# POINTS OF INTEREST ON SENATE CANDIDATES

#### KEYNOTE ADDRESS

# THURSDAY, AUGUST 2, 1:30 P.M.

#### IOWA

This past Sunday, Tom Tauke and Tom Harkin faced off in their first televised debate on defense spending, crime, drugs, and foreign policy. There's not a doubt in Iowa voters' minds that our Tom beat their Tom. Congressman Tauke was quick on his feet, and Senator Harkin was caught off balance. Even the <a href="Des Moines Register">Des Moines</a> Register, a paper slanted towards the left, called the debate a "draw" (which generally means victory for the challenger).

Tauke said Harkin "was at the top of the list among the Senate candidates" in taking money from S & L political action committees; Harkin replied that he had given back thousands of dollars in campaign contributions and challenged Tauke to do the same.

The next debate will be on August 15, and the subject is abortion. (Tauke's "debate coach" is Linda Divall, the foremost strategist on this and women's issues).

The latest head to head poll taken July 18-22 by American Viewpoint (Divall) shows Tauke within 8%. Harkin is only at 50%.

#### ILLINOIS

Lynn Martin's name identification among Illinois voters is significantly on the rise (now at 75%), and the latest poll taken on July 20, shows Martin trailing Simon by a mere twelve percentage points. In addition, Martin nearly matched Simon dollar-for-dollar during the second quarter of 1990. Simon still refuses to debate Martin, and she has asked Illinois voters to write him to ask why he's afraid to debate.

With Illinois among the major media states, Lynn will need alot of cash to keep pace, since Simon leads the pack among PAC recipients. We can win this one.

#### HAWAII and RHODE ISLAND

Pat Saiki and Claudine Schneider are running energetic, futuristic, and vital campaign against Senators Pell and Akaka, who are about as exciting as watching paint dry on the Senate wall. Saiki and Akaka are dead even at 45%, in the latest poll taken at the beginning of July.

In addition, Saiki outraised Akaka last period with \$374,287 to Akaka's \$269,573. With Democrats greatly outnumbering Republicans in Hawaii, it's important that we work hard to keep Saiki well financed.

The first wave of TV advertisements for Claudine Schneider began weeks ago. President Bush is going to Rhode Island on August 20 to do a fundraising appearance for the Rhode Island GOP. Schneider's latest poll shows a slight decline, but only due to a statewide announcement tour by Pell. She's still a "Tier 1" candidate.

# MONTANA

There was a poll released today by PMR Research, which shows Senator Baucus ahead by only fourteen percentage points (52-38%). Clearly Alan Kolstad is closing the gap. President Bush appeared in Billings for Kolstad on June 20 and raised \$175,000 - a record amount for any political event in Montana.

# IDAHO

Another record breaking event took place in Boise, where Larry Craig brought in \$225,000 during President Bush's visit. Craig had over 900 people in attendance at \$100/plate.

While Craig is well ahead in the polls, Democrat challenger Twilegar reports a net worth of \$4.5 million, and has the resources to make this a close race. It may be good to mention Craig to the Trust members as someone in need of cash.

# COLORADO

The Democrat primary between Josie Heath and Carlos Lucero will occur on August 14. Most recent surveys show that the race is tightening, with Heath still leading. She's the "bigger lib" of the two.

Hank Brown has raised \$3 million and has \$1.3 million on hand. The campaign is on the air with positive media.

#### MICHIGAN

With the Schuette-Durant bout scheduled for August 7, there is no head-to-head polling data available since April between Schuette and Levin. Schuette should win the primary comfortably, but has a mere \$411,998 cash on hand to Levin's \$3,237,473.

With Levin's flip-flop on the flag issue, Schuette has been running some "All-American" media spots.

Stress the importance of Michigan as a major media state and Schuette's need for additional cash.

# NEBRASKA

Hal Daub outraised Exon during the last reporting period \$390,000 to \$336,000. Daub has \$100,000 cash on hand, but since he's not accepting PAC contributions, we should stress him as someone that needs individual contributions. In contrast, Exon has received 60% of his contributions from PACs.

Neither campaign is on the air this week, although Exon ran TV last February, and Daub ran an endorsement by President Bush on radio in Western Nebraska earlier this month along with some newspaper ads.

Daub is running an aggressive, grassroots campaign designed to portray him as "more in touch" with Nebraska's needs.

The President raised \$200,000 for Daub on June 8, and Daub's most recent survey of June 11-12, showed him 8 points behind (keep in mind, it's a Wirthlin poll).
