, PRO-CHOICE, AND PRO-ENVIRONMENT. IT IS A FORWARD-LOOKING BILL THAT GIVES STATES THE FREEDOM-TO-CHOOSE HOW TO DEAL WITH THEIR TRASH PROBLEMS, WHILE ENCOURAGING A COMPREHENSIVE STRATEGY FOR DEALING WITH SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT.

I HOPE THAT THIS DISTINGUISHED SUBCOMMITTEE WILL CAREFULLY CONSIDER THIS LEGISLATION AND THAT THE FULL SENATE WILL TAKE IT UP FOR CONSIDERATION IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

MANY OF OUR STATES CAN NOT WAIT MUCH LONGER FOR HELP WHICH CAN ONLY COME FROM CONGRESS. ###
