HONORING DEAN EVANS

AND, CERTAINLY, BROWN-MACKIE, THE CITY OF SALINA, AND I SUSPECT MANY HERE IN THE AUDIENCE, COULD NOT HAVE FOUND A BETTER FRIEND THAN DEAN EVANS. AND IT'S VERY FITTING THAT YOU HONOR DEAN TODAY WITH THE CREATION OF A SCHOLARSHIP IN HIS NAME.

WE SEE IT IN THE POLLS, RECORDING UNPRECEDENTED PESSIMISM ABOUT THE STATE OF OUR NATION. WE SEE IT IN THE POPULARITY OF POLITICAL CANDIDATES REPRESENTING SOMETHING --ANYTHING--OTHER THAN THE STATUS QUO.

REJECT "SIREN SONG OF ISOLATIONSISM"

REGRETTABLY, SOME ALSO SEE THE CHANGES BROUGHT BY THE END OF THE COLD WAR AS AN INVITATION FOR AMERICA TO RETREAT FROM THE ROLE OF WORLD LEADER THAT WE HAVE PLAYED.

INDEED, AFTER DECADES OF MULTIBILLION DOLLAR DEFENSE BUDGETS; WITH THE IMMEDIATE MILITARY THREAT TO AMERICA SEEMING TO FADE AWAY; AND IN THE FACE OF OUR SERIOUS DOMESTIC PROBLEMS -- THE SIREN SONG OF ISOLATIONISM SOUNDS OH-SO-SWEET TO MANY, MANY AMERICANS.

LET'S FACE IT. WE ALL GET FED UP WHEN WE HEAR SOME FOREIGNER BAD-MOUTHING AMERICA. WE ALL GET FRUSTRATED WHEN SO-CALLED ALLIES AND FRIENDS -- ON WHOSE DEFENSE WE HAVE SPENT BILLIONS OF DOLLARS -- TURN AROUND AND TREAT US UNFAIRLY ON TRADE AND OTHER MATTERS. WE ALL SOMETIMES LOOK AROUND AND SAY: HEY, WE'RE THE MOST POWERFUL, RICHEST COUNTRY ON EARTH, AND WE DON'T NEED ANYONE ELSE -- WE CAN MAKE IT ON OUR OWN. BUT BUILDING A WALL AROUND AMERICA, AND PULLING BACK FROM OUR LEADERSHIP ROLE IN

THE WORLD, IS NOT THE ANSWER TO ANYTHING.
IT'S A SHORT-TERM, "FEEL GOOD" REACTION, FOR WHICH AMERICA

AND AMERICANS, IN THE LONG RUN, WILL PAY DEARLY.
WE'VE MADE THE MISTAKE OF ISOLATIONISM BEFORE. YOU'VE STUDIED IT IN YOUR HISTORY CLASSES. ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT REASONS WE HAD TO FIGHT WORLD WAR II WAS BECAUSE THE UNITED STATES, DURING THE 1920'S AND 1930'S, TRIED TO TAKE A "HOLIDAY"

FROM THE REST OF THE WORLD. WHILE NAZI GERMANY WAS BEING BORN, AND JAPAN WAS RE-ARMING, WE SAT BACK AND TRIED TO PRETEND IT WAS NONE OF OUR BUSINESS.

BUT STARTING IN 1941 IT BECAME VERY SERIOUS BUSINESS, INDEED, FOR THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. OUR ISOLATIONISM WAS A TRAGIC MISTAKE, AND MANY OF YOUR PARENTS AND GRANDPARENTS CARRY THE SCARS OF THAT MISTAKE TO THIS DAY.

THE FRUITS OF THE COLD WAR VICTORY

THE FACT IS, THE COLD WAR IS OVER -- AND IT ENDED IN A GREAT VICTORY -- BECAUSE AMERICA LEARNED FROM THE MISTAKE; BECAUSE AMERICA, FOR NEARLY A HALF CENTURY, WAS WILLING TO DEFEND FREEDOM WHEN IT WAS SERIOUSLY THREATENED. BECAUSE WE AMERICANS WERE WILLING, IN THE WORDS OF PRESIDENT KENNEDY, TO "PAY ANY PRICE, BEAR ANY BURDEN, ENDURE ANY HARDSHIP,...TO INSURE THE SURVIVAL AND THE SUCCESS OF LIBERTY."

SO WE WON THE COLD WAR, AND NOW WE CAN ENJOY SOME OF THE FRUITS OF THAT SUCCESS. WE CAN ASK OTHERS -- OUR ALLIES -- TO BEAR A HIGHER PORTION OF THE COST OF KEEPING INTERNATIONAL ORDER. WE CAN PAY MORE ATTENTION, AND DEVOTE MORE RESOURCES, TO PROBLEMS HERE AT HOME.

BUT WE CANNOT AFFORD TO LAY DOWN THE MANTLE OF WORLD LEADERSHIP. WE CANNOT ONCE AGAIN STICK OUR HEADS IN THE SAND, AND LET HISTORY PASS US BY.

TOO MUCH IS AT STAKE. OUR OWN SECURITY, OUR OWN PROSPERITY. LIKE IT OR NOT, THE WORLD IS A LOT SMALLER THAN IT USED TO BE, MILITARILY, POLITICALLY AND ENVIRONMENTALLY. THANK GOD, IT ALSO HAPPENS TO BE A BIT SAFER THAN IT USED TO BE. THANKS TO THE COLLAPSE OF COMMUNISM, THE DEFEAT OF SADDAM HUSSEIN, AND THE BEGINNINGS OF WHAT IS NOW BEING CALLED THE "NEW WORLD ORDER."

DANGEROUS UNCERTAINTIES REMAIN

BUT WE CAN'T AFFORD TO KID OURSELVES. THE WORLD CAN STILL BE A DIFFICULT AND DANGEROUS PLACE.

WE DON'T KNOW WHEN THE NEXT "SADDAM HUSSEIN" WILL POP UP, TO THREATEN BOTH HIS NEIGHBORS AND THE PEACE OF THE WORLD. WE DON'T KNOW JUST YET WHOSE FINGERS, AND EXACTLY HOW MANY FINGERS, STAND POISED OVER THE NUCLEAR BUTTONS WHICH CONTROL ALL OF THOSE THOUSANDS OF WARHEADS WHICH STILL EXIST, ARMED AND AIMED, IN THE FORMER SOVIET UNION. BUT IT'S NOT ONLY IN THE MILITARY AND POLITICAL FIELD WHERE AMERICA STILL FACES REAL DANGERS AND GRAPPLES WITH SERIOUS PROBLEMS. THE CONNECTION BETWEEN AMERICA'S WELL-BEING AND GLOBAL DEVELOPMENTS AND EVENTS IS JUST AS STRONG IN TERMS OF OUR ECONOMY.

AMERICA & THE GLOBAL ECONOMY

DoD will send a letter to each of the colleges and universities specified in last year's defense appropriations bill. The letter will ask K State to submit a formal proposal and demonstrate that the \$7.7 million serves the mission of the Department of Defense. I have discussed this with K State officials and they are preparing to respond.

Your letter to Cheney notes that this test has already been met -- at least with respect to the Congress. Still, I anticipate that Cheney will require this documentation from everyone anyway (maybe he will scare some of them off).

As far as timing is concerned, this thing could be dragged out over the rest of the summer. K State wants to get going so they can start classes this fall. In addition, they have some pending contracts to begin international pilot training that cannot be executed without this equipment. They were warned not to bet on the come. I give this 70%-30% chances for coming through.

07/11/92 - Salina:

Of course, Senator Ben Vldricksen is the state senator from Salina. He has served since 1979. Senator Vidricksen does not have primary opposition, but faces a tough general election challenge from a Mr. Vern Silvers, Democrat candidate from Salina. Mr. Silvers is an engineer with Phillips Lighting and has been recruited by the Democrat Machine in Topeka. Ben Vidricksen has done the following for Salina: Has been active in job creation and economic development; has helped bring the Highway Program to the Salina/Ellsworth area; has helped bring the Kansas State School of Technology to Salina; and has helped bring a tourism information center to Salina. SUBJECT: Brown Mackie College

In the last four months, I have met twice with Gary Talley, President of Brown Mackie. He was interested in making a distinction within the Higher Education Act regarding proprietary schools, but he did not bring the subject up until after Senate consideration of the Act.

Essentially, Talley wanted preferential treatment for degree granting regionally accredited proprietary schools, as these schools have an average default rate of 14.6% (FY89 is the latest figure available). In comparison, proprietary schools as a whole have an average of 45%. However, not all schools included in Mr. Talley's proposed definition have acceptable default rates -- several exceed the 25% default rate that Congress established as a threshold for participation in Federal education assistance programs. Brown Mackie's rate is just under 20 percent.

Mackie is the only such school in Kansas. Second, he is on the Board of Trustees for the group that represents these schools.

Talley's definition was not included in the Higher Education Act because the conferees felt that it conflicts with Congress's effort to crack down on schools with bad default rates. However, report language does recognize that this group, as a whole, is a safer bet than proprietary schools at large.

\*\*Note\*\* In addition to meeting with myself, Talley has sat down with Jim Wholey and Sheila Burke. He has been difficult to help, as he has been unwilling to work with the staff. Given Talley's actions, Sheila said that we helped him as best we could.

# Tony's to a find cause of gas leak?

# Wind direction worsened effect

A day after an anhydrous ammonia leak hurt 15 people, executives of Tony's Pizza Service promised Monday to do everything possible to ensure safety at the frozen pizza plant in south Salina.

The injuries, none of them serious, occurred when anhydrous ammonia leaked twice from the roof of the Tony's plant. The cause of the leaks was not revealed Monday.

"We're still investigating. We'll probably have details tomorrow," said Bob Beasley, manufacturing manager for Schwans Sales Enterprises, the parent company.

The leaks occurred from the plant's refrigeration system, which uses ammonia as a cooling element. The first leak, reported about 7 p.m., was in the form of a vapor cloud. The second, about an hour later, was in liquid form that, when exposed to air, created a cloud.

Fourteen of the 15 people injured were members of the Indiana National Guard, who were spending the night at Nickell Barracks just west of the Tony's plant. They all were treated at Salina's two hospitals for respiratory problems, headaches and abdominal pain. None were admitted.

The Guard personnel, numbering 110, were spending the night in Salina while en route back to Pueblo, Colo., after transporting ammunition from Pueblo to McAllister, Okla., said Capt. Sue Wong, public information officer of the 319th Transportation Brigade in Pueblo.

The barracks were evacuated after both leaks. The Guard members were able to return to the barracks late Sunday to spend the night, and they left on schedule Monday morning, Wong said.

All were reported to be in good condition, she said.

One Tony's worker was injured. That person, an employee of a security service employed by Tony's, was treated by emergency medical technicians at the plant. He was stalloned outside the plant when the leaks occurred.

The plant was shut down for a fourday July 4 holiday weekend, Beasley said, and only about 15 to 20 people were inside. Those people included maintenance and fabrication team employees, as well as some outside contractors.

Because no employees were seriously hurt by the leak, the Occupational Health and Safety Administration will not investigate the leak, a spokeswoman with the Wichita office said Monday.

OSHA was notified of the leak, as were other state and local officials, Beasley said.

#### Odd wind no blessing

An unusual easterly, northeasterly wind of 17 mph that blew the ammonia away from the city might not have been much of a blessing, emergency officials said Monday.

The wind blew the ammonia west

into the nearby barracks area, where the 110 Guard personnel were staying.

"We would normally not have an easterly wind," Salina Fire Chief Tom Girard said. "It's usually from the south or southwest, which meant it would have affected a larger area, but maybe not as many people."

Gail Aills, director of emergency management for Salina and Saline County, agreed.

"It was from an unusual direction, which was both a hindrance and a help," he said. "The wind was from a direction that carried it right over the barracks. If the wind had been from any other direction, it would not have hurt anyone."

He added, however, that the high wind speed caused the ammonia to dissipate quickly.

"If there had been less wind we would have had more of a problem with people," Aills said.

Aills, Girard and Salina Police Chief Jim Hill were pleased with how the situation was handled. Emergency personnel from those agencies worked with Tony's maintenance employees, who have expertise and special training, Girard said.

"We will go through a post-incident analysis," the fire chief said. "It's a critique to see if we can learn anything from the experience."

Aills, too, said "There was a real good response. I was well pleased with what I could see."

He said there were some communication problems, but such problems are hard to avoid when so many agencies are involved in an incident.

City emergency personnel train for such mishaps, and Aills said that training was apparent.

"I'm sure that's why it did run as smoothly as it did." he said.

#### Ammonia is suffocating

Ammonia, chiefly used in refrigeration, is colorless, pungent and suffocating.

It's a familiar substance to officials, Aills said.

"Farmers fertilize fields with it all the time," he said. "It's not exotic."

The only way of dealing with an ammonia cloud, such as occurred in the first leak at Tony's, is to evacuate those in the wind's path, Aills said.

The second leak, in liquid form, was treated with water, which carried some of the ammonia to a drainage area near the plant. Such treatment with water is an accepted method, Aills said.

Ammonia is highly water soluble. When dissolved in water, it forms ammonium hydroxide.

As far as Girard and Aills could remember; this was the first time any significant release of ammonia had been reported in Salina.

"All the right circumstances came together to create that incident," Aills said.

Neither Girard nor Aills was sure of the amount of ammonia used in the Tony's refrigeration system.

But, Girard said, "It's a big freezing system."

Beasley declined to discuss the amount of ammonia at the plant.

The leak was the first of a signif-

icant nature to occur in his 14 years at Tony's, Beasley said.

#### Not the first leak?

Although it may have been the first significant leak, an employee of Tony's who contacted the Journal on Monday said it's not the first time employees have been exposed to the gas.

"They've had ammonia leaks several times the last seven years, off and on," said the employee, who asked not to be named.

Workers in the processing area have routinely complained about ammonia vapors from the nearby freezer room, and the fumes cause them to have headaches, the employee said.

In one instance, about seven years ago, a production line had to be shut down temporarily because of a leak; ill employees were taken outside to be revived, but supervisors had them return to work as soon as they felt better, said the employee.

"They just say it's ice buildup sometimes," said the employee. "You're told to keep your mouth shut and that's it. Maintenance tells you they can't smell anything and walk off. Or it takes them the whole evening to fix and in the meantime you have to work around the smell."

Replied Beasley: "Obviously, anonymous employees can say whatever they want to but we're very cautious with our ammonia. ... Any system can develop a pinhole leak. If you have ammonia, in time, you will experience that."
