JOSEPH W. MCGOVERN - 1993 HONOREE

Joseph W. McGovern, Esq. has been a major figure in the health and human service ministry of the Archdiocese of New York for almost six decades.

Born in the Bronx on February 22, 1909, he attended Our Lady of Mercy Elementary School and Regis High School. The year 1930 was not a good year even for a magna cum laude graduate of Fordham to seek employment, but Joseph quickly found a teaching position at his alma mater, Regis, where he remained for three years while studying at the Fordham Law School, graduating first in his class in 1933. He became a full-time professor at the Law School for seven years and was a part-time member of the faculty until 1966. Mr. McGovern has practiced law in New York City since 1933 and is currently senior partner at McGovern & Dawson. He was elected to the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York in 1961 and served until 1975. His Regents colleagues elected him Chancellor of the University in 1968 and he served in that position until 1975.

Mr. McGovern has been active in Church matters throughout his career, as a member of the Archdiocesan Legal Advisory Committee, legal counsel to Catholic Charities and a member of the National Diocesan Lawyers Association. In addition, he has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Calvary Hospital, President of the Board of Kennedy Child Study Center, Secretary of Mary Manning Walsh Nursing Home and a Director of and the Catholic Guardian Society. He is also a member of the American Association of the Knights of Malta and the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre.

Mr. McGovern's participation in civic affairs is equally impressive. He was a New York State delegate to the White House Conference on Education in 1955 and to the White House Conference on Children and Youth in 1960. He was a member of the New York City Community Mental Health Board from its inception in 1954 until 1962 and served from time to time as its acting chairman. He was also a Director of the Coalition of Voluntary Mental Health and Mental Retardation Agencies and a member of the Fund Distribution Committee of the Greater New York Fund, the predecessor of the United Way of New York City.

Mr. McGovern has received many awards, including the Achievement Award of the Fordham Law Alumni Association, the Annual Award of the New York Academy of Public Education and the Child of Peace Award of the Catholic Home Bureau. He has received honorary degrees from Fordham, Pace, Yeshiva, Mt. St. Vincent, Iona, Manhattan, New Rochelle, Marymount Manhattan, Colgate, Keuka and Siena.

Mr. McGovern was married in 1935 to Marie V. Gough of New York. Their family includes a daughter, four sons, twenty-one grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Alfred Emanuel Smith

Almost under the Brooklyn Bridge in New York, in an old tenement on South Street, Alfred Emanuel Smith was born on December 30, 1873.

He attended St. James School on the lower east side and sold newspapers on Park Row. His father died when Alfred was only thirteen. His school days ended and he undertook the care of his mother and younger sister.

Alfred started work in his father's trucking business. Soon he saw an opportunity to earn a little more money at the Fulton Fish market. Later he worked for a steam pump company in Brooklyn as a laborer.

Growing up in his neighborhood with a lively interest in all that was going on around him, he turned naturally to politics.

He married Catherine A. Dunn in 1900 and they raised five children: Alfred E., Jr., Emily, Catherine, Arthur and Walter. In 1903 he was elected to the New York State Assembly. He served in the Legislature for twelve terms being elected majority leader of the Assembly, then minority floor leader and, finally, Speaker of the Assembly.

In 1915 Alfred E. Smith was elected Sheriff of New York County and two years later, President of the Board of Aldermen. He was elected Governor in 1918 and served four terms.

Governor Smith was nominated for the Presidency of the United States by the Democratic National Convention at Houston in 1928.

Al Smith was known for his keen interest in the needs of people. His record was marked by great strides in the fields of public welfare and education. His legacy is epitomized by the slogan "people come first."

This annual dinner of the Alfred E. Smith Memorial Foundation, Inc. is a tribute to the memory of a great man. His care for the less fortunate is continued in the work of the Foundation which supports programs of numerous hospitals and agencies in New York City and State.

The Foundation That Honors Him

The Alfred E. Smith Memorial Foundation, Inc. was founded by His Eminence, Francis Cardinal Spellman, and chartered on May 14, 1946 to honor the memory of New York's legendary governor and to help care for the needs of the poor and the sick.

The Foundation supported the building of the Alfred E. Smith Memorial Hospital at St. Vincent's Hospital and Medical Center in New York City.
