The Honorable Bob Michel

The son of a French immigrant, Bob Michel has lived the American dream. As a wounded combat infantryman, he defended American freedom in World War II, earning two Bronze stars, the Purple Heart, and four battle stars. As a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, he's worked for the people of Illinois' 18th District since 1957. Since 1981, his colleagues have voted him Republican Leader six consecutive times. In 1989, President Ronald Reagan presented him with the Citizens Medal, our nation's second highest Presidential Award.

Bob was born in Peoria, Illinois, March 2, 1923. After high school graduation and a semester of college, he was called to military service. Following his military service, he came home and earned a B.S. in Business Administration from his hometown's prominent institution Bradley University. He received Bradley's Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1961 and sits on the university's Board of Trustees. He also holds an honorary doctorate degree from Bradley, as well as Illinois Wesleyan, Lincoln College, and Bellarmine College.

Bob married his college sweetheart, the former Corinne Woodruff of Peoria. They have one daughter, three sons, and three grandchildren.

First elected in 1956, Bob served for 20 years on the House Appropriations Committee and currently serves *ex officio* on the House Intelligence Committee. He was elected to his first leadership position as Chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee in 1972, chosen as Republican Whip in 1974, and became Leader in 1980. He served as Permanent Chairman of the 1984 and 1988 Republican National Conventions.

Speaking Program Review Michel Portrait Unveiling 4 May 1992

- Speakers (Rostenkowski, Dole, Foley, Madigan and Ford) and Leader Michel assemble in H-208 holding room
- President arrives at Carriage entrance, is met by Sergeant at Arms and escorted to H-208
- White House press corps arrives and travels through Document Door up to Statuary Hall.
- Once all speakers have arrived (shortly after 4:30PM), Sec. Madigan enters Statuary Hall with Chaplain Ford and asks the guests to take their places for the unveiling ceremony. Madigan and Ford remain on platform.
- Offstage announcer announces Chmn. Rostenkowski, Minority Leader Dole and Speaker Foley. They enter through door by Rayburn Room. They take their places on the stage.
- Offstage announcer announces the President and Minority Leader Michel. They take their places on the stage.
- Sec. Madigan offers brief words of welcome and tribute to Leader Michel. He then introduces Chaplain Ford.
- Chaplain Ford gives invocation.
- Sec. Madigan introduces Chmn. Rostenkowski. He delivers his remarks.
- Sec. Madigan introduces Minority Leader Dole. He delivers his remarks.
- Sec. Madigan introduces Speaker Foley. He delivers his remarks.
- Sec. Madigan introduces the President. He delivers his remarks.

- Sec. Madigan recognizes artist Bill Hardin and Mrs. Michel in audience. They proceed to portrait and perform unveiling. They return to their seats.
- Sec. Madigan recognizes Leader Michel. He delivers his remarks.
- Sec. Madigan thanks speakers for their remarks and thanks guests for coming.
- Photo op with all speakers, artist, and Mrs. Michel in front of portrait.
