HAMPSHIRE LAST WEEK. WE
MADE QUITE A TEAM. I ASKED
FOR PEOPLE'S MONEY, AND
ELIZABETH ASKED FOR THEIR
BLOOD.**

***ELIZABETH DID ASK ME TO
PASS ALONG HER BEST WISHES.
SHE'S BEEN IN IOWA THREE OR
FOUR TIMES THIS SUMMER, AS
THE RED CROSS HELPED IN THE**

**AFTERMATH OF THE FLOODS.
AND BOTH OF US HAVE THE
SAME ADMIRATION FOR THE
COURAGE AND PERSEVERANCE
OF THE MEN AND WOMEN OF
IOWA.**

***AND AS IOWA REBUILDS, IT
WILL NEED A STRONG AND
HEALTHY BUILDING AND
CONTRACTING INDUSTRY.**

Glenn-Redfern imbroglio turns to nasty accusations

The special election billed as a friendly, little of popularity contest between two extraordinarily nice people may not be very friendly by the time voters have their say on Aug. 31.

The professional gunslingers of the side of Democrat Sandy Glenn have decided to play it rough, and it's unlikely that Republican Don Redfern's pals are going to let him get his brains beat out very long before someone responds in kind.

Things turned a bit mean Wednesday morning.

Disclosure reports showing Glenn has received more than half of her campaign funds from one source — the state's teachers union — hand delivered a nifty issue to Redfern.

It was obvious, he said, that Glenn is in the pocket of a special interest group. Furthermore, she only got there by promising to spend a lot more of taxpayers' hard-earned dollars, he said.

One hour later, Iowa Democratic Party Chairman Eric Tabor walked into the newsroom and dropped the equivalent of a laser-guided smart bomb on Redfern's big story.

Redfern can't be trusted to talk about fiscal responsibility because he's been walking around carefree for five years while he still owes thousands of dollars from an unsuccessful 1988 congressional campaign, Tabor said.

As campaigns go, the \$12,600 debt to an Alexan-

dia, Va., media consulting firm is nothing much.

Attempting to prove that point, state Republican chairman Rich Schwarm sent out copies of disclosure reports for several prominent Democrats. Unsuccessful U.S. Senate candidate Jean Lloyd-Jones owed \$160,000 as of July 29 while former Rep. Dave Nagle owes \$12,000 and 1986 gubernatorial candidate Lowell Jenkins owes \$18,000.

But that wasn't the point.

Redfern emphasized that he's paid 90 percent of his debt to the firm and the balance is "going to be taken care of."

But that's not that point, either.

In very practical terms, the only point that matters is that Redfern could have defused Tabor's device but failed to seize the initiative.

He said himself on Wednesday that he was sure Tabor "knew many days ago about this" and would use it at the most opportune moment.

So why didn't he do something about it?

Why wasn't Redfern ready with a letter from his creditor expressing their confidence in him?

Better yet, why didn't he just square his account?

Certainly, he could have done so for pennies on the dollar. That way, he could have had the last laugh — and a big strategic victory — when Tabor injected himself in the race.

Instead, he'll be fending off attacks until the campaign is over.

The Des Moines ad firm of O'Rourke & Associates has produced a particularly nasty spot in which the Acme Collection Agency comes looking for "Delinquent Don."

The fact that Redfern didn't launch a pre-emptive strike on Tabor has already left a few Republicans shaking their heads in amazement and wondering if the Cedar Falls lawyer has the political smarts it takes to win.

Should he lose — which would be considered at least a mild upset — GOP strategists certainly will be able to trace a line directly to Redfern's debt.

On the other hand...

Glenn has been left open to attack, though on a much smaller scale, by one of her own.

Former state Rep. Jane Teaford recently wrote a letter to the editor saying Glenn should be the voters' choice because she wouldn't quit like Slife.

In fact, Glenn did quit the Cedar Falls City Council in 1991.

She did so for much different reasons than Slife — the altogether reasonable desire to travel to England with her husband rather than a frustration with partisan bickering — but such distinctions are often lost in the dust when the opposition goes on the offensive.

CEDAR FALLS — The two candidates in the Aug. 31 special election in Iowa Senate District 12 are pounding the pavement for votes today.

Democrat Sandy C. Redfern and Republican Don Redfern both planned door-knocking forays in Cedar Falls. They are vying for the seat vacated by Cedar Falls Republican Harry Slife in the district that includes the western quarter of Waterloo and all of Cedar Falls and Hudson.

Redfern, a Cedar Falls lawyer, and Glenn, a former Cedar Falls City Council member, also have agreed to meet for a 7 a.m. Aug. 24 forum sponsored by 89.5 FM KHKE public radio and the Courier. The one-hour program will be a structure-free forum except for brief closing statements by both candidates.

last month.

To receive an absentee ballot by mail, a request should be sent including the name and date of the election, the voter's Social Security number (not required, but helpful), the address at which the voter is currently registered to vote, the address where the ballot should be sent and the voter's signature.

"It's very laughable when you look at the taxes Gov. Terry Branstad has raised over his term: two sales tax increases, an income tax increase and five gas tax increases.

"Sandy Glenn has balanced eight city budgets," Shannahan said. "That says she gets the job done with the resources available."

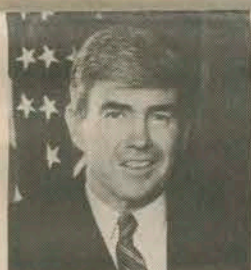

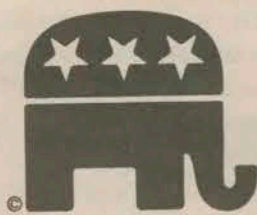

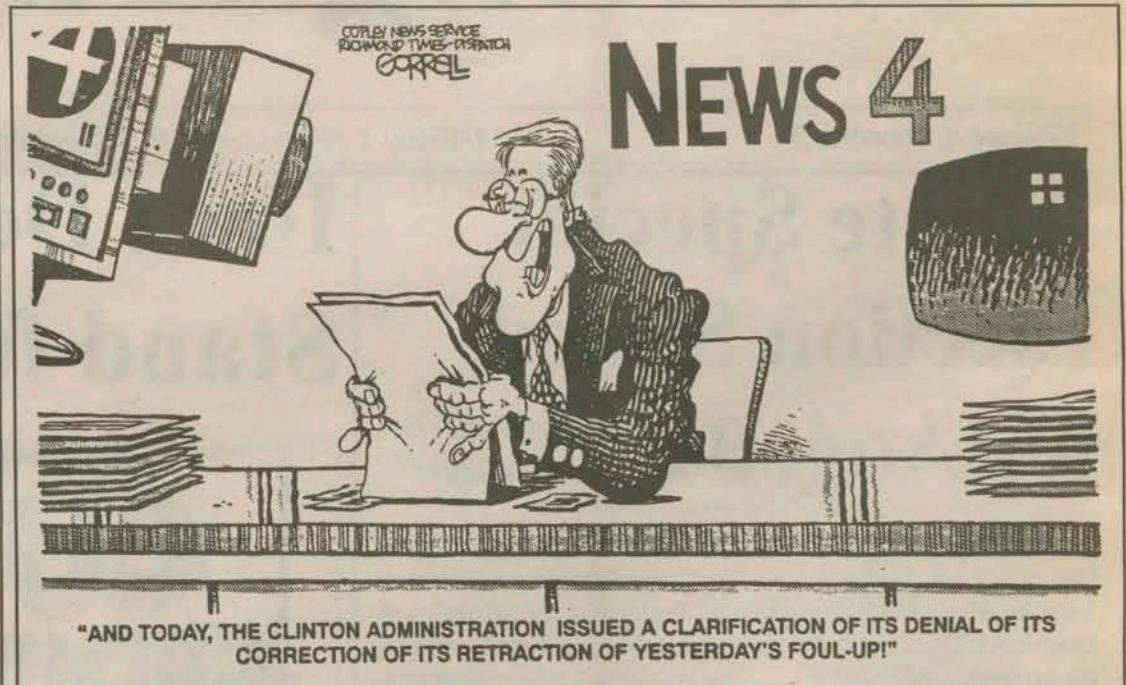

Democrat Smith Votes for Post Office Cover-up

Three Votes cast for Secrecy in Latest Scandal

Fourth District Democrat Congressman Neal Smith, the sole Iowa Democrat in the U.S. House who survived the 1992 elections, recently demonstrated his loyalty to the stench of corruption in the Democrat-controlled House of Representatives by voting against full public disclosure of the records on the House Post Office.

The most recent scandal involves revelations from the convicted former House Postmaster Robert Rota. Rota admitted helping two Congressmen embezzle more than \$30,000 in cash, according to the *Washington Post*. The Congressmen presented Rota with fraudulent official expense vouchers; instead of giving the Congressmen stamps (as the vouchers indicated), he gave them cash. The Congressmen also received cash in exchange for taxpayer-funded stamps, Rota admitted.

Information released by the government indicates that Congressman Rostenkowski (D-IL) -- a critical advocate of the Clinton agenda and powerful committee chair -- was one of the suspected Congressmen.

Former Iowan and U.S. Attorney Jay Stephens, who spearheaded the investigation, said on ABC's Nightline July 20 that he believes Rostenkowski will be indicted. "It's simply a matter of time," he said, adding that the total sum of money involved might add up to "hundreds of

thousands of dollars."

The rules of the House require that anyone indicted must resign from a committee chairmanship. Democrats know that the loss of Rostenkowski as Committee Chairman would effectively cripple Bill Clinton's ability to move his tax plan, health care, and other programs through the U.S. House.

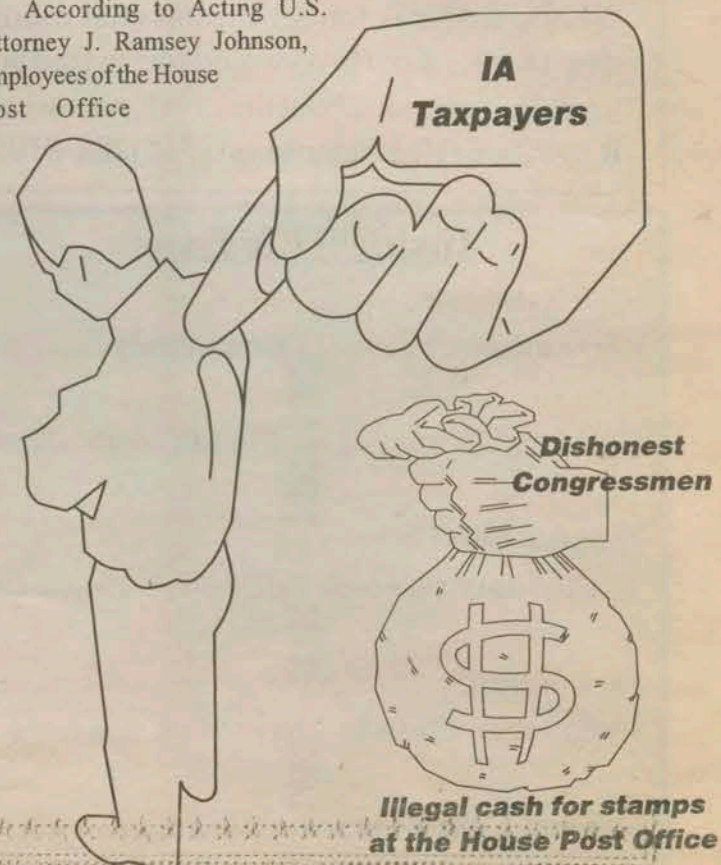
Congressman Neal Smith voted to keep the records on Rostenkowski from the public in July. Two previous votes made by Smith in 1992 rejected open disclosure or acknowledgement of the post office scandals (CQ vote 7 and 307).

13-Year Democrat Cover-Up

According to Acting U.S. Attorney J. Ramsey Johnson, employees of the House Post Office

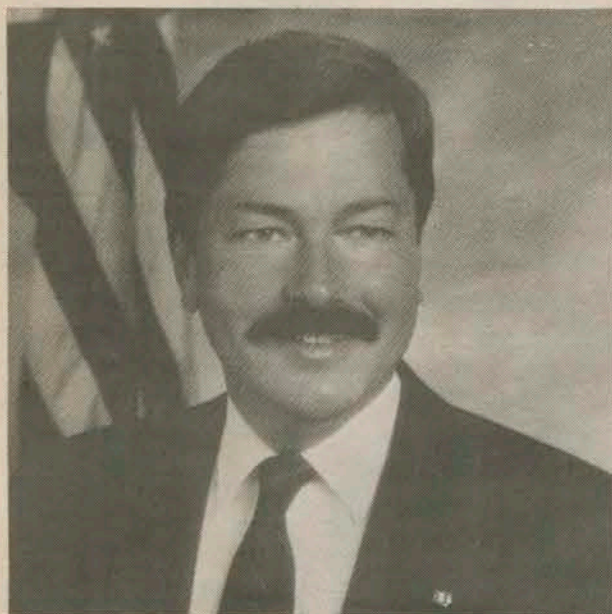
reported cash-for-stamp transactions benefitting Members of Congress as early as 1979, but House officers including Rota, had successfully managed to cover the allegations up.

The Capitol Police launched an investigation into narcotics dealing and cash-for-stamps embezzlement schemes at the Post Office in 1991. The probe was called off -- and given over to the Postal Inspection Service -- at the insistence of House General Counsel Steven Ross. Speaker Thomas Foley (D-WA) said that he approved of Ross' calling off the inquiry.

Early in July, *the Winning Edge* asked me to write an article focusing on the Republican Party's approach to solving the major problems facing America.

For crop losses, \$700 million plus \$300 million in contingency funding has been made available, as well as \$45 million for rural clean-up

efforts. The small business administration will have funds to leverage approximately \$300 million in disaster loans. I expect that action will have been completed on a package before congress recesses on August 7.

Iowans can take great pride in the leadership exhibited throughout this crisis by Governor Branstad, Senator Grassley, Congressman Leach, Congressman Lightfoot, Congressman Grandy, and Congressman Nussle.

Elizabeth has also asked me to extend her concerns to the people of Iowa. As President of the Red Cross, she made a number of trips up and down the Mississippi, where she was inspired by the spirit of "neighbor helping neighbor" which makes the midwest such a great place to live, work, and raise a family. She is also very grateful for your continued support of the Red Cross.

I have long taken heart in the Kansas State motto -- "To the Stars Through Difficulties." Iowans have experienced tough times before, and probably will again. But you always persevered. You always look ahead to better times. And I have no doubt that working together, Iowans will again reach the stars.

Please keep in touch, and let me know if the assistance provided by the Government is reaching you, and if I can be of any help.

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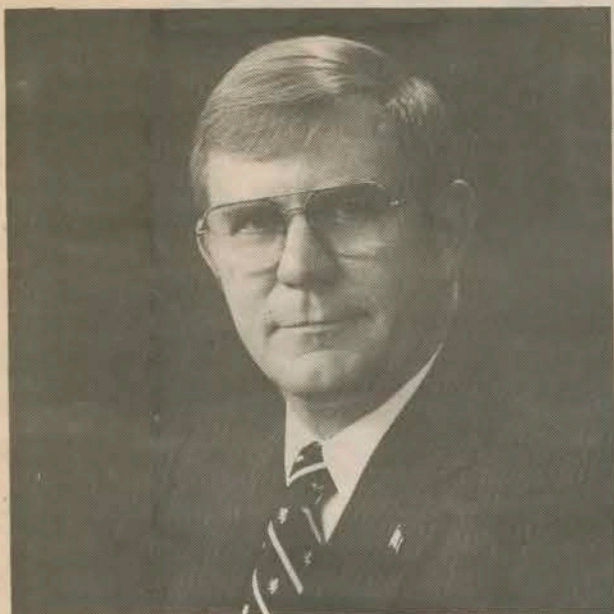

Republican Solutions: Insuring Iowa's Future

In the past months, Iowa's government has been beset by torrential rains that washed out fields and flooded businesses and homes. The damage estimates caused by the flooding will probably exceed \$3 billion, and will impact the State's already tight budget for many years to come.

During this crisis, however, Iowa has received national attention for the way in which volunteers from all walks of life pitched in to help their neighbors by sandbagging, distributing water, or cleaning flooded areas. Iowans showed the rest of the country that our people are not only strong in the face of adversity, but committed to helping one another in the finest sense of community and cooperation.

As elected officials, we should take a strong cue from our constituents. Just as the volunteers faced the rising

flood waters with calm and courage, we need to face these fiscal challenges with a clear mind and a common goal.

The fiscal pressure placed on us highlights the need for solutions the Republicans have been pushing for many years --retiring the debt, and establishing strong infrastructure and cash reserve funds. If the State had a debt-free budget, our government could meet necessary needs while also handling emergency expenditures. And, well-funded cash reserve and infrastructure funds could be used for rebuilding Iowa once the waters receded.

Just like the thousands of volunteers all across the state who pitched in to help others in an organized and systematic manner, Iowa's elected Republicans have, for the past two years, been fixing the fiscal problems facing Iowa in a steady and determined manner. The steps taken by Republicans to get Iowa's fiscal house in order may

have actually saved us from even bigger losses. If action had not been taken in the 1992 and 1993 sessions to restructure Iowa's budget and retire the State's debt, the fiscal impact to Iowa of the floods would have been more disastrous. As it stands, we presently have a cushion to ease the financial blow to the State.

These setbacks came just as Iowa had begun to turn the corner. But just as the floodwaters were met head on and eventually fought back, I am confident that we can meet and turn back these fiscal crises as well. 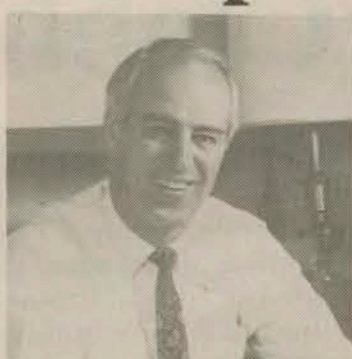
considered subchapter "S" corporations by the IRS. Under the Clinton proposal, they could see their taxes increased by a whopping 50 percent.

This proposal would allow spending to be shifted between government programs, thus giving the federal government flexibility to respond to emergencies such as the War in the Gulf or the flooding in the Midwest, yet would cap overall spending, producing a smaller deficit without tax increases.

Democrats Play Politics-- at Expense of Midwest

Flood disaster aid became the subject of a much heated debate in the House of Representatives this session. The debate highlights problems we have as a minority party in addressing crucial funding issues in Congress.

Congress didn't actually vote last week to delay funding to flood victims in the Midwest. The votes against bringing the issue to the floor were for other reasons that the Democrats just choose to forget.

Most representatives voted no because, in addition to approving funding for flood victims, the bill contained a little publicized pork barrel project to fund a non-disaster related jobs program for the City of Los Angeles. The Los Angeles jobs program that was included had never even been through a hearings process. The program had never been approved by a single committee. The program in Los Angeles, labeled a "teenage jobs program," changed the definition of teenager to include ages 17 up to 30 years of age.

It just so happens that the representative for the district who

would benefit from this boondoggle was one of the Democrats who really stuck her neck out for the president and voted for the BTU tax. Its funny how those things just "happen" up there in Washington, D.C.

How anyone could begin to try and categorize a poorly thought out temporary jobs program on the same level with the flood disaster in our state is beyond me.

Many of us who had legitimate amendments relating to the flood bill were barred from presenting them because of the closed rule. Others voted against this rule because they firmly believed that the bill should include budget offsets to pay for the emergency flood relief. Many of the members voted against the rule because they believe in open and free debate, especially when it involves spending money.

It was interesting that such a large majority of the House voted against the closed rule for the disaster aid bill. I think it is clear that it had nothing to do with them opposing disaster aid; they just didn't like being denied their right to debate the bill on the floor.

But the shenanigans on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives highlight one of the real problems in Congress - probably the basic reason we need change in the way Congress works.

The inability to get real issues debated openly on the floor has always been one of my major frustrations. Because the majority party controls all of the committees, the rules for debate on an issue are rigged from the

very beginning to make sure that outcome of the vote is, if not assured, reasonable predictable. Fiscally responsible alternatives on important funding issues often fall by the wayside. Innovative approaches are dismissed early in the process.

Even though some bills may be riddled with wasteful spending, it is impossible to point that out in debate on the floor because the Rules Committee (controlled by the majority party) has either closed or severely limited debate.

It is not by accident that you often can't tell what the Congress is voting on by just turning on your television. Too much of the actual law making goes on behind closed doors in committees, where the art of wheeling and dealing is perfected at the expense of the American taxpayer.

So if you could point to a part of Congress that is really broken, maybe debate on the floor is the place to start. It is difficult to address important issues and stir debate with a muzzle over your mouth.

But even with a muzzle, you can be assured that I will work tirelessly to make sure that we get the much deserved disaster relief for our state. I firmly believe that the American people all across our country are squarely behind helping their neighbors in time of need.



Disaster Aid System A Potential Disaster

The Administration and House leaders opted to mop up the Midwest floods through a disaster aid bill. It's a first-aid approach.

The best medicine, for victims of today's disaster, for future disasters, and for the national economy, involves creating a sound risk-management system. Eleventh-hour disaster bills can become disasters themselves.

I drafted a plan to create an emergency relief fund through the Federal Crop Insurance Corp., financed by floating bonds, to prepare for agricultural calamities. A host of national farm and insurance groups signed on, but House leaders said "No."

If there's any silver lining to the storm clouds that continue to hammer the Midwest, it's that they have shown the inadequacy of frantic last-minute aid bills.

For starters, aid bills are catchalls. President Clinton's \$2.5 billion disaster bill will pay for not only Midwest flood losses, but also for crop losses in other parts of the country due to drought, hail and wind. Iowa farmers will



probably get less than a quarter for every dollar of crop loss.

Disaster bills also add directly to the federal deficit. We should set aside some funds for disaster relief, as a form of budget insurance. We may not be able to predict disasters, but we can presume them.

After meeting with the president, I'm hopeful we will turn our crop insurance and flood insurance programs into viable risk-management tools. Right now, crop insurance costs too much and provides too little. It doesn't cover farmers who were unable to get crops in the ground, including many soybean producers this year. The program is undersubscribed,

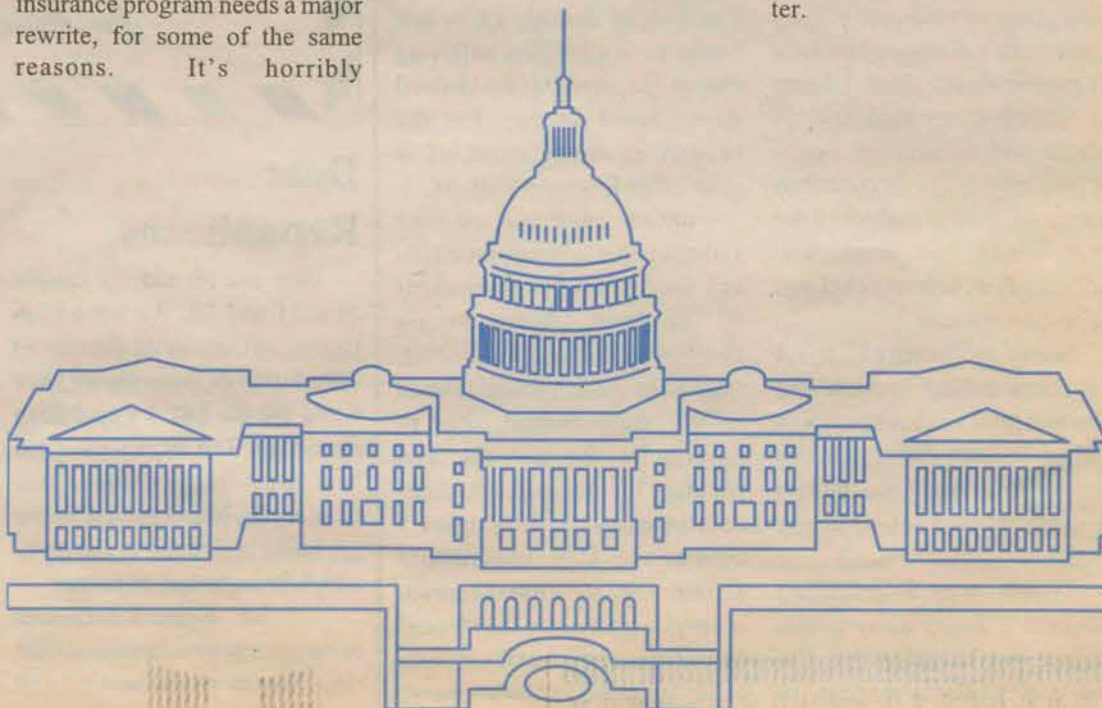
largely because we send mixed signals: We tell farmers they have to buy crop insurance, but we also tell them, "Don't worry, if there's a disaster, we'll bail you out."

While we're at it, the flood insurance program needs a major rewrite, for some of the same reasons. It's horribly

undersubscribed. Only 2 million of 12.6 million eligible subscribers actually bought coverage. Neither officials nor banks rigorously enforce the rules. And there's a question whether people should be in some flood plains at

all.

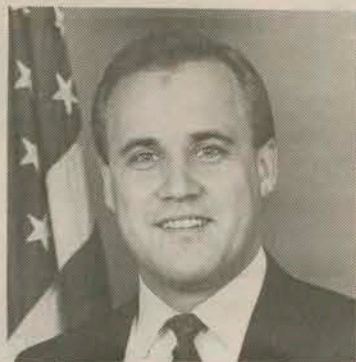
These are all issues we need to tackle sooner rather than later. Just because we have an emergency on our hands, Congress does not have to solve a natural disaster by creating a fiscal disaster.

A Tale of Two "Taxing the Rich" Floods Clobbers Everyone

I represent Iowans in their battle against two floods. One flood is from the rain and water of the past three months; and the other is from the flood of red ink from government spending for the past 30 years.

Iowans have watched our crops go under water, our homes flood out, and our hopes and dreams wash down toward an already swollen Mississippi River. As Americans, we've also watched our children's future wash away more and more every day as it gives way to the ever-rising flow of red ink known as the federal deficit and debt.

In Iowa, we have already made plans to rebuild. We will be successful because we believe in our principles, values and ourselves. In Washington, I urge Congress to take a lesson from Iowans in trying to tame the river of red ink during the next few weeks as it works to find ways to fund disaster relief.

I've urged Congress to provide federal disaster aid while finding offsetting spending cuts for the proposed \$2.5 billion in new spending. I think we can do both, but it will take some hard work.

I absolutely support providing federal disaster assistance for the flood-stricken people of the Midwest. The mere fact that this Congressman wants to pay for the obligations of a nation reaching out to a water-soaked region in need of help, should not and does not diminish my support for that assistance.

My message to Iowans and Congress is this: let's spend the money to provide relief for the thousands of Iowa's families, farmers, and businesses who have endured the worst natural disaster in our state's history. But let's not assume we should spend with our federal credit card first. I want to work to find a way to pay for it by cutting the fat out of our monstrous federal budget. Like every family, the government needs to pay its bills and I believe the money is there.

With all of the talk on Capitol Hill about cutting budgets, the experts are still predicting a deficit of close to \$300 billion for this fiscal year. Clearly, our budget crisis has not been solved by any means.

That's why I informed President Clinton in a special briefing last Thursday that I'm leading a bipartisan movement in

the House of Representatives to find offsets for emergency supplemental spending. Congressman Tim Penny (D-MN) and I have spearheaded a bipartisan effort with 15 other Members of Congress to work together with the House Appropriations Committee to find offsets for the supplemental spending.

To illustrate our task, the \$2.482 billion in disaster aid requested so far, represents .16379% of next year's proposed federal budget. On a smaller, but no less important scale, if a family making \$30,000 would be faced with a similar financial crisis, they would have to target \$49.14 to cut in their annual budget. Families would make those cuts if necessary, and the federal government should, too.

It's critical that disaster legislation be passed as quickly as possible and in a responsible fashion. Our bipartisan coalition believes that drafting the emergency supplemental appropriations bill with offsetting spending cuts will help to expedite passage of the emergency legislation, not slow it down.

Iowans are strong and believe in principles and values, such as do unto others as you would have them do unto you, and that people should pay for their obligations even in times of trouble.

I bring those same principles with me to Washington. I have worked hard to ensure that farmers, business owners, and families are given the help they need and deserve. The fact that I'm looking through the budget books in Washington believing that we can cut the bloated federal government to pay for the obligations of our assistance is what other Iowans would do.

Iowans have told me time and again that they pay their bills and want to see the government do the same. When Iowa's families sit around the kitchen table at the end of each month and review their budget, they're paying for the present, and planning for the future. In times of crisis and in times of peace, I believe the U.S. government should follow those common sense principles, so when the next levee breaks, whether it's in Iowa or Washington, we'll be prepared.

Clinton plan is anti-small business

Clinton Democrats have been trying to build support for increasing taxes by furthering class hatred between the middle class and the rich. After quickly abandoning his pledge of a middle class tax cut, Clinton shifted gears to emphasize that he wants "the wealthy to pay their fair share." The fact is, Clinton's tax increases will affect everyone--hurting the American economy just to finance Clinton's bigger government.

By Bill Clinton's definition of rich, our economy will suffer severely from crippling taxes on small and family businesses. Over 80 percent of small businesses file taxes as individuals. In fact, 72 percent of the so-called "family

incomes" of \$200,000 and up are small business incomes, not the wealthy taxpayers.

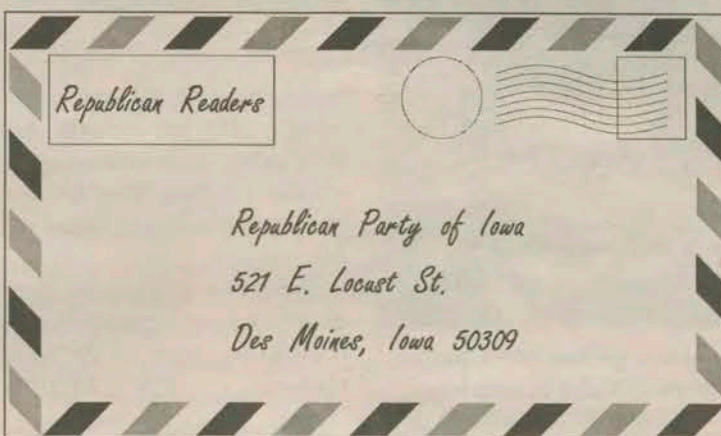
Small businesses are one of the greatest engines of our economy--creating the most new jobs in our country. Over the last decade, small business created 85 percent of the new jobs, according to Candidate Bill Clinton in 1992.

Mr. Bennett continues to state our beliefs in a wonderful way. We are so encouraged that he, Jack Kemp, and Bob Dole are

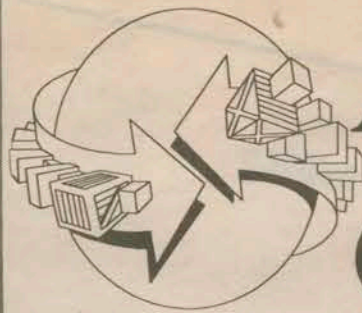
standing firm and speaking out with background authority on the many subjects for family friendly government...

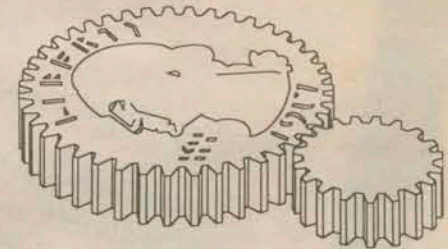

A Republican Growth Agenda for America

Republicans have an opportunity to defeat the Clinton tax increases aimed directly at small businesses, entrepreneurs, middle income families, and social security recipients and go to the American people with a superior agenda for jobs, economic growth, and renewed American leadership in the global economy.

Our first order of business must be debunking the Democrats' notion that higher taxes on anyone earning \$25,000 and above will lead to a more prosperous America.

Clinton's tax increases will weaken the economy, reduce revenues, and increase the deficit. The Clinton course is a repeat of the 1990 Budget Agreement when higher taxes, especially on the rich, were supposed to lower the deficit.

Instead the deficit increased from 3.1% of GDP in 1990 to 5% by 1992. Slower growth, compared with the four years before the deal, cost the Treasury \$180 billion in lost revenues in 1992 alone, according to estimates.

But, Democrats counter, raising tax rates on the wealthy will at least force them to pay their fair share. The truth is, wealthy Americans can easily shift money out of investments that create jobs into unproductive tax shelters or avoid paying taxes by reducing earnings in favor of non-taxed fringe benefits.

Both the Reagan-Kemp-Roth and Kennedy tax rate cuts demonstrated that lower rates actually increase the tax revenues paid by wealthy Americans. Following the Reagan cuts, the top 5% of taxpayers paid 43% of all taxed in 1990, up from 36.4% in 1980.

Congressman John Kasich, Senator Hank Brown, and the Heritage Foundation have put forward excellent plans to reduce the size of government and shrink the deficit without raising taxes. The key now is uniting these budget plans with a pro-growth agenda that really puts people first, not government.

Here are some ideas for a Republican growth agenda:

* ENCOURAGE ENTREPRENEURSHIP, SAVING, AND INVESTMENT.

The best way to rekindle the job-creating power of America's entrepreneurs is to expand the supply of risk capital available to finance creative new ideas and develop new products.

All provisions in the tax code affecting saving and investing should be immediately indexed to stop the corrosive effect of inflation. This includes indexing capital gains taxes, depreciation allowances, corporate tax rates, and retirement plans, such as IRAs and 401ks.

Ted Forstmann of Forstmann Little uses a striking example to illustrate the detrimental effect of inflation on saving. Consider a family which invested \$10,000 in stocks in 1971 and retired twenty years later with a portfolio worth \$37,000. After inflation the real value is unchanged, but because our capital gains tax is unindexed, the family is liable for a tax of nearly \$10,000 on a totally illusory gain. Thus, in reality, we're not taxing capital gains, but the formation of capital itself.

If we really want to encourage entrepreneurial capitalism and new businesses, ultimately we should phase out the capital gains tax altogether on long-term investments and eliminate it for anyone who works, saves, or invests in America's redlined low-income communities.

* TAX RELIEF FOR FAMILIES AND WORKING AMERICANS

The 1990 Budget Agreement started a trend toward higher tax rates combined with inefficient tax loopholes. The GOP should support the opposite approach by advocating a flatter, fairer, and simpler tax system that rewards, not punishes, success.

To spur job creation, we should adopt the main thrust of Senator Moynihan's plan to reduce the payroll tax, currently the greatest burden on middle class families and small businesses. Since the mid-1960s, the payroll tax has more than doubled from 7.25% to 15.3% today.

Republicans must also

champion tax reform that recognizes the family as America's paramount value-shaping institution. Economic growth is not an end in itself. The moral, spiritual, and cultural health of a nation is inextricably linked with the strength of the American family. That strength is being undermined by government policies, both economic and social, which are biased against marriage and families with children.

Increasing the dependent exemption, which has been eroded by inflation, would help parents to keep the resources they need to raise, educate, and nurture their children.

* SPENDING RESTRAINT

Spending restraint and regulatory relief should be part of an overall Republican philosophy of limited government. Government spending absorbs valuable resources, often for inefficient and wasteful purposes.

So while cutting wasteful spending, Republicans should propose strong budget caps to restrain government spending growth. Capping the rate of entitlement growth, except Social Security, at inflation plus population growth would save over \$250 billion over five years.

However, real spending control requires institutional changes to enforce accountability in the federal budget process. A Line-Item Veto, which Governor Clinton used in Arkansas, would help the President's eliminate pork-barrel spending.

TRADE

Open trade helped expand the global export market to \$3.1 trillion or 15% of worldwide output by 1989. Mr. Clinton is dangerously reversing course by threatening trade wars with Europe and Japan.

And, while President Clinton publicly supports the North American Free Trade Agreement, the only things he seems determined to export to Mexico are Al Gore's apocalyptic environmental policies. The key to U.S. economic growth lies in opening new markets to goods and services. Passing a clean, mutually-beneficial NAFTA agreement is the first priority.

The next step is to move

beyond NAFTA by negotiating a series of market-opening trade agreements culminating in a hemispheric free trade zone. Our ultimate goal should be to incorporate the Pacific Rim nations, Russia, and former communist states into a open global trading system.

While Bill Clinton's rhetoric is reminiscent of John F. Kennedy and Ronald Reagan, his policies are the most liberal of any president in this century.

Now is the time for Republicans to unite behind a growth agenda. Now is the time to draw a philosophical line in the sand with the new Democratic Administration -- to once again raise our banner as the party of

economic growth, low taxes, limited government, strong families, and equality of opportunity for all. Nothing could produce a sharper contrast with the policies of the Clinton Administration or better prepare our party for victory in the 1994 elections.
