NEW YORK, Sept. 24, 1971 ---- U.S. Sen. Bob Dole (R-Kans.)  
spent the afternoon today attending sessions of the United  
Nations on the question of admitting Mainland China to the  
U.N.

Dole was there to gather information about the U.S.  
position on the possibility of admitting Mainland China but  
at the same time insuring that Taiwan's 13 million people retain  
their representation in the U.N.

The Kansas Senator conferred with Ambassador George Bush,  
Delegate Allan Shepherd and Patrick Moynihan. Dole commented  
that he approves of the President's recent efforts to open  
communications with Mainland China. He said:

The President's earnest desire for peace has led him to open  
the door to communications with Mainland Chian. He has  
realized that surely, if we are to have this full generation  
of peace, the chances are better if China is encouraged to  
view the international arena as it really is, not from the  
vantage point of isolation and separation from world affairs.
