## TAXES

- O AGAIN, LET ME STATE MY POSITION THAT TO BALANCE THE BUDGET WE NEED TO LOOK AT SPENDING CUTS AND NOT NEW TAXES.
- O I BELIEVE THAT KEEPING THE LOWER RATES ENACTED IN 1986 IS

- O I KNOW THAT YOU ARE ALSO CONCERNED ABOUT THE AVAILABILITY AND
  COST OF LIABILITY INSURANCE. MANY OF YOU THINK THAT THE LAWS
  GIVING THE STATES JURISDICTION OVER INSURANCE REGULATION
  SHOULD BE REPEALED AND THAT THE CONGRESS SHOULD ACT TO LIMIT
  DAMAGE AWARDS IN MANY CASES.
- THESE ARE UNDERSTANDABLE CONCERNS AND WE SHOULD CERTAINLY
