The Senate Race

Political newcomer **Bernadette Castro** was recently chosen at the state GOP convention with nearly 90% of the delegates over former Ambassador to France, Evan Galbraith. She is considered a rising star in the state and offers a strong contrast to **Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan**. She has a great deal of personal resources and has the advantage of a united state GOP. The gubernatorial ticket also includes a woman while there is not a woman at the top of the Democrats' slate. With Governor Mario Cuomo's numbers very weak, **Moynihan** will have the problem of having to distance himself from both the state and national Democrats.

The Rev. **Al Sharpton** is attempting to challenge **Sen. Moynihan** in the Democrat primary on September 13 by petitioning to get on the ballot. In order to accomplish that goal, he must collect 15,000 valid signatures on nominating petitions during a five-week period this summer.

Sofa Family Heiress Selected By G.O.P. for Moynihan Race

New York State's Republican Party yesterday selected Bernadette Castro, whose family manufactured convertible sofas, to run for the United States Senate against the three-term Democratic incumbent, Daniel Patrick Moynihan.

At their state convention in Manhattan, the Republicans also lined up behind a candidate for lieutenant governor: Elizabeth P. McCaughey, an academic whose articles criticizing the Clinton Administration's health-care plan drew a storm of protest from the White House earlier this year.

New York's Republicans have traditionally not run as strongly among women as among men, and in their selections yesterday they seemed determined to bolster that weakness. Many Republicans also feel the party has lost support by promoting anti-abortion positions, and yesterday both women said they supported a woman's right to have an abortion.

In Ms. Castro, 49, the Republicans also chose a candidate whose personal wealth might help finance an expensive campaign against a well-known and well-financed incumbent. "Perhaps best known for appearing in television commercials for her family's convertible sofas, starting at the

age of 4, she said she expected that the Senate race would cost \$3 million to \$4 million.

Asked how much of her own money she would spend, she answered, "As much as it takes."

In Ms. McCaughey (pronounced Muh-COY), the Republicans picked a rising star within the world of conservative think tanks who could use the campaign — and elective office if she wins — as platforms to attack state and national Democratic policies.

"I think there's an analogy here to Jeane Kirkpatrick," said Fred Siegel, a professor at Cooper Union who worked with Ms. McCaughey at the Manhattan Institute, referring to the former United States representative at the United Nations. "She will appeal both to those who want an independent-minded woman and to those with center-to-right-wing political views."

Even as they were working to bolster support among women, the Republicans were working to salve relations with the Conservative Party. Many Conservatives were angered on Monday when Herbert London, a candidate for governor favored by Conservatives, failed to win enough votes to earn a place on the Republican primary ballot.

Mr. London said that he thought

On Primary Ballot

In casting the overwhelming majority of their votes for Ms. McCaughey and Ms. Castro, the Republicans guaranteed that both will be on the Sept. 13 primary ballot. On Monday, the Republicans endorsed State Senator George E. Pataki to run for governor.

However, Mr. Pataki may still face a primary challenge from several rivals, any of whom might seek to run with a different lieutenant-governor candidate.

Mr. London and Bill Green, a former Representative from Manhattan, said yesterday that he was weighing whether to challenge Mr. Pataki by circulating nominating petitions, a costly and time-consuming process.

Another candidate, Richard M. Rosenbaum, a former state Republican chairman, who did not attend the convention, has already announced that he planned to organize a petition drive this summer.

The Republican State Committee selected Ms. Castro over three other candidates, Evan G. Galbraith, a businessman and former Ambassador to France; Henry Hewes, an anti-abortion leader, and Scott Williams,

an engineer with I.B.M.

Acceptance Speech

In her acceptance speech, Ms. Castro characterized Senator Moynihan as an aloof intellectual more concerned about the political arcana of Washington than the prosaic concerns of average New Yorkers.

"I may not be an expert on the Federal Government yet, but I guarantee you I know more about the real world than Daniel Patrick Moynihan," she said. "There's nothing more real than retail."

Ms. Castro, a mother of four who lives in the Long Island village of Lloyd Harbor, had been an executive in the family furniture business for 16 years before the company was sold

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last year. She continues to manage the family's real-estate holdings.

She declined yesterday to say how much she is worth. But she sought to dispel the notion that she could not understand the concerns of the middle class by describing how her father, an Italian immigrant, and mother, who grew up on a Pennsylvania dairy farm, built the family business from scratch.

"I didn't have to milk cows before school and I didn't have to learn English at night, but I did learn how hard it is to run a family business in an environment that seems hostile to the entrepreneurial spirit," she said.

Unanimous Choice

Ms. McCaughey, who lives in Manhattan, was a unanimous choice of the convention at the Sheraton New York, having been selected jointly by Mr. Pataki, Mr. Powers and United State Senator Alfonse M. D'Amato. But few of the conventiongoers had heard of her before yesterday. And several expressed concerns about her party loyalty, noting that she was an independent until she registered as a Republican two years ago.

Ms. McCaughey, a 45-year-old mother of three who is divorced, has taught at Columbia University, written a book on the history of the United States Constitution and currently works at the Manhattan Institute.

She gained national attention earlier this year when an article she wrote for The New Republic drew an unusually heated response from the Clinton Administration. In great detail, the article assaulted President Clinton's health-care plan, saying it would lead to lower-quality care, rationing of services and price controls.

'Mario Cuomo's Fault'

Wearing a bright red dress and an ebullient smile, she used her acceptance speech yesterday to criticize the growth in New York's welfare rolls, its job losses and its low credit rating. "It's a disgrace and it's Mario Cuomo's fault," she said, repeating what has become the Republican's campaign mantra.

Democratic Party officials said there might be added pressure on the party to put a woman on their ticket now that the Republicans have backed two. Only one woman is seeking the Democratic nomination for statewide office, Karen Burstein, a Family Court judge who is running for attorney general.

"It will increase the pressure from women's groups, that's for sure," said a Democratic Party leader, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Mr. Lumbert said that he thought there might have been a calculated effort by Republican leaders to keep him off the ballot and that he was now considering challenging the selection process in court.

Yesterday, Republican and Conservative Party leaders were discussing the possibility of adding a Conservative candidate for state comptroller, George J. Marlin, to the Republican ticket. To do that, Republican leaders would need to replace the current Republican front-runner in the comptroller race, Assemblyman John J. Faso, who has worked assiduously in recent months to build support among party members.

When asked today whether Mr. Faso was going to be removed from the ticket, the Republican state chairman, William D. Powers, said only, "Ask me tomorrow."

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CUOMO, BEGINNING BID FOR 4TH TERM, ASSAILS THE G.O.P.

CHASTISES 'NEGATIVISTS'

With a Ticket of Incumbents, Democrats End Convention With Attacks on Pataki

BUFFALO, June 2 — Gov. Mario M. Cuomo kicked off his campaign for a fourth four-year term today with a speech that included a list of accomplishments, an acknowledgement that he had not reached all his goals, and a broad attack on Republicans, both in New York and elsewhere, for practicing the politics of division.

On the closing day of the State Democratic Convention, Mr. Cuomo and his running mate, Lieut. Gov. Stan Lundine, left the direct assaults on their probable Republican opponents, State Senator George E. Pataki and Elizabeth P. McCaughey, to a parade of surrogates. When it was Mr. Cuomo's turn, he used his meandering 50-minute acceptance speech to draw numerous substantive and political distinctions between the Democratic and Republican tickets.

"Stan and I are different because we weren't picked by some boss," he said, referring to Senator Alfonse M. D'Amato, who played a major role in assembling the Republican ticket. "Let me tell you something. I may hit a sour note from time to time. But understand this. The words and ideas that come out of my mouth are mine. No one else's. I will have no boss but the people of the state of New York."

That theme echoed repeatedly throughout the convention, where the Democrats nominated a ticket heavy with incumbents and outlined a strategy for what is expected to be Mr. Cuomo's toughest campaign since his first, in 1982. They made it clear that they would not let Mr. Pataki, an unknown quantity in most of the state, define himself alone. But the intensity of their attacks suggested the concern that Democratic strategists have about Mr. Cuomo's prospects this year.

Today's speakers took every opportunity to depict Mr. Pataki as a political creation of Mr. D'Amato. They characterized him as a man of maleable convictions who had made a career out of opposing initiatives rather than proposing solutions.

The chairman of the Democratic

leaders to portray New York as a parish of liberal politics.

"I believe we Democrats seem today to know this state better, to appreciate it more, to love it more than our opponents," he said. "Maybe it is

the negativism that has infected our adversaries."

He added, "Frankly, it makes me very uneasy to think we might place the soul of this great state into the hands of people who have so insulted us, so disdained us."

With the exception of Mr. Lundine, who was nominated without opposition today, the rest of the Democratic ticket was put together on Wednesday. It includes United States Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan, Attorney General G. Oliver Koppell and State Comptroller H. Carl McCall.

Mr. McCall used his acceptance speech today to level a direct attack on his Republican opponent, Herbert London, the 1990 Conservative Party nominee for governor. After losing to Mr. Pataki in the gubernatorial balloting at last week's Republican convention, Mr. London accepted the party's nomination as comptroller in an arrangement aimed at winning Conservative support for Mr. Pataki.

"Herb London doesn't want to be comptroller," said Mr. McCall, who hopes to become the first black candidate to win statewide office in New York. "He wants to use it to advance his far, far-right-wing agenda."

No Woman on Ticket

Heading into the Sept. 13 primary, the Democratic ticket remains without a woman while the Republican ticket has two — Ms. McCaughey and Bernadette Castro, who is running for Senate. Mr. Cuomo seemed to acknowledge that contrast in his speech today by listing virtually every woman he had appointed to office.

One Democratic woman, Karen S. Burstein, a former Family Court judge in Brooklyn, plans to try to run a primary campaign against Mr. Koppell, as does the Brooklyn District Attorney, Charles J. Hynes. To get on the ballot, they must collect 15,000 valid signatures on nominating petitions during a five-week period this

summer. The Rev. Al Sharpton also will go the petition route in an attempt to challenge Mr. Moynihan.

On the Republican side, Mr. Pataki still may face a primary challenge from Richard M. Rosenbaum, a former state Republican chairman. And some Conservative Party leaders hope to keep Mr. Pataki from receiving their party's endorsement at its convention in Albany on Saturday, a move that would tarnish the gloss of Republican-Conservative unity created at the Republican convention.

Mr. Cuomo begins the campaign with more than \$4.5 million, far more than Mr. Pataki. Mr. Wilhelm pledged today to give the State Democratic Committee \$1 million from a June 27 Democratic National Committee fund-raiser in Manhattan that will feature President Clinton.

Formidable Obstacles

But even the Democratic delegates and strategists here acknowledged that the Governor faces formidable obstacles.

A restless electorate demonstrated its impatience last year by ousting incumbent Democratic chief executives in New Jersey and New York City. And after a bruising recession, Mr. Cuomo's approval rating rests near its lowest point.

The Governor and his advisers maintain that he has an admirable record but has failed to sell it.

Unadvertised Successes

After Mr. Cuomo's speech, many Democratic leaders argued that Mr. Cuomo had not failed as a governor but had neglected until now to advertise his successes. "The speech was lengthy because it began the process of communicating a substantial series of accomplishments that have lost their immediacy," said the New York City Comptroller, Alan G. Hevesi.

Mr. Cuomo's media consultant, David Garth, agreed, saying even he had been surprised to learn what the Governor had done. He blamed the news media for not fully reporting the Cuomo record.

"The people who report the media don't stop at the rest stations on the state highway because if they did, they'd tell you that 22 of the 26 of the Thruway restaurants and stops have been rebuilt," he said. "It boggles the mind."

National Committee, David Weintraub, referred to him as "D'Amato light." New York City's Public Advocate, Mark Green, asked, "Are we going to let Al's pals run the state?"

While Mr. Cuomo declined to acknowledge Mr. Pataki by name, he painted the campaign as a struggle between positivism and negativism.

"Where would I be, Mario Cuomo, if the negativists who mocked my parents and called them dagoes had been in charge of the state of New York or any other important government?" Mr. Cuomo asked.

He also sought to link New York's Republicans to the national party's caustic 1992 convention in Houston and to past efforts by Republican

•Michigan Gov. John Engler: He faces a tough fight for re-election and he does not look like a presidential candidate. But he has become the country's No. 1 reform governor and thus has his admirers.

•Wisconsin Gov. Tommy Thompson: Another unconventional candidate and reform governor. But he does enjoy the asset of an easy re-election contest.

Democrats

National Chairman: DNC Chairman David Wilhelm continues to demand that Democratic candidates support the President despite bad reviews from Capitol Hill, raising demands from his head.

The consensus in the party is that he should be permitted to finish out the '94 election cycle but must be gone after that--preferably early next year but certainly well before the '96 convention.

Ex-Rep. Tony Coelho (D.-Calif.) enjoys considerable support from his former colleagues on the Hill as Wilhelm's successor. He knows Washington and has a vital California connection. But Republicans salivate at the prospect of reviving Coelho's business activities that led to his sudden retirement from Congress.

Republicans

Texas Convention: The "takeover" of the Texas GOP by the right-wing and the Christian Coalition has caused more deep concern in the press than in the party. The managers of the principal candidates, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and

gubernatorial nominee George W. Bush are not unhappy with the results of the convention or with veteran conservative Tom Pauken as state chairman.

Indeed, the dispute is seen by some as more cultural than political, with conservative Christians regarded as johnny-come-latelys who have not earned the right to lead. In turn, the conservatives see their movement as the only source of grass-roots activism in the party. Their biggest critic, former House candidate Dolly Madison McKenna, concedes this and says the party establishment will have to learn to work harder to turn out supporters. The make-up of the convention was clear from the result of its straw-poll for president which was won by Bennett, followed by Dan Quayle, with Kemp third.

Governors '94

Alabama: Gov. Jim Folsom (D) defeated state Education Assn. president Paul Hubbert by the expected double-digit margin. The run-off next week by former Democratic Gov. Fob James (R) and State Sen. Ann Bedsole (R) for the GOP nod is

expected to be won by James. Folsom would have some weaknesses, but would still start the campaign as the favorite. Leaning Democratic Retention.

California: State Treasurer Kathleen Brown (D) won with a wider margin than some expected in topping Insurance Commissioner John Garamendi (D) and State Sen. Tom Hayden (D). The opposite was true for Gov. Pete Wilson (R) who saw computer businessman Ron Unz (R) pull 34 per cent of the vote. Still, in absolute terms Wilson received more votes than Brown. Brown may also need to re-tune her message that the state is a basket-case to solidly win middle-of-the-road voters. Leaning Democratic Takeover.

New York: Polls showing Gov. Mario Cuomo (D) with a single-digit lead over State Sen. George Pataki (R) are expected to help Pataki's fund-raising efforts. Numbers as high as \$20 million have been tossed around as the total both candidates will spend. For Cuomo his slim lead is the result of voters looking for someone new rather than support for Pataki. He will have to convince them a vote for Pataki is risky. Cuomo has foolishly offended Sen. "Although he holds a narrow lead, for many voters the gubernatorial race is as simple as ABC -- Anybody But Cuomo." Lou Harris exec. VP David Krane: "It's very much an anti-Cuomo vote right now, rather than a pro-Pataki vote. ... If I were Cuomo, I'd be worried that with five months left before the election that my approval rating was below 50%." Only 14% said they knew Pataki was the GOP nominee (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 6/6).

CONSERVATIVES ON BOARD: Although Pataki was named the official Conservative Party candidate during their weekend convention, "virtually unknown" pro-life party activist Robert Relph was "given the right to challenge him." Conservative Chair Michael Long, Pataki backers and political professionals "predicted that Pataki would easily win the primary" (Dicker, N.Y. POST, 6/6).

PATAKI ABORT WOES: N.Y. TIMES' Dao: "As he seeks to unify the Conservative and Republican parties behind his candidacy," state Sen. George Pataki (R) "has come under attack from both ends of the political spectrum for his position on abortion. It is a position that could end up costing him the undivided support of the Conservative Party. ... In staking a position that upsets advocates on both sides of the abortion issue, Mr. Pataki can arguably proclaim himself a moderate, some political analysts said. But he also runs the risk of appearing to be a waffler." Marist Inst. for Public Opinion dir. Lee Miringoff: "If you look like you're all things to everyone, you can end up being nothing to everyone. Or you could look like you're building a consensus. It's still too early to say which it will be for Pataki." NRLC delegate Jeanne Head: "He would have been much smarter to stick to his guns and keep a strong pro-life position. Now a lot of people won't vote for him because they are angry" (6/4).

***16 NEW YORK: CUOMO BEGINS BATTLE FOR FOURTH TERM**

Dems at the state convention in Buffalo want Gov. Mario Cuomo (D) "to pour water on the GOP's 'blame Mario' campaign before it catches fire." They are hoping Cuomo will "come out swinging, reminding voters of his vision of New York and his efforts to keep the state afloat during the recession." Cuomo and media adviser David Garth "plan to begin doing that today when the governor accepts the Democratic nomination." He will "begin his offensive by blaming former Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and Republican-led legislatures for high income tax rates, sales taxes and 'a whole series of things that bankrupted [NYC] and devastated the [state] economy" (Browne, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 6/2).

PATAKI MAKES OUT: Sen. Al D'Amato "beat back an attempt by Democrats to block him from transferring more than" \$400,000 to state Sen. George Pataki (R). The state Board of Elections, "voting 2-2 along party lines, deadlocked on whether the huge donation is legal -- but the tie result gives D'Amato the OK to donate the cash to his handpicked challenger." The two GOP board members, and the board's atty "said there's nothing wrong with the complicated cash transfer. But the two Democrats claimed it violated the state's campaign finance law prohibiting such large contributions." Cuomo spokesperson Joel Benenson "charged the D'Amato contribution -- which was first challenged by the Brooklyn Democratic party -- was 'well in excess of [state law]'" (N.Y. POST, 6/1).

BARRETT GOES FOR THE STEAL: Pro-life businessman Pat Barrett "threatened to ruin plans for a GOP-Conservative unity ticket headed" by pro-choicer Pataki. Conservatives will meet 6/4 in Albany. Conservative Party leader Michael Long "said Barrett has little chance of derailing plans to back Pataki." Many GOPers and conservatives "believe that unified support for Pataki is the best chance to foil Gov. Cuomo's bid for a fourth term" (Birnbaum, N.Y. POST, 6/2).

GREEN OUT: Ex-Rep. Bill Green (R) said 5/31 he was pulling out of the Republican primary race and was throwing his support to ex-GOP Chair Richard Rosenbaum (R). Rosenbaum did not participate in the convention and is "committed" to gathering the 15,000 registered Goper signatures needed to qualify for the primary ballot (AP/N.Y. TIMES, 6/1).

*8 NEW YORK: MOYNIHAN OPPOSES SHARPTON DEAL, DECRIES ROLLINS
A last-minute attempt to "open" the NY Dem state convention to three candidates "was unexpectedly under way last night. But it was unclear if a deal could be reached." The three hoped they could secure agreement to be granted 25% of the convention delegate vote so that they could automatically qualify for the 9/13 primary ballot without having to circulate petitions around the state. Rev. Al Sharpton, seeking a deal to qualify for the Senate primary, was joined by ex-Brooklyn Family Judge Karen Burstein and Brooklyn D.A. Charles Haynes, who both wish to challenge AG Oliver Koppell (D) in that primary. Word was circulated "that talks were under way to pool the three insurgent's delegate support in order to get each one of them the 25 percent vote." Sharpton: "It's like Las Vegas, with all the dealing that's going on around here. I'm open to [delegate pooling] if everyone gets on the ballot, but I will not agree to an arrangement that puts some on the ballot and not everyone." Moynihan "contends that giving Sharpton automatic ballot access to challenge him would be a personal insult" (Dicker, N.Y. POST, 6/1). The Sharpton campaign got "a big boost" with the endorsement of Rev. Jesse Jackson. Jackson: "Moynihan is powerful but aloof" (Dicker, N.Y. POST, 5/30).

ROLLINS AT ISSUE: The Moynihan campaign called for the dismissal of Ed Rollins, recently announced as consultant to businesswoman Bernadette Castro (R), saying Moynihan "deplores the hiring of a political operative who thinks it is appropriate to slander African-American clergy in order to inflate his own ego and reputation." Castro manager Howard de Martini: "The real issue is not whether Ed Rollins should continue to represent Bernadette, but whether Senator Moynihan should continue to represent New Yorkers" (Purdim, N.Y. TIMES, 5/30).
