





Yerkes Observatory is a major astrophysical research facility, operated by The University of Chicago's Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics. It functions as an extensive laboratory for the development of sensitive detectors and instruments for telescopes located around the world.

Yerkes Observatory is located in Williams Bay, Wisconsin, about 80 miles northwest of Chicago. It lies about 190 feet above the level of Geneva Lake, 1,050 feet above sea level, at latitude 42°34', longitude 5^h54^m.



On clear moonless nights, far from city lights, you can see the Milky Way overhead. Telescopes resolve the glow into thousands of stars and vast dark clouds of dust.

THE UNIVERSE AROUND US

The earliest humans viewed the night sky with awe and wonder, even as we do today, and they must have had many questions. Why does the Moon change shape nightly? How far away from us are the stars? What are those points of light blazing across the heavens in numbers almost too vast to comprehend? Why do the same patterns appear night after night, year after year, generation after generation?

WHAT GALILEO SAW

Almost four hundred years ago Galileo looked through his telescope and saw things the eye alone could not detect. He observed mountains, valleys, and craters on the seemingly smooth Moon. He saw dark spots move across what was thought to be the featureless Sun. He saw that "wandering stars" (planets, from the Greek word meaning wanderer) were disks, not points of light.

Saturn, he noted, had ear-like features at either side of the disk (telescopes would later reveal these as rings). Four dots were visible around Jupiter; they changed position hourly. Galileo decided they were satellites in orbit around the planet, that the Moon might similarly be in orbit around Earth, and Earth in orbit around the Sun. He watched Venus go through phases like those of the Moon and deduced that they were caused by the angle of the Sun's rays reflecting off that planet, as observed from Earth. He looked at the stars in the Orion constellation and where the unaided eye could see nine stars, he saw ten times that number.

MODERN TELESCOPES

Galileo made momentous discoveries with a telescope that enlarged images about thirty times. Telescopes today are far more powerful: they permit us to gather hundreds of thousands of times more light than Galileo's telescopes.

Scientists now perceive a Universe that is vastly larger and far more complex than Galileo or his contemporaries could have imagined, and they are studying it with far larger and more complex instruments.

No longer do professional astronomers look through their telescopes; they use them instead as giant cameras to gather images electronically. Sophisticated instruments permit them to study light from unimaginably distant objects.

ASTROPHYSICS AND THE UNIVERSE

Astrophysical research increases our knowledge of the nature and content of the Universe. Our Sun, the closest star to Earth, is some 300,000 times closer than any other star. It is but one of approximately 100 billion stars in a great flattened disk of stars, interstellar dust, and glowing nebulae that we call the Milky Way Galaxy. The Milky Way Galaxy is only one of approximately 100 billion galaxies; astronomers can see distant galaxies everywhere they aim their telescopes.

For close to a century, astronomers at Yerkes have added substantially to our understanding of the Universe. They began taking photographs with the 40-inch Refractor in 1900; since then, they have accumulated tens of thousands of photographic negatives of galaxies, stars, planets, comets, the Sun, and the Moon. These negatives constitute a valuable archival research facility.

REFRACTORS AND REFLECTORS

The Yerkes Observatory 40-inch Refractor uses lenses to gather and focus light. It is similar to Galileo's telescope but is much more powerful. It was the largest telescope in the world in 1897; it is still the largest refractor.

Reflectors were developed by Sir Isaac Newton in the 17th century and use curved shallow mirrors to gather light. The largest telescope in the world is the 400-inch Keck Telescope in Mauna Kea, Hawaii. The 200-inch Hale Telescope at Palomar Mountain in California is the largest reflector in the continental United States.

The Hale Telescope and the Yerkes 40-inch Refractor owe their existence to George Ellery Hale (1868-1938), a pioneer in astrophysical research.

HALE AND YERKES

From childhood Hale was fascinated by astronomy; he was particularly interested in learning about the Sun and developed new instruments for photographing it. Following graduation from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Hale was accepted as a faculty member at the newly founded University of Chicago.





In 1890 Hale learned that the University of Southern California planned to build the world's largest telescope, using glass disks cast by Mantois of Paris and polished into 40-inch lenses by Alvan Clark and Sons in Cambridgeport, Massachusetts.

When the University of Southern California abandoned the project for lack of funding, Hale urged the University of Chicago to acquire the lenses and construct the telescope and an observatory. He and William Rainey Harper, president of the University, approached transit tycoon and millionaire Charles Tyson Yerkes, who agreed to fund the facility.

SELECTING A SITE

Hale sought a location close to the University but beyond Chicago smoke and haze. In addition to studying traditional night-time objects, Hale and his colleagues wished to do solar research. John Johnston, Jr., had given the University a 53-acre tract of land, about half a mile north of Geneva Lake. Observing conditions were equally good day and night, and a railroad line already ran from Chicago to Williams Bay, offering easy access to the University of Chicago. The site was chosen and construction began in 1895.

BUILDING THE OBSERVATORY

Warner and Swasey of Cleveland built the mounting for the telescope and a 90-foot diameter dome to house it. They also constructed a 75-foot diameter movable floor that raises astronomers to the telescope eyepiece.



ORNATE DETAIL

The Observatory's architect, Henry Ives Cobb, was fond of ornamentation rooted in classic mythology. At Yerkes, he let his imagination roam: everywhere in the structure, both inside and out, the viewer finds hundreds of ornate, often playful representations of animals real and fanciful, signs of the Zodiac, phases of the Moon, and many other embellishments.

Yerkes Observatory was completed and dedicated in 1897. It was built in the shape of a cross, with two smaller domes for additional telescopes at the end of each arm.

The building and its contents constitute a fascinating example of the architecture and technological accomplishments of the late 19th century. For the astronomer, far greater fascination rests with the work that has been accomplished at Yerkes and that continues, unabated, today.

LEGACY OF RESEARCH

A listing of all the research ever done at a major observatory would encompass many volumes; the following provides a representative sample of important work at Yerkes Observatory during the last century.


Edward E. Barnard suggested that the dark areas in the Milky Way are caused by opaque interstellar dust which conceal large numbers of stars; his photographic atlas of the Milky Way is a classic work.

Sherburne W. Burnham used the 40-inch Refractor to measure orbits of stars around each other, providing fundamental knowledge of stellar masses.

Otto Struve made major contributions in the field of stellar spectroscopy, using a spectroscope attached to a telescope to determine the chemical nature and other properties of stars. He also discovered widespread interstellar clouds of very tenuous gas in the plane of the Milky Way Galaxy.

Bengt Strömgren added greatly to our understanding of such interstellar gas clouds, especially those surrounding very hot stars. In addition, he pioneered work on the physical nature of stars.

Gerard Kuiper is best known for his discoveries and theories about the solar system. Kuiper discovered carbon dioxide in the atmosphere of Mars: he also discovered the fifth moon of Uranus and the second moon of Neptune.

W. Albert Hiltner discovered that interstellar dust particles cause a slight polarization of starlight, which can be used to understand better the particles and their environment, as well as mapping the magnetic field in the Milky Way.



Subrahmanyan Chandrasekhar studied the behavior of dying stars called white dwarfs, which led to an understanding of the maximum mass such stars can have (now known as "The Chandrasekhar Limit"). He won the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1983 for his theoretical studies of the physical processes concerning the structure and evolution of stars.

William W. Morgan established precise classification systems for the spectra of stars and the forms of galaxies. He significantly improved methods used to determine stellar distances and demonstrated the existence of supergiant galaxies. With data obtained with the 40-inch Refractor between 1937 and 1951, Morgan deduced the spiral nature of the Milky Way Galaxy. Morgan published several spectroscopic atlases, including the Revised MK Atlas for Stars Earlier than the Sun, in 1978, a classic work of stellar spectroscopy.

INFRARED RADIATION

Until relatively recently, astronomers have been limited to studying objects that either emitted or reflected visible light. Astronomers today are increasing our knowledge of the Universe by studying forms of radiation invisible to the eye, including gamma rays, X-rays, ultraviolet, infrared, and radio waves. Although dust blocks visible light from objects such as young stars, edge-on galaxies, and the center of our own galaxy, infrared and radio waves penetrate the dust and allow astronomers to study these sources.

Nearly everything in the Universe, from the coldest clouds of interstellar dust to the jets from centers of active galaxies, glows in infrared radiation. Objects too cool to glow visibly may shine brightly in infrared radiation.

Beginning in 1898, Hale and his colleagues began to measure infrared radiation from celestial bodies. They successfully detected Jupiter and Saturn and the stars Vega and Arcturus with a 24-inch telescope.

MODERN INFRARED RESEARCH

Yerkes Observatory has maintained a leadership role in the development of instruments for the study of infrared radiation. Infrared detectors are carried aloft as attachments to a 36-inch reflector aboard the Kuiper Airborne Observatory (KAO), named in honor of Gerard Kuiper, a former Yerkes Observatory director. The plane, a modified C141-A, is operated by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). It cruises at altitudes of up to 45,000 feet where the air is thin and dry enough to permit detection of infrared radiation blocked elsewhere by atmospheric moisture.

Yerkes researchers are active in developing Project SOFIA (Stratospheric Observatory for Infrared Astronomy), which will use a 97-inch reflector in a Boeing 747-SP. SOFIA will gather seven times as much infrared radiation as the KAO and provide images that are three times sharper.

THE APACHE POINT OBSERVATORY

Yerkes Observatory personnel develop detectors and other instruments for mountain top observatories where observations are less impeded by the atmosphere. The University of Chicago is a member of the Astrophysical Research Consortium (ARC) which operates such an observatory near Sunspot, New Mexico. Here, at the Apache Point Observatory, astronomers use a 3.5-meter telescope to study infrared and visible light.

The innovative 3.5-meter telescope is designed to spare researchers the time and expense of travel to its remote mountaintop location; it can be operated with a computer from any place on Earth that has a computer link. Yerkes faculty, graduate students, and technicians develop instruments to expand the information-gathering capabilities of the telescope.

MAP OF THE UNIVERSE

Plans call for a 2.5-meter telescope to be built at Apache Point. When completed in 1995 it will survey and measure distances to one million galaxies, providing an accurate, three-dimensional map of the Universe. Data obtained during this vast survey will be processed at Fermilab in Batavia, Illinois.

OTHER MOUNTAINTOP OBSERVATORIES

Different telescopes gather different information. Yerkes scientists conduct astrophysical research at several mountaintop locations, employing instruments designed, constructed, and tested at the Observatory for specific telescopes elsewhere.

Yerkes detectors have been used on the 4-meter reflector in Arizona at the Kitt Peak National Observatory. Similar detectors have been used on Mauna Kea, Hawaii, at the NASA Infrared Telescope Facility and the Caltech Sub-millimeter Observatory. Instruments are under construction for use on the new 10-meter Keck Telescope. One of the greatest challenges is designing instruments for telescopes at the South Pole, one of the most remote, least hospitable places on Earth.

ASTROPHYSICS AT THE SOUTH POLE

Despite the harsh conditions, the South Pole is perhaps the best place on Earth to conduct astrophysical research. Summer temperatures average 40° F below zero; in the winter temperatures can fall to 125° F below zero, removing water vapor from the air. The extreme dryness and the high elevation of the continent, about 10,000 feet above sea level at the South Pole, greatly facilitate observations at infrared wavelengths.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY CENTER

The National Science Foundation chose Yerkes Observatory as administrative headquarters for a major Science and Technology Center created to conduct astrophysical research in Antarctica. The University of Chicago is one of eleven institutions that constitute the Center for Astrophysical Research in Antarctica (CARA). One of four major telescope projects designed for remote control operation is under construction at Yerkes Observatory.





GOVERNORS' BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION



ALABAMA

Guy Hunt was born June 17, 1933, in Holly Pond, Cullman County, Ala., of parents Otto and Orene Holcombe Hunt. After graduating from Holly Pond High School, Governor Hunt served in the U.S. Army during the Korean Conflict in the 101st Airborne Division and 1st Infantry Division. He was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for outstanding performance of military duty.



In his first quest for public office, Hunt ran for state senator and was narrowly defeated by 1,000

votes. In 1964, he was elected probate judge for Cullman County, a position to which he was re-elected in 1976. In 1976 and 1980, he served as state chairman for the Reagan presidential campaign, in addition to serving as chairman of the Alabama delegation to the Republican convention. In 1978, Hunt first ran for Governor. While losing the general election to Fob James, he received 82 percent of the vote against two opponents in the Republican primary. In 1981, he was appointed State Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) of the U.S Department of Agriculture and served in that position until 1985.

In 1986, Hunt was elected Governor, becoming the first Republican Governor in the state since Reconstruction. In November 1990, he was the first Republican to be re-elected for a consecutive term and the second governor in Alabama's history to be elected to a consecutive term.

Hunt is a member of the National Governors' Association's Committee on Economic Development and Commerce and Task Force on Education. He was named one of 11 best Governors in the nation by U.S. News and World Report and the South's Top Governor for tourism by the Southeast Tourism Association.

Governor Hunt and his wife, Helen, have four children.

AMERICAN SAMOA

Pete Tali Coleman was born in 1919 on American Samoa. At the outbreak of World War II, Coleman enlisted in the United States Army, rising to the rank of captain.

After the war, Coleman attended Georgetown University, where he earned a B.S. degree in economics (1949) and a law degree (1951). While at Georgetown, Coleman was a John Hay Whitney Foundation fellow.



After law school, Coleman returned to Western

Samoa, formerly a trust territory of New Zealand and an independent nation since 1962, and practiced law. He later went to Pago Pago and served as a public defender.

In 1954, Coleman became attorney general of American Samoa. In 1956, he became the first native Samoan to be appointed governor of the territory. During his first administration, he chaired the Constitutional Convention which produced the territory's first constitution.

In 1977, he was elected governor. In 1980, he was re-elected to a second term, making him the first U.S. Pacific territorial governor to have been elected to successive terms of office. With his victory in the 1988 gubernatorial election, Coleman also became the first territorial governor to serve four terms in office.

Coleman is currently a senior partner in the law firm of Coleman and Faalevao and president of PTC, Inc, a consulting firm which specializes in Pacific Island development issues. He is the former chairman of the Republican Party of American Samoa and currently serves as the territory's Republican National Committeeman. He currently serves on the National Governor's Association's Committee on Economic Development and Commerce.



ARIZONA

Fife Symington was introduced to Arizona while stationed at Luke Air Force Base in 1968 during his service in the U.S. Air Force. Fife's military career included service in Southeast Asia, where he was awarded the Bronze Star for Meritorious Service. He left the Air Force with the rank of Captain and returned to Arizona.



Symington's civic involvements have included chairman, Phoenix Citizens Police Protection Bond Committee, 1988; vice president of the board of

trustees for the Heard Museum; Men's Art Council member; Environmental Quality Commission of the City of Phoenix; the Arizona Children's Foundation; and the Executive Board of Phoenix Community Alliance.

Symington's Republican Party credentials extend back to his college days, when he was one of a few Harvard students who openly supported Barry Goldwater for President in 1964. He is a former precinct committeeman in District 24 and served as Arizona State Republican Finance Chairman from 1982-1984. He has helped raise funds for numerous Republican candidates and was finance chairman of the John Rhodes for Governor Committee in 1988.

Governor Symington is chairman of the Western Governors' Association and a member of the National Governors' Association's Committee on Natural Resources, Task Force on Health Care and Task Force on State Management.

Symington and his wife, Ann, have five children.

CALIFORNIA

Pete Wilson was born Aug. 23, 1933, in suburban Chicago, III. He attended Yale University on an ROTC scholarship, and graduated with a bachelor's degree in 1955.

From 1955 to 1958, Wilson served as a Marine Corps infantry officer, then went on to earn a law degree from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1962.



Wilson's public service career began in 1966, when he was elected to represent San Diego in the

California Assembly. While serving in the State Assembly, Wilson held the post of minority whip. In 1971, Pete Wilson was elected Mayor of San Diego. In 1982, after 11 years as mayor, Wilson won his first term in the U.S. Senate. In 1988, Californians returned him to office by a 900,000 vote margin. While in the Senate, Wilson served on the Armed Services, Agriculture, and Government Affairs Committees. He has received a number of Watchdogs of the Treasury and the Guardian of Small Business Award from the National Federation of Independent Business.

Among his accomplishments in the Senate, Wilson counts his contributions to the war on drugs, including provisions he authored to increase the military's role in drug interdiction, restrict illegal trade of chemicals used to make "meth" and PCP, and make murder of a police officer in a drug-related crime punishable by death.

Governor Wilson is a member of the National Governors' Association's Committee on Human Resources and Task Force on Health Care. He is married to Gayle Wilson.

DELAWARE

Michael Castle was born July 2, 1939 in Wilmington, Del. He received his B.A. degree from Hamilton College in 1961, and earned a law degree from Georgetown University in 1964.

Castle is a member of the Delaware State Bar Association, and in 1964 chaired the Young Lawyers Section.

From 1968 to 1976, he served in the Delaware State Legislature, serving as senate majority leader from 1975 to 1976. In 1980, he was elected

Lieutenant Governor of Delaware, transforming the position into one with decision-making responsibilities. He served as chairman of the State Task Force on Education and Economic Growth; headed the Governor's Small Business Council, and Delaware's Trade Mission to Europe in 1981 and chaired the Governor's Task Force on Drunk Driving.

In 1984, Castle was elected Governor of Delaware. He currently serve as a member of the National Governors' Association's Executive Committee. He is also a member of the NGA's Committee on Human Resources, the Task Force on Health Care and the Task Force on State Management. He is also a former chairman of the Republican Governor Association (1987-88) and the Southern Governors' Association. Governor Castle is married to the former Jane DiSabatino.

GUAM

Joseph F. Ada was born in Agana, Guam, on Dec. 3, 1943. He obtained his bachelor's degree from the University of Guam and his master's degree from the University of Portland.

In 1969, Ada's political career began when he served as chairman of the First Constitutional Convention of Guam and as chairman of the Water Pollution Control Commission. He served as deputy director for the Guam Department of Public Works from 1970 to 1972.



In 1973, Ada was elected senator in the 12th Guam Legislature. In 1975, he was elected speaker, a post he was re-elected to in 1977. Ada was elected lieutenant governor in 1979 and served four years, returning to the Guam Legislature in 1983.

After serving two more terms in the legislature, Ada was elected governor in 1986 and was inaugurated on Jan. 5, 1987. He currently serves as a member of the National Governors' Association's Committee OII Economic Development and Commerce. In 1988, Ada was selected by White House Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter to serve on the President's Intergovernmental Policy Advisory Committee.

Ada is married to the former Rosanne Santos. They have three children: Eric, Esther, and Tricia.

ILLINOIS

Jim Edgar was born on July 22, 1946. He graduated in 1968, from Eastern Illinois University where he was student body president.

Edgar began his government service in 1968 and served for eight years as a key aid to leaders in both the Illinois House and Senate. He was elected in 1976 to the House from the 53rd Legislative District, which includes his hometown of Charleston, and was reelected in 1978. From April 1979 to December 1980 he served as director of legislative affairs for the Office of the Governor.



Edgar won election to Secretary of State in 1982 after being appointed to fill a vacancy the year before, and became the youngest Illinoisan elected secretary of state in this century. His accomplishments as secretary of state have caught the attention of countless organizations and public officials. In May 1986, U.S. News and World Report named him one of 30 "rising stars of American politics." Furthermore, Edgar received awards or honors from the U.S. Department of Education, the U.S. Justice Department, the National Safety Council and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. He is past-president of the National Association of Secretaries of State and a member of the boards of the Council of State Governments and the National Safety Council. President Reagan appointed Edgar to the Presidential Commission on Drunk Driving.

Governor Edgar is chairman of the National Governors' Association's Committee on Economic Development and Commerce and a member of the NGA Task Force on Education and Task Force on State Management Edgar and his wife, Brenda, have two children.

IOWA

Terry E. Branstad was born in Leland, Iowa, on Nov. 17, 1946. He received a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Iowa in 1969, and a J.D. degree from Drake University Law School in 1974. A two-year Army veteran, Branstad was a recipient of the Army Commendation Medal.

Governor Branstad was a delegate to district, state and national Republican conventions, serving as a delegate to the last three conventions. In 1988, he was chairman of the lowa delegation. He served



on the Council of State Governments' Liaison Committee to President Reagan, and is a past member of the board of directors for the American Legislative Exchange Council. He was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives in 1972, where he served for six years. In 1978, he was elected lieutenant governor, a position he held for four years.

After being elected governor in 1982, Branstad sold his interest in Branstad and Schwarm, attorneys-at-law. He still maintains an active interest in the Branstad family farm operation. Governor Branstad is a past chairman of the National Governors' Association (NGA), and convened the historic education summit in Charlottesville, Va. with President Bush. Currently, he is a member of the NGA's Executive Committee. He is also a member of NGA's Committee on Economic Development and Commerce and the Task Force on State Management and the Task Force on Health Care. He is a member of the American Legion Board of Directors, Lions, Farm Bureau, the Lake Mills Chamber of Commerce, and is affiliated with the Sons of Norway and People United for Rural Education.

MAINE

John R. McKernan was born May 20, 1948 in Bangor, Maine. In 1970, he received an A.B. degree from Dartmouth College. Thereafter, McKernan joined the Army National Guard, and then enrolled in the University of Maine Law School in 1971.

While still a student, he was elected to the Maine House of Representatives. In 1974, McKernan received his law degree, and was elected to a second term in the Maine Legislature, where his

colleagues selected him as assistant Republican floor leader.

McKernan left the legislature after his second term to practice law with the firm of Verril and Dana. In 1976, he headed President Ford's Maine re-election campaign and was involved in both the 1980 and 1984 Reagan-Bush efforts.

In 1982, McKernan was elected to the United State House of Representatives where he served two terms representing Maine's 1st Congressional District. During that time, McKernan served on the House Education and Labor Committee, the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, the Government Operations Committee and the Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families.

McKernan was elected governor of Maine in 1986, becoming the first Republican governor in Maine in more than two decades and the youngest governor in the United States. He currently serves as vice chairman of the National Governors' Association's (NGA) Committee on Natural Resources. He is also a member of the NGA's Task Force on Education. In addition, he is immediate past chairman of the Coalition of Northeastern Governors, and a member of the executive committee of the Republican Governors Association.

Governor McKernan is married to Congresswoman Olympia Snowe, who represents the 2nd Congressional District.

MASSACHUSETTS

William F. Weld attended the Middlesex School in Concord, Mass., from 1956 to 1962 before entering Harvard College, where he graduated summa cum laude in 1966. A year later, he received a diploma in economics and political science from Oxford University. Weld graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School in 1970.



After serving as a law clerk with the state's Supreme Judicial Court for one year, Weld worked for 10 years at the Boston law firm of Hill & Barlow. In 1974, he

served as associate minority counsel to the U.S. House Judiciary Committee during its Watergate impeachment inquiry. Weld was the 1978 Republican nominee for Massachusetts attorney general.

In 1981, Weld was named U.S. Attorney for Massachusetts by President Ronald Reagan. During his five-year tenure, the office won convictions in 109 of 111 political corruption cases, imposed fines on several banks engaged in money laundering, obtained lengthy prison terms for the leaders of the Boston Mafia, and broke up an arson ring that was responsible for 306 fires in the Greater Boston area. In 1985, Weld's fellow U.S. Attorneys elected him chairman of the Attorney General's Advisory Committee of U.S. Attorneys.

Reagan brought Weld to Washington in 1986, appointing him assistant attorney general in charge of the Criminal Division. Emphasizing public corruption, narcotics and white-collar crime cases, Weld oversaw all federal crime investigations in the nation. He resigned from that post in 1988 and joined the Boston law firm of Hale & Dorr, where he served as a senior partner until his election as Governor of Massachusetts in 1990.

On Jan. 4, 1990, Weld formally announced his candidacy for governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and was elected on Nov. 6, 1990. He was inaugurated on Jan. 3, 1991. Governor Weld is Chairman of the New England Governors' Conference and Co-Chairman of the National Governors' Association's (NGA) Task Force on State Management. He is also a member of the NGA's Committee on Economic Development and Commerce and the Task Force on Education.

Weld was born on July 31, 1945, in Smithtown, N.Y. He lives in Cambridge with his wife, Susan Roosevelt, and their five children: David, Ethel, Mary, Quentin, and Frances.

MICHIGAN

John Engler was born in Mt. Pleasant, Mich., on Oct. 12, 1948. He received a B.A. degree from Michigan State University in 1971 and a J.D. from the Thomas Cooley School of Law in 1981.

Using a campaign plan he wrote as a college term paper, Engler upset a popular incumbent and was first elected to the Michigan House of Representatives while a 22 year-old senior at Michigan State University. His stunning victory made Engler the youngest member ever to serve in the Michigan legislature at the time.



After serving in the House for eight distinguished years, Engler defeated another incumbent and was elected to the State Senate in 1978, becoming one of the youngest state senators in history. In 1984, he became senate majority leader. In addition to his responsibilities as majority leader, he was chairman of the Senate Government Operation Committee, the senate chairman of the Legislative Council, and a member of the Legislative Retirement Board of Trustees.

In 1988 President Reagan appointed Engler to the United States Trad Representative's Intergovernmental Policy Advisory Committee and was re-appointed in 1990. Engler also served on the Advisory Council on Education. In addition, he is active with the National Conference of Stat Legislatures. the Council of State Governments and the American Legislative Exchange. John Engler was co-chairman for the Bush/Ouayl '88 campaign in Michigan. Following the President's election, John was named co-chair of the Presidential Personnel Advisory Committee and was recently appointed by President Bush as chairman of the Commission on Presidential Scholars.

Governor Engler is a member of the National Governors' Association' Legal Affairs and Executive Committees and the Committee on Human Resources. He is also a member of the NGA's Task Force on Education and the Task Force on State Management.

MINNESOTA

Arne H. Carlson was born in New York, N.Y., on Sept. 24, 1934. He graduated with a B.A. degree from Williams College in 1957 and did graduate work at the University of Minnesota from 1957-1958.

After working with Control Data Corp., Carlson was elected to the Minneapolis City Council in 1965 and served as majority leader. In 1970 he was elected to the state legislature, and in 1974 he became the minority whip. He was awarded a Bush Foundation Fellowship in 1971 and studied governmental management.



In 1978 Carlson was elected state auditor, and immediately set upon overhauling the agency's operation. He created uniform accounting for cities, counties, townships and special districts and made Minnesota a leader among states in uniform accounting. In 1982 and 1986 Carlson was re-elected state auditor and was the leading statewide Republican vote-getter.

Governor Carlson is vice chairman of the National Governor's Association's (NGA) Committee on Human Resources and is a member of the NGA's Task Force on State Management and Task Force on Education. He also serves as chairman of the Midwestern Governors' Conference.

Successful businessman, family man and community leader, Governor Kirk Fordice is a professional engineer and president of Fordice Construction Company. The Vicksburg firm founded in 1949, specializes in heavy construction and highway bridge construction in Mississippi, Louisiana and Arkansas.



A former officer in the U.S. Army Reserves, Fordice served his country for 20 years. Most of those years were spent in the 412th Engineer Command in Vicksburg. He retired with the rank of colonel.

Governor Fordice's education includes both a bachelor's degree in civil engineering and a master of science degree in industrial management from Purdue University. He has been married to the former Patricia (Pat) Owens of Jackson for the past 35 years. They have four children and four grandchildre

Governor Fordice has served the state in various elected posts: as Warren County Election Commissioner (the first Republican elected to that office since Reconstruction); as chairman of the Warren County Republican Party; as state Republican Party Secretary; and as a Fellow of the Vicksburg Branch of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Mississippi's economic development has always been a prime concern for Fordice. A former board member of the Vicksburg/Warren County Chamber of Commerce and a former chairman of Vicksburg's Economic Development Foundation, he was recognized for his efforts in 1985, when the Mississippi Industrial Development Council named him Economic Development Voluntee Laureate. Governor Fordice also has worked toward the betterment of his community as vice-chairman of the Vicksburg-Tallulah District Airport Board, a a former board member of the Salvation Army and as a director of Merchants National Bank in Vicksburg. Fordice has been named to Who's Who in Finanti and Industry, as well as Who's Who in the South and Southwest. In 1969, the United States Jaycees tapped him as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America.

Elected governor on Nov. 5, 1991, Kirk Fordice became the first Republican Governor of Mississippi in this century. He is a member of the National Governors' Association's Committee on Economic Development and Commerce, the Task Force on Health Care and the Task Force on State Management. Governor Fordice is also 2nd Vice Chairman of the Southern Governors' Association.

Ashcroft was elected Governor of Missouri in 1984. He has placed excellence in education and economic development as his top priorities as governor. A cornerstone of Ashcroft's term in office is the enactment and implementation of the Excellence in Education Act of 1985, hailed by many as the most important improvement in school law adopted in the State's history.

In July 1991, a Newsweek survey of the nation's 50 governors ranked Ashcroft as one of the country's five most effective governors. Governor Ashcroft has served as the National Chairman of the Education Commission of the States (1987-88), as well as the National Governors' Association's (NGA) task forces on College Quality and Adult Literacy.

Ashcroft is the immediate past chairman of the National Governors Association (NGA) and a past chairman of the Republican Governors Association. He is a member of the NGA's Executive Committee, the Committee on Economic Development and Commerce and the Task Force on Education.

A talented musician, Governor Ashcroft is known by Missourians as a gospel singer, songwriter and recording artist. He and his wife, Janet, have three children.

Stan Stephens was born in Calgary, Alberta, on Sept. 16, 1929. He moved to Montana at the age of 19 and began a 38-year career in broadcasting.

During that time, Stephens was involved in news and editorial writing, announcing, and management of radio operations in Canada, Korea and the United States. He also has served as chief executive officer for three cable TV systems in Montana. During his broadcast career, Stephens received many state and national awards for



excellence in news and editorial writing. Most notable is his 1975 Edward R. Murrow award for journalistic excellence in editorials for uncovering a scandal in Montana's Workers' Compensation Program.

Stephens represented his home community of Havre in the Montana Senate for 16 years, starting in 1969. He is the only Montana legislator elected by his peers to every leadership position in the state senate. He served as Senate Republican floor whip in 1977, majority leader in 1979 and 1981, Senate president in 1983 and minority leader in 1985.

He retired from the Montana Senate in 1986. That same year he was recognized by the National Republican Legislators' Association as one of the country's 10 most outstanding state lawmakers.

In January of 1987, Stephens announced as a candidate for Montana Governor and was elected in November of 1988. His four-year term as the state's 19th chief executive included presiding as the Centennial Governor in 1989.

Stephens is a member of the National Governors' Association Committee on Economic Development and Commerce. He also serves as one of four governors on the President's Advisory Council on Intergovernmental Affairs.

As a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, Martin served as a senior member on the powerful House Committee on Ways and Means. He was a chairman of the Republican Task Force on Health and a member of the Republican Task



Force on Health and a member of the House Committee on the Budget. He also was elected chairman of the House Republican Research Committee, which made him a ranking member of the executive committee of the House GOP leadership. As a U.S. Congressman, he received the "Watchdog of the Treasury" award from the National Association of Businessmen, the "Guardian of Small Business" award from the National Federation of Independent Business and the "Distinguished Service Award" from Americans for Constitutional Action.

sponsored 85 bills that became law. He served on the Finance and Appropriations committee, the State Government Committee and was vicechairman of the Environmental and Natural Resources Committee during his three terms in office. From 1971 to 1976 he served as Cuyahoga County auditor and from 1977 to 1978 he served as Cuyahoga County commissioner.

In 1978, Governor Jim Rhodes selected Voinovich as his running mate and went on to win election. During his term as lieutenant governor, he served as first chairman of Ohio's State and Local Government Commission.

In 1979, Voinovich was elected to a two-year term as mayor of Cleveland and was re-elected twice to four-year terms in 1981 and 1985. He served as president of the National League of Cities in 1985. During the Voinovich Administration, the National Municipal League named Cleveland an All-American City an unprecedented three times in a five-year period. In 1987, City and State magazine selected Voinovich as one of three top mayors in the nation and named him to the AllPro City Management Team. In June of 1986, the National Journal named Voinovich one of five local and state officials who made a difference in Washington.

In 1978, he became the first Republican since Reconstruction to represent South Carolina's fourth district in the U.S House of Representatives. After coming to Congress, Campbell earned his master's degree in political science at American University and was elected to Pi Sigma Alpha national honor society. He served on the Congressional Textile Caucus Steering Committee and the House Banking and Housing, Appropriations, and Ways and Means committees. He was chairman of the South Carolina Reagan-Bush Campaign in 1980 and 1984, and Southern chairman of the Reagan-Bush campaign in 1988. Campbell was the chairman of the Reagan-Bush campaign in the U.S. House of Representatives in 1984. Since 1972, he has been a delegate to the Republican National Conventions, chairing the state delegation in both 1980 and 1988.

Governor Campbell is vice chairman of the National Governors' Association (NGA) and chairman of the NGA Finance Committee. He is the immediate past chairman of the Southern Governors' Association and a past chairman of the Republican Governors Association. He is only the second Republican in more than a century to be Governor of South Carolina.


