A LITTLE BACKGROUND:

The 250 members of the AAP represent approximately 80% of the books sold in the United States. Representatives of 203 are confirmed for attendance tomorrow.

They have titled the Senator's remarks on their program as "Legislative Policy Issues - The Republican Perspective".

Simon & Schuster, the Senator's publishers, will be represented in the audience but Dick Snyder will not be there.

ISSUES:

Aside from the matters of general interest suggested by the title, topics of concern will range from the international copyright questions you have already addressed in your draft to censorship (the NEA funding resolution / Mapplethorpe matter are issues to which this audience might be attuned) to, possibly, postal rates (an obvious bread-and-butter matter for these guys).

In addition, literacy programs are of more than altruistic import to this group - although I'm not sure what the precise question would be.

A last thought, influenced by my overexposure to communications issues: this group <u>is</u> concerned with the Baby Bell legislation - for the simple reason that, if a free-the-Bells bill (such as the one introduced by Dole in 1986) were to pass, the regional Bell companies would be allowed into electronic publishing, possibly in competition with these guys.

The current state of play on that issue is that there's a proposed bill in the House (Markey's), not introduced but under discussion; nothing in the Senate yet (Hollings has a bill in re: manufacturing, but it doesn't address publishing), but lots of as yet unproductive negotiating between the Bells and the newspaper publishers, overseen by Danforth.

THANK YOU AND GOOD MORNING. I'M PLEASED TO JOIN YOU FOR YOUR FIRST ANNUAL MEETING.

YOU MIGHT KNOW THAT I WROTE A BOOK A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO —— AND THEN AGAIN, YOU MIGHT NOT. WITH MY WIFE ELIZABETH, I AM THE AUTHOR OF 'UNLIMITED PARTNERS'—— I'M STILL WAITING FOR SIMON AND SCHUSTER TO BRING

IT OUT IN PAPERBACK. IF YOU'D LIKE A COPY, WE HAVE ONE OR TWO LEFT. HOWEVER, IT HAS TOPPED THE RUSSELL KANSAS DAILY NEWS BESTSELLER LIST FOR 98 STRAIGHT WEEKS.

YOU PICKED A PRETTY
REMARKABLE WEEK FOR YOUR
MEETING. NOT A SINGLE
COMMUNIST REGIME HAS BEEN
TOPPLED ANYWHERE IN THE
WORLD.

OF COURSE, IT'S ONLY THURSDAY.

YOU'VE COME WASHINGTON AT A TIME WHEN OF THE ACTION MOST OCCURRING IN OTHER PLACES IN WORLD. STILL, THE INCREDIBLE CHANGES WE'VE ALL SEEN HAVE CREATED TREMENDOUS CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITES FOR US HERE AT HOME --THAT'S WHAT I'D LIKE TO FOCUS

ON THIS MORNING.

LITHUANIA

JUST LOOK AT WHAT'S GOING THIS IN LITHUANIA. ON GORBACHEV'S FIRST REAL TEST SINCE HE ASCENDED TO THE PRESIDENCY IN THE SOVIET UNION. LITHUANIA MAY BE A SMALL COUNTRY -- BUT STAKES FOR ITS PEOPLE, FOR THE SOVIET UNION, AND FOR U.S.-SOVIET RELATIONS COULDN'T BE MUCH HIGHER. MET WITH PRESIDENT BUSH YESTERDAY, AND HE RIGHTFULLY SAID THIS IS A TIME FOR RESTRAINT. HE AND I BOTH BELEIVE THAT THE SITUATION LITHUANIA CAN BEST IN BE RESOLVED BY PEACEFUL NEGOTIATION. BUT MAKE NO MISTAKE ABOUT IT —— THE WHITE THE CONGRESS HOUSE AND STAND THE LITHUANIAN PEOPLE.

THE SOVIET AUTHORITIES MUST UNDERSTAND THE BOTTOM LINE: IF THEY USE FORCE TO DENY THE LITHUANIAN PEOPLE THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE THEIR OWN FUTURE, ALL BETS ARE OFF. UNDER THOSE TERRIBLE CIRCUMSTANCES, THE SOVIETS CAN KISS GOOD-BYE TO THE KIND OF POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONSHIP THAT THEY SO CLEARLY WANT, AND SO BADLY NEED, WITH THE UNITED

STATES. THEY CAN KISS GOOD—BYE TO U.S. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE, VASTLY EXPANDED INVESTMENT AND TRADE, AND THE FUNDAMENTALLY NEW KIND OF POLITICAL RELATIONSHIP THAT HAS DEVELOPED OVER THE LAST TWO YEARS.

IN ANY EVENT, I FIRMLY
BELEIVE THAT THE CHANGES IN
THE SOVIET UNION, IN THE
COMMUNIST BLOC AND IN THE

WORLD ARE FUNDAMENTAL CHANGES. THEY ARE NOT GOING TO BE REVERSED.

GORBACHEV

MRIE BACKEIDES

GAMBLE BACKFIRES

IN MY OWN VIEW ——
STARING COMMUNISM'S FAILURE
IN THE FACE, GORBACHEV TOOK
A GAMBLE. BY LAUNCHING
POLICIES WE NOW CODE—WORD
'GLASNOST' AND 'PERESTROIKA,'
HE GAMBLED THAT A LITTLE

FREEDOM —— POLITICAL, SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC —— COULD SOMEHOW REVITALIZE A SPENT SYSTEM.

THE GAMBLE DIDN'T WORK.

THE GENIE IS OUT OF THE BOTTLE: THE COMMUNIST PARTIES OF EASTERN EUROPE HAVE BEEN ALMOST TOTALLY DISCREDITED.

NO CHECKS TO GORBACHEV

REJECT GEPHARDT PLAN

IF WE ARE TO GORBACHEV SUCCEED. SHOULD DEMAND THE SOVIETS POURING BILLIONS QUIT OF DOLLARS OF MILITARY AID INTO ANACHRONISTIC REGIMES LIKE CASTRO'S IN CUBA, COMMUNIST THUGS IN ANGOLA, AND THE PUPPET GOVERNMENT IN **AFGHANISTAN** REGIMES

WHOSE POLICIES ARE 180%

AND, I'M NOT ONE WHO
THINKS WE SHOULD BE OUT
SPENDING A 'PEACE DIVIDEND'
BEFORE WE'RE EVEN SURE WE
HAVE ONE, AND HOW BIG IT IS.
MOREOVER, IF WE DO GET TO

THE POINT WHEN A REAL 'PEACE DIVIDEND' MATERIALIZES, THE FIRST PLACE IT OUGHT TO BE APPLIED IS REDUCING OUR OWN DEFICITS.

SO I DON'T THINK THE KNEE—

JERK ANSWER —— TAKE IT OUT

OF DEFENSE —— IS THE REAL

ANSWER.

THE FACT IS, WE NOW SPEND \$15 BILLION A YEAR ON FOREIGN AID. WHERE I COME FROM, THAT IS STILL REAL MONEY. YOU OUGHT TO BE ABLE TO DO A LOT WITH THAT.

ONE REASON WE'RE NOT DOING AS MUCH AS WE SHOULD IS WE 'EARMARK' SO MUCH OF THAT MONEY —— THAT MEANS THE CONGRESS TELLS THE PRESIDENT WHERE HE MUST SPEND IT.

WE EARMARK 82% OF OUR ECONOMIC AID, AND 92% OF

WHERE DO WE GET THAT KIND

OF MONEY —— WITH NO INCREASED 'POT,' AND A 'PEACE DIVIDEND' THAT SO FAR IS MORE RHETORICAL THAN REAL?

THE DOLE PLAN

ANSWER, BUT I HAVE SUGGESTED ONE PLACE TO START: WE OUGHT TO CUT 5% OFF THE TOP OF EVERY EARMARK. 5% ISN'T GOING TO KILL ANYONE. AND TAKING IT FROM EVERY

EARMARK, IN MY VIEW, IS THE ONLY WAY TO MAKE IT FAIR, AND MAKE IT POLITICALLY PALATABLE.

I'M PLEASED THE ADMINISTRATION HAS MORE OR LESS ENDORSED THAT PROPOSAL NOW -- AND IN FACT, A WALL STREET JOURNAL POLL SHOWS A LARGE MAJORITY OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE IN FAVOR OF IT, TOO.

WE DO HAVE THE DEBATE STARTED. AND TALKING ABOUT THESE THINGS IS THE FIRST STEP IN DOING SOMETHING ABOUT THEM.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

NO DOUBT ABOUT IT —— THE WORLD IS CHANGING QUICKLY, AND I KNOW THAT CHANGE HAS CREATED NEW PROBLEMS FOR YOUR INDUSTRY. THE GROWTH

FOREIGN ECONOMIES AND OF DEMAND FOR AMERICAN THE ENTERTAINMENT HAS CREATED THE NEW AREA WHOLE OF 'INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS' THE MULTI-BILLION DOLLAR OF AMERICAN PIRACY COPYRIGHTED BOOKS, MUSIC, ARTWORK AND OTHER PRODUCTS OF CREATIVE AMERICANS.

I'M CERTAIN AMBASSADOR
HILLS WILL BE ABLE TO ADDRESS

YOUR CONCERNS IN GREAT DEPTH, BUT I AM HOPEFUL THAT PROGRESS WILL BE MADE THIS YEAR. I AM PLEASED THAT AMBASSADOR HILLS LAST YEAR INITIATED ACTION AGAINST KOREA, UNDER THE 3-0-1 TRADE PROVISIONS. AND WE MUST CONTINUE PRESSING KOREANS THROUGH NEGOTIATIONS, TO KEEP AUTHORS AMERICAN AND

PUBLISHERS FROM GETTING RIPPED OFF, SO THEY CAN ENJOY THE REWARDS OF THEIR OWN HARD WORK. THE BERN CONVENTION. WHICH THE U.S. AGREED TO JOIN LAST YEAR, SHOULD ALSO HELP, AND WITH THE ADVENT OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY, WE MUST BE EVER VIGILANT IN TO PROTECT EFFORTS INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS.



DOMESTIC CHALLENGES

AND OF COURSE, OUR ONLY CHALLENGES ARE NOT OVERSEAS. WE HAVE A BROAD RANGE OF DOMESTIC ISSUES CONFRONTING CONGRESS —— THE FIRST AND FOREMOST BEING THE BUDGET DEFICIT. THE NATIONAL DEBT IS 3.2 TRILLION DOLLARS; INTEREST PAYMENT ON THAT DEBT IS \$160 BILLION A YEAR —— AND THAT'S JUST INTEREST! WE'RE BROKE. THE SAD PART IS, OUR CREDIT—RACKED ECONOMY IS BEING HELD TOGETHER BY THE JAPANESE. IF THEY START CALLING IN THE CREDIT CARD BILLS, WE'RE IN TROUBLE.

IN THE SENATE, WE ARE NOW WITHIN DAYS OF APPROVING A NEW "CLEAN AIR" BILL, A SWEEPING PACKAGE THAT IN THE FINAL ANALYSIS SHOULD BALANCE THE NEED TO CLEAN-UP

OUR AIR, OCEANS AND STREAMS WITH THE NEED TO MAINTAIN INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTIVITY.

THE COMING WEEKS, WE ALSO CONFRONT DIFFICULT ISSUES OF CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM, CHILD CARE, AND A CRIME BILL. BUT, AS ALWAYS, THE SERIOUS DEBATE ON BUDGET AND THE BUDGET PROCESS WILL CONTINUE TO DOMINATE OUR AGENDA UNTIL BOTH CONGRESS AND THE PRESIDENT FACE—UP TO THE TOUGH CHOICES.
