AFMA: The American Furniture Manufacturers Association (AFMA) is the largest furniture manufacturing trade association -- its membership representing about 75% of the roughly \$15 billion in sales produced by the domestic furniture industry. Membership is geographically widespread with member companies having home offices or plant facilities in every state.

Audience: AFMA is expecting about 100 persons to attend the speech (no Kansans will be present but there will be some executives with company-owned retail operations located in Kansas). The attendees will be CEOs of companies with annual sales ranging from \$50 million to \$1 billion.

GOOD MORNING AND THANK YOU FOR THE KIND INTRODUCTION AND WARM WELCOME. WITH CONGRESS' APPROVAL

RATING AT 18 PERCENT, IT'S ALWAYS A NICE SURPRISE WHEN PEOPLE ARE GLAD TO SEE ME. **IT SEEMS THAT IF YOU FILL A ROOM UP WITH MEMBERS** OF THE HOUSE AND SENATE, NO ONE LIKES US. **BUT SEPARATELY, WE'RE** POPULAR.

FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE THE ANALYSIS IS THE SAME FOR FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE -- GREAT IDEAS AND GREAT PROGRAMS. THE **PROBLEM IS IF YOU** MANDATE THAT BUSINESSES PROVIDE THESE PROGRAMS RATHER THAN HELPING THEM AND

ENCOURAGING THEM TO DO IT, THE LEAVE WILL BE A PERMANENT SABBATICAL FOR SOME OF THEIR EMPLOYEES. THERE'S NO DOUBT THAT **YOU WILL SEE THIS LEGISLATION COME UP FOR** A VETO OVERRIDE. AS WITH **PRIOR GO-AROUNDS ON**

THIS ISSUE, I EXPECT THAT THE PRESIDENT'S CERTAIN VETO WILL BE SUSTAINED. **OSHA REFORM AND STRIKER** REPLACEMENT IT SEEMS STRANGE TO ME THAT AS WE TALK ABOUT JOBS AND THE NEED TO **CREATE MORE JOBS -- AN ISSUE THAT HAS BEEN**

HIGHLIGHTED BY THE RECENT TRAGIC EVENTS IN LOS ANGELES, **OTHER DEMOCRAT LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES INCLUDE OSHA REFORM** AND THE STRIKER REPLACEMENT LEGISLATION. WHILE EVERYONE CARES

ABOUT WORKPLACE SAFETY, THE SENATE OSHA **REFORM BILL AMOUNTS TO** ANOTHER BIG REGULATORY **OVERKILL PROPOSAL --**WITH BIG CRIMINAL PENALTIES THROWN IN. **IT CERTAINLY WOULD REQUIRE A LOT OF CHANGES IN THE**

HOUSE, I DON'T EXPECT THIS BILL TO COME UP IN THE SENATE THIS YEAR. **ON STRIKER REPLACEMENT,** I THINK IT IS SAFE TO SAY THAT THIS BILL WILL SURFACE SOME TIME IN THE NEAR FUTURE. IT'S TOO IMPORTANT TO THE **UNIONS AND THIS IS AN**

FORTUNATELY, THIS BILL

ELECTION YEAR.

WON'T BECOME LAW FOR A LOT OF MEMBERS ARE LINING UP TO SUPPORT THE PRESIDENT'S VETO ON THIS ONE. **CONSIDER THIS** LEGISLATION'S IMPACT ON THE RECENT EVENTS AT

CATERPILLAR. IF S. 55 HAD **BEEN LAW, CATERPILLAR WOULD HAVE HAD NO OPTION BUT TO ACCEPT** UNION DEMANDS AND ONE **OF AMERICA'S INDUSTRIAL** SUCCESS STORIES WOULD **OVER TIME HAVE BECOME** ANOTHER DINOSAUR.
