RE: Senator D'Amato

### I. POLITICAL UPDATE

Senator D'Amato got a break recently when Laurence Rockefeller was denied a place on the GOP primary ballot, having failed to gather the appropriate number of signatures. With this, D'Amato is assured the Republican, Conservative and Right-to-Life nominations.

On the Democrat side, a bloody and raucous primary is underway. It began when the Village Voice ran a front-page story on Ferraro entitled "Gerry and the Mob". It recycled old stories about Ferraro and her husband having ties with organized crime, and some new ones as well. Liz Holtzman, the NYC Comptroller, immediately attacked Ferraro on this issue. Robert Abrams, the Attorney General, joined in, Governor Cuomo chastised both Abrams and Holtzman for engaging in "ethnic slurs". For her part, Ferraro hired an "independent" auditor -- a former judge -- to give her an ethical "clean bill of health". Interestingly, the "judge" refused to say the same about Ferraro's husband, John Zaccaro.

Initially, Ferraro appeared to weather the controversy, maintaining her commanding lead over Abrams and Holtzman. However, the D'Amato campaign now believes that she may be fading and Abrams surging.

The beauty of having Ferraro as the Democrat nominee is that Abrams would have to keep his Liberal Party endorsement, and this would drain votes from Ferraro, and thereby help elect D'Amato. This is the exact same scenario that elected D'Amato in 1980, when Senator Ingraham was on the Liberal line and he siphoned off just enough votes from Democrat Liz Holtzman to allow D'Amato to win.

This is not to suggest that Senator D'Amato can't win against Abrams. He can. Opposition research has turned up a number of potent issues to use against him. Bottom line: Senator D'Amato can defeat any of the three Democrats.

The primary election is Tuesday, September 15.

RE sanctions:

Although sanctions are having an economic impact on Serbia it is not clear whether they are having the desired political impact on Serbia. Milosevic is still around and he is still supporting Serb forces in Bosnia. Time is running out for Bosnia.

RE war spreading to Kosova:

In my view, the key is a united and strong international community effort against Serbia. If we are successful in bringing the war to an end in Bosnia, Milosevic will have to think twice about taking the war to Kosova. However, if we are not committed to stopping the war in Bosnia, we are issuing an invitation to Milosevic to take his terror train into Kosova.

What else could the United Nations do to be more effective in dealing with the Milosevic regime and the "new" Yugoslavia? Should this truncated Yugoslavia retain the seat of the old Yugoslavia at the United Nations or in any other multilateral organization such as the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe?

Yugoslavia should not be allowed to participate in any international organizations as long as Belgrade continues its barbaric aggression. While the administration is opposed to Yugoslavia retaining the seat of the Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia in the U.N., several European countries take a different view. The upcoming meeting of the U.N. General Assembly provides the United States with another opportunity to press hard for Yugoslavia's ouster from the U.N.

What is your view of the role of the Islamic countries in helping the Bosnians? Do you think these countries will become more involved if the U.N. and the Europeans don't do more to end the fighting?

It depends which Islamic countries one is talking about and what type of assistance. If we are talking about Saudi Arabia providing oil and money for food, I think that is a good thing. But, if we are talking about Iranian arms shipments and Iranian advisors, well that is another story. While I am sympathetic to the desperate situation the Bosnian government finds itself in, I am very uncomfortable with the involvement of radical and/or terrorist regimes, such as Iran in Bosnia. This could help provoke the radicalization of the Muslim population in Bosnia, which is traditionally very tolerant and secular.

Do you support the idea of a U.N. war crimes tribunal?

Absolutely. The Senate is on record in support of such a tribunal and I think that it would be useful to set it up as soon

as possible, so that all those engaged in war crimes will see that the international community will hold them accountable as individuals.

It seems that the issue of the status of Kosova is likely to remain unresolved in the near future, at least with respect to the EC and U.N. sponsored talks in Geneva.

I am not hopeful about a near-term resolution of the Kosova question at the Geneva talks. In my view, Kosova should be allowed to fully participate in the Geneva process. Until the Albanians of Kosova get equal status with the other ethnic groups of the former Yugoslavia, there will not be a satisfactory resolution of this matter.

Is there anything the Albanian-American community can do to raise the visibility of this issue?

In my view, the key to having an impact on the Kosova issue or other issues of importance to the Albanian-American community is to be a part of the political process across the board -- and not limit political participation to a few issues. Full-time political participation by the Albanian-American community -- involvement in elections around the country and at all levels -- will enable the community to have an impact on specific interests.

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FOR INTERVIEW WITH ILLYRIA

What in your view should be the policy priorities for the United States in the former Yugoslavia and particularly with respect to Kosova?

\* First, we must try harder to bring an end to the war in Bosnia-Hercegovina.

\* I think it is high time to consider options beyond negotiations and tightening sanctions since Serb forces continue their policies of ethnic cleansing and targetting civilians.

\* At the same time, we must do all we can to prevent the spread of the war to Kosova and other areas. No doubt, Albanians will be the next victims of ethnic cleansing.

\* We must make sure that the agreement signed recently in London is not just another piece of paper which Belgrade defiantly ignores.

\* Placing international monitors in Kosova are a good first step, but I think that deploying U.N. peacekeepers -- in advance of war breaking out -- could have a deterrent effect.

### (IF PRESSED ON KOSOVA AUTONOMY OR INDEPENDENCE):

\*If we can successfully prevent war in Kosova --which is should be the top priority -- we can turn to the task of restoring the human rights of Albanians in Kosova and providing them with the opportunity to exercise their right to self-determination.

What steps do you recommend be taken by the international community to end the war in Bosnia-Hercegovina and to prevent its imminent spread to Kosova?

Do you think that sanctions are working?

Do you believe the arms embargo against Bosnia should be lifted?

Do you think that the international community should intervene in Bosnia? If so, what role should the United States take? What do you see as NATO's role?

### RE military intervention, NATO, arms embargo:

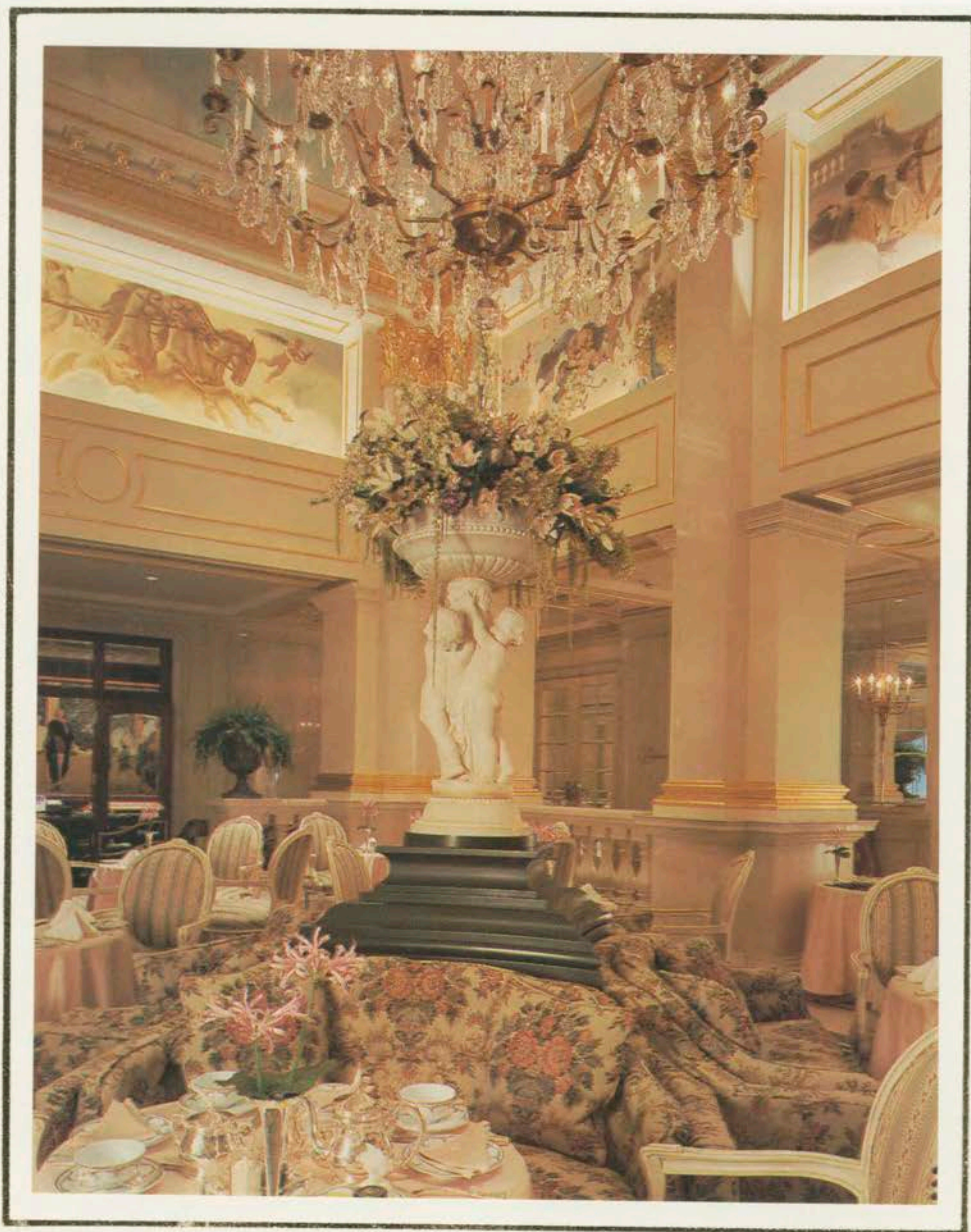
I believe that the U.N. should move to close the airspace over Bosnia so that Serbian planes can no longer strike Bosnian towns -- this could be achieved with the help of NATO. Moreover, the United Nations should review its arms embargo policy. It seems to me that the current embargo guarantees Milosevic's military might. This is not a fair fight. If the international community is not willing to intervene to help the Bosnians, then the Bosnians should be allowed to defend themselves. The Senate has called for the U.N. to review this policy which hurts Bosnia.

RE: Speech to the Society of Memorial Sloan-Kettering

You are scheduled to address the Society of Memorial Sloan-Kettering in New York on Monday, September 14 at the St. Regis on Fifth Avenue.

There will be approximately seventy-five business men and women in the audience, all of whom sit on various boards of the Society of Memorial Sloan-Kettering. None of the individuals are medical professionals.

The event is a symposium sponsored by the Annual Appeal Committee. The focus of this year's appeal is the Memorial Sloan-Kettering's new Prostate Cancer Detection Center. This will be an outpatient facility which will provide state-of-the-art testing, evaluation, and treatment for men at high risk of prostate cancer. The objective of the center is to respond to the numerous requests that the hospital receives to evaluate patients found to have either an abnormal rectal exam, or more commonly, an abnormal PSA test, but without an established diagnosis of prostate cancer.

The Annual Appeal Committee would like you to speak for four or five minutes describing your experience with prostate cancer. They would also like you to emphasize the need for more screening centers so that early detection is made possible for more men. If you would like to stay for a few extra minutes, some of the audience members may have some questions they would like to ask you.

Dr. William Fair will speak after you. He is the Chief of the Urology Service at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center.

**Annual Appeal fund raising**

The Annual Appeal is The Society's oldest committee. During the Center's Capital Campaign in the 1980's The Society's Annual Appeal Committee raised \$598,000 for the renovation of patient areas of Radiation Oncology and \$756,000 for the construction of the Surgical Day Hospital. The latter was part of the Kresge challenge grant in 1988 which garnered a \$2.25 million gift from Kresge. Since 1983, the Annual Appeal has raised an average of \$1.9 million yearly. Each year in the spring a luncheon is held to officially launch the campaign.

The Annual Appeal Committee consists of 75 women who write personal letters to their friends requesting financial support of Memorial Sloan-Kettering. This support is divided into two categories, restricted and unrestricted. Restricted donations are directed towards the donor's specification. For example, a donor may wish to give annual support to a favorite doctor to further his or her work. Unrestricted donations are applied to the yearly Annual Appeal project with the approval of MSK's President and Chief Executive Officer. Projects have included funding for the Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) suite, nursing education, mammography vans and mobile mammography units to bring mammography to a wider group of women in New York City and surrounding areas, and the Center for Diagnostic Imaging and Breast Cancer.

The professional staff of The Society provides support for the Chairmen and captains of the Annual Appeal. Workers manuals are printed which include job descriptions, a timeline, sample letters, Annual Appeal stationery, brochures and reply envelopes. The professional staff reports back to the Annual Appeal workers on receipt of contributions so that personal acknowledgments can be sent by the worker.

Each year, the committee members who raise \$75,000 or more for MSK are presented awards. On average eight to ten certificates are awarded each year. Mrs. Bruce Gimbel, Mrs. William O. Harbach, Mrs. Harmon Remmel and Mrs. Melville Hall have distinguished themselves as recipients of the award for nine consecutive years.

In 1990 the Annual Appeal raised the necessary funds to establish the first endowed chair sponsored by The Society. The Society of Memorial Sloan-Kettering Chair for the Pain Service will provide the essential financial stability in perpetuity for the Chief of the Pain Service. In March of 1990, the Boards of Overseers and Managers designated Kathleen M. Foley, M.D. as the first incumbent of The Society of Memorial Sloan-Kettering Chair. Dr. Foley, Chief of the Pain Service, is an outstanding clinician and investigator. Her research has been in the area of classifying the incidence, nature and physical changes that accompany pain in the cancer patient, as well as the management of cancer pain.
