I want to take this opportunity to thank you for agreeing to serve on the new National Commission on Social Security Reform.


In September, as you know, I announced I would appoint this Commission to work with the Congress and me to reach two specific goals: propose realistic long-term reforms to put Social Security back on a sound financial footing; and forge a working bipartisan consensus so that the necessary reforms will be passed into law.


