## HIGH-TECH LASER RESEARCH FACILITY WINS FUNDING BREAKTHROUGH -GARDEN CITY STILL CANDIDATE FOR \$211 MILLION OUTER SPACE PROJECT

WASHINGTON - Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole (R-Ks) announced today that the Senate Appropriations Committee has agreed with his request of \$23.5 for the Laser Interferometer Gravitational Wave Observatory (LIGO), a high-tech outer space monitoring facility.

Garden City is a finalist in the competition with 18 other cities to be the home of this \$211 million project. committee completed action on the FY 1992 Veterans Administration, Housing and Urban Development, and Independent Agencies Appropriations bill.
