Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., praised the efforts of Hutchinson city officials in reducing the potential liability of cities faced with the cost of cleaning polluted areas.


Earlier this spring, Dole met with Hutchinson Mayor Ron Leslie, City Commissioner Jim Fee and Environmental Protection Agency officials. The Hutchinson delegation had gone to Washington, D.C., in an effort to reduce the city's portion of the cost in cleaning up pollution in the Obee area on the east side of the city.

While the exact cost of the cleanup is unknown, Hutchinson city officials have proposed limiting the cost of the cleanup to the city to 5 percent of the city's assessed valuation, or about \$5

Dole urges cable company "to be generous"


Sen. Bob Dole said Friday that if efforts to amend the Cable Act of 1984 are begun, he has changes to in mind.

His comment was in reference to the difficulties Salina has had in negotiating a cable television franchise renewal with Salina Cable Television.

"If we get into changing (the act) by law, I'm going to have an amendment giving the city more power during renewal," said the Kansas Republican in his weekly telephone news conference.

"I'd like to shorten the franchise term. Fifteen years is too long, and I'd like to allow for competition for some of these monopolies." Over the past two years, the city and cable

company have been through sometimes-heated public hearings and negotiations in the cable company's attempt to gain renewal of its



franchise agreement, which expires in 1992. Dole said his office has been pressuring Tele-Communications Inc., the parent company of Salina Cable Television, to negotiate in good faith with the city.

"We've pressured — or strongly urged — TCI that it is in their best interest to be as generous as possible," Dole said. "We told them (TCI) to get out there and

work it out," Dole said. "Salina is a good-sized city and we told them they ought to try take care of it."

Dole met informally with Salina city commissioners in Washington, D.C., during a National League of Municipalities meetings. The city has corresponded with Dole and other members of the Kansas congressional delega-

Over the past two weeks, the commission has been discussing an ordinance that sets out regulations the cable company must follow when submitting a proposal to the city. Earlier this week, Salina Cable Television -

in a strongly worded letter to City Manager

Dennis Kissinger - said the city was interpreting the Cable Act incorrectly in several areas.

"I cannot express to you how dismayed we (TCI) are to see such a flagrant violation of standards and procedures spelled out in federal law," wrote Terry Jensen, area manager for TCI of Kansas.

The Salina City Commission has twice given preliminary approval to the ordinance that will allow the city to put out a request for proposals. In the request for proposals, the city has outlined what it deems necessary to meet the future cable needs of the community over the life of the next franchise.

Peter Brown, the city's public information officer, said some of the changes in the ordinance Jensen suggested might be made before Monday's commission meeting. But the ordinance should be given final approval Monday as scheduled.

"We had a very good meeting in my office with the EPA and the mayor," Dole said during his weekly telephone press confer-ence with Kansas media. "We discovered a lot of other municipalities are in the same fix. So I'd commend the city officials of Hutch for taking the lead and trying to find some way to reduce the potential obligations and responsibilities. I must say I was encouraged just sitting in on the meeting from what I heard from representatives of the Environmental Protection Agency.

"I think we just have to wait awhile and see what develops to see what the study reveals. But certainly the city and city officials have to do everything they can to protect the city from increased liability."

Dole said he had not seen the Hutchinson proposal but would be taking a close look at the concept when he receives it.

The Senate minority leader also was not particularly receptive to Rep. Dan Glickman's proposal to bring the Z-Bar Ranch into the National Park Service system. Thursday, Glickman, D-Kan., said he would be introducing legislation this spring to make the 17square-mile Z-Bar ranch near Strong City a national monument. "So far, we've said no," Dole said. "Maybe Dan has a new idea here. He says it's not going to cause any opposition, but a lot of the opponents say we've got tall grass and we don't need govern-ment to spend \$8 million."

Dole said the study is expected to predict that the park would bring an additional 19,000 visitors to the area each year.

The state's senior senator complimented the process through which Glickman was working.

the U.S. would expand its efforts to help the refugees, with plans calling for setting up relief faci-lities capable of sheltering and feeding up to 700,000 people who have fled Iraqi President Saddam Hussein's forces.

Dole said he supported the idea of a "safe haven" zone in Iraq, above the 36th parallel, so the Kurdish and Shiite people could return to their homes.

"We'll have to tell Saddam, in very clear language, 'You leave these people alone, or we may be back. If you start any sort of genocidal action, the world com-munity will not tolerate it," the senator said.

Dole said he was happy to report that there were no Kansas military bases included on Friday's Pentagon list of installations to be closed.

"That means it will be business as usual for Fort Riley, McConnell Air Force Base and Fort Leavenworth - and that adds up to great news for Kansas."

Dole said the news is a reflection of the critical importance of these top-grade installations to the nation's defense.


