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COLUMBUS, OHIO, Feb. 13 --U.S. Senator Bob Dole spoke to Republicans this evening at the 1969 Lincoln-McKinley Day Banquet in Columbus.

On urban crisis, Dole said the Nixon Administration seeks to involve private enterprise through tax incentives in the solution to the problems of housing, employment and education.

He said, "Through the cooperation of government and private enterprise, Richard Nixon seeks a rebirth of American cities, not just more broken promises of the last Administration."

Dole pointed out the governmental poverty programs as they have been structured in the past, have not reached those who needed help the most, while in the last eight years, the annual number of felonies in the nation has doubled."

Dole said Nixon has already launched an all-out effort to halt the ever-increasing crime rate in the Nation's Capital by planning to hire more policemen, more judges and more prosecutors.

Dole added "The war on crime will not replace an attack on poverty and urban blight. We have achieved for the whole of our society neither economic opportunity nor public order. We must have both."

Dole said the Nixon Administration will provide the dollars and cents incentives to allow private capital to do the job which government has failed to do.

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
