## Martinez checks out oil shipping lanes

Gov. Bob Martinez took an aerial tour of South Florida's most traveled oil shipping lanes Monday to highlight his campaign to move oil tankers away from the shoreline as they travel up and down the coast.

"We're concentrating on those tankers that are laden with oil," Martinez said as he concluded a one-hour jet tour with Admiral Paul A. Yost, commander of the U.S.

Coast Guard.

Concerned that a massive oil spill such as the one in Alaska's Prince William Sound could take place in South Florida, Martinez has suggested the establishment of tanker-free zones ten miles from the coast. This "would provide additional response time to deal with any oil spills," Martinez said.

Under current practices, tankers travel as close as two miles from the coast — particularly south-bound

vessels attempting to steer clear of the north-flowing Gulf Stream.

Yost, who came down from Washington for the air tour, said he would study the proposal. "It's an idea that the governor has presented to me and I want to look at it."

The issue is a complicated one. While the U.S. Coast Guard has authority over oil shipping lanes in U.S. waters — up to 12 miles from the coast — any decisions beyond that would have to be made by the

London-based International Maritime Organization.

"It's a very long process," Yost said.

Yost also used the occasion to lobby for the administration's proposed Coast Guard budget, now being considered by Congress, aiming his comments at U.S. Rep. William Lehman, D-Fla., who heads the committee that makes recommendations on the Coast Guard's funding.

"What we're able to do in Florida is going to be a direct function of Mr. Lehman and his committee," Yost said.

Yost said he was committed to improved protection of the coastline, but said Congress had to appropriate sufficient funds.

Martinez said the shipping industry might also have its concerns. "There are concerns that will have to be dealt with," he said. "It's not as easy as drawing lines on a map."

# Florida officials praise Bush's drug-fight plans

WASHINGTON — Florida officials had high praise Tuesday for President Bush and his \$7.8 billion proposal to finance a war against illegal drugs.

"It's the main agenda now," Republican Gov. Bob Martinez said after Bush briefed him and several others on the contents of the proposal. "It's no longer the subtitle to a crime-fighting package. We now have a national strategy. We now have a president highly visible on this issue."

Although the details have not been worked out, Martinez said that Washington would distribute about \$2 billion to state and local governments to spend on law enforcement, education and rehabilitation.

Earlier in the day, Martinez and Republican Gov. Michael Castle of Delaware held a Washington news conference to outline an anti-drug strategy devised by the National Governors Association.

The association surveyed the 50 states in an effort to determine which anti-drug programs had been the most effective and which might be extended to the national level.

Responding to criticism from some congressional Democrats that Bush's plan is inadequately funded, Martinez said: "The war on drugs is about more than just money. It's about changing values."

Making a similar point, Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Altamonte Springs, said, "I would like to see the president call on the American people to establish a social stigma on the drug user."

McCollum was among a group of House Republicans pushing the concept of "user accountability" — the notion of punishing casual users with such penalties as revoking their driver's licenses or making them ineligible for federal student loans.

Many proposals already enacted will remain underused unless public outrage pressures local prosecutors and judges to avail themselves of these new remedies, McCollum said.

Martinez said Bush would take the lead in helping to stir up a public outcry that would result in "a change of attitudes."

Sen. Bob Graham, D-Fla., stressed that results will cost money.

Applauding the president in a statement issued from his home in Miami Lakes, Graham said: "One of the things I like [about Bush's plan] is measurable goals, which should put emphasis on results rather than rhetoric."

Graham, one of several lawmakers to urge the U.S. Treasury to sell war bonds for the anti-drug effort, noted that Congress has passed anti-drug laws in the past only to fail to approve the spending bills needed to finance them.

Sen. Connie Mack, R-Fla., said he supported the president's plan "wholeheartedly."

"With the cooperation of local, state and federal governments, the war on drugs is a battle that America can win," Mack said in a prepared statement.

As usual, Martinez was accompanied by bodyguards during his appearances Tuesday in Washington.

The extra protection is the result of recent reports circulated by federal authorities that Colombia's cocaine cartel may be planning a political assassination aimed at a U.S. official with a high profile in the fight against drugs.

Martinez has been the leading official in the National Governors Association's fight against substance abuse and drug trafficking.

# Martinez urges use of military against drug lords

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Bob Martinez calls for the use of special forces to combat drug lords in Colombia and neighboring Latin countries in a Thursday letter to federal officials.

"The drug lords have indicated through recent actions that they mean business, and the United States must not stand idly by while they continue their rampaging and acts of terrorism," the governor wrote in a letter to Defense Secretary Richard Cheney and National Security Advisory Brent Scowcroft.

"The United States must be ready to apply the same level of urgency and importance to this operation as it would to any other mission that involves a threat to our national security," Martinez said.

The governor also told law enforcement officers in Tampa that "we cannot afford to turn our backs on a drug habit and drug-fueled violence that threatens the security of a democratic nation."

U.S. Sen. Connie Mack, R-Fla., agreed with Martinez that American forces should be used if requested by the Colombian government.

"This wouldn't be unprecedented," said Mack. "We've done it in the last two years, involving ourselves with the Bolivian government, with a drug military force."

Mack said it is possible Colombian President Virgilio Barco Vargas would ask for such help.

"I think under those conditions... we could in fact become involved in something like that," said Mack. "It

wouldn't take us long to move troops into that region. We've got a significant number of troops in Panama which isn't far away."

Mack also said it would be wise to first remove American citizens from Colombia.

"You want to have the dependents of your state department or other government agencies out of the country before you would act," said Mack.

Martinez, whose personal security has been increased this week by state police because of his visible role in the drug war, said the special military forces would be used to help identify and apprehend fugitive Colombian drug lords.

He also proposed the U.S. offer the same support to Bolivia and Peru.

"We cannot afford to sweep the drug trade out of Colombia, only to have it resurface in surrounding countries," he said.

Just last week the Florida governor wrote U.S. Attorney General Richard Thornburg, naming 25 major fugitive he would like to have extradited to the state to face narcotics indictments.

# Special sessions, re-election test to stretch governor's leadership

TALLAHASSEE — He's chided by child-care advocates, attacked by pro-choice abortion activists and criticized by legislative leaders.

Gov. Bob Martinez is facing tense times these days. He's about to embark on the three toughest tests of his political career — special legislative sessions on abortion and transportation and a re-election bid.

"Florida's on hold until the people decide on Bob Martinez's re-election," says Rep. T.K. Wetherell, D-Daytona Beach, and House speaker-designate.

Martinez disputes that and says he's pushing ahead with the state's business. In an interview in his Capitol office, Martinez talked about his coming battles.

They include:

- Roads. Martinez is adamantly opposed to raising transportation taxes. He has proposed using bonds to finance a \$2 billion expansion of Florida's turnpike, but legislators say it would mortgage Florida's future and that a better plan would be to raise the gasoline tax.

## Martinez undeterred by threats

TALLAHASSEE — It was business as usual for Gov. Bob Martinez on Tuesday, one day after he disclosed that ruthless Colombian cocaine lords had threatened to kill him.

"It doesn't really affect him that much at all. He's carrying out his schedule," said Jon Peck, Martinez's press secretary.

The governor did make a few changes in his routine in response to the threat. A few extra state police officers — Peck wouldn't say how many —

were traveling with the governor Tuesday during official state trips he made to Orlando and Tampa.

Also, the governor's office is releasing his schedule one day at a time rather than a week in advance.

"We've been told to take precautions and we're taking them," Peck said.

Before Martinez left for Central Florida, he said he would not be deterred by the threats:

"I'm going to maintain a full day. I think the worst thing you can do is not to do that."

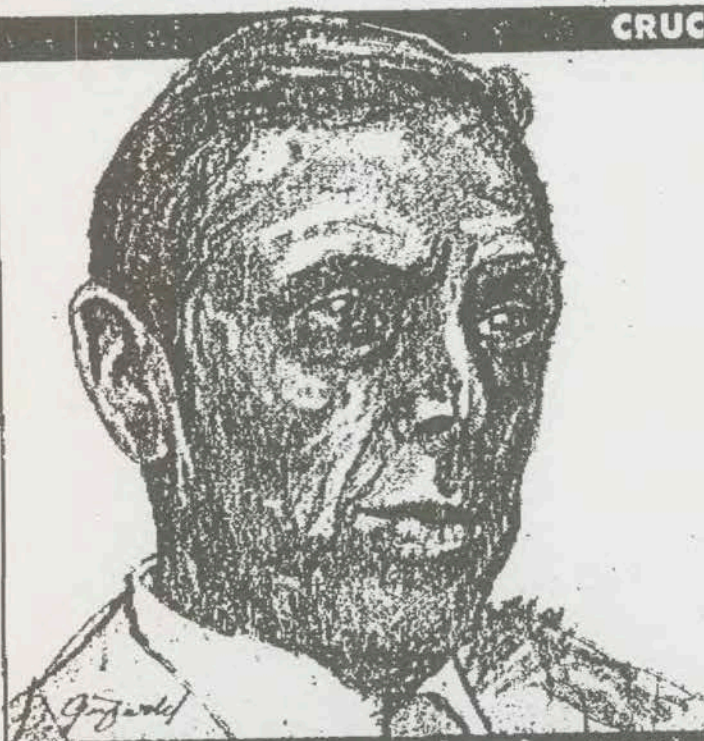

### Martinez on abortion

Gov. Bob Martinez is opposed to abortion but says he won't ask the Legislature to impose his views on all Floridians. Here is how he compares his legislative proposals to his personal views:

"During the first 20 weeks, or five months (of pregnancy), a woman (could) make a determination whether she wants to abort the unborn child or not. Right now, that time period (under Florida law) is six months."

"I don't think we should even come close to aborting a viable child. When they are viable (the fetus could survive outside the womb), it should not be terminated unless it is life-threatening to the mother."

"I think what we have suggested is a reasonable position that balances the rights of the woman and the unborn child."

being in the minority party. Unless he's challenged from within his own party, he'll face either U.S. Rep. Bill Nelson of Melbourne or state Sen. George Stuart, D-Orlando, the two announced Democratic contenders.

"This is still a Democratic state, and we have to earn our victory," says Martinez, who like former President Ronald Reagan was once a Democrat.

And his former colleagues in the Democratic Party haven't put out a mat to welcome him back. Instead, they want to topple him.

"He has made so many bad political decisions, we look excellent for 1990," says Simon Ferro, the Miami lawyer who is state Democratic Party chairman.

Expect the Democrats to make a case that Martinez's tough-on-crime reputation is undeserved.

"We've got a prison bed crisis that's going to hit us on the head like a hammer," Ferro says.

Indeed, Florida will need 100,000 new beds by 1996, according to the latest state estimates. Martinez says with pride that while governor he successfully added 9,300 new beds.

"That's more than Reubin Askew and Bob Graham put together, and I've still got another year to go," he says.

During that year, Martinez expects to hear about the case of Charlie Street. He's the ex-convict released early last year from state prison and, 10 days after he was freed, was accused of killing two

Miami policemen. Street was released under a state program to ease overcrowded prisons.

Martinez doesn't think Street will become Florida's version of the Willie Horton story that dogged Democratic presidential candidate Michael Dukakis.

"I never really complained yet that I inherited this prison mess. The Democrats were in control of government when this all started," Martinez says.

Ferro downplays Martinez's claim. He says the real problem is that the governor hasn't shown enough leadership.

"He's the top chief executive in the state. We should expect more," Ferro says.

Martinez, a former Tampa mayor, says his leadership capabilities are sound. But he says some of his plans have been thwarted by the Democratic-dominated House. As governor, Martinez can veto bills he doesn't like, but he has to rely on friendly legislators to champion legislation he favors.

Martinez says he has done his part to help ease the road and prison crisis and that his critics are just not right.

"A lot of that is just inaccurate background noise," the governor says.

Asked to list his accomplishments, Martinez gives himself high marks as a national spokesman in the fight against drugs. He is expected this fall to press for greater enforcement of a little-noticed state law that allows judges to revoke the driver license of con-

victed drug offenders.

He also will emphasize his environmental record. In January 1988, Martinez led the fight to ban oil exploration off the Florida Keys.

"I think we are showing that we can provide for environmental protection, while still allowing the economy to expand," Martinez says.

And, he wants to soften his image as a Reagan-inspired conservative, arguing that he has helped the poor.

When the Children's Defense Fund, a Washington-based child-advocacy group, last week criticized him and 47 other governors for urging Congress to delay approval of a new law to expand Medicaid coverage for pregnant women and poor babies and children, the governor appeared surprised.

"In this state, we've helped put more people on Medicaid, so I don't know why they would criticize Florida," he told a reporter.

Martinez says he joined the other governors in urging a two-year delay because it appeared that Capitol Hill wanted to unfairly burden the states with higher costs.

Martinez thinks he'll weather the criticism this fall on abortion and roads and also next year on the campaign trail.

"This is a big state, one with high visibility nationally," Martinez says. "But I'm looking forward, once I make my announcement (for re-election) to a full-fledged race."

# Governor's plan to restrict abortions would affect few women, report says

TALLAHASSEE — Fewer than 2 percent of women having abortions in Florida may be affected by Gov. Bob Martinez's proposed restrictions, according to a report by the state's social service agency.

The report by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services is largely based on estimates, however. It acknowledges that many abortions go unreported each year. It doesn't account for women who might leave the state for abortions. And it bases its prediction of the potential cost of Martinez's plans on assumptions that may be overstated.

The HRS report estimates that as many as 1,663 abortions would have been affected by Martinez's proposals and 998 of them may have been averted. An estimated 79,000 abortions were performed in Florida last year, although 67,580 actually were reported to the state.

Martinez is asking lawmakers to enact his new restrictions at a special session Oct. 10-13. But legislative leaders say it's unlikely they will do much, if anything, with what the governor proposes.

Most of the women who would be affected by the proposed limits — those paying for abortions in public hospitals, where the governor wants abortions banned — could still have the procedure done at another hospital or clinic, the report notes.

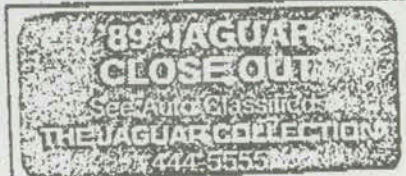
The report assumes that one-quarter of women having abortions in public hospitals wouldn't be able to obtain them elsewhere. That means that 284 of the 949 abortions performed in public hospitals last year might have been precluded had the governor's proposed limits been in effect.

The report also assumes that no abortions would occur after 20 weeks of pregnancy, when the governor proposes requiring that doc-

tors test for the viability of a fetus outside the womb before allowing an abortion. That involves an estimated 714 of the abortions performed in Florida last year.

If a majority of women forced to forgo abortions are eligible for public aid, the report concludes, the cost to the government of caring for newborn babies and mothers the first year alone could exceed \$4.4 million.

Martinez's bid to prohibit public funding of abortions — except in cases of rape, incest or life-threatening situations — has no impact, the HRS report notes. During the last two years, the state paid for just three abortions for women whose lives were endangered.

# Governor defends stance on abortion

TALLAHASSEE — For weeks, Gov. Bob Martinez remained stoic while answering question after question about his call for additional restrictions on abortion.

On Thursday, his patience wore thin and he got a bit testy about defending himself.

Martinez took a shot at legislators who say they don't want to come to the special session he set for next month and who say nothing will pass.

"I think legislators who seek election shouldn't be out dodging hard votes," he said. "What I can't understand is a legislator who believes that an unborn baby who is viable ought to have its life ended."

The Republican governor had strong words for women who seek abortions after they are 20 weeks pregnant.

That is the point where Martinez wants to prohibit abortions if tests show the fetus is viable, or can live outside the womb.

"A woman has up to five months to make that decision (for an abortion)," he said. "If she can't make up her mind by then ... I think there's something wrong."

Martinez also took a shot at abortion rights advocates and their choice of words.

"It isn't a fetus; it's an unborn baby we're talking about," he said. "Those who believe in abortion like to put it in real cold terms, medical terms that don't show any sympathy, don't show any emotion."

And he had an answer for critics who wonder whether the state can afford the cost of his proposals, which a state agency estimates will prevent

about 1,000 of the 79,000 abortions performed each year in Florida. The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services calculates it will cost the state up to \$5.8-million the first year to care for the additional children, and the costs will rise in future years.

"We spent tens of millions to save a manatee, and no one questions that," Martinez said. "Millions to save a panther, nobody questions that. You mean to tell me we're going to question the cost of saving one unborn baby? I can't believe it. I won't accept that."

Martinez's remarks were among the strongest he has made on the issue since the U.S. Supreme Court decided in July to let states enact more restrictions. The comments came during the taping of his monthly cable television

show, which will be broadcast at 7:30 p.m. Monday on the Sunshine Network.

"He's good today, isn't he?" asked Brian Ballard, the governor's chief of operations, who watched the taping with reporters. "I guess he's tired of people thinking he's backing down from his position."

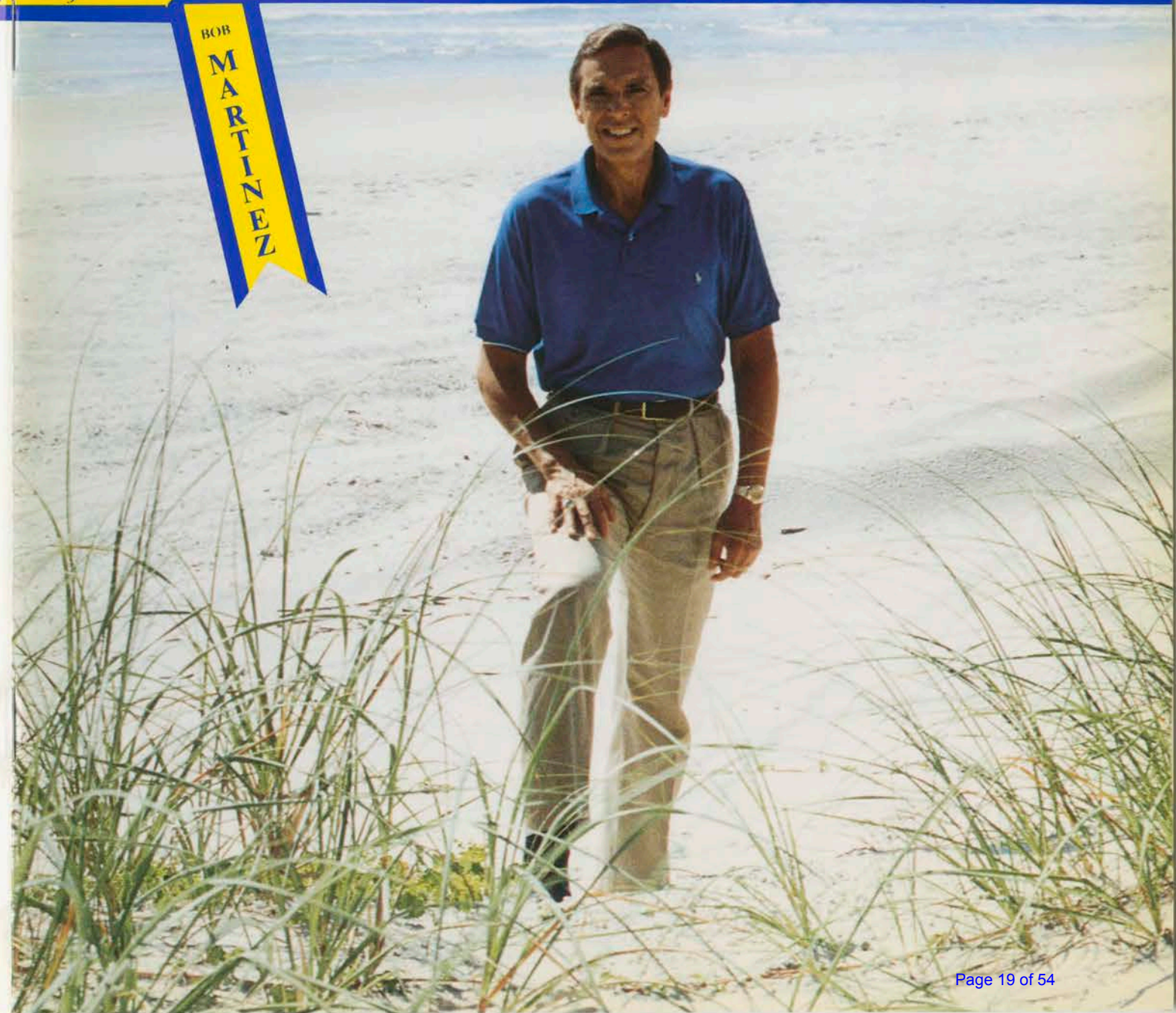
Ballard and other Martinez officials said later that there had been no discussions within the governor's office about presenting a tougher appearance on abortion.

Among Martinez's recommendations are prohibiting the use of public money, facilities and employees in performing abortions or abortion counseling except in cases of rape, incest or when the mother's life is in danger. He also wants to establish more regulations for abortion clinics. He would prohibit abortions after 20 weeks if tests find the fetus to be viable, unless the mother's life is in danger.

INSTEAD OF AT THE DRUG THUGS, WHO ARE THE ENEMIES  
OF THIS NATION, MUST THINK THE PEOPLE OF THIS  
COUNTRY ARE AFFLICTED WITH AMNESIA. BUT AMERICANS  
KNOW WHY WE'RE IN THE MIDDLE OF A DRUG CRISIS  
TODAY. WE HAD TO GO TO WAR AGAINST FASCISM FIFTY  
YEARS AGO BECAUSE OF THE APPEASEMENT OF HITLER.  
AND WE HAVE TO GO TO WAR AGAINST DRUGS TODAY  
BECAUSE OF THE LIBERALS' CAPITULATION TO DRUG USE  
20 YEARS AGO. THE PROBLEMS WE NOW FACE ARE NOT  
CAUSED ONLY BY CRIMINALS IN COLUMBIA.



THEY ALSO COME FROM THE LIBERALIZATION OF  
DRUG LAWS IN THE 1960'S, FROM DECRIMINALIZING AND  
ROMANTICIZING DRUG USE. TODAY'S DRUG CRISIS WAS  
BORN YESTERDAY WHEN WE FAILED TO DENY THAT  
"GETTING STONED" WAS NOTHING MORE THAN  
DESTROYING YOURSELF.

NOW THE DEMOCRATS HYPOCRITICALLY ATTACK  
GEORGE BUSH'S CALL TO ARMS, SAYING THAT HIS WAR  
WON'T FUND ENOUGH COPS AND JUDGES AND BORDER  
PATROLMEN.



THEY ARE THE SAME PEOPLE WHO HAVE FOUGHT  
AGAINST JUDICIAL REFORM, WHO HAVE WOUNDED THE  
CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM BY VOTING AGAINST TOUGH

IN HIS DRAMATIC TELEVISION ADDRESS, PRESIDENT

HAD TO TAKE AIM NOT ONLY AT THE ENEMIES OUTSIDE  
OUR BORDERS, BUT AT THE ENEMIES WITHIN AS WELL.





HE SAID THAT WE COULDN'T BUY OUR WAY OUT OF A  
CRISIS. WE COULDN'T USE THE OLD LIBERAL SOLUTION OF  
WAVING A CHECKBOOK AS IF IT WERE A MAGIC WAND AND  
EXPECTING THE PROBLEM TO DISAPPEAR. NO, HE SAID  
THAT THERE WOULD BE NO EASY VICTORIES IN THIS WAR.  
BUT HE SAID THAT WE COULD WIN THIS STRUGGLE,  
PARTICULARLY IF WE RE-ARMED OURSELVES MORALLY ,
