\*AND THAT MEANS THAT WE MUST LOOK AT EACH REPUBLIC INDIVIDUALLY -- INCLUDING NOT ONLY THEIR NEEDS FOR **HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE BUT THEIR ABILITY TO REPAY** THE CREDITS AS WELL. \*BUT I'M CONFIDENT THAT WE'LL BE ABLE TO CONTINUE TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE

PEOPLE OF THAT REGION -BECAUSE THEY DESPERATELY
NEED OUR ASSISTANCE AND
BECAUSE IT'S THE RIGHT THING
TO DO.

MEMBERS TO LEGISLATE ON THE BASIS OF FEAR OF THE UNKNOWN, RATHER THAN ON SCIENCE AND COMMON SENSE. \*I DON'T HAVE TO TELL YOU ABOUT THE IMPACT THAT SOME OF THE RIGID PROPOSALS FLOATING AROUND WOULD HAVE -- NOT JUST UPON FARMERS AND THE FOOD

INDUSTRY AS A WHOLE -- BUT
