WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 28, 1972 ---- U.S. Senators James B. Pearson, Bob Dole and Rep. Keith Sebelius announced today that the Mueller-Schmidt House in Dodge City has been entered in the National Register of Historic Places.

The Kansas Republicans explained that the National Register is the official schedule of the nation's cultural property that is worth preservation. Congress called for such a list in the Historic Sites Act of 1935 and the Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

The National Register is published biennially with pertinent information about each property.

All historical areas in the National Park System, together with those properties eligible for designation as National Historic Landmarks, are of national significance and thus qualify automatically for the National Register. Properties of State or local significance may be nominated by the States and will be placed in the Register on approval of the National Park Service.

Properties listed in the National Register are eligible for federal grants-in-aid as authorized by the National Historic Preservation Act.
