RESEARCH GRANTS;
KSU, KU AND WSU TO GET ASSISTANCE

DODGE CITY - Kansas Senator Bob Dole announced today that the state's higher education system has secured a \$100,000 federal planning grant to help Kansas universities compete for energy-related research funding.

The grant, awarded by the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), will be administered by Kansas State University. Along with K-State, Wichita State and the University of Kansas will use the federal funding to aid in developing a comprehensive five-year plan for strengthening energy-related research and human resource development.

"This grant will help boost three of our state universities' chances to secure critical funding. This grant will strengthen even further our state's already outstanding research resources at these universities. The need to produce substantially more energy within the United States and to use precious energy more wisely was made crystal clear by the Persian Gulf War. With this grant, Kansas can leap to the forefront of that effort."

Under the DOE program, a minimum of 20% cost-sharing from each state is required. It is a statewide initiative that calls for a partnership between the state, industrial leaders and state universities.
