

KU POLLUTION STUDY IN LINE FOR \$1.45 MILLION GRANT; DOLE'S REQUEST APPROVED TODAY, ALONG WITH EASTERN EUROPE PROGRAM

WASHINGTON - Senator Bob Dole (R-Ks) announced today that the Senate Appropriations Committee has approved his request to fund a pollution research program at the University of Kansas, Lawrence. In addition, the committee also voiced their strong support for a training program for Eastern European government officials, also at KU.

During mark-up of the FY 1992 Veterans Administration, Housing and Urban Development, and Independent Agencies Appropriations bill, the full committee agreed to Dole's request of \$1,450,000 to fund, for a second year, a nonpoint-source pollution project jointly researched by the University of Kansas, Iowa State University, and the University of Nebraska.

"The environment is one of America's priority issues. This project will help us determine ways of limiting water pollution in the future including long-term monitoring of streams and other water resources," said Dole. "This second year of critical funding will enable these research teams to study water samplings for an additional year."

In addition, included in the FY 1992 Commerce, Justice and State Appropriations bill, the full Committee agreed with Senator Dole in adding report language about KU's Institute for Economic Pluralism and Democratization program. The Institute seeks to train educators from universities throughout Eastern Europe in democratic and economic disciplines.

"KU is one of the leading institutions on Eastern Europe issues. By educating instructors from all over Eastern Europe, they will be able to train leaders of local and regional government and business enterprises in these fragile new democracies. This is one of the most effective ways to help the forces of democracy and free enterprise achieve their goals," said Dole.
