COMMITTEE WILL ESTABLISH A HEARING RECORD  
TO PUT RCRA REAUTHORIZATION BEFORE THE FULL  
SENATE IN 1990.

- o GROUNDWATER CONTAMINATION IS A GROWING  
AND COMPLEX PROBLEM WHICH MUST BE

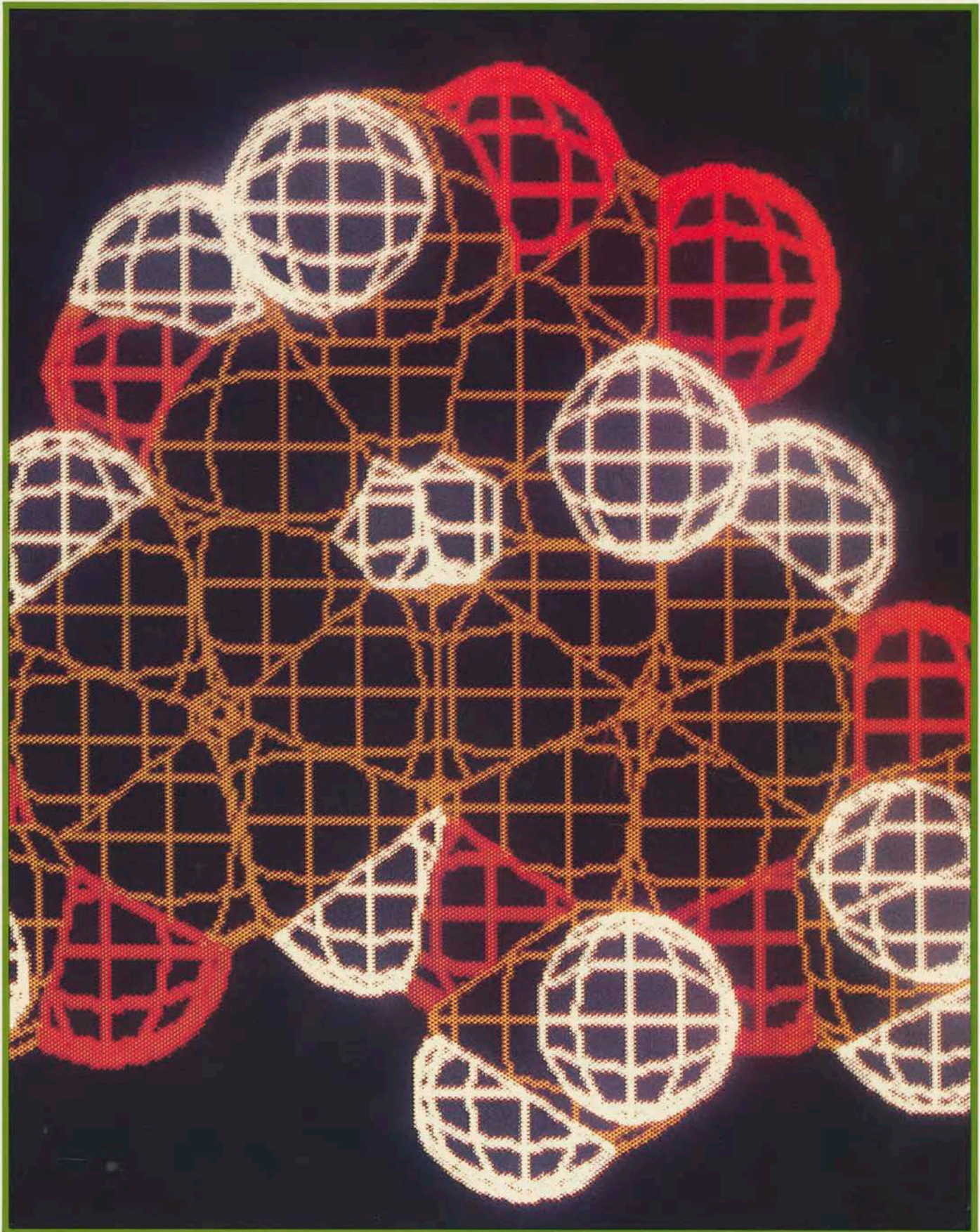
