THE HUCK BOYD FOUNDATION IS IN THE PROCESS
OF ESTABLISHING A RURAL RESOURCE CENTER TO HELP
RURAL COMMUNITIES AND CITIZENS KEEP THEIR VITALITY
IN CHANGING ECONOMIC TIMES. THE CENTER

WILL PROVIDE A CLEARINGHOUSE FOR INFORMATION WHICH WILL ALLOW SMALL TOWNS IN RURAL KANSAS TO HAVE ACCESS TO SELF-HELP MEASURES AND POINT THEM IN THE DIRECTION OF POTENTIAL PRIVATE AND PUBLIC ASSISTANCE. JUST AS HUCK HIMSELF GENERATED A PERSONAL VITALITY THROUGHOUT THE TOWNS AND COUNTIES OF KANSAS WHILE HE WAS WITH US, IT IS OUR HOPE THAT THIS FOUNDATION WILL SERVE AS A CATALYST IN PROVIDING THE SUPPORT NECESSARY

TO REENERGIZE RURAL KANSAS. THE PROPOSED RURAL RESOURCE CENTER WILL PERPETRATE HUCK'S SPECIAL GIFT OF FINDING SOLUTIONS TO THE PROBLEMS FACING RURAL AMERICA.

THE AREAS WHICH THE FOUNDATION HAS CITED AS ITS MAJOR FOCUS ARE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, EDUCATION, RURAL MEDICAL SERVICE, TRANSPORTATION, CONSERVATION AND WILDLIFE PRESERVATION, THE ENVIRONMENT, BASIC INFRASTRUCTURE, AND CULTURAL

ACTIVITIES. THE HUCK BOYD FOUNDATION HAS SET \$3 MILLION AS ITS FUNDRAISING GOAL, AND WE ALL NEED TO WORK HARD TO MAKE THIS A REALITY.

WORKSHOPS AND OTHER SPECIAL EVENTS TO PROVIDE
EXPERTISE TO SMALL BUSINESS PEOPLE IN RURAL
AREAS. THERE ARE ALREADY A LOT OF SOURCES FOR
PROGRAMS AND INFORMATION THAT COULD BE USEFUL
IN EFFORTS TO REVITALIZE RURAL KANSAS, BUT THERE
IS REALLY NO WAY TO PULL IT ALL TOGETHER IN A
CENTRAL PLACE TO MAKE ALL THE AVAILABLE
INFORMATION AND TECHNICAL EXPERTISE READILY

ACCESSIBLE TO INDIVIDUALS AND ORGANIZATIONS IN
RURAL AREAS. IT IS OUR HOPE THAT THIS INITIATIVE WILL
ACCOMPLISH THESE OBJECTIVES.

FROM MY EXPERIENCE WITH KANSANS, I KNOW
THEY ARE RESOURCEFUL AND CREATIVE PEOPLE WITH A
STRONG WILL TO GET THINGS DONE. SOMETIMES THEY
ONLY NEED THE TOOLS TO ACHIEVE THEIR GOALS AND
THE RIGHT INFORMATION TO USE AS A ROADMAP. THE
RURAL RESOURCE CENTER WILL PROVIDE THE MISSING
LINK BETWEEN ALREADY EXISTING PROGRAMS.

TOPEKA, Kan.--More than 100 Kansas business people, educators and other friends of the late Kansas newspaperman Huck Boyd heard plans Friday evening for a proposed rural resource center and related programs at a Topeka dinner.

Honorary hosts for the reception and dinner at the Topeka Country Club were Kansas Senators Bob Dole and Nancy Kassebaum along with Rep. Pat Roberts.

Sen. Dole greeted the guests telling them how the proposed center would perpetuate Boyd's gift of finding answers and solutions to problems facing rural America. "Huck Boyd had a unique ability to get answers and results and that is what this rural resource center is all about," Dole explained.

~~Both~~ senators and Rep. Roberts said they were especially pleased that cooperative arrangements have already been discussed with several Kansas universities, medical organizations and other foundations.

Fran Jabara, director of The Wichita State University center for entrepreneurship and small business development, announced a tentative agreement with the Huck Boyd Foundation to provide workshops and other special events to help small business people in rural areas. Jabara has also been named to the foundation's leadership council.

Gov Mike Hayden discussed his friendship with Huck Boyd and the efforts needed to help revitalize rural Kansas. The featured speaker was John Graham of the Kansas Farm Bureau.

Boyd's widow, Marie, thanked the guests for attending and shared some of her late husband's aspirations for rural Kansas and America.

Foundation officials announced that a \$3million fund raising campaign is to get underway later this year.

The proposed rural resource center will compile and store information about programs, institutions, agencies, key leaders and related background to assist any community, organization or individual upon request. Three primary areas to start include (1) rural medical service, (2) economic development and (3) the environment.

Other areas of resource background will cover the areas of rural education, transportation, conservation and beautification, wildlife preservation, cultural activities, basic infrastructures and responsive government.

The three Kansas congressional leaders and foundation officials said the rural resource center will serve as a central clearing house regarding pertinent information relating to programs developed for rural enhancement and survival. Sen. Kassebaum pointed out that there are many programs already in place designed to assist Kansas communities, organizations and individuals, but too many times no one knows they exist. "With one phone call people can get that information from this center," Kassebaum said.

Rep. Roberts said most Kansas communities have the brainpower, manpower and willpower to help themselves if they have the right information, resources and directions. One way to provide that information, he said, is through the proposed rural resource center.

Foundation officials said that the center could be functioning within 90 days following the successful completion of the fund raising campaign. The facility will be located in Phillipsburg, home of Huck Boyd.

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HUCK BOYD FOUNDATION
FACT SHEET

WHAT IS THE HUCK BOYD FOUNDATION? It is a public, non-profit foundation established by a select group of Huck Boyd's friends as a memorial to the Phillipsburg newspaperman, civic leader and politician.

WHAT IS THE FOUNDATION DOING? It is in the process of establishing a Rural Resource Center to help rural communities and citizens find and/or keep abreast of private and public programs, institutions, agencies, grants, financing, individuals and related information leading to the enhancement and survival of rural America.

WHY ESTABLISH A RURAL RESOURCE CENTER? Huck Boyd was known for his unique ability to get answers or find solutions to various problems confronting rural areas. Much of his success was due to his unique tenacity as well as an assortment of friends, colleagues, special contacts and numerous business, civic, educational, medical, military and governmental leaders that allowed him to go directly to decision makers or to the sources of needed information. The Rural Resource Center is our way of perpetuating Huck's special contribution to Phillipsburg, the State of Kansas and the United States.

HOW WILL THE RESOURCE CENTER FUNCTION? It will most probably be similar to a library disseminating needed information via a phone-linked computer for fast service and information storage.

WHAT KINDS OF INFORMATION WILL BE AVAILABLE? All types of background on public and private programs, institutions and agencies, grants and financing, case studies, lists of department and/or program leaders and related information.

HOW ABOUT AN EXAMPLE? Okay! Suppose that a rural community is about to lose its one and only doctor. How does it go about getting a replacement? The Rural Resource Center will have specific information on file regarding what agencies, institutions and/or individuals to contact, any grants or assistance available and case studies illustrating how other communities have solved a similar situation.

EXPAND ON THAT. How about a small community, without a formal city government, that needs to install a sewer system? What do they do? The Rural Resource Center could give them the name of agencies, construction firms, financial considerations and options and case studies to help them get the assistance they need.

GIVING INFORMATION RATHER THAN DONATIONS IS THE GOAL? Exactly. There are already numerous programs in place to help rural communities in various ways, but very often no one knows about them. The Rural Resource Center will not only have that information available but will help to promote or bring attention to those programs.

WILL A BUILDING HAVE TO BE CONSTRUCTED? As the Center expands its information services, storage and other programs it will eventually build a specific Resource Center and Museum complex including a lecture hall and meeting rooms.

HOW ABOUT NOW? That's the beauty of the Rural Resource Center concept. It's estimated that within 90 days after the Foundation raises the money needed the Rural Resource Center can be in operation in the Foundation's current offices.

WHAT ARE THE AREAS OF INTEREST OR PRIORITIES? There are ten of them: (1) Rural medical service, (2) economic development, (3) the environment, (4) education, (5) transportation, (6) conservation and beautification, (7) wildlife preservation, (8) cultural activities, (9) basic infrastructures, and (10) responsive government.

WHAT ARE INFRASTRUCTURES? Primarily we think of them as local government structures, organization and services such as the form of government (township, county) and what services it provides. However, infrastructures can refer to business, medical and other organizations too.

CAN THE RESOURCE CENTER COVER ALL TEN AREAS? Not immediately. The three major priorities will be (1) rural medical service, (2) economic development and (3) the environment.

WHAT ENVIRONMENTAL PROBLEMS WILL BE CONSIDERED? Background on quality water supplies, disposing of asbestos and other related hazards, and cleaning up underground fuel tanks.

WILL THE FOUNDATION BE DOING ANYTHING ELSE? Absolutely. Steps have already been taken to develop a program in cooperation with the Center for Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development at The Wichita State University. Workshops will be offered in the rural areas to help small business people function and compete more effectively. Noted business leaders will also be brought to the rural areas to meet with business people, farmers and students for sharing problems, possible solutions and related background.

ANYTHING MORE? Discussions have also been held with the Kansas State University Extension Department for possible cooperation with their DIRECT program and with the Kansas Department of Commerce. Similar discussions have been held with the Great Plains Health Alliance and meetings are scheduled with the Wesley Foundation regarding rural health projects.

THEN THERE IS MORE THAN THE RURAL RESOURCE CENTER? You bet. Our hope and plan is to serve as a catalyst in providing the necessary background and information for rural America to help itself and regain its vitality. New methods, new alternatives, options and new thoughts can be implemented to deal effectively with the changes and demographics of today if people know how or where to get the appropriate information and assistance.

YOU FEEL THAT RURAL AMERICA IS STILL IMPORTANT. Certainly. Just where do some of these so-called "experts" think our economic food supply is going to come from? And with traffic congestion, pollution, rising crime rates, needed recreation areas, a growing demand for retirement areas and a need for a well prepared work force the rural areas can be our greatest resource for solutions to many of society's current and future problems.

HOW WILL YOU FINANCE THE RURAL RESOURCE CENTER? A major fund raising campaign will get underway in the near future. Efforts are proceeding right now to establish a Leadership or Advisory Council to assist the Foundation in preparing for the fund raising effort.

HOW MUCH MONEY IS NEEDED? We believe that a \$3 million goal will be sufficient to get the Rural Resource Center and related programs underway. Of course an ongoing fund raising effort will be instituted after the initial \$3 million capital fund campaign is successfully completed to assure the Foundation of stable financing.

WILL URBAN AREAS BENEFIT TOO? Of course! Adequate and economical food, quality water supplies, clean air, soil and water conservation, wildlife preservation, an educated work force with good work ethics and a viable transportation system favors urban areas too. By keeping our rural areas economically viable the urban areas remain healthy and have more options and possibilities open to them. And remember that much of the Eastern establishment and West coast look at Kansas City, Wichita, Omaha and Oklahoma City as rural communities rather than urban. We must work together and solve the various challenges confronting us to help the Midwest grow and thrive.

The March meeting of the Huck Boyd Foundation Board of Directors was called to order in the Foundation office at 8 a.m. by William W. Kaumans, President. Members present were Kaumans, Don Hewitt, Marcia Boyd Krauss, Cy Moyer and Doyle Rahjes.

A motion to approve the Minutes of the February board meeting was made by Don Hewitt. Second by Doyle Rahjes. Motion passed.

The Treasurer's Report was deferred until the April meeting.

The Executive Director reported the following:

1. Payne attended a state-wide Small Business Development Center meeting on the Kansas State University campus, Mar. 3.
2. A meeting was scheduled with Harlan Priddle, Department of Commerce, Dr. Walter Woods and other K-State representatives, and the Huck Boyd Board of Directors for Mar. 9. Due to airplane landing gear problems a second meeting date was scheduled for Mar. 20.
3. Payne and members of the board are continuing to work on both leadership and prospective donor lists.
4. The final proof of the brochure was received from Printing Inc. Cy Moyer made the motion, with a second by Don Hewitt, to add a reference of environmental protection and tell the printer to proceed.
5. A pledge form has been prepared by Payne and approved by Lowell Hahn. Payne will submit it to the printer immediately.
6. A gift-range "table" and rating forms for use in the fund raising campaign have been prepared by Payne.
7. A suggested dinner invitation and RSVP form was prepared by Payne and forwarded to Rep. Pat Roberts for approval by Roberts, Sen. Dole, and Sen. Kassebaum along with their signatures, printing and mailing.
8. Reservations have been confirmed with the Topeka Country Club for Friday evening, Apr. 14, and a large projector and sound system have been reserved too. Ten new video tapes have been ordered from Innovative Communications and delivered.
9. Payne contacted a dozen Kansas bankers, by phone, to tell them about the Foundation, the Rural Resource Center, and to request potential leadership and donor names. The results were varied. Fran Jabara, Wichita State University Entrepreneurship Director, was also contacted about a possible professorship or related program.

10. A fund raising campaign operating schedule has also been prepared by Payne.

Following his report, Payne was asked to make reservations for the board members and spouses in Topeka for the evening of April 14. (Reservations have been confirmed at the Club House Inn, I-70 and Wanamaker Road, for everyone except Doyle and Charlotte Rahjes.)

The topics of (1) donor lists, (2) a leadership council, (3) recruiting volunteers and solicitors and (4) selection of campaign and committee chairmen were discussed under "Old Business." It was agreed that special meetings would most probably be needed to resolve those respective issues.

Under New Business the Topeka dinner was the major subject. It was felt that the program should include a speaker in addition to the video tape presentation. After some discussion Doyle Rahjes recommended John Graham of Manhattan and Farm Bureau. Don Hewitt made the motion to invite Graham, seconded by Cy Moyer. Motion passed.

A reception or "open house" for Phillipsburg and Phillips County was then discussed. It was felt that some special event should be held prior to the Topeka dinner, possibly Apr. 11 or 12, at Martha's Restaurant. An informal "open house" featuring light refreshments and the continual showing of the videotape is to be planned with the help of board members' spouses. It was suggested that Payne contact Dora Kaumans and Charlotte Moyer to serve as co-chairwomen.

The remainder of the meeting was spent reviewing, adding and deleting names for the April 14 dinner invitation list. Payne was advised to try to have the list completed by Tuesday, Mar. 22.

The meeting adjourned at 11:40 a.m.
