- o We are here to honor those who have made contributions during the past year to the Infant Development Center and Preschool.
- o Your commitment to the protection and support of our nation's most vulnerable young citizens is an inspiration to all of us.
- o I am proud of the message that your commitment conveys
 - You are progressive in your recognition that early intervention can and does make a difference.
 - You are informed in choosing to forge a solid local and community based solution to the needs of handicapped infants.
 - You are successful in meeting your goal, and in fact exceeding that goal of \$1 million.
- o This center started in 1972 with an \$18,000 Federal grant for a model program from what was then the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Along the way, there has been a combination of Federal, state and local funding support. While there is no doubt that governmental funds planted the seed, it is you who have provided the sunshine. It is you and your contribution that will keep the Infant Development Center and Preschool a thriving and permanent community resource.
- o I have been told that this center has served about 1,000 families. That's impressive. And there are many here who deserve special recognition for that achievement.
- o First, Lee Ann Britton, the Director of the Center, and, so I am told, the energy that makes this cause worthwhile. She has been with the center since its inception and has hung in there through the good times and the hard times.

- o Second, you have been enormously successful in acquiring skilled and persistent leadership which is evident in the individuals who are on the Board of the Foundation. Specifically, Dr. Bridgens and Mr. Jim Butler have been identified as critical to the Endowment Campaign and the President-Elect of the Foundation Board Mr. Dick Edmonds has worked hard to secure adequate funding.
- o Of course, a source of special pride is the ongoing contribution of the employees and professional staff of Shawnee Mission Medical Center. On Valentine's Day this year their contributions totaled more than \$30,000. What a remarkable vote of confidence. I know that support means a lot to those who work at the Infant Development Center.
- o And I know that Shawnee Mission Medical Center has been critical to the survival of the Center as well...providing that "something extra"...giving the center a home and support during a particularly tough time.
- o At the Federal level, I will continue my ongoing commitment to support Federal legislation that responds to the human service needs of special citizens. Even in a time of belt tightening, I can assure you that programs for the disabled have continued to receive bipartisan support.
- o Recently passed legislation reaffirms our ongoing commitment to our nation's youngest citizens. In the 1986 Federal budget, we included a provision that enables states to expand their medicaid coverage for prenatal and postnatal care. There can be no doubt that our first line of defense is to try to prevent disorders.
- o In this year's 1987 proposed Senate budget funding levels for education, rehabilitation and developmental disability programs have been maintained. Also, the Social Services Block grants to states (Title XX) have been maintained at current service levels.
- o It should also be noted that many programs that are targeted at the poor, such as Aid to Families with Dependent Children and Medicaid, have been excluded from Gramm-Rudman automatic spending reductions.
- o The 1987 Senate Budget for the National Institutes of Health includes sustained funding for research in the prevention, early detection, and amelioration of disabilities.

- o Quite frankly, we can still do a better job of maintaining a balance between the Federal, state and local role in health and social services. We are making progress. Increasingly, we see the benefits of providing the states with flexibility and the wisdom of local initiatives.
- o The Federal bureaucracy, no matter how sensitive, cannot possibly respond to all of the needs of those served by the Infant Development Center. Each individual requires assistance that is a result of an unique set of circumstances, and the Federal government is incapable of responding with this type of fine-tuned precision. The fact that this center uses a "tailor made" treatment plan for each infant indicates to me that you understand "fine tuning" very well.
- o And finally we must not lose sight of the fact that it is you and your contributions that have brought us here today--and it is you I congratulate. You exemplify that "local initiative" in its finest form.

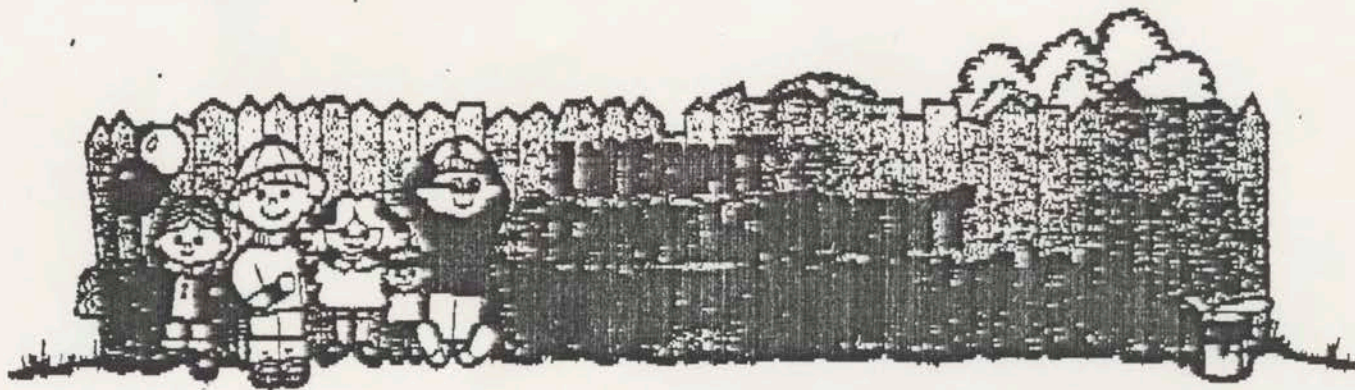

FACT SHEET

PHILOSOPHY and OBJECTIVES

1. Start as early as possible--early intervention is especially critical in handicapped children under four years of age.
2. Serve all disabilities--any child not reaching normal development, whether emotionally, mentally or physically, regardless of severity, is accepted.
3. Individualized therapy--each child's program is tailored to meet his specific needs for maximum development.
4. Parental support--parent groups help each other share and face the difficult problems of raising a handicapped child.
5. Periodic evaluation--new goals set and evaluation every six months by physician and staff.
6. Integrated preschool--where normal and handicapped children benefit and learn from each other.
7. Follow-up program--help and teaching provided long after child leaves IDC.
8. Information and referral--a center where parents can get information and learn about their community resources for the handicapped.
9. Research--Constant study and progress reports on every child graduated from IDC provide vital data for research and improved techniques.

HISTORY AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. Started in 1972 with an \$18,000 grant for a model program from HEW.
2. Became a part of Johnson County Mental Retardation Center in 1972 with county funding.
3. Taken over by SHMC in 1977 when county funds were threatened.

4. This pioneer program soon became the largest and most respected program of its kind in the state. Over 700 in this area have been served.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION (For details, see attached statement)

1. Operational cost per year (including estimated indirect expenses) is about \$301,000.
2. Only about \$115,000 collected annually in fees, grants and gifts.
3. An endowment of \$1 million will provide permanent funding.

REASONS TO GIVE

1. Children under five are the most under-funded age group among the handicapped.
2. Children under five offer the best dollar-for-dollar investment in the handicapped because:
 - They learn faster than at any other age.
 - Their basic attitudes and self esteem are being formed for life.
 - A good head start means best chance of reaching their maximum potential.
3. Parents need help most when they first learn the devastating news that their child will never be normal.
4. The Infant Development Center has the most outstanding track record of any such program in the area.
5. The IDC serves our own community, friends and neighbors.
6. The IDC is not a part of any national fund-raising program like United Way or United Cerebral Palsy.
7. Public funding has been cut drastically and similar programs have been forced to close in state after state. (In fact, the IDC would not exist today had not SMHC come to its rescue in 1977.)
8. The IDC is backed by a solid institution, and dollars invested in an endowment now will guarantee a permanent home and permanent funding for a vitally needed program.
