Congressman Bob Dole, 6th District Kansas Republican, has been notified by George P. Larrick, Commissioner of Food and Drugs that Dole's recent objections to establishing a standard of identity for "Whole Fish Flour" are being entered into the record of proceedings on the issue now pending before the Food and Drug Administration.

Dole recently wrote Larrick supporting the latter's contention that "Whole Fish Flour" should be considered an adulterated food since none of the objectionable parts of the fish, such as the intestines, heads, fins and other foreign matter are removed before processing.

"Mr. Larrick has informed me a decision will be reached following the closing date for filing formal objections on November 14, 1961. I agree completely with Mr. Larrick's position that since whole fish flour contains ingredients not ordinarily considered fit for human consumption in the United States, it should therefore be considered adulterated", Dole said.
