SUBJECT: FOLLOW UP ON SCREENING OF CHUCK NORRIS' FILM:
DELTA FORCE II

We checked out your idea of having the Norris film screened in the Hart Building. There were several problems including sound quality and cost of getting in sufficient sound equipment which made it impossible to do. It was a good suggestion, though, and the Wilson people appreciated it.

In the interim, MGM has agreed to pay the cost of having the film screened at AMC/Union Station, and Senator Wilson will be hosting the film screening. They have asked if you would like to co-host with Wilson. The film deals with breaking up drug cartels in Central America.

Senator Wilson would like to invite all Senators and their families to the screening, and selected staff on committees with jurisdiction over the drug issue. In addition, he's submitting a list of people he would like invited (which includes his staff) and has invited you to do the same, should you wish to co-host.

Should you wish to co-host, the plan is to have the screening begin around 7:30 p.m. on July 24, with Chuck Norris giving very brief opening remarks. Senator Wilson give remarks and you may do the same if you wish to.

Hart July

We received a telephone call from Linda Ulrich in Senator Wilson's office asking if we would be willing to host a private Senate screening of Chuck Norris' new movie: **DELTA FORCE II**. The movie is about the breakup of a drug cartel in Central America. Congressman Bill Young hosted a screening of the film last month for House Members, which was a great success.

Senator Wilson had originally agreed to host the screening and was hoping to get the Motion Picture Industry Assn. involved. Wilson has since decided that it may be "controversial" for him to host the screening since he would have to go seeking sponsors. They don't want to do anything that would be misinterpreted, due to the closeness of his gubernatorial race. They are now looking for another Senator to sponsor, and Chuck Norris asked if Wilson would be willing to approach you on this.

Norris is the actor who dropped by the office a few months ago who has been involved in Republican politics. He's gone on the road with President Bush and is someone we could use as a spokesman on our behalf for some of our Senate challengers. This would be particularly useful to someone like Congressman Schuette, since Levin recently had Richard Dreyfuss in Michigan on his behalf. We could potentially get some Senate challengers involved whom Norris may be willing to campaign for.

Wilson's office has already reserved AMC/Union Station theater for the evening of the 24th at a cost of \$750. The theater seats about 250 people. Currently, Yvonne tells me that your schedule for the 24th has a reception for Senator Burdick from 6-8 p.m. Norris is also available on the 25th, and your schedule is free on that evening, so far.

Just wanted to let you know that Senator Wilson may approach you today on this. Unfortunately, this is only a week away.

SUBJECT: SCREENING OF CHUCK & AARON NORRIS' DELTA FORCE II

Here are the logistics of what's going to happen this evening:

1. 7:20 p. m. Depart the Capitol for Union Station via car. Wilbert can drive to the Main Entrance of Union Station, where either myself or John D., will be stationed.
2. 7:25 p.m. You will be ushered down two flights of stairs through a Fire Door located directly outside the left side of the Main Entrance of Union Station. (Note: it's dark and cave-like, but the only way that permits you to go into the theater without passing numerous tourists on the food court).

At the bottom of the stairwell, the doorway will lead you into the hallway which connects the theaters at AMC/Union Station. You will be escorted only about 20 feet to the theater where the screening will be.

4. 7:30 p.m. You will enter the movie theater for brief remarks. Senator Wilson will introduce you first, then Chuck and Aaron Norris.

NOTE: There may be cameras there, as Entertainment Tonight has requested that they be allowed to interview Chuck and Aaron Norris.

5. 7:33 p.m. Brief remarks by Senator Dole.
6. 7:36 p.m. You will be escorted out of AMC/Union Station theaters the same way you entered.

7:45 p.m. Arrive U.S. Capitol.

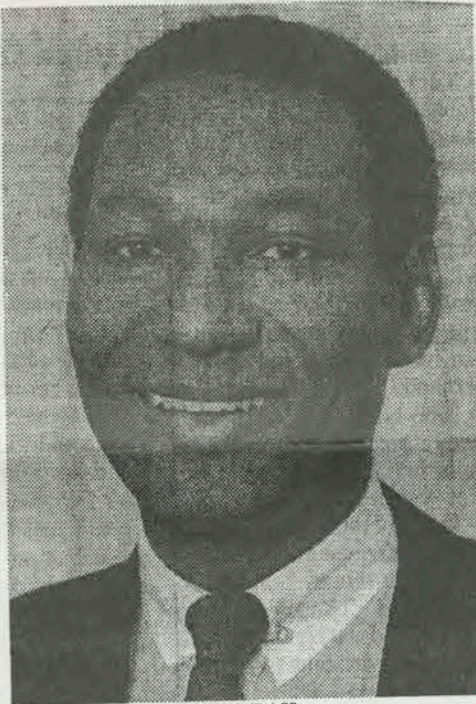
The Washingtonian magazine has broken a 25-year tradition by making a political endorsement. In an unprecedented editorial in the August edition, the magazine is supporting John Ray to become the city's next mayor. In coming to the decision, Washingtonian Executive Editor John Sansing said, the magazine's board of editors met in April and May with all the potential candidates except Mayor Marion Barry, who declined the invitation. "With the city in such turmoil," Sansing said yesterday, the Washingtonian decided to speak out because "this is the most important election since 1978."

In endorsing the low-profile, soft-spoken Ray, the Washingtonian editorial argues: "After twelve years of a high-profile, confrontational mayor, the District of Columbia needs a leader who in a low-key manner can unite this city, now beset with budgetary deficits, a dangerous drug culture, and increasing racial distrust. A lowering of rhetoric and a lessening of the confrontation are needed."

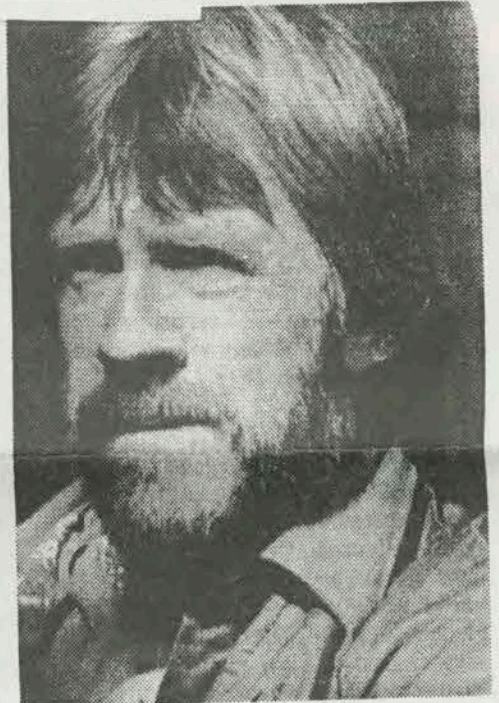
Out and About
