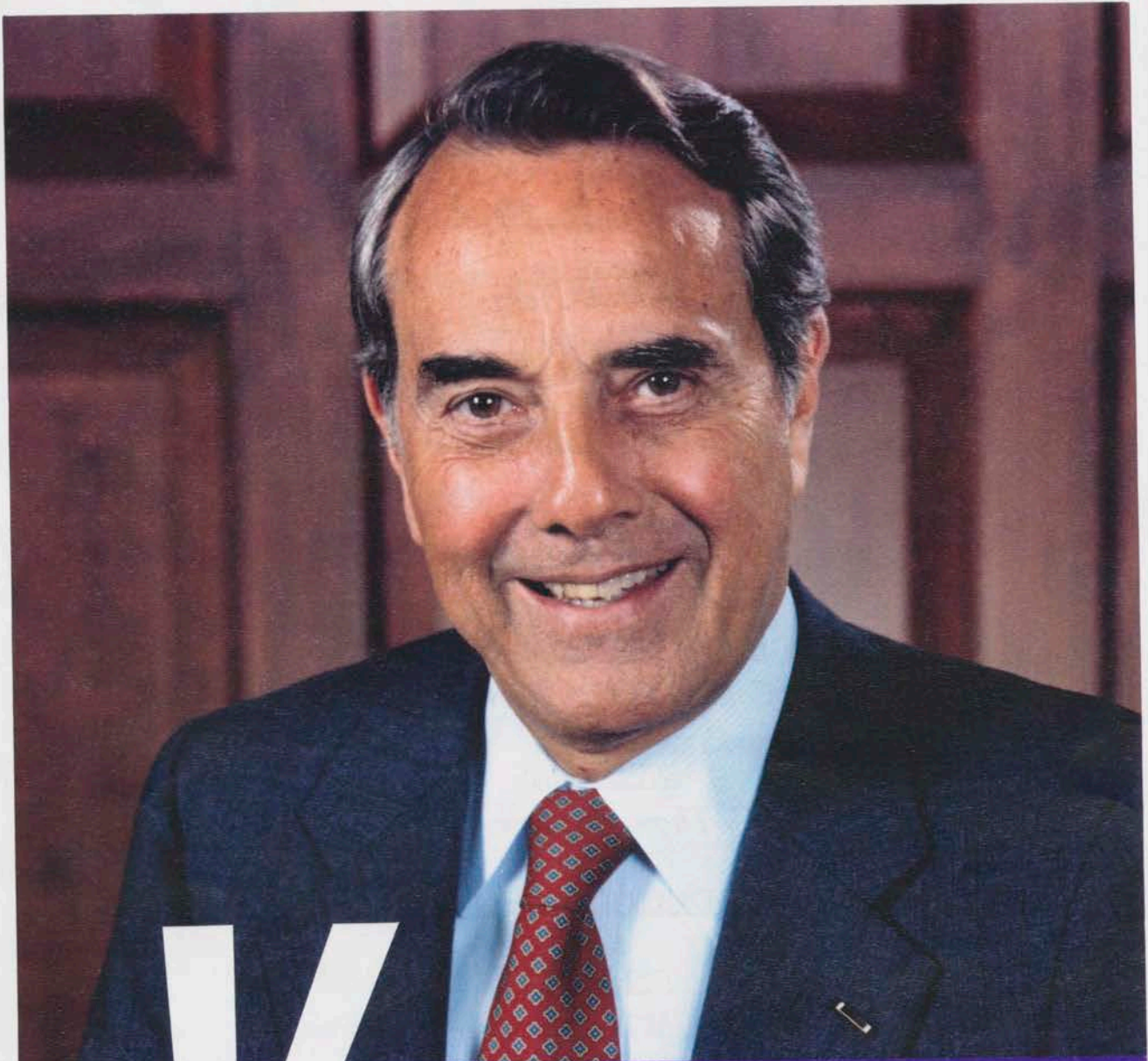

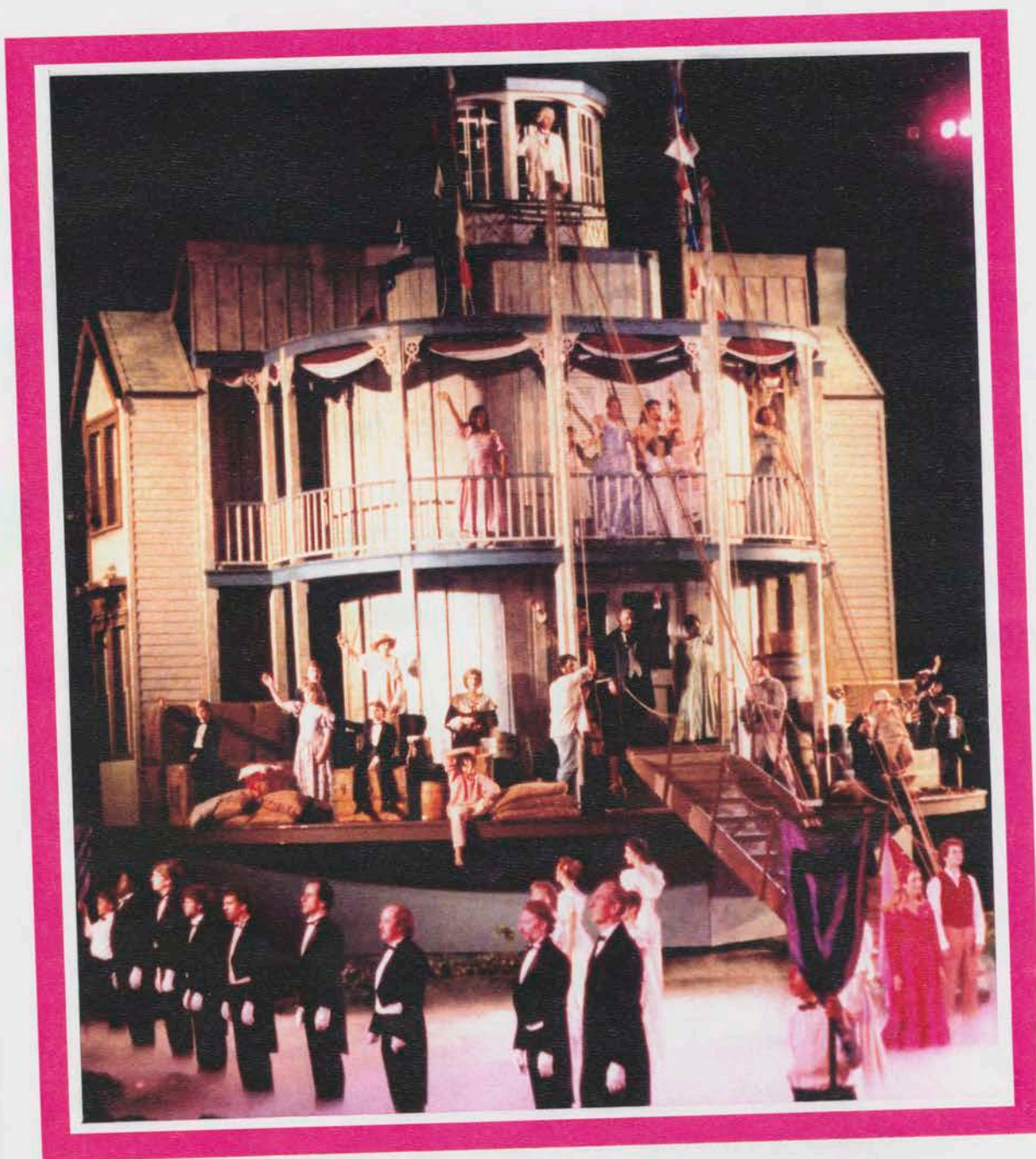

THE U.N. PEACEKEEPING RECORD**

**IN THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA IS
ONE MARKED BY FAILURE. THIS
YEAR, THE UNITED STATES WILL
SPEND AT LEAST \$300 MILLION TO
FUND UNPROFOR IN THE FORMER
YUGOSLAVIA, BUT WE ARE NOT

ALBANY, April 10 — when asked why the state budget for the fiscal year that began April 1 is now more than two weeks late and not close to final passage, Gov. Mario M. Cuomo and state legislative leaders point to ideological disputes over school aid, health care and tax cuts.

But the coarser reality about the budget fight is this: it's mostly about protecting incumbents.

"The issues that keep this budget from closing have less to do with good public policy than what's good for an individual lawmaker's election," said Cynthia B. Green, deputy research director of the Citizens Budget Commission, a nonprofit fiscal watchdog group.

This is, after all, an election year when Mr. Cuomo, a Democrat, and

the Senate's leadership.

Name the issue and similar battles are under way in closed-door negotiations. Capital construction? Senate Republicans want to build minor league baseball stadiums upstate and an Olympic-quality swimming pool and soccer stadium on Long Island. Assembly Democrats want that money used for repairing schools in and around New York City. Mr. Cuomo wants a portion for opening a special school for gifted high school students.

Budget 'Solvable'

Tax cuts? The Senate Republicans want more for businesses; the Assembly Democrats want more for low-income families. Mr. Cuomo wants some of both.

"This budget is eminently solvable," said Mary Ann Crotty, Mr. Cuomo's director of policy management.

That potent combination has created a negotiating atmosphere that Mr.

A rare state surplus creates its own special problems.

Cuomo has likened, in effect, to an all-you-can-eat buffet for the starving. "They're working with two hands to feed themselves from the trough and they're bumping into one another and they're getting a little greedy," he said of the Legislature last week.

Waiting for Best Deal

Within that setting, lawmakers seem more compelled to wait for the best deal rather than to reach quick agreement. The result: wrapped inside almost every policy debate is a raw political fight over money for some constituency.

"A surplus is politically more difficult to deal with than a deficit," explained Assemblyman John J. McEneny, an Albany Democrat. "With a deficit, people can accept no new spending. But when people hear about a large surplus, everybody feels a sense of entitlement."

Nowhere is the haggling over state dollars more bare-knuckled than in the school aid arena. The issue stirs large blocs of voters because state aid to local schools can relieve property taxes. Not surprisingly, the Legislature has increased its contri-

ing in which the state sold short-term bonds to pay for the previous year's school aid. Those bonds could not be sold without a final budget, so pressure from school districts often cajoled lawmakers to settle their differences.

But in hopes of improving the state's low bond ratings, the Legislature and Mr. Cuomo ended spring borrowing this year. Now, most school districts will not feel a budget pinch until mid-June.

The Legislature has also passed the portion of the budget that pays the salaries of most state workers, so that the government can continue operating.

The legislative leaders advance their own theories on why the other side will not close. Mr. Marino contends that Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, a Manhattan Democrat, is blocking the Senate's efforts to cut taxes. Mr. Silver argues that Mr. Marino wants to make the budget as late as possible to embarrass Mr. Cuomo, perhaps by discouraging Wall Street investment rating firms from upgrading the state's bonds.

Except for a few barbed outbursts, Mr. Cuomo has refrained from attacking the Legislature, perhaps because he, too, needs some of the "goodies" in the \$33 billion budget for his re-election effort.

Among those goodies are \$68 million in Liberty Scholarships for needy college students. Mr. Cuomo championed the program in 1988 only to cut it from his 1991 budget because of the recession, calling it a painful sacri-

ISSUES

- o Elmira, NY is an industrial city. The largest employers are Hardinge Brothers, which makes precision machines, and a Toshiba Display Devices facility. Rep. Amo Houghton represents this area -- the 31st Congressional District.
- o According to John O'Mara, the issues of greatest concern to those attending the events in Elmira are health care and Whitewater. There will be many physicians in attendance.
- o Immigration -- Gov. Cuomo is seeking to add New York to the list of States who have filed lawsuits against the federal government seeking payment for past services provided to undocumented immigrants under a failed immigration policy. Undocumented immigrants apparently cost NY \$970 million last year.
- o Gambling -- becoming more and more popular in States -- NY is also considering approval of casino and riverboat gambling. This would require an amendment to the NY constitution. Gov. Cuomo opposed gambling in NY outside of the already legalized gambling on the upstate Indian reservations. Amendment could be before voters by 11/95.

Governor Cuomo's unfavorable numbers are high and his re-elects are low. Yet, because the Republicans have been so divided over a candidate, Gov. Cuomo is likely to benefit from the GOP's disarray. Add to this the Libertarian candidacy of radio shock jock Howard Stern and it becomes even more interesting. From a "hack poll" done by Prodigy computer services subscribers, 51% preferred Stern, 21% Cuomo, and 22% the GOP nominee. Subscribers are "overwhelmingly" Republican and many political experts believe that Stern would draw voters from the right. Stern does have the highest unfavorable rating of all the candidates, however, most being under the impression that this is a publicity stunt. Stern's reasons for running? -- "to reinstate the death penalty, improve the collection of highway tolls...and ensure that road construction crews work only at night."

Among Republicans, Rep. Green is considered to be the strongest contender. He announced his candidacy referring to himself as the "Unity candidate" meaning that he is more moderate. A poll conducted 3/23-30 showed Cuomo with 36% and Green with 27% in a head-to-head.

As you know, Senator D'Amato has handpicked State Senator George Pataki as the GOP candidate and has handed over his \$400,000 war chest initially established to benefit D'Amato in his own possible run for Governor. D'Amato, probably hoping to gain the support of the Conservative Party in the State, recommended a Pataki-London ticket. However, Conservative Party Chair Michael Long "said he doubted a Pataki-London ticket could be arranged."

After reporting 4/4 that Sen. Al D'Amato (R) will give Pataki his \$400,000 war chest, which D'Amato raised while exploring his own gov. run, N.Y. POST's Dicker reports that D'Amato says his "ideal ticket" for the race would be Pataki for gov. and London for LG. D'Amato: "While I think that George would be the best candidate for governor, I think we have to recognize that Herb is a very strong contender for the Conservative Party endorsement." NY GOP Chair Wm Powers "said he too favored 'putting together' a winning ticket": "I'm prepared to do whatever it takes to have peace and harmony in the party." Ex-Rep. Bill Green (R) announced his candidacy for the GOP nod to challenge Gov. Mario Cuomo (D) 3/19 saying the GOP has been losing NY elections because they've "drifted to the right." Green, calling himself a "unifying force," said he'd collect petitions to force a GOP primary if he fails to get the 25% vote that would put him on the ballot at the 5/22-26 GOP convention (Carroll, NEWSDAY, 3/19). Green: "Our party cannot run a right-wing ideologue who offers only simplistic answers to the complex problems of government." He said GOPers need a moderate, pro-choice candidate like him, "not someone who is being used as a pawn in an intra-party fight." Green was referring to state Sen. George Pataki (R), whose candidacy is supported by Sen. Alfonse D'Amato (R) and is opposed by state Senate Maj. Leader Ralph Marino (R) (Lombardi, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 3/19). Green, noting he "gets along fine" with both D'Amato and Marino: "The party can't afford to have either D'Amato or Marino come out of this a loser" (Carroll, NEWSDAY, 3/18). Conservative Party Chair Michael Long said he did not think it was "plausible" for either Green or moderate GOPer/ex-NY party chair Richard Rosenbaum to win his party's endorsement because they are too liberal. Green's entry sets up "what is essentially a primary within a primary" between Green and Rosenbaum. The goal for both will be "to force the other from the field before the primary," where either could win with a small plurality because there is no runoff. Rosenbaum has said he will bypass the convention and try to get on the ballot by collecting signatures (Sack, N.Y. TIMES, 3/19). Cuomo Hopes for Weak Rival in Governor's Race In New York, and GOP May Have Just the Ticket

NEW YORK — When it comes to finding a candidate to take on Mario Cuomo this year, New York Republicans seem hellbent to prove the old chestnut that says you can't beat somebody with nobody.

The 62-year-old governor is slumping badly in the polls as he prepares to seek his fourth four-year

term to lead this brawling, contentious state. But the Republicans have an entire field of squalling nobodies hoping to take on Mr. Cuomo, who, in New York if no longer in the nation, is still somebody.

"Let's not discourage them in their disarray," the governor says.

It's déjà vu all over again. In 1990, desperate to find a candidate to take on Mr. Cuomo, the GOP state chairman combed through a friend's address book. He got to R, and out popped Pierre Rinfret, an economics consultant who turned out to be the sole Republican willing to make what could only charitably be described as a run. Though Mr. Cuomo managed just 53% of the vote, the GOP candidate was thrashed, barely beating the Conservative Party candidate.

This should be the GOP's big year. The latest Marist College Institute for Public Opinion poll puts Mr. Cuomo's approval rating at 35.6%, an all-time low. "Last time he ran, his weakness came as a surprise," says Lee Miringoff, the Marist poll taker. "This time, the Republicans have no excuses."

A year ago, their best candidate seemed to be the state's top judge, Sol Wachtler. But he was sent to jail for threatening to kidnap his former lover's daughter. The next-best hope was Sen. Alfonse D'Amato. But Mr. D'Amato says, "I'm too busy in Washington. I can't take the time." That leaves the field of dreams.

Gov. Cuomo says he has an idea of what the Republicans have been looking for to oppose him: A Catholic with great personal wealth and an eagerness to spend a lot of it for the campaign, and a willingness to oppose his or her own church by supporting both abortion rights and the death penalty. "I don't know how you do that simultaneously," says the governor, who is also Roman Catholic. He opposes the death penalty and performs deep public soul-searching on the abortion question.

The governor's analysis isn't far off the mark. From their focus groups and private polls, Republican leaders really did have in mind such a candidate. They also wanted him or her to favor tax cuts and come from the suburbs. The leaders talked on the phone and even had a hideaway dinner at an Italian restaurant on Long Island in their efforts to find that candidate.

"We gave it a good-faith effort," says Sen. D'Amato, the principal kingmaker. "We just couldn't come to an agreement."

The result is that they've drifted back to the positions they held before the talks. Sen. D'Amato and party Chairman Wil-

liam Powers, once his chief of operations, are once again boosting an obscure state senator named George Pataki, the former mayor of Peekskill. The powerful GOP leader in the state Senate, Ralph Marino, still says Mr. Pataki is unacceptable. He threatens to endorse his own candidate, whose identity remains a mystery.

If that weren't confusing enough, a number of other candidates are already out there campaigning. They include former Ambassador to France Evan Galbraith; former state party Chairmen J. Patrick Barrett (the man who discovered Mr. Rinfret) and Richard Rosenbaum; and Herbert London, a professor at New York University and the 1990 Conservative candidate. All of them insist they'll take the fight to a party convention in late May, and if that doesn't work to a primary election in September.

"I'm not sure that's a good idea," says Mr. Powers, the chairman.

For the Republican kingmakers, the frustration is that they've come a long way since the 1990 disaster. "Rinfret was the low point all right," says Mr. Powers. "After that campaign, we put together a hostile takeover of what was left of the state party." He says that when he seized power in early 1991, he found that only 137 people had contributed to the party in the preceding 12 months.

Since then, he's pretty much put the party back together, no mean accomplishment. More than 58,000 people contributed to the party last year, many of them taking part in the "dime a day to defeat Mario" campaign. The state party played a key role in electing Rudolph Giuliani mayor of New York. Republicans also won key elec-

tions in Syracuse, Binghamton and Troy, and even took over Albany County, in the governor's backyard, for the first time in 75 years.

In Sen. Pataki, Mr. Powers and Sen. D'Amato have a candidate who meets some of the qualifications they laid down for this year's Cuomo challenge. The 48-year-old Mr. Pataki may not be wealthy, but he is Catholic, and he supports abortion rights in a limited way and favors the death penalty. "He's a wonderful young man," says Mr. D'Amato. "He's got guts and independence and he's voted against all of Cuomo's budgets."

Problems With Pataki

No surprise, he's also strong on cutting taxes, which won him the support of a New York City supply-side group called Change-NY. That bothers Mr. Marino, the state Senate leader, who has been a target of Change-NY's ire. A fair number of conservatives, many of whom sometimes bolt to the Conservative Party in election years, aren't exactly excited about Mr. Pataki either. They worry about his abortion-rights stance. "Al D'Amato himself is pro-life," says Mr. London, the 1990 Conservative candidate and would-be 1994 GOP nominee. "Trying to force Pataki down our throats is bizarre."

What the Republicans want to avoid at all costs is another situation when they field one candidate, the Conservatives field another and Mr. Cuomo squeezes out still another victory. Mr. London insists the Conservative nomination is his for the asking, and he says he will take it if the Republicans try to rally around Mr. Pataki or any other abortion-rights supporter.

LIFT BOSNIA ARMS EMBARGO

U.S. SHOULD LEAD EFFORT TO LIFT EMBARGO, ACT ALONE IF ALLIES
WON'T FOLLOW: IS FURTHER FUNDING OF U.N. PEACEKEEPING FORCE
JUSTIFIED? TAXPAYERS GETTING BIG U.N. BLUFFS FOR THE BUCK

ELMIRA, NEW YORK -- The following are remarks of Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole prepared for delivery tonight at the Souther Tier County Republican Dinner in Elmira, New York:

Today the Bosnian city of Gorazde is on the verge of collapse and the United States, together with NATO, is on the verge of losing its credibility in world affairs. The events of this past weekend are evidence that the United States has abdicated the leadership role it assumed in February when Sarajevo was rescued. Since then, we have turned over the reins to the United Nations -- which has already lost all credibility in the former Yugoslavia.

Gorazde: A Humanitarian Catastrophe

With more than 300 people killed in Gorazde, 1,100 wounded, 30,000 people displaced from their homes, and Bosnian Serb forces shelling the city's water power plant and hospital, the situation in Gorazde is a humanitarian catastrophe. Yet, the U.N.'s response has been to issue more statements and to pull out U.N. peacekeeping forces. Meanwhile, President Clinton has taken the position that the United States and NATO cannot take action unless authorized by the United Nations. I reject that view. The United States does not have to wait on the United Nations to establish U.S. policy toward Bosnia.

Not Getting Peacekeeping We Pay For

The U.N. peacekeeping record in the former Yugoslavia is one marked by failure. This year, the United States will spend at least \$300 million to fund UNPROFOR in the former Yugoslavia, but we are not getting the peacekeeping we are paying for. The fact is that UNPROFOR has not carried out resolutions passed by the U.N. Security Council, such as Resolution 836 which authorizes the use of force to protect "safe havens" such as Gorazde. Instead of getting protection of so-called safe havens in Bosnia, the U.S. taxpayers have gotten big bluffs for the buck. It's no wonder the Serbs have now called the U.N.'s bluff.

Serious Questions About U.N. Funding

We have reached the point where we must consider whether further funding of UNPROFOR can be justified -- especially since the presence of UNPROFOR troops are cited by our allies as a key obstacle to lifting the arms embargo against the Bosnians. And so serious questions must be asked when UNPROFOR's mandate expires on the 30th of April; expansion of UNPROFOR at this time may be the worst option for the protection of Bosnians. If the United Nations is unwilling to take measures with NATO to protect Bosnian enclaves it has committed to protect, UNPROFOR forces should be withdrawn and the Bosnian Army should be armed.

American Leadership Needed to Lift Embargo

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American Leadership Needed to Lift Embargo

Therefore, I call upon the President to resume a serious effort to lift the arms embargo against the Bosnian government. President Clinton indicated today that he still favors the lifting of the arms embargo against the Bosnians. However, this cannot and will not occur without U.S. leadership. The President should make it clear that the United States is ready to and will lift the embargo unilaterally if our allies and other members of the U.N. Security Council refuse to go along. Unlike the embargo against Iraq, this arms embargo violates the U.N. Charter and Bosnia's right to self-defense. Lifting the arms embargo may not help the people of Gorazde who are on the brink of death, but it may save other Bosnians from the dangers of U.N. indecision and appeasement.

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
