SUBJECT: CHANEY GOODMAN SCHWERNER MEMORIAL SERVICE

Attached is a statement for the memorial service honoring James Chaney, Andrew Goodman, and Michael Schwerner. The memorial service will take place in Statuary Hall.

You are scheduled to speak at 11:21 a.m., immediately following remarks by John Buchanan and Speaker Foley. The organizers of the memorial service have asked that you limit your remarks to <u>3 minutes</u>.

James Chaney, Andrew Goodman, and Michael Schwerner

On June 21, 1964, three young civil rights workers -- James Chaney, Andrew Goodman, and Michael Schwerner -- were killed in Mississippi by the Ku Klux Klan. The events surrounding their deaths were depicted in the recent movie, <u>Mississippi Burning</u>.

The deaths of Goodman, Schwerner, and Chaney have come to symbolize one of the high points of black-Jewish cooperation in the area of civil rights. Goodman and Schwerner were both Jewish and from the New York City area. Chaney was a black man from Mississippi.

Senate Resolution

Last May, you introduced a resolution -- along with Senators Mitchell, Simpson, and Cranston -- declaring June 21, 1989, as Chaney Goodman Schwerner Day. The resolution also declares the sense of the Congress that the "Voting Rights Act of 1965 has helped to fulfill the promise of American democracy."

Freedom Caravan

A four-day "Freedom Caravan," commemorating the 25th anniversary of the murders, has set out from Philadelphia, Mississippi, and will conclude its trip in New York City. The Freedom Caravan will also stop in Washington today. The memorial service in Statuary Hall is the Freedom Caravan's main event in Washington.

Meeting with President Bush

I have been informed that President Bush intended to meet with the Chaney, Goodman, and Schwerner families earlier this morning.

STATEMENT OF SENATOR BOB DOLE

CHANEY GOODMAN SCHWERNER MEMORIAL SERVICE

JUNE 23, 1989

INTRODUCTION

I WANT TO THANK JOHN BUCHANAN FOR THOSE KIND WORDS OF INTRODUCTION. I ALSO WANT TO THANK THE CHANEY, GOODMAN, AND SCHWERNER FAMILIES --AND THE MEMORIAL COALITION -- FOR GIVING ME THE OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK TO YOU THIS MORNING.

I KNOW THAT MANY OF YOU HAVE TRAVELLED A LONG WAY TO COME TO WASHINGTON. AND I KNOW THAT SOME OF YOU HAVE COME ALL THE WAY FROM MISSISSIPPI ON THE FREEDOM CARAVAN. BUT YOU HAVE COME HERE FOR A VERY GOOD REASON. YOU HAVE COME HERE TO CELEBRATE -- YES, CELEBRATE -- THE DEATHS OF THREE REMARKABLE YOUNG MEN: JAMES CHANEY, ANDREW GOODMAN, AND MICHAEL SCHWERNER.

WE ALL KNOW THE STORY: IT WAS A DARK AND MUGGY NIGHT. THERE WAS A CAR CHASE. THERE WAS A BRIEF EXCHANGE OF WORDS -- THEN A BURST OF GUNFIRE. AND THREE YOUNG MEN LAY LIFELESS ON THE SIDE OF THE ROAD -- IN A DITCH -- THE INNOCENT VICTIMS OF UNHARNESSED AND UNCOMPROMISING EVIL.

THESE YOUNG MEN WERE FROM VERY DIFFERENT BACKGROUNDS. THEY WERE NOT WHAT WE WOULD CALL NATURAL FRIENDS. BUT THEY GAVE THEIR LIVES TO ACHIEVE ONE SINGULAR -- AND UTTERLY <u>PATRIOTIC</u> AND <u>AMERICAN</u> -- GOAL -- TO GUARANTEE THE RIGHT TO VOTE <u>NOT JUST</u> FOR WHITE AMERICANS. <u>NOT JUST</u> FOR BLACK AMERICANS. BUT FOR <u>ALL</u> AMERICANS.

ALL OF US HERE TODAY ALSO KNOW THE LEGACY: WE KNOW THAT THE TRAGIC -- AND UNTIMELY -- DEATHS OF THESE YOUNG MEN HAVE HELPED -- IN A PROFOUNDLY SIGNIFICANT WAY -- TO MAKE THE RIGHT TO VOTE A LIVING RIGHT -- AND THAT THEIR DEATHS HAVE COME TO REPRESENT ONE OF THE GREAT MILESTONES IN AMERICA'S LONG JOURNEY TOWARDS <u>RACIAL JUSTICE</u>.

YOU KNOW, JAMES CHANEY, ANDREW GOODMAN, AND MICHAEL SCHWERNER WERE YOUNG MEN WHEN THEY WERE MURDERED. PERHAPS THAT IS WHY THEIR LEGACY RINGS SO TRUE TODAY. IT ALWAYS SEEMS THAT IT'S THE YOUNG PEOPLE WHO HAVE THE VISION -- AND THE COMMITMENT TO SEE THIS VISION BECOME REALITY. WE SEE THE VISION AND COMMITMENT OF YOUTH EVERY NIGHT ON OUR TELEVISION SETS -- IN CHINA.

AMERICA'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS
