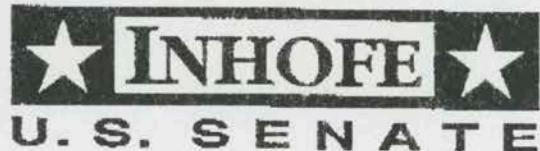

SUBJECT: Oklahoma visit

I understand you may do a meeting at the grain elevator. Below is a summary of the major ag issues.

BACKGROUND...Oklahoma wheat, grain and stocker cattle enterprise accounts for 75% of agriculture revenues generated in OK. They also have cotton, peanuts, hay, sorghum, corn and oats.

WHEAT...Cash wheat prices in Kansas this week were as high as \$3.65. This is due to USDA estimates which lowered the size of the national wheat crop. World estimates are also down. Australia's crop is just over half the size of last year.

FARM ORGANIZATIONS...The National Cattlemen's Association has given money to both McCurdy and Inhofe. (A long story) The Cotton Council has given money to McCurdy.

ANTI AG VOTES...McCurdy recently voted for a maritime subsidy bill which dramatically increased vessel tonnage taxes. This would increase the annual tax on a ship carrying Oklahoma wheat to Europe from \$67,500 to \$228,000. Inhofe did not vote. McCurdy voted in 1986 to override the President's veto of the textile quota bill, endangering retaliation against Oklahoma wheat exports.

PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS...This issue has been well received in OK. They are especially concerned about the impact of the Endangered Species Act on private property. (The ESA will not come up this year. You are a co-sponsor of Slade Gorton's bill which attempts to streamline the process and add commonsense to the Act). Both Inhofe and McCurdy have cosponsored wetlands reform in the House. Only Inhofe has cosponsored endangered species reform. Only Inhofe has cosponsored the two major property rights bills: the Private Property Rights Act of 1994, and the Private Property Owners Bill of Rights.

The League of Private Property Voters, comprised of 261 grass roots groups, rated 14 House votes on private property. According to their rating, Inhofe scored 100% while McCurdy scored 0%.

FARMBILL...This will be debated in 1995. There will be 3 driving factors. Environment, budget, and urban politics.

Environment -- what to do with the CRP and other water quality

programs will be debated extensively.

Budget -- If the Administration sends up a budget package which reduces ag spending -- other alternatives will have to be looked at. Either that, or agriculture will have to draw a line in the sand and fight for more money. Other alternatives may include what is known as the Iowa Farm Bill. This is a revenue assurance plan that guarantees a producer 70% of their income based on a 5 year historical average.

Urban Politics -- While it may be possible to pass a Farm Bill in the Senate, such an endeavor may be difficult in the House. The House Ag Committee has only 12 Members (out of 50) which have Farm Bill experience.

CRP...The Government spends \$1.8 billion a year on CRP payments. Consequently, there are concerns by Ken Cook of the Environmental Working Group (a close advisor to Secretary Espy) on how to get the biggest bang for the buck. It is important to note that if the 37 million acres in CRP came into production, grain stocks would go up, driving down price and increasing deficiency payments such that there would still be a cost of \$800 million or more. You will get questions on whether or not CRP will be continued. Predictions now assume the program will be continued in some form. There may be fewer acres and those acres may be targeted to environmentally sensitive areas (waterways, ponds, etc...). If this is the case, you can expect a regional battle between the East and Midwest. Also, payment rates will most likely be lowered.

GATT GREEN BOX...The Administration is charging agriculture \$1.7 billion to pay for GATT. Agriculture is claiming their fair share is around \$800 million. The ag groups would like the difference to be put towards GATT legal programs or green box. These include the Market Promotion Program, Foreign Market Development and TEFAP. You did not sign a letter supporting these efforts since the ag groups have not come up with offsets.

GATT FARM BILL EXTENSION...There is a strong move to authorize the Farm Bill on the GATT implementing legislation. You are on the record opposing loading GATT up with such items as dairy. However, if the Administration includes dairy, then it may be worth taking a look at the Farm Bill. USTR and USDA are looking into the legalities of doing this. If we were to revert back to Farm bill standing authorization, that would be the 1949 Act which is GATT illegal. Even if we extend the Farm Bill this year, chances are good we will have to rewrite it if there is a budget reconciliation in 1995.

EOP...Funding was cut by \$150 million in the Senate so total EOP spending is \$850 million. We must now go to Conference with the House to determine a final spending level. You have supported efforts to spend EOP to the maximum allowable level.

CROP INSURANCE...Crop insurance reform has now passed the House and Senate and they will go to Conference soon. Staff will start meeting this week. We must pass the Helms hurdle on the motion to instruct Conferees. The package is lean and mean. Under reform, disaster programs are eliminated. Instead, that money (approximately \$1 billion annually) is put towards the crop insurance program. The funds are used to buy down premium increases in the out years. Additionally, farmers participating in the farm program are required to take out catastrophic crop insurance. The only reason we are pursuing this is the overwhelming concern that in the future, Congress will require disaster bills be paid for except in years when the disaster is widespread.

PLANT VARIETY PROTECTION ACT...This Act has passed the House and is snagged up in the Senate. It had passed the Senate once before and we are trying to pass the amended House version again. We do not expect much opposition. This bill does not allow for the incidental sale of seed between farmers. We could not change this provision without being in violation of international agreements. All of the ag groups signed off on this Act except Farm Bureau and they have been quite in their opposition.

USER FEES...There are two types of user fees. One for the Food Safety Inspection Service for anything past the first 8 hour shift. The other is for FDA user fees. Every year, the Administration proposes user fees to fund various programs. However, they never submit a plan on how to implement these fees. Of course, every year user fees are removed during conference. This year, you used FDA user fees to fund Soil Conservation programs and children with disabilities in the school lunch program.

The Senate includes \$150 million for FDA user fees while the House includes \$103 million for FSIS. Opponents will argue that inspection programs are necessary to maintain public health and therefore should be supported by public funds. They may also point out that Congress has not authorized user fees and of course, there is no plan in place to administer a user fee program. They also see this as an additional tax.

BOTTOM LINE -- The FDA user fees have been removed since the House blue slipped this provision. The FSIS fees are still on the table. Money is short so everyone is taking a hit. We will see what happens in Conference. Meanwhile, these fees will continue to come up every year as money is short.

ENERGY

The main issue in Texas and Oklahoma is what needs to be done to save the domestic oil industry. Oil prices are below the cost of operating many U.S. wells causing problems for independent producers. U.S. oil imports are at an all time high. Imports as a percentage of U.S. consumption hit 58% in July. Sen. Boren, as head of the Oil & Gas Coalition, presented a package of incentives to President Clinton in June which included tax credits, regulatory relief and legislative initiatives. No action has been taken on these initiatives to date. The tax credit is seen as crucial as it would allow marginal well operators to either depreciate their equipment or assist with their current cash flow problems. Sen. Nickles is supportive of the Boren proposal. A tax credit for marginal production is the primary focus of support. The Independent producers cannot operate the wells at this level of production and the low prices. Enclosed is a summary of the Oil and Gas Coalition proposal to the President, an oil & gas industry status sheet, and President Clinton's response to Sen. Boren regarding the Oil and Gas Coalition proposal.

ENVIRONMENT

Tulsa and Oklahoma City are both sensitive to Clean Air Act standards. Tulsa especially has taken steps to ensure it does not break the ozone thresholds.

TRANSPORTATION

Inhofe is a big supporter of the aerospace industry. He helped out on the civil aviation bill, which is of importance to Oklahoma.

Inhofe and His Enemies: They Just Don't Get It?

As he runs for the U.S. Senate, Jim Inhofe's enemies keep resurrecting two legal controversies involving the Tulsa Republican. In response to questions in a recent interview, the 1st District U.S. Representative described the cases as "closely related but ... treated by my adversaries as two separate issues."

The first matter involved an inter-family dispute. His brother, Perry D. Inhofe, "who ran the family insurance business, bought out my interest without disclosing to me" that he was planning to sell the company for a hefty profit. As the congressman explained it, "The courts found that he bought me out at 25 cents on the dollar, and awarded me not only the compensatory damages, but punitive damages as well because of his fiduciary relationship with me." (The case was a jury trial, No. CJ-88-3033, with Tulsa County District Judge Jane Wiseman presiding.)

Inhofe continued, "The second issue involved the FDIC (Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation). In 1983, Quaker Life Insurance Company borrowed approximately \$300,000 from Bank of Commerce. The bank required that I, as an

officer, guarantee the corporate note. I required the corporation to put up over \$1 million in active receivables as collateral so that the bank could never come back to me on the guarantee."

In 1986, "the Bank of Commerce became insolvent and was taken over by the FDIC. Subsequently, the FDIC was awarded a summary judgment against me in the amount of \$663,500 for failure to perform under the guarantee. It is interesting to note that the attorneys for the FDIC were unaware that the collateral even existed. This summary judgment could have been avoided if I had secured counsel that dealt in this field, but it never occurred to me that the courts would allow the FDIC to release the collateral and come after a guarantor."

Inhofe "appealed that decision to the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals" which, in February, "reversed the lower court's decision." (No. 92-5141) FDIC hoped to sustain the case, but failed. Several weeks ago (on July 5), Judge John E. Conway of the (U.S.) Northern District of Oklahoma ruled in Inhofe's favor.

From the judge's order: "The court finds that FDIC's Complaint fails to state a cause of action, that there is no genuine issue of material fact, and that Mr. Inhofe is entitled to judgment as a matter of law. Such motion is therefore granted, and this action is therefore dismissed with prejudice." (Case No. 90-C-0079-CO)

Inhofe reflects, "I really believe that this experience has helped me in understanding others who have been relentlessly and unjustly pursued by the bureaucracy and in some ways could actually be a plus."

Facts and non-facts about these cases continue circulating in the political rumor mill. "Politics ain't beanbag," as they say, but Inhofe is entitled to frustration about the willingness of some critics to smear him with issues which were actually resolved in his favor.

Just curious: What parts of "verdict," "reversed" and "dismissed" do Jim Inhofe's enemies not understand?

Change, Clinton Help Not Wanted

Hopeful Says

WASHINGTON — U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy, D-Okla., says he doesn't want President Clinton to come to Oklahoma to campaign for him this fall in his race for the Senate.

Instead, McCurdy said, Oklahomans wanted to hear a message about their values.

Speaking Tuesday on "Larry King Live" on CNN, McCurdy seemed to validate the belief held by Republicans and even some Democrats that Clinton has become a liability for members of his own party, at least in some parts of the country in this election year.

That point was made earlier in the program by Haley Barbour, the chairman of the National Republican Party.

Barbour predicted Clinton and his policies would be a key factor in helping Republicans pick up a number of seats in both the Senate and the House.

McCurdy said the race in Oklahoma was not about Clinton but about himself and Sen. David Boren, the man McCurdy wants to succeed, and U.S. Rep. Jim Inhofe, his Republican opponent.

Inhofe is expected to make McCurdy's support of Clinton and his policies a major issue.

McCurdy said that although he had known Clinton for some time, he had not been shy about opposing White House policies he believes are wrong.

The current debate over health care insurance is "not about health care, but about disease control," Coru said.

He called for the introduction of "cost-effective, proven strategies that focus on prevention of disease through use of natural medicine and health education, rather than on treating symptoms after the disease has occurred."

Coru said he supports community development programs "that have been shown repeatedly to reduce social stress and lower violent crime from 10 to 20 percent in America's inner cities."

He called for an emphasis on education. "When education is satisfying and relevant to the student's own life, then we won't see dropouts who become targets of drugs and drug-related crime," he said.

The Natural Law Party was formed in 1993 and is fielding more than 70 congressional and Senate candidates this year, he said.

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Inhofe Stresses Haiti as Issue

WASHINGTON — U.S. Rep. Jim Inhofe, R-Okla., hoping to use Haiti as an issue in his Senate race, urged his Democratic opponent, Rep. Dave McCurdy, on Wednesday to use his "close relationship" with President Clinton to stop an invasion of the Caribbean island country.

McCurdy, however, had beaten Inhofe to the issue by months.

As early as May, he was urging the Clinton administration not to intervene militarily in Haiti.

That did not stop Inhofe from using what could become a highly emotional issue to link McCurdy to Clinton, a major campaign tactic for the GOP nominee.

"I know on some days Dave McCurdy likes to claim he is close to Bill Clinton and can influence him," Inhofe said in a statement issued by his campaign.

"Let today be one of those days because an invasion of Haiti is imminent, and I urge Dave McCurdy to call his friend Bill Clinton and talk him out of this risky madness."

McCurdy campaign spokesman Tom Eisenhauer responded, "It's a shame to see Congressman Inhofe trying to play politics on an issue that involves American lives."

After opposing an invasion last spring, McCurdy had reiterated his concerns again in August in a letter to Clinton.

Neese Charges Fallin Voted for Pay Raises

OKLAHOMA CITY — Terry Neese, a Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, accused her runoff opponent of voting with liberal Democrats to raise state employees' salaries.

Rep. Mary Fallin replied that although she voted for pay raises, so did the rest of the House Democrats.

Fallin, R-Okla., called Neese's accusations "incorrect and exaggerated."

Neese, an Oklahoma City businesswoman who ran for lieutenant governor four years ago, said Fallin sided with "the liberal Democrat good ol' boys" in 1992 to approve a state employee raise that cost the state \$26.5 million.

Fallin said she was one of 119 House members, including Republicans, who voted for the pay

McCurdy Out of Touch

THERE can be little doubt U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy has been in Congress too long. He has forgotten how to think like an Oklahoman.

Sunday's vote for President Bill Clinton's crime bill is only the latest of betrayals by McCurdy, who has tried to convince Oklahoma voters he is a moderate.

McCurdy opposes term limits for members of Congress, supported gun control legislation and has voted to support President Clinton's legislative program 90 percent of the time, more than any other member of Oklahoma's delegation and even more than far leftists like U.S. Sen. Ted Kennedy.

Voters should have been forewarned when McCurdy campaigned for Clinton in the New Hampshire presidential primary and seconded Clinton's nomination in a speech to the 1992 Democratic National Convention.

Oklahoma U.S. Sen. David Boren, whose seat McCurdy aspires to, managed to think for himself and represent his Oklahoma constituency. It would be tragic to replace Boren with a puppet for the Washington establishment.

To put it simply, McCurdy is out of touch with the home folks. Oklahoma Democrats should remember that when they cast their votes today to nominate a candidate for the U.S. Senate.

On McCurdy's Vote

ONCE again Oklahoma's Dave McCurdy has helped pull Bill Clinton's political chestnuts out of the fire.

From his position on the House Armed Services Committee, McCurdy gave Clinton valuable support for his proposal to allow avowed homosexuals in the military. While he voted against the final version of the 1993 budget bill, he had given significant rhetorical backing to the Clinton tax increase.

McCurdy has repeatedly sided with Clinton on gun control legislation, and Sunday he helped pass a highly flawed \$30.2 billion crime bill — a victory the president desperately needed after losing badly in an earlier attempt. The bill, which bans about 180 types of firearms, was opposed by all five other Oklahoma House members.

The Norman Democrat said he was pleased that House negotiators had been able to "strip the pork from the bill." But although the price tag was trimmed by \$3.3 billion, the bill still contained \$7 billion in social welfare spending masquerading as "crime prevention."

The revised crime bill provided less for prison construction than the previous version. It also would not allow federal judges to sentence aliens convicted of violent

crimes but require that they be released into the streets pending deportation proceedings.

The Aug. 11 defeat of the administration's anti-crime package was highly symbolic, because it depicted a weakened president who could not whip his own party into line on a popular election year issue. Yet the modified bill was still so faulty that 64 Democrats rejected Clinton's personal lobbying efforts.

The next move is up to the Senate, where McCurdy aspires to sit next year. That body preserves a much higher degree of independence, which might cramp the style of someone who would ignore his conservative constituents' views to rescue a politically crippled president.

Sen. Min. Leader Bob Dole, campaigning for Rep. Jim Inhofe (R-01) in Tulsa 8/26, said an Inhofe victory in the fall could give the GOP control of the Senate: "This is the one that could put us over the top. This could be 51." Tim Phillips, manager for Rep. Dave McCurdy (D-04), said that by inviting Dole to OK, Inhofe "is again showing he values the partisan, self-serving goals of the national Republican leadership over the interests of Oklahoma and the country." Inhofe "said he expects to see McCurdy run from Clinton": "There is no way in the world he is going to be able to shake loose from the guy. Frankly, it is a little offensive that he'd try. To me, it shows a great character flaw that he would now try to disavow the very president that he nominated at the National Convention." Inhofe said McCurdy's voting record is "90 percent with Clinton ... He is now going to have to live with the fact that the president's closest, most intimate friend is Dave McCurdy." Phillips called this an "hysterical distortion" and said McCurdy's voting record "is almost identical" to that of resigning Sen. David Boren (D) (Martindale, TULSA WORLD, 8/27). At a candidates' forum, McCurdy "stressed how his relationship" with Clinton "would help keep Oklahoma's military bases open and healthy" (Myers, WORLD, 8/26).

ROASTED CHESTNUTS: A DAILY OKLAHOMAN editorial notes McCurdy once again has "helped pull Bill Clinton's political chestnuts out of the fire" by voting to pass a "highly flawed" crime bill and producing "a victory the president desperately needed." The piece notes the Senate "preserves a much higher degree of independence, which might cramp the style of someone who would ignore his conservative constituents' views to rescue a politically crippled president" (8/23).

Dole Carries Inhofe Torch to Tulsa

Election Could Put Republicans In Majority

U.S. Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., said Friday that a victory by U.S. Rep. Jim Inhofe in November could give Republicans control of the Senate and enable them "to keep a better eye on Bill Clinton."

"This is the one that could put us over the top, this could be 51," a majority in the 100-member Senate, Dole said of Inhofe's race against Democrat U.S. Rep. David Boren.

They are seeking the Senate seat David Boren will vacate in November to become the president of the University of Oklahoma.

Dole, the Senate minority leader, was joined by U.S. Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., in campaigning with Inhofe in Tulsa on Friday.

Dole said he would not discuss his presidential ambitions until after the November elections.

Republicans, he said, need a net gain of seven seats to regain control of the Senate.

Being targeted, he said, are Senate races in Oklahoma and at least nine other states, including Massachusetts, where U.S. Sen. Ted Kennedy is up for reelection.

"We think Ted Kennedy will be gone next year. . . . That would be a shocker. I mean some of the liberals probably wouldn't get up for weeks," Dole said.

Other targeted states are Arizona, Maine, Michigan, Tennessee, Ohio, California, Pennsylvania and Virginia, where

the contest is Ohio's North-Ohio state.

"I never thought that," Dole answered when asked if he ever believed there could be two Republican senators from his neighboring state of Oklahoma.

"But, I never thought I would have two Democrats from Nebraska. They've got great feebull, but something's happened in their politics up there."

McCurdy's campaign manager Tom Phillips said by inviting Dole to Oklahoma, Inhofe "is again showing he values the partisan, self-serving junk of the national Republican leadership over the interests of Oklahoma and the country."

During the Senate campaign, Inhofe said he expects to see

McCurdy "run from Clinton. . . . There's no way in the world he's going to be able to shake some from the top."

"Frankly, it is a little offensive that he'd try. To me, it shows a good character flaw that he would now try to disavow the very president that he nominated at the Democratic National Convention."

Inhofe said McCurdy's "voting record is 90 percent with Clinton. . . . He is now going to have to live with the fact that the president's closest, most intimate friend is Dave McCurdy."

An aide to McCurdy said he should "at least have some personal obligation to tell the truth. This is an example of the hysterical distortion that we

are going to hear from Congressmen Inhofe apparently."

Phillips said McCurdy's voting record in the U.S. House is almost identical to that of U.S. Sen. David Boren, who has not the standard for bipartisan leadership in the Senate.

Both Boren and McCurdy have opposed Clinton on the budget, welfare reform and health care, and have pushed for further spending cuts, the McCurdy spokesman said.

McCurdy's campaign manager charged that Inhofe "voted his party line 97 percent of the time last year, more than any other member of the Oklahoma delegation."

Inhofe said the crime bill was an example of McCurdy siding

with Clinton. "He voted for it, just for the president," said Inhofe, who voted against the measure.

Phillips said Dole had tried to pull the crime bill "as an example of his partisan disregard for the best interests of the country."

Dole said calls to his office have been running 100-to-1 against the crime package.

The public reaction to congressional passage of the crime bill, Dole said, will delay work on the president's health package.

"I think it is in intensive care right now," the Kansas senator said.

Saying he believes this will be a "great year" for Republicans, Dole noted that a GOP Senate majority would make him the majority leader in that body.

"Not because that is so important," he added, "but it gives us committee chairmanships. We control the agenda. We can keep a better eye on Bill Clinton, and he needs to be watching."

Nickles said he is looking forward to an Inhofe victory in November. "Because I think we will be tying together most of the time. I am afraid that his opponent and I would be cancelling each other's votes out."

Nickles said he has "no personal objections" to McCurdy but said the two have different political philosophies. He, too, noted McCurdy's vote on the crime bill.

"We think this is about who can best replace David Boren's strong, bipartisan leadership in the U.S. Senate. Congressman Inhofe seems to think that this race is about making Bob Dole majority leader. Unlike him, we think Oklahoma is more important," the McCurdy spokesman said.

David Boren, D-Seminole. Beale and McCurdy, 44, and Inhofe, independent Danny Corn, 48, of Edmond, will be on the Nov. 8 general election ballot.

McCurdy, Inhofe Camps Trade Shots Over Editorial

The campaign committees for
the two candidates for the U.S.
Senate traded insults Tuesday
over what role — if any — Rep.
Dave McCurdy played in killing a
tax on Oklahoma's energy indus-
try.

The controversy was triggered
by a Tulsa World editorial that
called for Rep. Jim Inhofe, R-
Okla., to "tell the truth" about
McCurdy's position.

The Tuesday editorial said that
despite remarks to the contrary
by Inhofe, McCurdy, D-Okla., op-
posed the so-called Btu tax and
was instrumental in killing it.

The Friends of Jim Inhofe
Committee said the editorial in-
cluded "distortions." The com-
mittee also sent a press release
headlined, "Dave's Double Talk
— The ETU Lie."

The Friends of Dave McCurdy
Committee issued an "Inhofe
Watch" and said Inhofe had been
"caught fibbing on the Btu tax."

The Inhofe campaign said
McCurdy had "caved in to White
House pressure and voted for the
original House version of the Clin-
ton budget," and persuaded three
other House members to do the
same.

The spokesmen for Inhofe said



the World reported on Feb. 18,
1993, that "McCurdy went on to
call the Btu energy tax 'fair to
people all across the country.'"

On May 20, 1993, the Inhofe
campaign said, the World report-
ed that "it was not exactly clear
what turned McCurdy around on
the energy tax ... immediately
after Clinton announced his eco-
nomic package in February,
McCurdy joined in heaping praise
on the president and his plan."

Inhofe's campaign said Inhofe
"didn't need to be reminded who
he works for, the people of an
energy state that would be devas-
tated by the Btu tax costing Okla-
homans an estimated \$371 million
in 1996 and 7,700 jobs by 1996."

Inhofe's campaign statement

was issued Tuesday outside the
Tulsa World building by City
Councilor John Benjamin; former
Councilor Dewey Bartlett Jr., the
president of Keener Oil Co.; and
Don O'Nesky, the deputy director
of the American Association of
Petroleum Geologists.

McCurdy's campaign respon-
ded that McCurdy forced Clinton to
abandon the Btu tax when the
measure went to the Senate.

"That's been verified by all
kinds of independent accounts —
from newspapers to Sen. David
Boren and Bob Woodward's book,
"The Agenda: Inside the Clinton
White House," McCurdy spokes-
man Tom Eisenhauer said.

"In exchange for his vote the
first time, the president's 1993
budget plan went through the
House of Representatives,
McCurdy got the president to
abandon the Btu tax and to agree
to further spending cuts," the
campaign said.

It said The Daily Oklahoman
quoted Boren as saying:

"I think (Dave) does more to
help our cause by getting this type
of agreement ... than he would
have gotten if he had just cast a
'no' vote and not been part of the
bargaining process. (He) deserves
the thanks of all Oklahomans for
helping to achieve major changes
in the Btu tax and the entire bud-
get package in the House."

Mildren Calls on Walters To Halt Prisoner Releases

Lt. Gov. Jack Mildren called on

Shedrick responded, "Jack

Corrections.

These offenders, she said, can

passed to keep Oklahoma's prison
system out of the federal courts
and to "make certain we have
enough cells for violent offenders,
which I support to keep the public
safe."

Mildren said that according to
news reports, "1,403 criminals
have been granted early release
since mid-1993, some after serv-
ing less than 10 percent of their
original sentences."

More than 11 percent were re-
turned to prison, he said at the
Tulsa Press Club.

Mildren said added prison beds
could be placed in current state

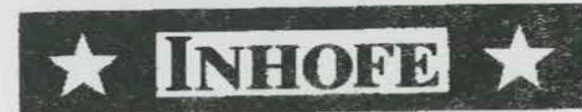

Oklahoma City (Tinker AFB) and Enid (Vance AFB) are concerned about base closure. There are over 24,000 direct jobs at risk. McCurdy has elevated the issue and raised fears by declaring that both of these bases will be closed if a Republican is elected -- only he can go to Clinton to protect them. More Democrats will make America stronger? More Democrats will protect key bases?

Nunn has stumped for McCurdy and stated that he would "do all he can to put McCurdy on the Armed Services Committee." Of course, the SASC has little to do with the process -- and Nunn can't, himself put McCurdy on the SASC. McCurdy is perceived as someone who has and can deliver on defense projects which is why he is pushing this issue. Republicans seem willing to support McCurdy because of this issue.

Inhofe would like you to make a similar pledge -- his folks believe that coming from you it would mean something. (Note that Inhofe was a member of the HASC and folks didn't think he did much). I have down-played the appointment issue by telling the Inhofe people that as far as base closure, the SASC doesn't really influence the BRAC process.

The important issue is that you have an appointment to the BRAC and you can pledge to work closely with Jim Inhofe to help Tinker and Vance make their best case. Further, you can say that you will make sure that your appointment will be someone who will be open and listen to the concerns of Enid and Oklahoma City.

Should you meet with Chamber of Commerce representatives, I suggest the attached talking points. McCurdy is one of those who likes to have it both ways -- support the Clinton plans, but then say how he will fight for his communities.

Tinker Needs GOP Victory, Inhofe Says

U.S. Rep. James Inhofe said Monday he will be in a better position to help Tinker Air Force Base in the U.S. Senate next year because Republicans likely will gain control of the Senate.

Inhofe, R-Tulsa, said most national publications are conceding that Republicans are going to take control of the Senate.

If that happens, Inhofe said, Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., who attended a fundraiser for him recently, will chair the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Inhofe said he more than likely will be on the Thurmond committee if the GOP gains control and possibly could become a subcommittee chairman.

Inhofe, 59, said the major problems facing Tinker stem from defense budget cuts that "are rendering us in a position where today we couldn't fight the Persian Gulf War."

The pending appropriation bill for the Defense Department is \$243 billion, which is \$7 billion less than 1980 when this nation couldn't afford spare parts for military equipment, Inhofe said.

He said there have been so many cuts during the Clinton administration that bases such as Tinker have been jeopardized when they should not have been.

"It's inconceivable to me that a person like Dave McCurdy who has supported all of Bill Clinton's defense cuts can turn around and say that he is going to save Tinker," Inhofe said.

McCurdy, 44, D-Norman, said earlier Monday in El Reno he cannot guarantee he can save any of the military bases in Oklahoma, but he can guarantee that no one can provide more leadership than he can. He has provided more leadership or has a better relationship with the Air Force, the Defense Department, the administration and the Congress.

Key Senate Leader Impressed by Tinker

Georgia's Nunn Tours With McCurdy

 Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn said Thursday that Congressman Dave McCurdy has the knowledge, effectiveness and respect in Washington to help Tinker Air Force Base if McCurdy is elected to the U.S. Senate.

Nunn, a Georgia Democrat, came to Oklahoma Thursday to help McCurdy's U.S. Senate campaign and to tour Tinker Air Force Base. He later went with McCurdy to Rockwell International in Tulsa.

Nunn, whose state is the home of Warner Robins Air Force Base, an air logistics center similar to Tinker, said Tinker was "enormously impressive."

Tinker, Warner Robins and three other air logistics centers will be scrutinized by the Base Closure Commission next year.

Later in the day, McCurdy's opponent for the Senate seat, U.S. Rep. Jim Luskoff, 39, a Tulsa Republican, issued a statement asking why McCurdy chose to leave the House where he is the third ranking majority member of the Armed Services Committee if protecting Tinker is McCurdy's top priority.

Nunn said everyone knows the military budget is shrinking by one third so the nation's military force structure.

But the base structure of the nation has shrunk only 10 per-

cent, "which means we've got to match by infrastructure for the one military force we have," Nunn said.

"The rule of thumb knowledgeable people in the Air Force tell me is they have about one or two bases too many to be able to sustain now," Nunn said.

"The closing of bases is not purely a political matter because the Base Closure Commission was created to remove deliberations as far from politics as possible," he said.

"But you can't remove it totally or completely, because you want to because we have civilian control. Congress plays a role and the White House plays a role," Nunn said.

He said he and McCurdy believe the uniqueness of Warner Robins and Tinker will be important in keeping those bases open but facts ultimately will be very important.

"Any point is, the facts will be basically determining efficiency of the base and the uniqueness of the base," he said. "That is going to tell the tale."

And what people must keep in mind is they need someone to present those facts, he said. "You need someone effective and knowledgeable and respected in Washington to present those

facts, and Dave McCurdy meets all those qualifications," Nunn said.

McCurdy, 44, who is running for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by David Rosen, has had a colorful record on the House Armed Services Committee as well as the House Intelligence Committee, Nunn said.

Noting that Rosen is one of his closest friends in the U.S. Senate, Nunn said McCurdy has many of the same qualities that Rosen has.

"David Rosen has characteristics that I also see very clearly in Dave McCurdy," Nunn said.

Those characteristics are intelligence, integrity, independence — calling the shots as he goes them regardless of political party — and energy, Nunn said.

"These four characteristics I see in Dave McCurdy," Nunn said. "Those are characteristics you need in the United States Senate."

He said he hopes that if McCurdy gets into the Senate, he will want to become a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

"If he does he will have my total support both as chairman of that committee and as a member of the steering committee (which makes congressional assignments)," Nunn said.

McCurdy Out of Touch

THERE can be little doubt U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy has been in Congress too long. He has forgotten how to think like an Oklahoman.

Sunday's vote for President Bill Clinton's crime bill is only the latest of betrayals by McCurdy, who has tried to convince Oklahoma voters he is a moderate.

McCurdy opposes term limits for members of Congress, supported gun control legislation and has voted to support President Clinton's legislative program 90 percent of the time, more than any other member of Oklahoma's delegation and even more than far leftists like U.S. Sen. Ted Kennedy.

Wayne LaPierre, NRA executive vice president, said Friday the NRA will include McCurdy, D-Norman, on its list of campaign targets this year due to his approval of gun-control legislation.

"We are going to be very, very active in the Dave McCurdy race. The fact is I've watched him for a long time, and he runs around Oklahoma with a shotgun and then he goes back to Washington and votes for every gun bill that comes down the pike," LaPierre said during a stop in Oklahoma City.

McCurdy defended his voting record on weapons Friday night and disputed some of LaPierre's statements.

"I think Wayne is

speaking for himself right now, and I don't think the NRA has taken a position," McCurdy said. "However, I support gun owners' rights. I own guns, I hunt, I taught my children to hunt. But on the issue of standing up for Oklahomans, I have been there because I stood with law enforcement to ban assault rifles, assault weapons that are designed to kill, and I believe Oklahomans want to see tough law enforcement."

LaPierre said the NRA will be taking a message to the Oklahoma people that he hopes will affect the outcome of the Senate race.

"What we're going to be saying is we need to put people in office that vote the same way in Washington that they talk in Oklahoma," he said.

He said McCurdy has been "doing photo opportunities with

shotguns when he's just voted back in Washington to put the federal government right in the middle of every gun owner's home in Oklahoma. And that's wrong."

McCurdy said he hasn't been involved in such photographic setups.

"I don't know what photo ops he's talking about. He may be confusing me with someone else."

"I believe common sense must prevail in that there's certainly guns we don't need on the streets in America ... we've exempted over 600 types of guns — hunting weapons — three of which I own. So again, I think he's overreacting and overstating his position."

LaPierre said he assumes the race for Sen. David Boren's seat will come down to McCurdy and U.S. Rep. Jim Inhofe, R-Tulsa. — provided that McCurdy defeats

Corporation Commissioner Cody Graves in the Democratic primary. LaPierre said if that is the case, the NRA will support Inhofe.

LaPierre said the NRA is not relying only on money to defeat McCurdy come election day. He said the NRA plans to visit small towns in Oklahoma and inform them of McCurdy's record.

"When I find all those gun owners in Oklahoma with magazines holding more than 10 rounds, I'm going to say, 'You can thank Dave McCurdy that the federal government is watching over your shoulder, and in terms of your semiautomatic firearm, you can also thank him that now your going to have to go through a maze of federal paperwork if your ever going to transfer or sell it,'" he said.

LaPierre also

warned that the crime bill passed by a congressional committee on Thursday will not fix America's crime problem.

He said the weapons the bill has targeted are only used in 1 percent of homicides in the country.

LaPierre said the 19 semiautomatic weapons the proposed legislation bans are basically no different except in appearance from the 650 guns the committee chose not to include.

LaPierre said the solution is to build more prisons, prevent felons from returning to the street repeatedly, reform the entire juvenile justice system and establish educational programs to prevent crimes.

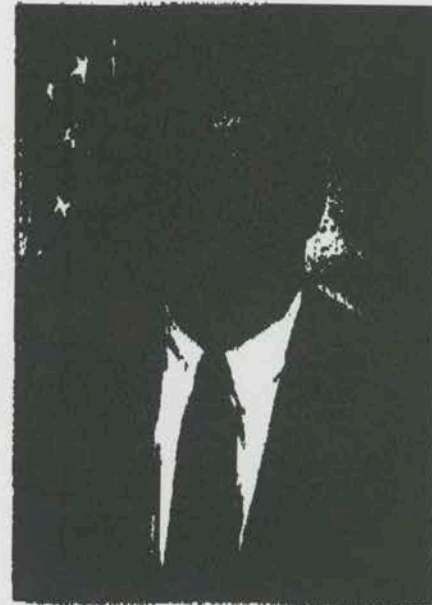

ENERGY

The main issue in Texas and Oklahoma is what needs to be done to save the domestic oil industry. Oil prices are below the cost of operating many U.S. wells causing problems for independent producers. U.S. oil imports are at an all time high. Imports as a percentage of U.S. consumption hit 58% in July. Sen. Hutchinson and Sen. Boren, as head of the Oil and Gas Coalition, presented a package of incentives to President Clinton in June which included tax credits, regulatory relief and legislative initiatives. No action has been taken on these initiatives to date. The tax credit is seen as crucial as it would allow marginal well operators to either depreciate their equipment or assist with their current cash flow problems. Sen. Hutchinson's opponent will be speaking to the Texas Independent Petroleum and Refining Organization this Saturday. Enclosed is a summary of the Oil and Gas Coalition proposal to the President, an oil & gas industry fact sheet, a copy of Sen. Hutchinson's letter to President Clinton and Clinton's response to Sen. Boren regarding the Oil and Gas Coalition proposal.

ENVIRONMENT

PROPERTY RIGHTS - Fish and Wildlife Service planned to designate 33 Texas counties as critical habitat areas for endangered species. Landowners strongly objected claiming the federal government is taking away property rights. FWS has now backed off, saying they will reduce the acreage being considered to 8,000 acres and will allow each landowner to be heard. Saturday in Austin there is a property rights rally; reflecting landowners frustration over the takings of property. Sen. Hutchinson is a co-sponsor of your legislation S. 2006 which requires government agencies to conduct takings impact assessment when promulgating regulations. This was added to safe drinking water bill.

CLEAN AIR ACT - The Outstanding Natural Resource Water (ONRW) program included in the bill allows states to designate ONRW's. It includes water bounded by natural parks, so there is concern that the Rio Grande could be designated. Under new program, these areas must be "preserved", but concern exists over what that means.

Comptroller candidates battle over GOP proposal to cut debt

A Republican candidate for state comptroller Tuesday proposed restructuring the state's tax system and eliminating the state's debt within 10 years.

Kicking off a statewide campaign tour with former U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese, Teresa Doggett introduced her four-part economic plan to Texas voters.

Doggett's proposal called for increasing the current legislative majority required to override the constitutional provision which prevents deficit spending by legislators.

Under the state constitution, the Legislature is not able to spend more money in one session than the amount allocated by the state comptroller.

Doggett said the Legislature finds too many exceptions to this rule.

"Right now, you can make an exception with a plain majority," Doggett said. "We would like to take that up to a super majority of three-fourths to two-thirds vote in both houses."

The exceptions have run the state's debt to

\$10 billion, primarily in the form of bonds, she added.

She said that by increasing the legislative majority and informing voters of the current debt, she hopes to eliminate the debt within 10 years.

Doggett said voters will be discouraged from approving new bond issues if they realize how high the current state debt is.

Greg Hartman, campaign spokesman for incumbent Comptroller John Sharp, said Doggett is "just plain wrong" about the legislative majority required to override the constitutional provisions.

"The Legislature can spend only what the comptroller said it can unless there is a four-fifths vote in both houses to override it," Hartman said.

The fact that she was unaware of the actual requirement "shows why [Doggett] is clearly unqualified for the position," he added.

Doggett said her plan would save money for business owners and the state by creating uniform sales tax rates, she added.

"Everywhere I go, people talk to me about the fact that our sales tax structure is too

complicated," she said. "What we need to do right now is take a look at that whole code and redo it."

Doggett said she would save business owners money by lowering the franchise tax paid when new businesses are created.

She also said privatization of state government operations is another key element of her plan.

"We need to do what I call value-analysis to determine whether the particular functions of the state government are necessary, who should be doing those functions, and if it is actually possible to get somebody in the private sector to handle those functions better," she said.

Hartman said Sharp created the Council on Competitive Government to determine how the state can privatize its operations. He added that \$20 million in government contracts have been granted to the private sector this year.

"It was Sharp's idea to create this agency, and we feel it has worked out well," Hartman said.

Meese will appear with Doggett in other Texas cities over the next two days.

Hutchison lends support to Dole's health-care plan

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison told a gathering of Texas pharmacists Saturday that she's not willing to throw out the nation's proven health-care system in exchange for the "massive federal experiment" proposed by President Clinton.

"I don't want my mother to have to call a bureaucrat when she gets sick," Hutchison said. "I want her to call a doctor. I want her to be able to call the pharmacist she chooses."

The senator, who spoke to about 250 people at the annual convention of the Texas Pharmaceutical Association at the Convention Center, said she supports Kansas U.S. Sen. Bob Dole's GOP plan.

"This bill makes improvements in our current system while protecting its quality and the right of each individual to select the doctor of his or her choice," she said. "Most importantly, it does not place one-seventh of our nation's economy under the control of a massive bureaucratic experiment."

Calling health-care reform "the most important issue we're going to face in my lifetime," she said Dole's plan, and a similar one in the House of Representatives, is a good approach that resulted from a year-long debate.

"The consensus from this debate is reflected in the Dole plan, which has more senators behind it than any other bill," she said.

Clinton has criticized the bill because it doesn't provide guaranteed coverage for all Americans.

Hutchison said the Clinton plan elicits one of the biggest fears of Americans: rationed health care.

She said the Dole plan provides affordability and reduces the costs associated with malpractice protection, one of the fastest-growing components of health-care expense.

"I want to have a free-enterprise solution," she said. "I'm not going to be badgered into a bad bill."

She faces Democrat Richard Fisher in the November election.

Hutchison also was critical of Clinton's foreign policy.

"Sometimes I think you could describe our foreign policy as, 'Walk softly and carry a twig,'" she said.



"It is crucial that North Korea abide by the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty," the senator said. "North Korea is violating the treaty, and we are not acting swiftly and not acting firmly."

The U.S., acting with other nations, should impose sanctions immediately on North Korea, she said.

Crime Bill: Not Worth the Cost

Congress labored mightily on a crime bill; it produced a mouse that turned into a rat. Crime is the number one issue in Texas. Men and women want to feel secure walking around their neighborhoods. They want to sleep in peace at night. They want their children to go to safe schools and worry about their exams, not about what to say to a drug dealer.

President Clinton likes to tout the 1994 Crime Bill — recently adopted by a House and Senate conference committee — as the toughest, smartest and most extensive in U.S. history. And to his credit, the bill contains a handful of tough measures on crime. Unfortunately, the majority of this legislation is no more than a rehash of the failed social programs of the 1960s. And it leaves out a number of tough, anti-crime measures that should have been included.

The Clinton Administration has embraced the idea that trying to identify and prevent "root causes" of crime is more important than catching and punishing those who actually commit the crimes. This philosophy is reflected in the Crime Bill, which uses scarce resources to fund a host of government programs only distantly related to crime, rather than to build more prisons and ensure criminals stay behind bars.

Sixty percent of the \$32.2 billion allotted in this plan goes toward social engineering programs for inner cities. The administration even advocates setting aside \$40 million for midnight basketball leagues.

The following are just a few of the tough crime control measures rejected by the congressional majority: a fully funded provision to provide \$13 billion to states for prison construction, with a provision that 85 percent of a criminal's prison sentence be served; tough federal penalties for violent juvenile gang offenses; HIV testing of accused rapists; mandatory minimum sentences for selling drugs to minors and for committing a crime with a firearm.

This Crime Bill is full of election-year padding. One example is a program which gives the Clinton Administration \$895 million to distribute however it wishes among 15 high-crime areas. This money can be spent on such non-crime purposes as transportation and employment services. Another would give \$1.3 billion to private groups, governments and courts chosen by the attorney general. The money could be used to provide benefits to criminals who are drug addicts, benefits including child care, job placement, housing placement and health care — with no requirement for random drug testing.

The Clinton Administration is ignoring the lessons of history, which teach us we cannot reduce crime by merely tossing money at our inner cities. That is not crime prevention. It is extortion.

We should not play politics with crime. This Crime Bill places style over substance, and represents nothing more than business as usual in Washington. I cannot tell the hard-working taxpayers of Texas that this is a crime bill worth the money it will cost them. In fact, I cannot say to them that this is a crime bill at all.

Regulators Overusing Endangered Species Act

There's an old saying: any government powerful enough to give you something can just as easily take it away. The adage is still relevant today. The assault on private property rights continues with new and more bold tactics.

In the year I've been in Washington, I've heard people say some pretty extraordinary things. One of the most alarming came from President Clinton's Secretary of the Interior, Bruce Babbitt, who several weeks ago dismissed individual property rights as "anachronistic" and out-of-date.

This statement, of course, is contradicted by the U.S. Constitution (and common sense). Unfortunately, Secretary Babbitt and others in the Clinton Administration are trying to enforce their view on the whole nation. For instance, last week Secretary Babbitt announced a refinement of Interior Department policy. He promised that his agency would seek to put only one set of use limitations on any parcel of private property — provided the landowner does not fight the initial federal taking!

These policies threaten Texans' land, water supply, and livelihoods. In recent "Capitol Comments" I've written about two such problems in our state. The 1.5 million residents of San Antonio and the surrounding area face drastic limits on pumping from the Edwards Aquifer, the region's only source of water, in order to prevent the possibility of harm to endangered animals that live in aquifer-fed springs. I recently passed a resolution that put the U.S. Senate on record unanimously in opposition to federally-ordered water rationing. Unfortunately, Secretary Babbitt has yet to indicate he is prepared to put human health, public safety, and economic consequences in the affected area before the interests of blind salamanders.

A similar problem afflicts Central and Southwest Texas. In its zeal to protect an endangered songbird, the golden-cheeked warbler, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (an agency of the Interior Department) initially designated a gigantic area — 20.5 million acres in 33 counties — as potential critical (i.e., protected) habitat. In response to public outcry and vehement protests from me, Congressman Lamar Smith, and other elected officials, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service promised to put its plans on hold temporarily. The key word here is "temporarily."

Bad news seems to come in threes, and now comes news the Fish and Wildlife Service has filed preliminary plans to designate parts of a 55 county area of the Texas Panhandle as critical habitat for the "swift fox." Among other things, the agency's plan would halt rodent control, which would be a disaster for farmers and ranchers. The Framers of our Constitution wouldn't believe how the federal government usurps private property today. For them, protection of private property rights was a bedrock principle. They understood our Nation could not grow and prosper unless individuals, businesses, and communities control the land and its water resources.

That's why I and others will fight every way we can to reverse current federal policies and preserve private property. The economic consequences of environmental regulation must be considered. Public, not private, land should be set aside to protect fish and wildlife. Water management decisions should be made by state and local entities, not by federal bureaucrats.

These are not outdated ideas, as some are saying in Washington, they are

Texas' U.S. Senate Race **HUTCHISON VS. FISHER**

In a nationally watched special election last summer for the Senate seat of Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen, Texas State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison demolished appointed Sen. Bob Krueger by a margin of 2 to 1. In the largest victory ever in Texas against a Senate incumbent, Hutchison genuinely made history, winning 239 of 254 counties, more than had ever been taken by a Republican before.

Now, she's facing a race for the full six-year Senate term against millionaire Democrat and former Carter Administration official Richard Fisher. At first glance, the 44-year-old Fisher appears a far more formidable opponent than Krueger or arch-liberal former State Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox, whom Fisher defeated for the Democratic Senate nod this year. With no record in elective office, the Dallas industrialist was spared the burden of explaining any controversial issue stances and, in fact, said relatively little about issues leading up to the primary. Rather, he focused \$1.5 million of his own money on a TV blitz that underscored past corruption charges against Mattox and

emphasized that Fisher was a political outsider.

The tactic worked, and Fisher—who had drawn mediocre single digits in the initial crowded race for the seat in '93—rolled up 54% of the vote against Mattox. But now that he is the Democratic nominee, Fisher is being forced to state where he stands on issues—and that's where he's clearly vulnerable.

"Richard Fisher says he's a 'New Democrat' and that he's going to hitch his wagon to Bill Clinton's star," declared Hutchison. "He is clearly another Bill Clinton, and he's proving exactly that in his switching of positions on issues. For instance, he recently challenged me to eight debates, and I said let me make a counter-offer. Let Richard Fisher debate himself on the eight major issues where he's changed his positions. Then, I'll take the winner."

One-time Ross Perot adviser Fisher switched from opposing to favoring NAFTA and, while he initially said he was against the Striker-Replacement bill, he now says he favors it—quite obviously, a ploy to court the Texas Labor Council, which supported primary opponent Mattox.

"Well, that's the same old slogan of everyone who's going to vote for taxes," says Hutchison. "He's just a person who's very clearly without a compass."

Like his positions, Fisher's political loyalties are also suspect: He gave a check to several Democratic presidential candidates in 1988 and, before that, had donated to Republicans. He reportedly tried to get an appointment in the Bush Administration, and of course couldn't. And while he was a Perot intimate in 1992, Fisher later claimed that he was somehow supporting Bill Clinton behind the scenes.

One blatant example of Fisher's lack of political spine emerged during a debate before the Democratic primary. Reminded

that his father-in-law (the late conservative Rep. Jim Collins) ran for the same Senate seat against Bentsen in 1982, Fisher admitted he supported Collins, but quickly added that he was a major Bentsen booster at the same time. Pressed as to whom he voted

for in that race, Fisher refused to say.

Hutchison was astounded by Fisher's refusal to admit his position. "I mean, anybody would have said, 'I voted for my father-in-law,' period, and everybody would have understood. This is a man with no character. This is a man who will say anything to get elected. He's desperate. Now is not the time to elect people who have no principle."

Second Amendment rights are political dynamite in Texas, where most citizens own more than one gun. Hutchison opposed the Brady Bill, and voted against the assault

weapons ban. Her opponent has said he would have done the opposite on both issues.

If there is any issue on which conservatives are dismayed with Hutchison, it is her failure either to condemn abortion or to seek government protection for the unborn. "I do not think that government should be in on that decision," she says, "except for reasonable restrictions." She insists she opposes abortion after "viability," however, and would let states put limits on abortion. "I favor parental consent, and I think states should be able to pass parental consent restrictions."

Hutchison also opposes government-funded abortion, an important element in Clinton's health plan, and she voted for the Hyde Amendment because of her belief that federal tax money should not be spent on abortions, except in medical emergencies like rape,

incest or to save the life of the mother.

Fisher's stand is quite different: He favors the so-called "Freedom of Choice Act," which would permit abortion under any circumstances and provide tax dollars for it.

Like other GOP candidates this year, Hutchison wants to lash her opponent to Clinton's record and drag him before the voters. "I think Texas has changed. I think people are fed up with the way our state government is running, and the way our federal government is running, and I think they're going to rebel," she declared. "My opponent likes to say he's going to change the way things are done in Washington. I say, 'Who's been in charge in Washington for the last 40 years?'"

State Democrats don't want Clinton's help in campaign

HOUSTON — With President Clinton's popularity in a nose dive nationally, Texas Democrats are quietly trying to distance themselves from him. Clinton has not been invited to the Lone Star State to campaign for statewide candidates.

"It's not likely Bill Clinton will make any appearances in Texas," said Chuck McDonald, a spokesman for Gov. Ann Richards.

Not so long ago, Richards headed the national convention that nominated Clinton for the presidency, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro ran Clinton's Texas campaign and Democratic U.S. Senate nominee Richard Fisher helped Clinton found the national Democratic Leadership County.

Yet on Friday, Fisher said he expects Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison to try to "hang Bill Clinton around my neck." Fisher also said if he is elected, his job is not to do Clinton's "bidding."

Also last week, Mauro said running for land commissioner "doesn't have anything to do with Bill Clinton."

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock's Republican opponent, Tex Lezar, is running radio com-

mercials labeling Bullock as a Clinton Democrat.

Bullock has replied with ads that rail at the federal government, never mention his party affiliation and end with the tagline: "He's independent. He's tough. He's Bob Bullock."

Texas Democrats are trying to avoid a repeat of 1978, when President Jimmy Carter's unpopularity cost the party the governor's seat for the first time since Reconstruction. Democratic Gov. John Hill lost to Republican Bill Clements.

"The good thing for the Democrats [this year] is everybody knows what the problem is. Hill got blindsided in 1978 in the midterm Carter election," University of Houston political scientist Richard Murray told the *Houston Chronicle* in yesterday's editions.

Murray said unenthusiastic Democratic-leaning voters stayed out of the 1978 election while Republicans were fired up to vote. He said Clinton could cause the same thing to happen in the fall.

"The Democrats have to worry about their vote base eroding," Murray said.

The Texas Poll conducted in August has already signaled trouble. The poll found that more respondents who identified

themselves as Republicans than as Democrats said they are likely to vote, by a margin of 4 percentage points.

Murray said he does not believe that Clinton's popularity slump will affect Richards in her race against Republican George W. Bush because she is a "well-known governor, with a well-developed persona of her own."

Clinton, however, could be a drag on Fisher, he said.

"It's going to be real hard for him, given the national climate and the president's lack of popularity, to get any traction running against Kay Bailey," he said.

Fisher won't ask Clinton to make campaign swing

AUSTIN — Less than two months after embracing President Clinton, Democratic U.S. Senate nominee Richard Fisher said Friday he does not plan to invite the president to campaign for him.

"You've got a little bit of a hand tied behind your back because of the president's unpopularity in this state," Fisher said over lunch with reporters. "Is it a depressant on our race? It obviously is."

The Dallas millionaire, who says he has known Clinton since they were among founders of the centrist Democratic Leadership Council, said he does not anticipate soliciting a Clinton campaign swing.

"On the other hand, you don't know what's going to happen between now and Election Day," Fisher said.

At a July 19 Washington, D.C., campaign fundraiser Fisher said he was running "to help Bill Clinton get done what he was elected to do." At another point, he called the Democratic president "this great man."

Fisher, conceding he trails Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison as the campaign enters its last 60 days, said Friday: "The president is very unpopular in this state. Is it helping me that he's unpopular? Of course, it is not. Do I bear ill will towards him? I do not. Do I want to see him get it right? Of course I do."

Fisher said Hutchison has been trying to hang Clinton around his neck.

Campaigning in Dallas on Friday, Hutchison fired a clear shot at Clinton's criticism of Republicans as obstructionists, saying: "I thought to myself what is he asking us to say yes to? The largest tax increase in the history of America? Turning over our private property rights through increased regulation? Turning our U.S. troops over to the United Nations? Throwing out the greatest health-care system in the world?"

"Thank goodness somebody's saying no, no, no, no."

Fisher, an investor-businessman emphasized, however, that voters should not confuse him with a Clinton clone.

"If I am hired on by the state of Texas, my job is not to do his bidding," Fisher said. "My job is to represent Texas and do what's right for the country."

Hutchison spokesman David Beckwith said Fisher is "trying to have it both ways. He's criticizing Kay for failure to support Clinton policies yet he's trying to distance himself from Clinton personally."

AUSTIN -- Democratic Gov. Ann Richards headed the national convention that nominated Bill Clinton for the presidency, and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro ran Clinton's unsuccessful Texas campaign.

But with Clinton's popularity in a nose dive nationally, Texas Democrats are now trying quietly to distance themselves from the president.

"A lot of times you'll hear people bad mouthing the president out on the street," Harrison County Democratic Chairman Jim Ammerman said recently. "That's kind of become a social 'in' thing to do."

So far there have been no invitations to the president to tour with Texas' statewide candidates.

"It's not likely Bill Clinton will make any appearances in Texas," said Richards spokesman Chuck McDonald.

In the lieutenant governor's race, incumbent Bob Bullock's little-known and underfinanced Republican opponent, Tex Lezar, is running radio commercials labeling Bullock as a Clinton Democrat.

Bullock has replied with his own radio ads that rail at federal bureaucrats, never mention his party affiliation and ends with the tag line: "He's independent. He's tough. He's Bob Bullock."

Democratic U.S. Senate nominee Richard Fisher helped Clinton found the national Democratic Leadership Council. But Fisher on Friday said that he expected Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison to try to "hang Bill Clinton around my neck."

Fisher said if he is elected, his job is not to do Clinton's "bidding."

What the Texas Democrats are trying to avoid is a repeat of 1978, when President Jimmy Carter's unpopularity cost the party the Governor's Mansion for the first time since Reconstruction.

In the summer of 1978, Carter's popularity was dropping dramatically around the nation, but Texas Democrats saw no need to worry because gubernatorial nominee John Hill was riding high.

Hill led his Republican opponent

noted that Carter was unpopular in Texas, but "no knowledgeable political source here predicts that the president's unpopularity is great enough to elect Bill Clements."

Clements defeated Hill by 17,000 votes.

"The good thing for the Democrats (this year) is everybody knows what the problem is. Hill got blindsided in 1978 in the midterm Carter election," said University of Houston political scientist Richard Murray.

Murray said unenthusiastic Democratic-leaning voters stayed out of the 1978 election while Republicans were fired up to vote. He said Clinton could cause the same thing to happen this year.

"The Democrats have to worry about their vote base eroding," Murray said.

The Texas Poll conducted in August signaled that erosion. The poll found that more respondents who identified themselves as Republicans than Democrats said they were likely to vote, by a margin of 4 percentage points.

A recent poll by First Market Research of Austin said only 23 percent of Texans held a favorable view of Clinton, while 40 percent regarded him unfavorably. Another poll by Republican pollster Bryan Eppstein set Clinton's statewide popularity at 32 percent with 45 percent holding an unfavorable view of the president.

Clinton ran second in Texas behind President George Bush in the 1992 election and became the first Democrat to win the White House without carrying Texas since 1845.

Although the state was lost, Clinton received more votes than Carter ever did in Texas, more than the Democratic nominee in 1984 and more than Richards received in her low-turnout gubernatorial race in 1990.

Murray said he did not believe the president's popularity slump will affect Richards, because she is a "well-known governor with a well-developed persona of her own."

He said Richards also benefits from being a woman because independent female voters tend to feel less hostile to Clinton than men do.

But Murray said Clinton could be a drag on Democrat Fisher's hopes to unseat Hutchison in the Senate race

nee George W. Bush. Rove said Bush has no plans to use Clinton against Richards or make the race into a surrogate for Bush's father, the former president defeated by Clinton.

But Rove said he believes that voter unhappiness with Clinton will drive Republicans to the polls who normally only vote in presidential election years.

"Clinton is so bad and alienated so many people, he has nationalized this election," he said.

Richards spokesman McDonald said the president's popularity will play no role in the governor's race because Richards has a record of her own. He noted that former President Bush was highly popular in 1990 and his campaign swing for Republican gubernatorial nominee Clayton Williams did nothing to save Williams' campaign that year.

Yet Lezar, Bullock's Republican opponent, said he believes that Clinton could be the issue that helps him defeat Bullock.

"Voters are holding Clinton against the Democratic Party the same way they held Nixon against the Republican Party in 1974," he said.

Lezar said Clinton is not the only factor at play. He said voter alienation is turning the electorate away from career politicians to people such as Ross Perot or the Libertarian Party. He said Texas voters also are tired of Democratic politicians at the local level who are closet Republicans.

"They really ought to change parties," Lezar said. "This state is becoming a Republican state ... (and) this sort of hermaphroditic politics just isn't going to last much longer."

But Bullock said he believes that voters will judge him on his record, not Lezar's attempts to tie him to Clinton. Bullock noted that he supported Democrat Bob Kerrey in the 1992 presidential primaries.

"I have never been closely associated with the president ... I never shook his hand but one time in my life," Bullock said.

He said he also does not believe "a person's liabilities or assets" transfer from one politician to another.

Marta Greytak, the Republican opposing Mauro, already is trying to make Clinton an issue in the race.

Mauro is a longtime friend of the Clintons, and earlier this year first lady Hillary Clinton attended a Houston fund-raiser for Mauro.

Mauro was embarrassed in 1992 when caught using state employees and equipment to help run Clinton's Texas campaign. He apologized and repaid the state. The Travis County district attorney cleared him of any criminal wrongdoing.

"I'm running for land commission -- that doesn't have anything to do with Bill Clinton," Mauro said last week. "Texans, for their own sakes, vote their own consciences."

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Hill led his Republican opponent Bill Clements by 66 percent to 20 percent in public opinion polls at the beginning of August.

Undaunted by his long shot chances, Clements appeared with Hill at an industrial appreciation dinner in Amarillo. Clements stood up at the dinner and said President Carter "is a dead chicken around John Hill's neck . . . and I intend to hang him with it."

Clements then pulled a rubber chicken from a paper sack and threw it at Hill. The phony fowl splashed into the dinner plate of the Amarillo mayor's wife.

After the incident, New York Times political writer Tom Wicker

"It's going to be real hard for him, given the national climate and the president's lack of popularity, to get any traction running against Kay Bailey (Hutchison)," he said.

Democratic political consultant George Christian also said he doubts that Clinton's unpopularity will affect Richards. But he said Clinton does represent an anti-government sentiment among voters that Republicans might be able to exploit.

"If the Republicans can say, 'Send a message to Clinton,' it could hurt across the board," Christian said.

Karl Rove is the chief strategist for Republican gubernatorial nomi-

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Mauro said he believes that voter turnout this year will be driven more by how voters feel about Richards at the head of the Democratic ticket and Hutchison at the head of the Republican ticket than by any feelings voters might have about Clinton.

But Greytok said she believes that voter feelings about Clinton may be decisive in her race.

Mauro "is Bill Clinton in Texas," Greytok said. "He is so close to Clinton . . . that he even illegally ran (Clinton's) campaign out of the General Land Office. So, from my perspective, talking about those things is going to be very important

2 Senate candidates cast themselves as moderates

AUSTIN — Unless someone goes hunting for doves, the race between Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Democratic nominee Richard Fisher will probably not catch fire until the candidates debate or air TV ads.

Yet, there is a little friction.

"She's been avoiding me," said Fisher, a millionaire Dallas businessman-investor and political novice who upset Democratic war horse Jim Mattox in an April runoff. "She's worried about just appearing to be deficient as a senator."

Fisher, 45, initially sought eight debates and offered to fly to Washington, D.C., to parry at the time and place of Hutchison's choice.

Now he says he will settle for three

October debates his campaign has penciled in.

"If it's all we get, that's what we work with," Fisher said.

Hutchison spokesman David Beckwith said the senator, who captured the Senate seat over interim Democratic Sen. Bob Krueger in June 1993, would probably join in the three debates, but no more.

Hutchison, 50, was not available for comment, but she has made an unanswered offer of her own: to fly President Clinton to Texas so he could assist Fisher.

In campaign speeches and literature, both major candidates paint themselves as moderates who harbor huge differences with each other.

For instance, Hutchison joined most of her fellow Republicans in voting against the anti-crime package approved by Congress.

She objected to "social programs" in the final version as well as a ban on 19 assault weapons, Beckwith said.

Fisher, calling Hutchison an "obstructionist" angling to be Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole's running mate in the 1996 presidential race, said he would have voted for the crime legislation, which could place between 20,000 and 100,000 police officers on the street.

Fisher also has endorsed a proposal by Senate Finance Committee Chairman Daniel Patrick Moynihan of New York to heavily tax ammunition used in weapons of mass destruction. But he

Fisher also favors the death penalty for individuals who deal drugs to children and says no prisoner with a drug addiction should be released without completing a rehabilitation program.

On health care, Fisher hews to a bipartisan approach formulated by Sens. John Chafee, R-Rhode Island, and John Breaux, D-Louisiana. The measure seeks to provide health insurance to 95 percent of the population by 2001 and includes a proviso allowing workers to keep their health plans even if they lose their job.

Likewise, Hutchison endorses "portability," but also says there is no health-care crisis. Noting that at least 30 million Americans lack insurance coverage, she said last year: "Many of those people, they're young, they're healthy — they don't need coverage."

Beckwith said Hutchison supports a woman's right to abortion with "reasonable restrictions" requiring parental consent for a minor and setting a waiting period. The senator opposes the use of federal funds to pay for abortions for poor women except in cases of rape, incest or to save the life of the mother.

Fisher, pro-choice without qualification, said federal funds should be available to pay for abortions for poor women.

"Look, I'm the father of four children. I'm not advocating abortion as a form of birth control," he said. "But I don't believe there should be restrictions."

On welfare reform, both candidates endorse the idea of limiting payments in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program to two years for able-bodied recipients.

Fisher said he would support the U.S.-led invasion of Haiti as a last resort, and with the expectation that Caribbean nations would serve as post-invasion

peacekeepers. Hutchison opposes invasion, Beckwith said, instead favoring a lift of the economic embargo in return for another democratic election.

Hutchison believes Clinton has appropriately controlled the exodus of Cubans to Florida, Beckwith said, but opposes any negotiations with Cuban leader Fidel Castro.

Fisher said Clinton should partially lift the economic embargo against Cuba and begin planning for democracy upon Castro's demise.

In the arena of political reform, the candidates sound similar.

Hutchison and Fisher each seek a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget and limiting members of Congress to 12 years in office.

Hutchison says she has reduced her office budget by 20 percent since her election and met a campaign promise to hire an ethnically diverse staff.

Fisher favors reducing congressional staffs by half and removing "extraordinary privileges" enjoyed by U.S. House and Senate members. He has said he would accept only the salary of a schoolteacher.

Fisher refuses contributions from political action committees, Hutchison accepts PAC aid.

Hutchison voted for a Senate-backed campaign finance reform measure reducing PAC contributions and limiting gifts from lobbyists to congressional staff. Fisher said he would have done the same.

Libertarian candidate Pierre Blondeau, 58, a Houston businessman, wants to repeal all federal taxes to be replaced by a 25 to 30 percent national sales tax.

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However, Greytok is unwilling to concede that a Mauro victory would be a voter endorsement of Clinton.

"If we lose, what I will feel is that the public did not snap to the issues and the record of Garry Mauro," she said.

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Playing blackjack a gray area for Tigua tribe, state

EL PASO — There's a new game in Texas.

It's called Tigua 21, but don't let anyone fool you. It's blackjack. And there's no denying it will put added pressure on state officials to legalize casino gaming in all of Texas.

The Tigua Indian tribe of El Paso added four blackjack tables to its picturesque, pueblo-style Speaking Rock Bingo and Entertainment Center for the first time Friday. Players ringed the tables well before the 6 p.m. start, and others waited their turn at the classic card game.

Francis Fischer of El Paso plays bingo at Speaking Rock four to five times a week "unless I'm winning when I play every night . . ." Friday, she played an hour of blackjack before bingo.

"This will be a lot more convenient than Las Vegas," she said.

College student John Spencer drove 45 miles from Las Cruces, N.M., to play blackjack.

"It's not as though there are places to play all over the place," he said, prompting other players to grumble in agreement.

The Tiguas are skirting the legality of casino-style gaming by declaring their blackjack is

Minority opportunity districts now under attack in Texas and across the South are critical to the realization of our nation's democratic ideals.

National leaders such as Barbara Jordan, formerly a representative of Texas' 18th Congressional District, would not have been able to serve their country if the diversity of our citizenry

had not been recognized in the creation of such congressional districts.

In a federal court decision last month, Texas' 30th District — which marked a historic first with the election of an African-American representative from Dallas in 1992 — was thrown out as unconstitutional along with two other Texas districts that included African-Americans and Hispanics in the political process.

The courts have grappled with the issue of minority opportunity districts in recent months. In North Carolina, a court upheld the constitutionality of two districts that helped to "break free of a legacy of racial bloc voting."

But in Louisiana, a three-judge panel threw out an African-American opportunity district and redrew the lines to create a district that is more than 70 percent white, setting the stage for the possible election of former Ku Klux Klan leader David Duke.

The battle should intensify this fall. Redistricting is expected to be argued before the U.S. Supreme Court, which will have to decide between representative democracy for all or the resurrection of an era of racial exclusion.

So-called bizarre shapes have been the line of attack against minority opportunity districts. Yet the shapes of many majority white districts are just as "bizarre."

How many readers can differentiate the 30th District, represented by African-American Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson, from the 6th District, which is 89 percent white? The 30th District — which is 47 percent African-American, 36 percent white and 15 percent Hispanic — is wholly within the Dallas metropolitan area and spans only 42 miles at its longest point. In contrast, the 6th District is 82 miles long.

The 30th District illustrates the need for minority opportunity districts and the pressures that dictate the shapes of congressional districts in Texas and other states. The exclusion of African-Americans from the political process has been extreme in Dallas.

Racial bloc voting — whites voting only for white candidates — consistently prevented African-Americans from being elected to the City Council, the County Commissioners Court, the Legislature and Congress, except in districts where African-Americans constituted nearly a majority.

Those powerful incumbents successfully battled to keep some of their prior territory, including large numbers of African-American voters. As a result of the incumbents' land grab, the new district was denied many African-American neighborhoods and had to go in search of population and enough African-Americans elsewhere to keep it a viable opportunity district.

In the recent Texas decision, the federal court ruled that minority opportunity districts created under the Voting Rights Act must be attractively shaped, even in a state where "ugly" majority white districts are the norm.

The court specifically upheld the constitutionality of several white districts that ramble over vast territory and split many counties and cities, because those districts were configured to protect white incumbent members of Congress, both Republicans and Democrats.

Yet districts designed to remedy centuries of racial exclusion are being required to meet much higher standards. The court seems more concerned with district shapes that would win an art contest than with true representative democracy.

The possibility of no African-American representatives from Texas looms in the near future, when the court rules on how the districts must be redrawn.

Minority opportunity districts are the most integrated districts in the country. Many white residents of those districts have testified in their support and indicated that their African-American representatives in Congress are very responsive to all constituents, regardless of race.

Minority opportunity districts promote racial understanding. As one witness testified, Barbara Jordan's "example made it easier for other African-American elected officials to gain some level of acceptance in the white community."

Challenges to minority opportunity districts in Texas, North Carolina, Louisiana and Georgia are likely to return to the Supreme Court in the next term, giving the court a fuller picture of the complexity and tough politics involved in congressional districting.

The evidence will show that all of the districts were created to remedy a history of wholesale exclusion of African-Americans from Congress and that many non-racial considerations influenced the district shapes.

The Supreme Court should follow the lead of the federal court in North Carolina, which recently concluded that the quality and inclusiveness of representation is more important than how pleasing a district is to the eye.

Given that housing patterns are racially segregated in Dallas, a "pretty" African-American opportunity district could be drawn. But in the 1981 reapportionment, the large African-American residential area in Dallas was split, giving two white congressmen a cushion of loyal Democratic voters and denying African-Americans the opportunity to elect a representative of their choice.

In 1991, the 30th District was created as an African-American opportunity district. But because of politics, not race, the district had to be squeezed between the former districts of two white incumbents, Martin Frost and John Bryant, each of whom wanted to win re-election.

A STATE IN CRISIS

I believe the state of California is in a crisis both fiscally and morally. Our people are afraid to use their parks, walk in their own neighborhoods, and be in their homes after dark. We are seeing good permanent jobs leave California for places that offer far less in terms of living conditions but offer what business needs: a place to operate a business, free from oppressive regulations and unfair taxes.

We cannot conduct business as usual, but must recognize that we are in a crisis. We need our legislators to rise above special interest politics, such as the tobacco, liquor, and gambling industries, and begin doing the **people's** work.

The intent of this booklet is to inform the voters what to expect from Adam Michelin during his first term representing the 51 State Assembly District. The bills listed will be submitted during the first six months and his efforts will be entirely devoted to passage of these bills. Adam will work for you the people, not for someone else's political agenda.

Please see inside of the back cover if you would like to help Adam in his effort to bring common sense back to state government.

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Notes

BILL 1 - GUN CONTROL

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to begin the control over the use of guns by criminals, not law-abiding citizens. Use a gun in commission of a crime, go to jail.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Use of or carrying on your person or in your auto a gun of any form, loaded or unloaded, during the commission of any crime shall make that crime a gun felony. For any gun felony it will be unlawful to enter into any form of plea bargaining. If convicted of the underlying crime, an additional 10 years shall be added to the sentence and any chance for parole for both the underlying crime or the additional 10 years shall be forfeited.
- If during the commission of a gun felony any person is killed by the gun used or possessed by the person(s) committing the underlying crime, that person is guilty of murder one and the crime shall be punishable by death.

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- Any minor using a gun during the commission of a crime shall be tried as an adult. The adult owner of the gun, unless legally excused (i.e. gun reported stolen), shall be tried as an accomplice to the minor's crime.
- Previously convicted felons convicted of a gun felony, will have 20 additional years added to the sentence.
- None of the sentences shall run concurrently.

BILL 2 - POLICE PROTECTION ACT

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Our police are the front line troops against the criminal element in our society and deserve our full support and protection.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The intentional killing of any police officer during the exercise of the officer's duties shall be murder one and upon conviction shall be punishable by death.
- The killing of any police officer by one already in prison for life imprisonment shall be punishable by death.
- The intentional or unintentional injuring of any police officer during the exercise of the officers duties shall be a felony. It will be unlawful to plea bargain with the accused and upon conviction, 10 years will be added to the sentence and the loss of possibility of parole.

BILL 3 - JUVENILE COURT REFORM

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

To re-focus the juvenile court system to saving all the children it can instead of the current failure of the system to effect any change at all.

To establish minimum adult supervision standards for children.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Children without minimum adult supervision should be taken off the streets. Adequate funding should be provided to locate adequate homes or shelters, either church based or community-based.
- A major effort must be made to locate the parents of these abandoned children.
- To establish mandatory stays away from home for first-time offenders. This time should be at community or church based centers in order to allow the child to continue at school.

- To establish mandatory stays away from home for second-time offenders. This time should initially be at a work ethic camp, with mandatory transition time at community or church-based centers.
- To establish mandatory stays away from home for third-time offenders. There should be a mandatory stay at a prison for two weeks, with the additional time to be at work ethic camps, and a mandatory transition stay at a community or church based center.
- The time spent for each offense after the third shall increase the stay at each stage, until: 1) child reaches 18 when he or she will be transferred to state prison, 2) child is declared by the court to be incorrigible, when he or she will be held at a work ethic camp until 18 and released or, if child falls into 1) above, transferred to prison.

- For enumerated crimes, however, the child will either be removed from the juvenile court system or held until 18 when the courts will determine the continued likelihood of release.

Enumerated crimes

Any age

- Murder
- Aggravated assault
- Use of gun in any felony crime

Over 10 years old

- Adult felony
- Robbery
- Aggravated Arson

BILL 4 - INMATE BILL OF RIGHTS

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

To establish maximum living conditions at any prison facility, and to define all rights to prisoners.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The state shall determine the average standard of living for the working poor and shall establish that condition throughout the state prison system. No prison shall be equipped with more facilities nor provide services greater than the working poor could afford.
- All state citizen rights, unless defined in this statute, are lost. The Department of Corrections shall have final decision as to any prisoner grievance.
- The courts will grant broad deference to the discretion of the department. No state court shall have any jurisdiction until full and final

Department of Corrections decisions are made as to the grievance.

- The right to appeal any sentence of death shall be limited to one appeal, unless there is new evidence (evidence that was previously unknown at time of trial) presented. The constitutionally mandated review of the sentence shall not be counted. The courts shall give absolute priority to any appeal made. Any stay of execution shall be heard within 48 hours of the stay. Any appeal shall be heard within 20 days of the stay.
- Right to Die. Any prisoner with a sentence longer than his or her life expectancy shall be allowed the choice of voluntary death or jail time. If death is selected, the prisoner will receive 10% of the present value of any estimated savings (from not serving time) to be left to his or her estate. If the voluntary death option is taken, the state is required to pay the victim(s) of the crime(s) 20% of the present value of any estimated savings.

BILL 5 - STATE IMMIGRATION ACT

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to require the equal enforcement of federal and state laws, to guard against the waste of the state assets, and to reduce the inflow of illegal foreign nationals.

HIGHLIGHTS

- It shall be unlawful for any state or local political subdivision to establish a procedure requiring the non reporting of any illegal act.
- It shall be a crime to knowingly not report the use of any state service by someone not entitled to use that service.
- Auxiliary Border Police. The state and local police shall be authorized to deputize citizens for the sole purpose of watching the border for illegal foreign nationals who attempt to cross. The state shall make available funds necessary in order to supplement this effort.

BILL 6 - TORT REFORM ACT

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

To establish limits on awards and to establish a punitive damage award fund.

HIGHLIGHTS

- All punitive damages awarded shall be paid into a special state fund and not to the individual.
- Attorneys' fees shall be paid out of non punitive damage awards and be limited to the greater of time and materials or 20% of the non-punitive award.
- Pain and Suffering shall be limited to a maximum of 3 times actual damages.
- The initiating party in a lawsuit shall bear all legal costs if that party loses the action.
- Negligent Inflection of Emotional Distress (NIED) is not a cause of action.

- Statute of repose for all products produced or used in the state is 7 years.
- The state special punitive fund will be used to compensate victims of crimes.

BILL 7 - LEGISLATIVE SALARY INCREASE ACT

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Since the elected legislative body ultimately works for the people, it is only correct that the legislative body ask the boss for a raise.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Any pay raise either proposed by a special committee or introduced by the legislative body must be voted upon at the same time that the elected official is to be voted upon.
- If the official is appointed then the pay raise must be approved at the same time the person making the appointment is up for election.

BILL 8 - WELFARE REFORM

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The overall intent is to provide adequate assistance to a family that has suffered a major catastrophic event through no fault of their own, and cannot afford to recover on their own. This family must be able to regain a sense of stability and move on with their lives in a reasonable period of time, but in no case longer than two years. Assistance is not meant to create a lifestyle or be a permanent solution to poor education, mistakes made in life, or the like.

HIGHLIGHTS

- To establish basic requirements for welfare enrollment. The enumerated list of requirements shall be inclusive. The list shall include at least; U.S. citizenship, domicile in state for 6 months without employment, or born in state, intent to domicile with employment.

- To establish a lifetime maximum of 24 months state aid for welfare from any state. One may regain the welfare safety net through work, similar to unemployment insurance.
- To establish a minimum standard of living, but in no case lower than poverty level.
- It should not be a requirement that the person not be working nor separated from the spouse.
- Those currently enrolled on welfare shall be given 24 months of intense benefits and released from the program.

BILL 9 - SCHOOL FUND ALLOCATION AND RESPONSIBILITY ACT

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Our state constitution requires (Prop 98) minimum spending authority for the education of our children. This is a good idea. The future of our children and our state depends on a good solid education.

The problem is that our educators have become more concerned with growing a bureaucracy than with the education of our children.

We spend more than 50% of our compensation dollars on non teacher salaries (teacher is defined as one whose primary function is to teach children in the classroom).

Our Democratically-controlled legislature does not have the backbone to fight the teacher's union and make the necessary changes.

The intent of this legislation is to ensure that the maximum dollar amount is focused into the classroom.

Children who are disruptive at school should be removed from the normal class, not be rewarded and dropped from school to walk the streets. Such children are at-risk and are a future problem for society. We must help.

OVERVIEW

This bill:

- Mandates that no more than 15% of total compensation authority be spent in any support activity, including a specific limitation on any state-wide administration of 1%, a school district limitation of 4%, and a school limitation of 10%.
- Re-focuses authority on capital expenditures to local school boards. A per student capital expenditure amount shall be allocated to each district. The district shall have the absolute authority to build, plan, defer, acquire land, and the like.

- Requires truth in teacher accounting. State mandated student-to-teacher ratios shall be adhered to. This legislation establishes uniform standards to account for teachers.
- Focuses on at-risk children. This legislation establishes classes of at-risk children and provides for additional funds to be allocated for use in the school districts for these children.
- Establishes English as the required teaching language.
- Establishes teacher excellence standards and compensation standards.
- Establishes U.S. citizenship, state domicile, and school district residence as standard for enrollment. Any other pupil must pay per pupil cost or transfer pupil credit from current school

MAJOR PROVISIONS

Definitions

A teacher is a person for whom 75% of compensated time is spent in direct instruction to pupils.

An administrator is anyone not classified as a teacher.

A teacher shall be counted on a pro-rata basis in any statistical basis. Hence, a teacher who normally travels to five schools during a school week shall be counted as 1/5 teacher when computed for pupil-to-teacher ratios.

Compensation shall mean all purchases of an individual's time, whether direct salary, independent contracting, or consulting.

Minimum standards

Student ratios

Every school shall maintain an overall pupil to teacher ratio of 20 to 1.

Teacher bonus

Two separate Compensation Bonus pools shall be established; one for every district and the other for every school. The total amount of each pool shall be 10% of prior year's paid compensation.

The distribution of this pool shall be based upon objective qualitative standards only, such as: percentage of attendance, drop-out rate, SAT scores, college board advanced placement exams, teen pregnancy rates, vandalism and student crime rates, and the like.

Details of this bonus program shall be developed by each school district and approved by the Regional Oversight Council.

Teacher excellence standards.

Every teacher must maintain a continuing education requirement of 26 credit hours per year or be re-certified every other year.

Re-certification shall consist of independent evaluation by school board and an objective test.

The concept of tenure shall be eliminated.

Administration

Regional Oversight Council (ROC).

The state shall be divided into at least 5 regional areas based on population areas with every school district being within one area.

This Regional Oversight Council shall consist of one elected member from each school district in the regional area.

The council shall meet four times a year to vote on matters that require approval.

Any staff required for this council shall be part of the overall state 1% budget.

Any full-time teacher, or principal is eligible to be elected.

Elections shall be held during the non-school year.

Term shall be for 4 years, with 25% of the council up for election each year.

Funding levels

The intent of this legislation is not to alter Prop 98's guaranteed minimum funding levels but to establish priority as to how the money is to be spent.

At-Risk Children

The state has the responsibility to provide education to every child. Problem children are at-risk children; children without adult supervision are at-risk children. A community-based support system, schools, churches, and local organizations can help to identify, watch, and help teach children who are at-risk. Funds will be provided to establish these programs.

**BILL 10 - SPENDING AUTHORITY AND VARIATIONS
ENACTMENT -(SAVE)**

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Our state government requires a new way of deciding what to spend our money on and how much to tax. With Prop 13 and other similar measures being eroded by the spending of the Democratically-controlled State Assembly, it is clear that we cannot control spending by controlling taxes.

We must limit the total spending for the state. Having achieved this we can now mandate a balanced budget, with taxing authority up to the mandated spending levels.

The State of California needs a simplified way of determining what our taxes are spent on so that, just like you and me, in hard times we will know what are basic State Government needs and what are frills.

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OVERVIEW

- To establish the maximum allowable expenditures in any one fiscal year to 6% of the State's Net State Gross Product
- To establish the maximum Revenue (Taxing Authority) limit in any one year
- To mandate a Balanced Budget in any one year
- To establish an Expenditure Priority System

MAJOR PROVISIONS

Maximum Allowable expenditure limit,
Authorized Expenditure Cap (AE Cap)

The State Gross Product (SGP) shall be determined within 3 months of the close of the fiscal year. (The state Gross Product is the sum of all goods and services conducted in the state, including all State and Local government expenditures - an overall gauge to the states economic health.)

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The state's prior fiscal year Authorization Expenditure Cap shall be subtracted from the current State Gross Product (SGP), the resulting amount being Net State Gross Product (NSGP). (This procedure is subtracting the state's prior year budget from the State Gross Product (SGP)).

The sum of 6% of the Net State Gross Product (NSGP) shall be established as the Authorization Expenditure Cap (AE Cap) for the next fiscal year.

Expenditures shall be defined as any payments to anybody, any fund established, any transfer to any group, and the like.

The state shall not be authorized to exceed this limit in total expenditures, except as provided below.

Maximum Revenue Limit

Revenue is defined as any amount collected from any source such as taxes, both personal and corporate, fees, interest earned from deposits, and the like.

The Maximum Revenue Limit (MR Limit) shall be equal to the AE Cap computed above for the matching year.

The state shall not be authorized to collect more revenue than authorized to spend by the AE Cap.

Expenditure Priority System

All expenditures shall be classified into four categories, A, B, C, and, M:

A - Essential Expenditures - Expenditures to meet the essential role, of government, as expressly defined in the states constitution. For example:

- Line Police
- Prisons
- Teachers
- Schools, operating costs
- Roads, emergency repairs

B - Basic Expenditures - Expenditures that are needed to continue Type A services for an extended period. For example:

- Support Police
- Compensation of Elected or appointed officials
- Schools, repair or modification
- Roads, non-emergency repairs

C. Enhancement Expenditures - Expenditures that add or enhance the quality aspects of life or any non constitutionally mandated services. For example:

- Legislative staff
- Arts
- Marketing departments
- Schools, new construction
- New Roads

M - Mandated Expenditures - Expenditures that are mandated by federal law and have matching federal funds associated with them.

Authorized Variations

Emergencies

Under a declared catastrophic state of emergency the Maximum Revenue Limit (MR Limit) may be exceeded if and only if the following occurs:

All C level expenditures are suspended

All B level expenditures are reduced by 25%

If under the following circumstances the revenue is still insufficient to meet the needed expenditures, the state is authorized to issue bonds equal to the short fall to be repaid in 5 years or less.

During this repayment period, no C level expenditures shall be made.

All outside contributions shall be used to first, reduce the bonds and, second, repay exceeded MR Limits, prior to restoring any C level expenditures.

Estimating error

If the estimate for next year's revenue falls short, then the following provision shall be used to make up the difference.

First, all "C" level expenditures shall be reduced pro-rata to reduce the short fall, until zero is reached.

Second, all "B" level expenditures shall be reduced across the board until 25% reduction is reached.

Third, "B" level expenditures shall be further reduced in proportion with raising new revenue.

Any change is better than what we have now, even Bill Clinton.

WRONG!

Changing the wrong person could make everything much worse than it is now. It is like a car that has 4 tires. If 3 of them are flat, changing the engine will not fix the car. You must change the flat tires. But it is easier for voters to change who is President than to vote out their Congressman, U.S. Senator or both. The questions to ask are, "Is my legislator one of the flat tires" and "Is Clinton really the answer?"

CLINTON'S ARKANSAS - How Arkansas compares among all 50 States.

- **ECONOMY** - "When he took over, Arkansas ranked as one of the nation's poorest states. It still does." (LA TIMES Sunday 10/18/92). Arkansas ranks 50th in median family income, 48th in people living above the poverty index, 48th in disposable income.
- **CRIME** - Violent Crime up 95% since 1981. Rape up 70% since 1980. 50th in per capita justice system spending. 50th in per capita spending on police. Commuted 40 life sentences for murder and rape.
- **TAXES** - Raised taxes and fees 127 times, including sales taxes and taxes on food and gasoline.

CLINTON Claims Arkansas has led the nation in new job growth. Again, according to the Los Angeles Times, "Clinton's programs may have had some impact on the state's job-growth rate, but the impact has been small. The main source of new jobs has been the state's rapidly growing chicken industry, growth that has made the poultry producers a powerful entity in Arkansas. And that, in turn, has stymied efforts to control chicken-related pollution."

Clinton has made loud claims regarding balancing his state budget. According to the Times "Under the Arkansas constitution, the budget must be balanced. The state has an automatic budget-cutting process that cuts spending to match revenues each quarter of the year." As President, Clinton would have no such process to force him, or Congress, to balance the budget. And since Gov. Clinton continues to oppose a Balance Budget Amendment, he will never have such a restraint in Washington.

CLINTON'S AMERICA - The next 4 years under a Clinton Administration would be a change for America a change for the worse.

Matt Fong, member, CA State Board of Equalization paints a picture for us in his article "What Bill Clinton Really Has Up His Sleeve".

"Mr. Clinton wants to impose one of the largest gross tax increases in history on the American People - more than 150 Billion Dollars" (Mr. Fong refers here to Bill Clinton's economic plan, Putting People First). "And, he intends, at the same time, to increase government spending by 220 billion. He openly proposes to substantially increase the national debt over the next four years. His running mate, Senator Gore, was a leading supporter of the Congressional filibuster that recently killed the Balanced Budget Amendment supported by President Bush and most Americans."

"Higher taxes do not lead to smaller deficits. They dig the nation deeper into debt. Over the past 40 years, for every \$1.00 in increased taxes, government spending has gone up \$1.58. Bill Clinton claims he wants to change history. He won't! He will only repeat history but in a grander style by imposing - higher taxes and more spending."

CLINTON'S AMERICA - We will see a nation where Act-up protesters are shouting louder than ever, "We're here, we're queer, we're proud of it, get used to it." Mr. Clinton wrote to the Washington Blade on March 20, 1992 "I am fundamentally

committed to the protection of the rights of gay and lesbian Americans. I will call for a repeal of the ban on gays and lesbians in the military and pledge to issue an executive order if elected prohibiting discrimination against gays and lesbians in federal hiring and contracting." For all intents and purposes this means a future of quotas for gays in federal hiring. Quotas which could result in a gay white male being promoted over a hispanic or black fellow worker at HUD, the FBI, or the IRS.

There is no reason to doubt he would sign S574 and H.R. 1430, the federal homosexual gay rights bill introduced by Ted Kennedy, Alan Cranston, Barney Frank, an open homosexual, and co-sponsored by Barbara Boxer. There were 124 co-sponsors in the House and Senate. Quoting from the Oct. 1992 issue of "Family Voice", published by Concerned Women Of America, "Senate bill S. 574 and House bill H.R. 1430 would provide special privileges for homosexuals on the basis of 'affectional or sexual orientation,' giving them special civil rights status akin to racial minority. Under this legislation, schools could be required to teach that homosexuality is natural, and churches could also be forced to hire and ordain homosexual men and lesbians as clergy. This bill would pave the way for legally recognized homosexual "marriages" in which a "partner" could receive the same benefits as married spouses do today."

Will Clinton's signing of these homosexual bills bring about more of what was experienced in the Los Angeles Unified School District in the last 4 years, where the homosexual community introduced "Project 10". A program where Jr. and Sr. High School classes are pulled out of the classroom and instructed that 1 out of 10 of them are homosexual.
