Here's some great news for all Sedgwick County Republicans: *we are winning* the voter registration battle! And we're winning it in a big way!

The recent numbers from the Sedgwick County Election Commissioner's office are just beautiful. What I am about to tell you is good news for every Sedgwick County Republican Candidate, because statistically speaking, voter registration is the most significant factor in predicting voter behavior.

Here's the score:

From Aug. 1 to Sept. 17, Republican registration grew by 4,726 voters. We grew from 79,779 registered voters to a total of 84,505 registered voters county-wide!

That is an astounding 5.92% increase. (That rate would be equivalent to an annual rate of 46 percent).

Note that it is normal for voter registration to increase in the days leading up to the general election, and the Democrats have experienced some growth, too, but at a more moderate rate.

By comparison, the Democrats gained 3,006 registered voters, increasing their total numbers from

66,924 to 69,930 in the same 47-day period. The Libertarians posted a 0.0 percent gain, holding steady at a total of 312 registered voters county-wide.

However, the most unusual twist is occurring in the unaffiliated (independent) list.

During the same Aug. 1 to Sept. 17 period of growth, the unaffiliated voter numbers have actually gone down! There were 44,188 on Aug. 1, now there are only 36,438. Note: this would be typical behavior in the days leading up to a primary, but not for the days leading up to a general election.

We can see by these numbers that the two major political parties are gaining in popularity. The most popular choice of the two is the Republican Party!

I couldn't be happier! Please keep up the good work. Continue to ask your friends who are not registered, to register as Republicans. Ask your independent friends to change their affiliation to Republican.

With continued growth and hard work, the Republican Party has the potential to win *every* race in Sedgwick County. Keep up the good work!





VA/HUD Subcommittee included a HUD Special Grant of \$1.2 million to continue a program to replace water mains and service lines. Funds would also be used to replace sidewalks, streets, curbs and to clean up open spaces.

Wichita Public Bus Garage

City requested are help in securing funding for new, centrally located garage and maintenance facility. Total cost of the facility is \$5 million. Transportation Subcommittee included \$4 million for garage. Conference cut to \$3.4 million.

Wichita State University

Funds would be used for WSU's outstanding research in such areas as ice removal, aging aircraft, and the reduction of pilot workload and human error. Requested \$3 million. Received \$1.4 in House bill. Senate deleted. Conference included \$1 million.

FY 93 Defense Projects:

A-6 Re-Wing

The Navy will restart the A-6 rewing program because of the cancellation of the A-12. Boeing did the work last time and expects to win this contract. 1993 request is \$126 million.

P-180D

At your request, the committee added \$16 million for 4 Piaggio aircraft to modernize the National Guard fleet. This stayed in the bill as passed. Piaggio makes large sections of these aircraft in Wichita. Based on your help, Piaggio has agreed to move their final assembly plant from Lincoln to Kansas. The location is pending and no deal should be announced at this time.

C-12F

You inserted 12 C-12's \$43 million to continue modernization of the Army Reserve aircraft fleet. You started this program last year by adding 3 aircraft. The provision was approved by the conferees and by Congress.

KC-135R Tanker Reengining

The Congress approved \$426 million to continue the tanker modernization program. This will begin to reengine the RC-135 fleet and start the E to R conversion of the National Guard fleet. The program had been proposed for termination by DoD but Congress took a different view. This should keep the line open for 4 to 5 more years.

Tanker-Transport Training System

This is the T-1A Jayhawk built by Beech. The President requested \$177.8 million for 36 aircraft in 1993. No additional funds are required and should be non-controversial. The Congress protected full funding for the program.

T-47 Aircraft for Drug Interdiction

Your amendment to fund \$37 million to lease these aircraft stayed in the final bill. DoD will make the final determination on what to do with the aircraft.

FY 1992:

Project Freedom Antidrug Abuse Grant

The Commerce, State, Justice Appropriations Conference agreed to Senator Dole's amendment to provide \$150,000 for Project Freedom's program to counsel and educate at mothers at risk for drug abuse.

Beech C-12F Cargo Planes

Your request to provide \$9.3 million for 3 Beech C-12Fs for the Army Reserve was included in the final bill by the Defense Appropriations Committee. This year, the Army reserve has request 16 more for a cost of \$57.6 million. Dan believes this will have to be closely followed.

Beech Tank Transport Training System

The Defense Appropriations Committee fully funded the President's amended request of 34 TTTS aircraft from Beech at a cost of \$156 million. This year the President requested \$177.8 million for 36 aircraft in FY 93. Should be noncontroversial.

Boeing KC-135 Tanker Re-engining

The Defense Appropriations Committee, with Senator Dole's strong support, included language to fund 26 Boeing Tanker Re-engining kits for a cost of \$587 million. Dan has already begun battling with Sean O'Keefe over a new request from the Air Force for 28 kits. Estimated cost is \$526.7 million.

Cessna T-47 Drug Airplanes

At Senator Dole's request, Congress agreed to provide \$35 million to lease 15 T-47's from Cessna to be used by the National Guard for drug interdiction if the Guard and Customs can agree on a plan. They are still talking.

Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation of Kansas

Defense Appropriations Committee approved language clarifying the

participation of small business firms that employ the severely disabled at not less than 20% of their work force (which will include Center Industries in Wichita) as DoD subcontractors for "small disadvantaged business" program requirements.

Domestic Violence Grant

The VA/HUD Appropriations Conference approved Senator Dole's request for a \$500,000 grant to help Wichita fund its new domestic violence program.

McConnell Air Force Base

Disaster Supplemental/FY 1992 Appropriations Bill

At Senator Dole request, the Defense Conference approved \$43.2 million to repair tornado damage at McConnell Air Force Base. The original request was for \$55 million, however, some funds will be provided through non-appropriated funds. Also, about \$4 million of FY 1991 funds were used for repairs.

National Weather Service Modernization: High Tech Tornado Warning

The Commerce, State, Justice Appropriations Conference agreed to the Senate funding level of \$155,607,000, after Senator Dole wrote House Subcommittee Chairman Neal Smith in strong support of the high Senate number. The House of Representatives level was \$122,347,000 -- \$33,360,000 less than the Senate level. The National Weather Service has slated 24 sites in Kansas to receive the high-tech Automated Surface Observing System (ASOS) and 4 sites the NEXRAD Doppler radar system (Wichita, Dodge City, Goodland, and Topeka).

This year will send letter in support of the President's request of \$132 million for NEXRADs and \$19 million for ASOS. I would encourage the people at the airport to lobby Rep. Slattery and Rep. Glickman on fully funding the President's request in the House. Rep. Glickman's hearing last year in Wichita turned out to be a lot of hot air when it came time provide the funding.

U.S. Courthouse

The Treasury/Postal Appropriations Conference approved Senator Dole's amendment to provide \$9,968,400 for much-needed renovations, repairs and additions to the U.S. Courthouse in Wichita.

P.S. -- According to Jesse Jackson, Bill Clinton's Vice-Presidential nominee, Sen. Al Gore, is one of the three original sponsors of D.C. Statehood in the U.S. Senate. So you can expect a major push for D.C. Statehood from the Clinton-Gore Administration -- unless you and I stop them NOW.

REPUBLICAN INCUMBENTS

Missouri - Senator Kit Bond

Current polls show Senator Bond with what appears to be a comfortable lead. However, given the strength of the Democratic Party in Missouri, an insurance policy for this race would be most helpful.

He faces St. Louis County Council member Geri Rothman-Serot, ex-wife of a former Lt. Governor, and is hoping his name identification will help her cause.

Bond recently completed an extensive tour of Missouri where he unveiled his visionary "Blueprint to Prepare America for the Next Century", which included an outline of his plan for elimination of the federal budget deficit and reforming health care.

New York - Senator Alfonse D'Amato

New York voters will see a matchup of a classic liberal against a classic conservative, with State Attorney General Robert Abrams defeating Geraldine Ferraro in the Democrat Primary to face conservative Senator Al D'Amato in the General.

Senator D'Amato has conducted an aggressive campaign, which on occasion has been bitter and nasty on both sides.

We see this race going right down to the wire, but the sharp differences in the candidates' political philosophy which have been documented should help D'Amato.

Wisconsin - Senator Bob Kasten

In little more than a 2-week period, Senator Kasten was come from being approximately 20 points behind in the polls to dead-even with his opponent, State Senator Russ Feingold.

Feingold has attempted to appeal to the anti-incumbency mood of the country in general, but the Kasten campaign has been well-financed and therefore able to get his message on TV. This race is currently too close to call.

CHALLENGERS AND OPEN SEATS

California "A" - Bruce Herschensohn

Conservative Los Angeles KABC-TV commentator Bruce Herschensohn has surprised the pundits by rising in the polls to what every indicator points to as a dead-even race against ultra-liberal Congresswoman Barbara Boxer.

Boxer has the distinction of being the biggest spender in Congress, whose domestic agenda would double the national budget deficit, who has also been hounded for her involvement in the check-bounding scandal.

The momentum has been building constantly for Herschensohn, but it is still too close to call.

Colorado - Terry Considine

Former State Senator Terry Considine's race got a big boost Friday when a third-party pro-life candidate dropped out of the race and endorsed Considine over his opponent Congressman Ben Campbell.

The GOP has a 30,000 voter registration advantage in Colorado, but Considine has been somewhat handicapped by not having the name identification advance of Campbell. As he has become better known, the trial ballots have tightened, and with this recent development, Considine should emerge the victor. However, this race is also very close, and support from Mr. Perot could push us over the top.

Georgia - Paul Coverdell

Former State Senator, Chairman of the Georgia Republican Party, and Peace Corps Director, Paul Coverdell got a late start in the campaign after winning the August runoff. However, he has campaigned with vigor, outlining an economic reform package and a campaign reform package.

His opponent, incumbent Senator Wyche Fowler, is highly vulnerable, having beaten Senator Mack Mattingly in 1986 in what many considered to be a fluke. Fowler continued to be dogged by his image as a big-city liberal. He has also become testy lately as press accounts of his check-bouncing in the House have begun to resurface as an issue.

The polls show Coverdell within the margin of error, and this could be one of the GOP surprise victories of the year.

Idaho - Dirk Kempthorne

This seat became open with the retirement of conservative Senator Steve Symms. The current GOP nominee has been Mayor of Boise from 1986, and faces Congressman Richard Stallings.

Like so many of his Democrat House colleagues, Stallings has been caught up in the check-bouncing scandal, and while Kempthorne has aired TV spots challenging Stallings to a "clean campaign pledge", Stallings has refused to do so.

Idaho is a solid right-to-work state, and Stallings's co-sponsorship of the Striker Replacement Bill has once again indicated he is out of the step with the views of the majority of people in Idaho.

Tracking polls have shown Kempthorne ahead, but the race has begun to tighten somewhat. This should be a safe GOP seat, but with the volatile electorate this year, this race could also be too close to call.

Illinois - Rich Williamson

This race took on a new look when incumbent Democrat Senator Alan Dixon was defeated in the primary by Cook County Recorder of Deeds Carol Moseley Braun.

Attorney Williamson represents a successful, experienced conservative voice, having been a former advisor to Presidents Reagan and Bush, and U.S. Ambassador to the UN in Europe. He has laid out an economic program for the state, and is successfully comparing his views with Braun's.

While Braun temporarily rode a wave of popularity in the so-called "Year of the Woman", serious ethics questions have come into play in this race. Braun has been accused of permitting double-dipping in her Cook County Recorder of Deeds office, awarding a no-bid contract, and engaging in a questionable loan deal with a lobbyist. Allegations also recently were made that Braun had defrauded Medicaid by not declaring additional income from the sale of logging rights on her mother's property. Braun's mother is a Medicaid patient in a nursing home, and Braun also failed to declare the additional income on her own income tax return.

A recent poll by the University of Illinois shows this race within the margin of error, and the race will go to the wire -- but Williamson should win on the strength of his political philosophy.

Washington - Rod Chandler

This is an open seat, created by the retirement of Democrat Senator Brock Adams. Republican Rod Chandler has served in the U.S. House since 1982, won his primary with only 20% of the vote. His opponent, Democrat State Senator Patty Murray won her primary with 29% of the vote, and has aggressively courted labor unions and teachers groups. She has thrown her support to the spotted owl at the expense of jobs in the region.

Washington should represent one of the best chances for Republicans to pick up a seat from the Democrats, but the "Year of the Woman", the anti-incumbent mood, and Chandler's support for a Congressional pay raise place this race in the toss-up category.

Throughout the 1980's, moderate Republican Ginger Barr represented the district and had little problem being re-elected. In 1990, Ginger retired and Mike McCrite won the Republican nomination to succeed her. Joan Hamilton, a strong campaigner, won the Democratic nomination. Hamilton went on to win the race by seventy-three votes; a well-worn excuse was Ginger Barr's public support of Hamilton, the Democrat, because McCrite favored tough restrictions on abortion. Clearly, for the last decade, the voters of the 51st district have favored a moderate woman.

GREG PACKER:

Greg is a 29-year old husband and father who owns his own trucking business. Greg is a native of Marshalltown, Iowa, and a graduate of Iowa State University. Greg is very definitive when asked why he is running for office: the current worker's compensation system and other burdens on business are strangling his livelihood. Rather than complain, he is getting involved. While he is a political novice, his work ethic is second to none. He'll work hard door to door, but needs the technical expertise to back it up. With respect to the abortion question, Greg is pro-choice, but not vocal about it unless asked.

Greg defeated well-known Republican Lee Kinney in the GOP primary, and Lee has vocally (and in my opinion, irrationally) blamed everyone but herself for losing the election. She is said to be working with Bradshaw to defeat Greg. If we can focus Greg's mail and campaign schedule on the basis of polling data, Greg should win.

MARGE BRADSHAW:

Marge won a surprise victory over KTWU Executive Cindy Barry. Marge lost the 1990 primary to Joan Hamilton, the eventual General Election winner. Marge works hard at door-to-door campaigning. Three of her main issues will be flooding in Rossville, annexation of Lake Sherwood by Topeka (she's against it, as is everyone else that lives there) and school finance. Ironically, both Lee Kinney and Mike McCrite are working for Marge.

Ranson, a former aide to Governor Bennett, is the wife of Jack Ranson and a Vice President of the Ranson Companies. As I am sure you are familiar with her background, I will not go into great detail, other than to say that the abortion issue may be a factor in this race. Pat is an active pro-choice spokesperson, and her opponent is also actively pro-choice. Taken at face value, this would seem to be a wash; however, there is concern that pro-life Republicans will sit on the sidelines in this race.

JIM WARD:

Ward, 35, is a Wichita attorney. In addition to information provided in the above sections, Ward is viewed by many as the next generation of Democratic leadership in the State Senate. He is vocal and confrontational, and will enjoy the support of the trial lawyers, the KNEA, and other traditional Democratic groups. His campaign will be well-financed.

THE DISTRICT:

The district is comprised of the western portion of Sedgwick County and a handful of precincts in Sumner County. Former State Senator and current Lieutenant Governor Jim Francisco beat Republican Phillip Journey in 1988 with 65% of the vote. After the 1990 General Election, Jim's brother Ken was appointed to fill the seat.

TODD TIAHRT:

Todd, 41, ran for the State House of Representatives in 1990 and lost to incumbent Democrat Rick Bowden by seven votes. At the onset of the 1990 campaign, Todd was viewed as a one-issue pro-life candidate, but as the voters got to know him, they saw he was much more than that. Since 1990, Todd has been the 4th District Republican Chairman.

Todd beat moderate Republican State Representative Elizabeth Baker by a 73% - 37% margin in the 1992 primary to win the nomination. He is a smart campaigner, speaking to issues such as government spending and individual initiative to win the primary. He is no longer viewed as a one-issue candidate, although Baker is actively working against him on the basis of her pro-choice views.

KEN FRANCISCO:

Francisco was appointed to fill the term of his brother after the 1990 election. He was a member of the Kansas House of Representatives from 1975 - 1978 and 1980 - 1990, when he was defeated by Republican Darlene Cornfield. Francisco is considered a vulnerable incumbent, although this will be a close race given the fluid and unpredictable nature of current Sedgwick County politics.

Cable TV Update

ISSUE ONE: MULTIMEDIA v. GLICKMAN

- o On Tuesday (Oct. 28), Glickman withdrew his FCC complaint after reaching an agreement with Multimedia. Glickman will receive 50 spots on the same channels that the editorials were aired and 50 spots on additional channels.
- o The agreement followed a FCC meeting with both parties, where the basic message was that the FCC would not favor Multimedia. My guess is that the FCC didn't want to take on Dingell who favors broadcasters and the newspapers.
- o Multimedia will continue to pursue a ruling from the FCC that the "editorials" were a First Amendment right. A ruling is not expected until after the election.
- o Glickman has not withdrawn his FEC complaint, but Multimedia does not need to respond to it until after the election.
- o Sbarra wanted me to find out which way the FCC was leaning on the complaint. As this issue will later be considered by the FEC, I believed that it would be better to keep our distance. JoAnne Coe agreed, and I told Sbarra that I couldn't do it.

ISSUE TWO: CABLE BILL

The cable bill is confronted with three very large problems:

- o Legal problems: Both the Must Carry provision and the Retransmission Consent issue have been taken to court. Must Carry has been ruled unconstitutional twice, but that was as a regulation, not as a federal statute.
 - o Enforcement problems: The FCC can't afford the Bill's regulatory requirements. It is estimated that the bill will consume a 1/3 of the FCC budget. Possible offsets could include user fees (which, incidentally were stopped by Danforth in the Senate), or through supplemental appropriations (Dingell has sent one of his Dingellgrams requesting relevant info).
- SIDE NOTE: Prior to the cable bill, the FCC faced 11 furlough days. It is expected that this number will now increase.
- o The Bill's regulatory nature doesn't translate well at the local level, especially in rural areas. For instance, the must carry provision was to improve access to broadcast channels by mandating that Cable TV carry them. This provision does little for rural subscribers, because it only affects LOCAL broadcast channels -- which of course don't exist in rural America.

UPDATE

Last night, Glickman withdrew his FCC complaint after reaching an agreement with Multimedia. Glickman will receive 50 spots per day on the same channels that the editorials were aired and 50 spots on additional channels. The agreement followed a FCC meeting with both parties, where the basic message was that the FCC would not favor Multimedia.

Sbarra's chief counsel told me this morning that they do not consider this agreement as a win, or even as a draw, because the FCC was not willing to consider Multimedia's 1st Amendment argument. Multimedia believes that the FCC doesn't want to pick another fight with Congress over an interindustry issue. This assertion may well have credibility. The FCC was just burned on the cable bill and Dingell is quite adamant about his support for broadcasters and the newspapers.

Multimedia will continue to pursue a ruling from the FCC that the "editorials" were a First Amendment right. A ruling is not expected until after the election.

Finally, Glickman has not withdrawn his Federal Election Campaign complaint, but Multimedia does not need to respond to it until November 7th.

Fowler Says It Is Time To Break Up the Club Of 'Perks and Privilege'

Cost of Congress Increases 700 Percent, Double New Spending For U.S. Defense

It cost taxpayers \$2.8 billion last year to pay for Congress, an increase of more than 700 percent in the last twenty years.. By comparison, defense spending has increased just over 300 percent.

"We must reform Congress," says 4th District Republican candidate Tillie Fowler, "and we can start by cutting its budget."

The \$2.8 billion budget for the 535 members of Congress is:

- \$800 million more than the budget for Duval County;
- \$2.75 billion more than Flagler County;

Father Wounded, Reported Dead in Pacific; Grandfather Dies Prematurely at News

Tillie Fowler has a special reason to be sensitive to the thousands of Veterans living in the 4th Congressional District; a reason she says makes serving them a priority in Congress.

"My father took over the family drug store by fate," she says. "My great grandfather and my grandfather were both pharmacists and had run that corner store in Milledgeville for many years."

But her father, she says, "wanted to go to New York to be a stock broker."

Like so many other Americans, World War II changed Tillie's father's plans for the future.

"Daddy was in the service and he was shot in the Pacific. Most of his company was killed and the telegram came back to Milledgeville that he was missing.

"They were out in the jungle for days," Mrs. Fowler says, "and the Army thought everyone was dead."

Fortunately, several days later, Mrs. Fowler's father was found, badly wounded, but alive. Two days after they got word back that he was alive, my grandfather died. He was 52."

Young Culver Kidd returned to Milledgeville, his dreams of being a stock broker in New York left on a battle field in the Pacific. Although he was not a pharmacist like his grandfather and father, he took over the family business.

"Growing up, I saw how my own family pulled together, how my grandmother was so strong...and how she missed my grandfather so much. I saw my father, denied his dream, turn his own energies and talents into building a better Milledgeville, and eventually a better Georgia through his civic, charitable and political efforts," says Mrs. Fowler.

Those young memories and early impressions, she says, have only been reinforced by the pressing need today to keep Veterans and their families in the front of the nation's debates about health care, economic reform and national defense.

"That's one reason I worked so hard to get on the House Armed Services Committee," she says. "I know my grandfather and my father both would want someone like me looking out for Veterans."

Tillie Fowler Qualified To Serve Us In Congress

Small Town Upbringing Taught Tillie To Value Hard Work, Differing Viewpoints

Tillie Fowler is qualified to serve in Congress.

She is the mother of two daughters, a valued and recognized volunteer in her community, a trained lawyer, and she has been an elected citizen member of Jacksonville's City Council where he was chosen as its first woman President.

While growing up in Milledgeville, Ga., as a child, Tillie saw how her family made service to others a way of life. It is a tradition she has carried forward in her community...and her country.

"My father owned the corner drug store in Milledgeville and I worked there every summer and on weekends with my brother and sister, beginning when I was ten," she says.

Running the cash register and waiting on customers, Tillie says she learned, "the work ethic and to value the differences between people."

She learned something else which she believes will be very important as a member of Congress. "It was there in that drug store that I learned the importance of the bottom line. Working with my father, I saw the difficulty small business owners have in holding down costs and making a profit."

It was difficult back then, Tillie says, "but today, because of health care costs, government red tape, excessive litigation, and a stymied economy, the small business owner almost qualifies for the endangered species list. No single group probably has as much at stake in this election as small business owners."

In 1967 Tillie Fowler put her Emory University Law Degree to good use by working as a young legislative assistant to one of Georgia's outstanding U.S. Representatives. In 1971, Tillie served as General Counsel in the White House Office of Consumer Affairs.

It's no wonder that in 1970, then 28 year old Tillie Fowler was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Women in America.

As an elected citizen member of the Council, Tillie chaired the Finance Committee and served on the Council's important committees.

Fowler Wants Change, Hair Record Business As Usual

Contrary to what his television commercials say, which try to paint him as an "outsider" in the Florida Senate, the Mattox Hair public record tells a very different story.

That record, says Tillie Fowler, is something voters should examine "when they ask themselves what he will do as a member of Congress."

For example, on the final day of the 1985 legislative session, Sen. Hair joined 27 other members of the Florida Senate to vote himself a 50 percent pay increase.

Senate Bill 743, which was opposed by 12 Senators, also doubled the unrestricted slush fund of the House Speaker and Senate President, a fund which has been used without strings by the Democratic leadership.

In the 1987 session, as Floridians protested, Sen. Hair joined the Senate's "good old boys" Sens. Dempsey Barron and W. D. Childers to pass the \$1.1 billion state services tax, a tax on more than 40 Florida businesses from barbers to bookkeepers, and millions of consumers.

Sen. Hair's first vote for the billion dollar services tax was on April 15. Then, on April 23, when another committee substitute was brought back before the Senate, Hair voted "yes" again.

"When he should have fought the good old boys tooth and nail," says Mrs. Fowler, "he stood with them and against the taxpayers of Florida.

Angry voters finally forced the repeal of S.B. 777, the state services tax. "Why does this matter," asks Mrs. Fowler?







On the campaign trail, Tillie Fowler likes to talk about how Winston Churchill was fond of turtles "because turtles know they have to stick their necks out to get somewhere."

That's the kind of public official she has been: Someone willing to stick out her neck to move forward. "I'm not afraid to take bold action in the face of opposition when I know I am right," she says.

You don't have to look very far to find evidence of Tillie Fowler's toughness--the kind that will be required of new members of Congress to bring about budget, health and economic reform and to establish a new standard of ethics for Congress.

Three good examples:

- Having three Council members arrested and brought back to chambers to pass the City's 1989-90 budget;
- Pushing for a tough sign ordinance;
- Fighting for eight-year term limits for Council members but losing in Council, then taking the issue to the voters for approval.

Jacksonville City Council member Ginny Myrick remembers the Council meeting of September 28, 1989, when Mrs. Fowler served as President.

It was the Council's last chance to pass the 1989-90 City

budget. To do otherwise would have violated Florida law.

"We were totally caught off guard when three Council members walked off the Council floor, left the chambers and left us without a quorum to pass the City budget at the very last minute," says Ms. Myrick.

When the trio departed, President Fowler was told by the City's General Counsel she had two options:

1. Adjourn the meeting and call a special meeting. Because of required public notice, the delay would put the City in violation of Florida law;
2. Have the three Council members returned to the floor to vote by use of the arrest warrant.

"Tillie, on that night, displayed two important talents for leadership. First, she stepped back from all of the chaos and confusion

and determined her options. She got the facts and analyzed the situation. She did not shoot from the hip or react out of emotion," says Ms. Myrick.

"Once she and the Council were briefed, Tillie had the courage to make the hard decision by calling for and getting a unanimous vote of those present to have the three members brought back under arrest so we could get the City's budget passed. The easy road would have been to adjourn the meeting, not pass the budget and deal with the State."

Mrs. Fowler's opponent, Democrat Mattox Hair, criticized her for the action during a campaign debate in St. Augustine. Her response was simple: "As lawmakers, we have a duty to uphold the law. The law said we had to pass the budget and as President of the City Council, it was my job to obey the law and see that it was enforced on those who chose to ignore the law. I would do the same thing again today."

A Times-Union article later quoted a Jacksonville attorney and civic leader this way: "She had courage. Women have to prove at some time in their political career that once they see the showdown at the O.K. Corral, they won't blink."

Later, in a July, 1990 article, The Florida Times-Union described Mrs. Fowler as a "reformer" for her bold stands against "bad legislation" and her fight to rid Duval County of unsightly billboards in the face of strong opposition from the then Council leadership.

"Mrs. Fowler and the others fought a losing battle to eliminate billboards, although citizens later approved a referendum that did what they wanted."

She won another battle at the ballot box after losing a relentless war on the City Council to impose eight year term limits on members of Council.

Like the sign ordinance, Mrs. Fowler's reform efforts were stalled by long-term Council members unwilling to relinquish their seats after eight years, but when given the chance, voters approved eight-year limits overwhelmingly.


New Congress First Vote Is For Speaker; Fowler Will Not Vote To Re-Elect Tom Foley

Fowler's Care For Great Uncle 'Eye Opener'

During the ten years before he died at age 92 earlier this year, Tillie Fowler served as the guardian for her great uncle. It was "a decade of having my eyes opened over the problems seniors and their families have with Social Security, Medicare and other government agencies important to our elderly."

That experience, along with her service as a community volunteer and elected public official, taught Mrs. Fowler that seniors "need all of the friends and allies they can get. We should be angry for allowing the federal government to make our elderly prisoners of the bureaucracy. I am going to fight to change that."

Mrs. Fowler will also fight to maintain the integrity of Social Security and will battle any attempt to cap or trim benefits. As guardian for her great uncle, Mrs. Fowler handled all of his legal and other affairs.

"It was frustrating, to say the least, to fight the red tape, and often battle the disinterest of those who are supposed to help seniors."

Not enough effort is made to assist seniors in remaining in their homes and keeping them out of nursing homes. "We need to increase our efforts at assisted, independent living for the elderly. It is important to their quality of life and their dignity. Seniors are not disposable. They make incredible contributions to our lives and we need to do everything we can to honor their lives."

Mrs. Fowler says she will fight to improve Medicare and Social Security services.

The safety of senior citizens will be a top Fowler priority in Congress.

"Everyone--especially seniors-- should be able to live in their homes and walk the streets without fear. We must help local law enforcement put police on the streets and we must have a tough federal program which takes drug dealers out of our neighborhoods and puts them in jail."

"I'm going to Congress as a citizen Representative. That means that my first priority will be to represent the citizens who elected me. I can only do that by spending as much time as possible in my District and that is what I intend to do," says Tillie Fowler.

Mrs. Fowler says she will open District offices in both Volusia and Duval Counties which will be staffed and opened at least five days a week. "This is a large district and the people deserve to have their Representative close by, no matter where they live."

Mrs. Fowler says she will come back to the 4th District every Thursday night the House is not in session, returning to Washington three days later on Monday night.

"Most people don't know that Congress only meets from Tuesday through Thursday. Unless there is a special meeting, I will fly home on Thursday afternoons or evenings, hold office hours, conduct town meetings and be with my constituents until I return Monday night for the Tuesday session," she says.

Senator Doesn't Rule Out Another Presidential Bid in 1996<

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) Sen. Bob Dole said Wednesday he hears ``a lot of conversation'' that people wish he was a candidate for president this year, and some tell him they hope he runs again in 1996.

If George Bush isn't re-elected, he said, he expects a ``lot of jockeying'' among Republicans for the party's nomination in four years. He intimated he could be among them.

Dole, who tried unsuccessfully for the GOP nomination in 1980 and 1988, is 69. He will be 73 on July 22, 1996.

He joked about his age at a news conference, saying in '96, ``I'll be 96.''

But he didn't rule out the possibility he could make a third run for the presidency, especially if Bush loses next week to Democrat Bill Clinton.

``As you go around the country, you get a lot of conversation like that: wish you were running, or hope you're going to run in '96,''' Dole told reporters.

``Bush is going to win, so that probably won't come up. If he doesn't win, I assume there will be a lot of jockeying around by a lot of people.

``If I win (re-election next Tuesday), and I'm still the Republican leader (of the Senate), then I'll be in the thick of it, trying to figure how we're going to keep everything together.''

Pressed about whether his age would rule him out in 1996, Dole said, ``Oh, you never know. I'm in good health. After you have your prostate out, you're supposed to be real healthy.''

Dole underwent successful prostate cancer surgery last December. He has said he is fully recovered.

The senator met with reporters prior to speaking to a luncheon meeting of the Greater Topeka Chamber of Commerce.

Dole, who is completing his 24th year in the Senate and is seeking a fifth six-year term, said his campaign's track polling showed Bush had pulled ahead of Clinton by 10 percentage points in Kansas in a 400-voter sample this week. He said he thinks that may be indicative of what is happening nationally.

Asked how much his poll showed him ahead of his Democratic opponent, Gloria O'Dell, Dole replied, ``Try 50 (points).''

``The president is pretty encouraged,''' said Dole, who talked Tuesday night to Bush by telephone. ``He feels it's moving in the right direction. Kansas is one of the states where he's been behind and now we're ahead. I'm not sure it's 10 points. Polls are polls.''

Dole said he is trying to get the Bush campaign to schedule an airport appearance by the president in Wichita or Topeka, and that it probably would have to be on Sunday if it were to occur. However, he said, nothing had been decided.

On other topics, Dole said:

He tried to put an end to the fuss between the Bush campaign and Ross Perot over Perot's allegations regarding Republican

``dirty tricks.'' He said he talked to both Bush and Perot about it, and basically both agreed to put it behind them without resolution.

``I think it just should be forgotten,'' Dole said. ``It shouldn't have been mentioned in the first place.'' Dole said the president told him to tell Perot that Bush didn't know anything about such things as an attempt to disrupt the wedding of Perot's daughter.

``I think he'd rather hear it from the president than from me,'' Dole said of Perot's reaction. ``I'm not certain we've eased the waters.''

His wife, Elizabeth Dole, national president of the Red Cross, was interviewed last spring by a Perot campaign aide about becoming his vice presidential running mate, but turned him down.

``She told them I was the Republican leader and running for re-election, and she is very happy being president of the Red Cross,'' Dole said.

Mrs. Dole will join him Monday for what he called ``nonpartisan public receptions'' in Wichita, Topeka and Overland Park. Dole said the receptions are not campaign events because ``the campaign will be over then.'' He said they are designed so he can ``just say I appreciate representing the state of Kansas.''

The receptions are scheduled for 7:30 a.m. at the Wichita Marriott, 10 a.m. at the Topeka Downtown Ramada Inn, and at 11:30 a.m. at the Overland Park Marriott.

YOU WANT TO PROTECT CAFE, CAR EFFICIENCY STANDARDS -- THROW THE AUTO WORKERS OUT OF BUSINESS. BUT AROUND HERE, I FAVOR MULTIPLE USE OF PUBLIC LANDS. AND I WILL STOP THESE ENVIRONMENTAL EXTREMISTS. (APPLAUSE.)

AND HERE'S SOMETHING THAT NEW MEXICO UNDERSTANDS, AND I'M NOT SURE THE CLINTON-GORE TICKET UNDERSTAND, WE ARE GOING TO -- THE THING THAT HAS SAVED US IN GLOBAL SLOWDOWN. AND REMEMBER, THE UNITED STATES IS DOING BETTER THAN JAPAN; WE ARE DOING BETTER THAN GERMANY AND THE REST OF EUROPE; WE ARE DOING BETTER THAN CANADA. AND ALL YOU HEAR FROM THESE GUYS, ASSISTED BY THESE TALKING HEADS ON THE NEWS, IS HOW BAD EVERYTHING IS. (APPLAUSE.)

AND LET'S REFORM OUR LEGAL SYSTEM. WE'RE SUING EACH OTHER TOO MUCH. (APPLAUSE.) WE'RE SUING EACH OTHER TOO MUCH, AND, FRANKLY, CARING FOR EACH OTHER TOO LITTLE. GOVERNOR CLINTON IS IN THE POCKET OF THE TRIAL LAWYERS. Network Views

Anxious viewers probably won't be surprised at all to learn that in the past two years, 91 percent of the sources who have been interviewed on the network newscasts about the economy have delivered negative reports. . . .

And since July, 96 percent of the economic evaluations and 83 percent of the predictions about the economy have been negative. . . .

A survey by the Center for Media and Public Affairs says the economy has been the number one domestic news story on the networks in that two-year period, and behind only the Persian Gulf War and the fall of communism among all news subjects. . . .

In 11 of the past 12 months, unemployment has been the top economic story, followed by the recession itself. Trade issues edged out the job story last month, however. . . .

Since July five out of every six sources cited on network news have expressed anxiety over future economic developments. "This aspect of the coverage also produced the only major difference among the networks," the center pointed out. "A majority (53 percent) of sources on ABC expressed optimism about future developments, while 61 percent of sources on NBC and 69 percent on CBS were pessimistic" . . .

The center noted that three regular features of the nightly news shows—"ABC World News Tonight's" "American Agenda," "CBS Evening News's" "The Money Crunch" and "NBC Nightly News's" "The Daily Difference"—have become factors, as the networks now often "personalize" economic news in those segments. . . .

Between October 1990 and September 1992, the nightly newscasts on ABC, CBS and NBC devoted 2,531 stories and 63 hours 36 minutes of air time to the economy, says the center. NBC was far and away the most dogged, devoting more than 26 hours to economic stories compared with about 18 hours' worth on both CBS and ABC. . . .

MEMORANDUM

RE: The President's Inherent Line Item Veto Power
DATE: October 23, 1992

The line-item veto may already lie in the original languages of the Constitution. The Constitution in Article I, Section 7, Clause 2 gives the President veto power over all bills passed by Congress. Congress may override any presidential veto by a two-thirds majority vote of each house.

However, at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, on Wednesday, August 15, 1787, according to James Madison's published notes of the debate, Mr. Madison commented on Clause 2. "Mr. Madison, observing that if the negative of the President was confined to bills, it would be evaded by acts under the form and name of Resolutions, votes, etc. -- proposed that 'or resolve' should be added after 'bill.'"

In other words, Madison was concerned that Congress would subvert the presidential veto by merely labelling its actions "Resolutions, votes, etc." instead of "bills." (Apparently, "etc." refers to whatever an imaginative future Congress might invent.) So Madison proposed to have Clause 2 refer to any "bill or resolve." The "or resolve" language was Madison's first shot at all-inclusive language.

That night, Madison apparently talked with the older Randolph. The next morning, the Convention came to order to hear an improved and expanded proposal. "Mr. Randolph, having thrown into a new form the motion putting votes, Resolutions, etc. on a footing with Bills, renewed it" with the language that was accepted that day by the Convention and was inscribed as Clause 3 of Section 7 of Article I. "Every order, resolution or vote to which the occurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary" would also be subject to the presidential veto in the same manner as described for bills in the preceding Clause 2.

Randolph had found the broadest possible formula in the language of the day to describe the "etceteras" of "form and name," as yet not invented or described, that Madison feared. It only remained for future Congresses to invent it and name it, in

order for the President to be able to veto it.

During the time of the Constitutional Convention, there was no term in the English language for "line-item veto." Hence, that term could not be put in the Constitution. Instead, the Convention drafted the broadest possible veto powers in the available language of the day, anticipating and rejecting all future, and as yet unnamed, games of "form and name" by Congress intended to subvert the veto.

A President today could determine a "bill" by Congress contained implicit "orders, resolutions, or votes" by Congress for each line item, and veto selected "orders, resolutions, or votes" within a bill at his discretion. If Congress plays the game of "form and name" to subvert the President, then the President must likewise defend himself. This is the point of Clause 3.

A 1982 case from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, *CONSUMER ENERGY v. FERC*, citing Madison's notes, states "Clause 3 was inserted to prevent Congress from evading the requirements of Clause 2 by merely calling its actions something other than a bill."

The argument on the other side would allow Congress to totally destroy the veto by bunching bills together. Taken to its extreme, each Congress could determine that all its actions for the entire two-year period would, on the last day, be bunched together into that Congress' one and only huge biennial bill. All the individual bills that would have been passed over the course of the two years would no longer be called bills at all, but merely "preliminary" procedural steps to the sole leviathan bill. Then the President would have the choice of forgoing the veto entirely, or vetoing two complete years of legislation. This is the very game of "form and name" that inspired Clause 3.

It is not mere coincidence that the federal deficit began its explosion, and the wheels came off the congressional budget process, at the same time that the Impoundment Control Act of 1974 gutted the President's "impoundment" line-item veto over congressional spending excesses. The President needs a working line-item veto -- by whatever name -- to keep Congress' compulsive spending from endangering the economy.

It should be noted that President Bush has referred this question to the Attorney General, and was advised not to try using the line-item veto.

EXCERPTS OF BILL KRISTOL'S ADDRESS TO THE ARLINGTON REPUBLICAN
CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEE BREAKFAST, OCTOBER 23, 1992

I want to talk about the character issue for a minute -- trust, character, integrity. The Democrats have spent a lot of time recently trying to make it illegitimate to talk about character. I don't think that at the end of the day they succeed at this because it is so contrary to common sense.

The fact is that all of us - when selecting people in whom we're going to place responsibility - care about the character of those people. I care about the character of the teachers of my kids, the coaches, the PTA President and even physicians, an area that takes a lot of expertise. You want to know the character, the integrity and the trustworthiness of the person in whom you're entrusting something important.

Character really is an issue, and with the President of the United States more than any thing else. Plenty of experts can help the President, and advise him on the details of health care policy and foreign policy. There are no experts to help replace a deficiency in character. And I do think, again, in the last ten days, we need to make a case to the American people that they really need to think seriously about whether Bill Clinton has the character and integrity to be President of the United States.

One way to help think about it is this: Almost four years ago, George Bush submitted the name of John Tower to be Secretary of Defense of the United States. And in an almost unprecedented event, the Democratic Senate rejected the late Senator Tower.

We obviously thought that there was a misjudgment of what his character really was. But none of us said it was illegitimate to raise the issue of John Tower's fitness for high office, and to raise the issue of his character - overall judgement, overall life experience - that show the discipline, responsibility, and stability he would need to be Secretary of Defense. Let me read what some Democratic Senators said at the time:

Senator Tim Wirth: "Everybody has a right to behave the way they want in their own private lives. There is no question about that. But there are also times when what you do as an individual sets an example. We all have that responsibility here as members of this body. If you are the head of a large organization, you have very specific responsibilities and I do not think John Tower meets that test. This...I find very troubling." Senator Wirth's point is what we might call the "Tower test."

Senator John Glenn: "The military is very strict on ... fraternization. In days past, that was called womanizing...In the military, there are strict rules of fraternization and how you treat women in the military. It is with respect and dignity...When those lines of impropriety are crossed with regard to fraternization, they are dealt with harshly...It is an issue that receives very special consideration in the military now."

Senator Sam Nunn: "Senator Tower falls short of the standards which must be demanded of those who would bear the awesome responsibilities of this position. The committee found examples of indiscreet conduct toward women by Sen. Tower which call into question his judgment and his ability to set an appropriate example for the men and women in uniform."

Senator Barbara Mikulski: "There is...a pattern of behavior that runs through Senator Tower's activities and raises grave doubts about this nominee's judgement and leadership...All of us politicians have had our personal lives and our families held up to public scrutiny. That exposure is sometimes painful and often unfair, but the public must be able to judge our dependability, work habits and ethical standards..."

I don't see how these Democratic Senators can argue - and they argue this in good faith I believe - that Senator Tower has shown a pattern of behavior that disqualified him to be Secretary of Defense, yet, somehow, Bill Clinton is qualified to be Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces.

The Democrats in the Senate established the "John Tower test" for high national office. It was the Democrats in the Senate who said that the character question was sufficient reason to deny Senator Tower that job.

The Senate Democrats set the standard, but I do not believe that anyone can honestly say that Bill Clinton meets that standard. I don't believe that anyone can honestly say that Bill Clinton can pass the "Tower test." If he can't, I honestly don't believe that he should be elected as President of the United States. And, I think that in the next ten days the American people will come to that conclusion as well.

What's most amazing, of course, is that all these Senate Democrats - having defeated Senator Tower - tried to defeat Clarence Thomas on charges relating to character and on his behavior towards women. Clarence Thomas has defended those charges. But now the Democrats are trying to take these kinds of charges off the table, saying they are illegitimate to discuss.

If the charges against Clarence Thomas were true - which I do not believe or I would not have supported him - President Bush would have withdrawn the name. No one would have said, Yes, he should be a Supreme Court Justice. We believed the charges were false. I hope that the evidence will come out that Justice Thomas was telling the truth, but the point here is that the test was a matter of character, a pattern of behavior. No Democratic Senator at the time said, "Oh, gee. That's just his private life. It's illegitimate to even raise it. It shouldn't even be discussed. Let's just stick to the traditional issues."

But if it's important what the behavior and the character of a Supreme Court Justice is, it's certainly no less important to look closely at the behavior and character of the President. One, then, has to look at the evidence about Bill Clinton. People need all the details and then they can make up their own mind. A lot of this is circumstantial, a lot of it is hearsay.

We do have, interestingly, an unchallenged tape recording of a series of conversations between Governor Clinton and his "acquaintance," as his campaign manager calls her -- Gennifer Flowers. The veracity of these tapes have never been challenged by Bill Clinton. They're in the Congressional Record. Every American can get them, I assume, by writing your Congressman and asking for the Congressional Record of September 23rd, 1992.

It's not fun reading this tape, it's not a particularly elevating experience. It's really hard to read this transcript and think to yourself, this man could be President of the United States. Admittedly, we've all had conversations that we'd like to take back. And, private conversations probably shouldn't be taped, but this is a matter of our public record and we can't take it away and pretend we don't know about it.

Here's one little (part) of this conversation. It has gotten very little attention in the press. Gennifer Flowers is talking about how she got her job with the State of Arkansas. She obviously got it with some help, direct or indirect, from Bill Clinton, and, in fact, there was a grievance file from when Gennifer got the job...by a woman who sounds like she should have gotten it -- a black woman named Charlotte Perry. She, in fact, won her grievance case...This is a matter of public record.

This is a state job, paid for by taxpayers. Gennifer Flowers won because the specifications for the job were jimmied to suit her and to bump from the job a current employee of the State, Charlotte Perry. This grievance is a matter of public record.

In any case, Ms. Flowers had a public hearing. She was worried about the publicity. The conversation goes on about how she's worried that the press doesn't (follow) her case. Then she says, "The only thing that concerns me at this point is the state job." Clinton: "Yeah, I've never thought about that, but as long as you say you've just been looking for one, you'd check on it - if they ever ask if you've talked to me about it, you can just say no."

It's a little bit appalling to have the Governor of a State tell an employee of that state - in a discussion about a job that he's helped her get - that if the press ever ask her a question ... to say "no." This is from the conversation in which they are in fact talking about it.

As we all know, the truth about the story has never fully come out...Anything about this relationship or a million other incidents about Governor Clinton's past -- in his public life and private life. It has to be dragged out of him piece by piece, inch by inch, with continual attempts to stonewall -- we don't obviously know everything, we're never going to know everything (because) people's lives are complicated, and there are just things we'll never know for certain.

What the American people have to do is make up their mind, on the totality of the evidence, about the character and fitness for high office -- high national office -- of Bill Clinton. Over the next ten days we can help the American people take a real long look at the life and career of George Bush and the totality of his acts compared to the life and career of Bill Clinton and the totality of his acts. (When they do) they will choose to keep George Bush as President of the United States.

Ross Perot tells CBS News Correspondent Lesley Stahl in a story to be aired on Sixty Minutes Sunday night (10/25/92) that he got out of the presidential race last summer because he was told by a high Republican friend of his who he refused to name that the Bush campaign had used a computer to doctor a picture of his daughter Caroline that would have embarrassed her and the family. Perot says however that he never saw the picture.

Perot also says he learned from that high Republican official that there were plans to disrupt his daughter's August wedding. This was not confirmed, but Perot said he didn't want to take the chance. During the wedding Perot's security people had dogs, presumably bomb sniffing dogs, in the church. The wedding was in August and Perot got out of the presidential race in July.

After Perot left the race he was told the Bush campaign was planning to wiretap the critical telephone lines in his Dallas business operation. Perot said he reported it to the FBI office in Dallas. The head of that office, Buck Reville, says his agents look into the claim and found no evidence of the alleged wiretapping.

Perot also tells "60 Minutes" Correspondent Lesley Stahl that he got a call from President Bush on the day he dropped out of the race, suggesting they have a meeting. Perot says he sent a message to the White House "in technicolor" that the alleged dirty tricks would be the Number One item on the agenda of such a meeting. Perot says when the President got the word that Perot wanted to discuss the alleged dirty tricks the meeting was cancelled.

Talking Points for Senator Bob Dole

TAXES:

- Clinton wants to raise \$150 billion in new taxes, but anyone with a calculator can tell you he won't get it by raising the taxes only on foreign companies and people with incomes over \$200,000. He's going deeper into the middle class for the same reason banks are robbed: that's where the money is.
- The same holds true for his spending program -- billions upon billions of unaccounted-for spending promises, with no price tag, only a promise -- he won't tell you how -- that he'd cut back spending before increasing the deficit.
- On issue after issue, its the same pattern of Clinton deceptions. But his worst deception yet -- saying with a straight face that he won't raise taxes on the middle class.

TRUST/CHARACTER:

- Clinton said his own character isn't the issue, it's "the character of the Presidency." Let's go back to when a friend of mine, John Tower, wanted to be the Secretary of Defense. You Democrats formed a lynch mob, said "character" was the issue. Ron, if made Bill Clinton was forced to go through the same character trial as John Tower, he'd fail.
- And he still won't come clean on his draft record. I sent a letter last week calling the Governor to release the personal papers he promised to share six months ago.
