## CLINTON'S REQUEST FOR SPECIAL TREATMENT BY SENATOR FULBRIGHT'S OFFICE

September 19, 1992

- Today's front page revelation in the New York Times that Gov. Clinton sought intervention by Senator Fulbright's office to help him avoid the draft further confirms that Gov. Clinton has not been candid about his draft situation.
  - Although Gov. Clinton has repeatedly denied receiving "unusual or favorable treatment," this morning's revelation proves that he did. (Copy of New York Times story 9/19/92 attached.)
  - He failed to disclose his anti-war activities and draft notice so he could get into the ROTC.
  - He said he was never drafted, but now admits he was.
  - He said he never had a deferment, but now admits he did.
  - He said he never opposed the draft, but now admits he did.
- To assure the American people he has the credibility and integrity to lead out nation, Gov. Clinton must immediately come forward and tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.
- So that the American people can have all the facts, Gov. Clinton should also:
  - Release all his documents bearing on his draft situation, which he now acknowledges withholding (AP stories dated 4/17/92, 9/2/92, and 9/7/92, and Boston Globe, 9/6/92, including all draft notices, all correspondence with the draft board and Selective Service System, the ROTC, the United States Department of State, Senator Fulbright and his office, Cliff Jackson, Henry M. Britt, Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller and his office, friends,

- relatives (including but not limited to his mother and his Uncle Raymond), and any other persons.
- \* Request all other persons holding correspondence or any other documents relating to this matter-including Randall B. Woods, who admits having a letter from Gov. Clinton to one of Senator Fulbright's aides (Washington Post, 2/16/92 -- to release all those documents.
- 4. As U.S. News (Sept. 21, 1992) has stated: "It all boils down to a question of trust. Bill Clinton is still entangled in the confusing stories he has told about his Vietnam draft status." With six weeks to go before the election, it is time for Gov. Clinton finally to come clean.
