The George David Beveridge, Jr. Editor of the Year Award

The National Press Foundation established the Editor of the Year Award in 1984 to recognize significant journalistic achievements that enhance the quality of journalism in the United States. In 1987 this award was named in honor of the late George David Beveridge, Jr., a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and long-time member of the NPF Board of Directors. The award, open to an editor at any level, is made in recognition of imagination, professional skill, ethics and an ability to motivate staff—qualities that produce excellence in media. Past winners are Bill Dwyre, Sports Editor, *Los Angeles Times*; John C. Quinn, Editor, *USA TODAY*; Mike Pride, Editor, *The Concord Monitor*; Richard A. Oppel, Editor, *The Charlotte Observer*; N. Christian Anderson, Editor, *The Orange County Register*; Norman Pearlstine, Managing Editor, *The Wall Street Journal*; Janet Chusmir, Executive Editor, *The Miami Herald*; and Burl Osborne, *The Dallas Morning News*.

Tina Brown is honored for revitalizing two venerable magazines, *The New Yorker* and *Vanity Fair*. The British-born editor earned an M.A. in English at Oxford University. She took the helm of *Vanity Fair* in 1984, attracting seven National Magazine Awards plus first place in *Adweek's* annual top magazine list. She was *Advertising Age's* editor of the year for 1988. Earlier in England she was the recipient of numerous awards for her contributions to *The New Statesman*, the *Sunday Telegraph*, and *Punch*, and for editing *The Tatler*. She became editor of *The New Yorker* in September 1992. Brown is the first magazine editor to be named editor of the year by the National Press Foundation.



The weekly publication whose leadership she grasped in 1992 was already the most honored magazine in the world. Since its launch in 1925 *The New Yorker* and its contributors have won 13 Nobel and 61 Pulitzer Prizes, along with 62 National Book and 13 National Magazine Awards. Nevertheless, Ms. Brown immediately instituted changes in typeface, paper and design, most of which made the magazine more faithful to the spirit of its founding. "Notes and Comments," the editorial voice of the magazine, now introduces each issue, and a factual piece serves as the lead offering. Under Ms. Brown the magazine is more like itself than ever before.



The Distinguished Contributions to Journalism Award

The National Press Foundation created the Distinguished Contributions to Journalism Award to honor persons who have, through their vision and leadership, strengthened American journalism and furthered the efforts to establish quality in American journalism. Past winners include financier Leo M. Bernstein; Sun Company CEO Theodore A. Burtis; Donald R. Larrabee, Griffin-Larrabee News Bureau; John J. Johnson, Editor and Publisher, Johnson Publishing Co.; A.M. Rosenthal, Associate Editor, *The New York Times*; Fred W. Friendly, Edward R. Murrow Professor of Journalism, Columbia University; Eugene L. Roberts, Jr., Executive Editor, *The Philadelphia Inquirer*; Nancy Hicks Maynard & Robert C. Maynard, Senior Vice President and Publisher, respectively, of *The Oakland Tribune*; John Seigenthaler, Chairman and Publisher of *The Tennessean*; and attorney Richard M. Schmidt, Jr.



David S. Broder is national political correspondent and columnist for *The Washington Post*. He joined the *Post* in 1966 after service with the *Daily Pantagraph* (Bloomington, Illinois), *Congressional Quarterly*, *The Washington Star*, and *The New York Times*. In 1973 he won the Pulitzer Prize for distinguished commentary. Broder is author or co-author of four books. His twice-weekly column appears in more than 300 newspapers worldwide. He is honored for setting new high standards for political and campaign reporting.

Broder published his book, *Behind the Front Page: A Candid Look at How the News is Made*, in 1987. His *Changing of the Guard: Power and Leadership in America* was issued in 1980. In 1972 he authored *The Party's Over: The Failure of Politics in America*. Broder is also co-author (with Stephen Hess) of the 1967 book *The Republican Establishment: The Present and Future of the GOP*.

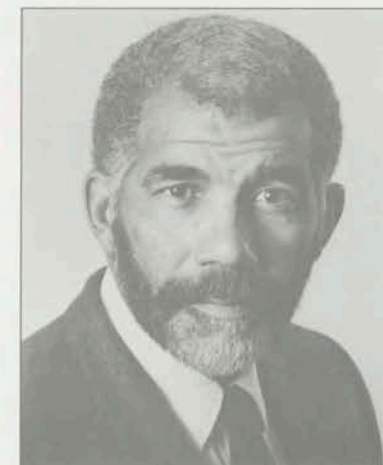
A native of Chicago Heights, Illinois, Broder received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Chicago. He has been a Fellow of the Institute of Politics at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government, and a Fellow of Duke University's Institute of Policy Studies and Public Affairs.



The Sol Taishoff Award for Excellence in Broadcast Journalism

In 1983, the National Press Foundation received a bequest from the late Sol Taishoff, founder and editor of *Broadcasting* magazine, a veteran of electronic journalism and a long-time member of the NPF Board of Directors. The Foundation, in turn, created this prestigious lifetime achievement award for distinguished service to broadcast journalism. Past recipients have been Ted Koppel, anchor of ABC News' "Nightline"; John Chancellor, commentator for NBC Nightly News; Don Hewitt, Executive Producer of CBS News' "60 Minutes"; Robert MacNeil and Jim Lehrer, of the "MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour"; R.E. "Ted" Turner, for CNN; Brian P. Lamb, for C-SPAN; David Brinkley, anchor of ABC News' "This Week With David Brinkley"; Roone Arledge, President of ABC News; and documentary producer Ken Burns.

Ed Bradley has been co-editor of "60 Minutes" since 1981 and became anchor of "Street Stories" in January 1992. He has won numerous Emmy, duPont-Columbia, Peabody, Ohio State and Overseas Press Club awards. Prior to joining "60 Minutes" Bradley covered the White House for CBS News, anchored the Sunday evening news, and was principal correspondent for "CBS Reports." He began his 30-year career in broadcast journalism at WDAS Radio in Philadelphia and later served stints in Paris and Saigon for CBS News.



In 1973 Bradley was wounded while on assignment in Cambodia. Nevertheless, in 1975 he volunteered to return to Indochina and covered the fall of Cambodia and Vietnam. His coverage of the plight of Cambodian refugees on the "CBS Evening News" won a George Polk Award. Other assignments produced award-winning reports on "Schizophrenia," "The Boat People," "Blacks in America," "The Boston Goes to China," "Return of the CIA," "Miami: The Trial That Sparked the Riots," "The Saudis," and "The Embassy." His televised interviews with singer Lena Horne and convicted murderer Jack Henry Abbott also earned national citations.

Bradley will be introduced by his "60 Minutes" producer, Don Hewitt, who has also been honored with a Taishoff Award.



The Clifford K. Berryman & James T. Berryman Award for Editorial Cartoonists

In 1989 Florence Berryman, former art critic of the Washington Star, endowed an annual award in memory of her late father and brother, both Pulitzer Prize-winning cartoonists. The elder Berryman (1869-1949) joined the Star in 1907 and was honored with the Pulitzer Prize in 1944. His son, James (1902-62), joined the Star in 1924, becoming his father's collaborator and successor. He received the Pulitzer Prize in 1951. The Berryman Award, open to editorial cartoonists of newspapers and magazines, is for work that exhibits power to influence public opinion, plus good drawing and striking effect. The initial winners were Signe Wilkinson, of the *Philadelphia Daily News* and Stuart Carlson of the *Milwaukee Sentinel*.



Bill Schorr, editorial cartoonist of *The Kansas City Star*, was chosen from a field of 58 competitors for his ability to combine strong commentary with pointed humor, and for his deft touch with the cartoonist's pen. The cartoonist, who is syndicated by United Features, started with the *Star* in 1973, moved to the *Los Angeles Herald Examiner* in 1978, then back to the *Star* in 1987.

Schorr's cartoons are distributed nationwide four times a week by United Feature Syndicate and appear frequently in *TIME*, *Newsweek*, *U.S. News and World Report* and *The New Republic*. His drawings have also been featured on the MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour, "Face the Nation" and other television news programs. The Berryman Award winner is also the creator of a comic strip, "The Grizzwells," distributed by the Newspaper Enterprise Association.

Runner-up to Schorr was Bob Jorgensen of Extra Newspaper Features. Third place cartoon honors went to Tony Auth of *The Philadelphia Inquirer*.

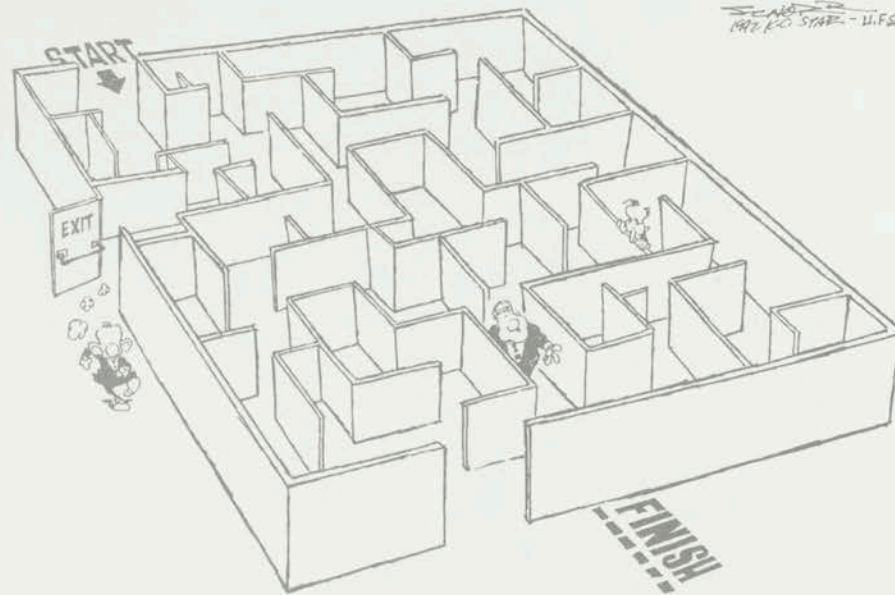
